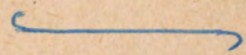
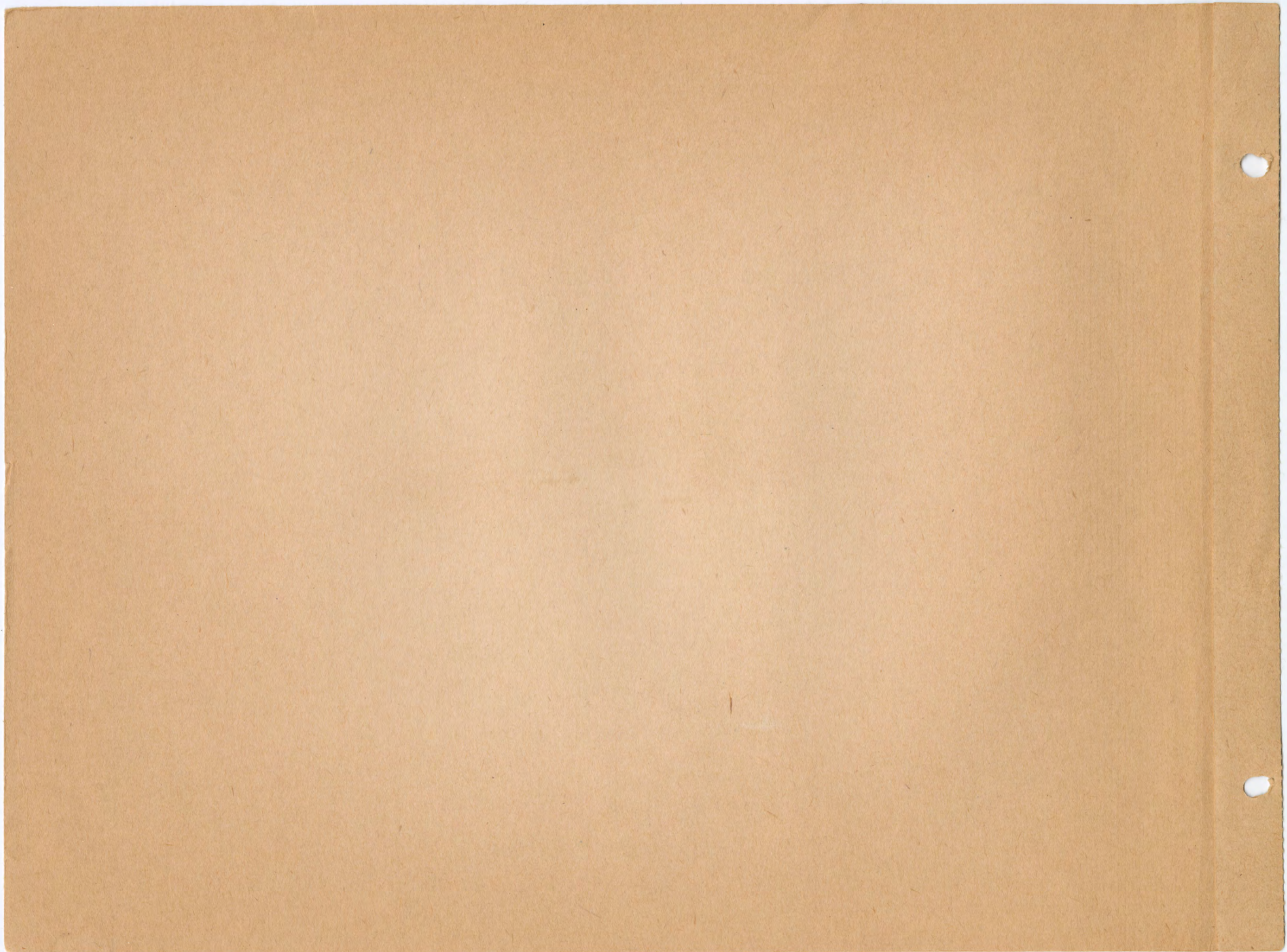

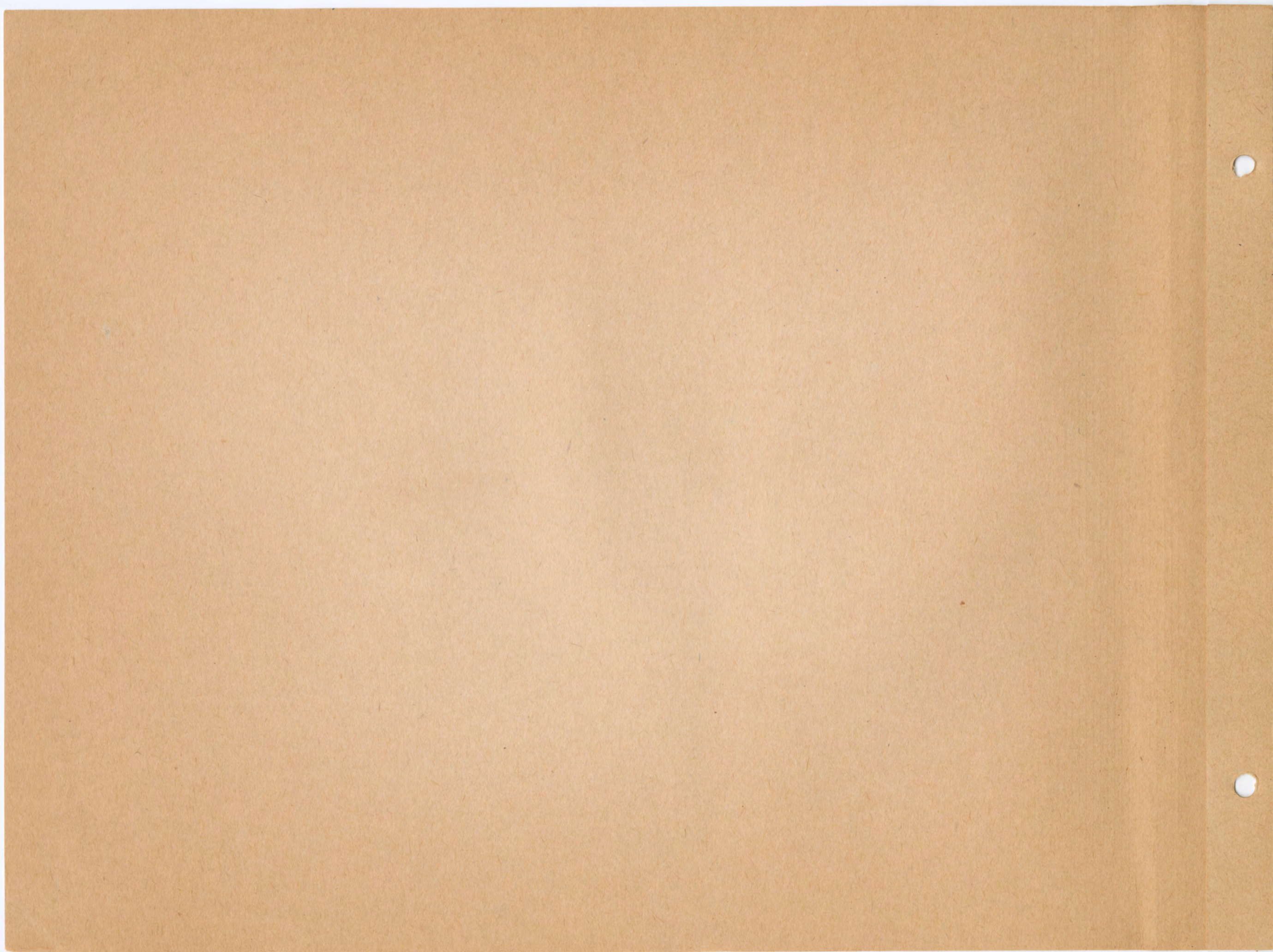

EARLY WORK AND ORGANIZATION OF THE COUNCIL

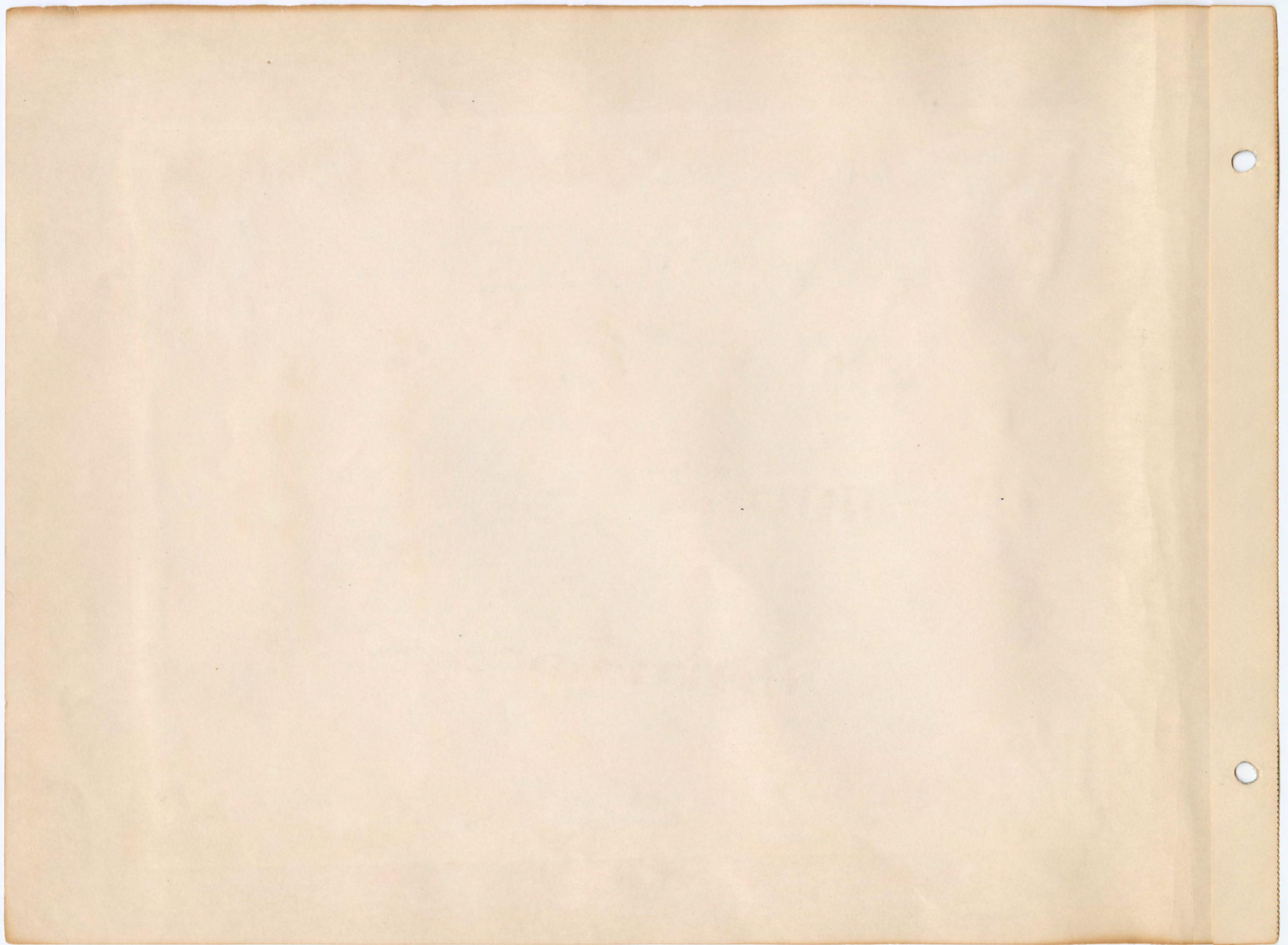
The following material was taken from a publication entitled The Reform Advocate (Texas Edition), published 3143 Dearborn St., Chicago, Ill., December 25, 1909, from the section entitled "Jews of Fort Worth" from an article entitled "The History of the Jews of Fort Worth", written by Miss Flora Weltman.

---"In April 1904, the Council of Jewish Women agitated the desirability of engaging the services of a Student of the Hebrew Union College to officiate at the fall holidays, promising to donate out of its treasury sufficient funds to defray the expenses." (As a result of this effort on the part of the Council, the services of Rabbi George Zepin were secured. The congregation had completely dissolved in 1903, and through the efforts of Rabbi Zepin, the congregation was again revived.)

--"In the winter and spring of 1907, the Council of Jewish Women, having made annual contributions to the congregation to maintain a paid choir, inspired by Dr. Jasin (Joseph Jasin who was appointed to Beth El congregation in 1904) agitated the purchase of a lot for the erection of a Temple in future years. The initiative in the way of monthly contributions by a small circle of ladies, for the purpose of establishing a real estate fund was taken, but on account of the very few members of the council that contributed to this fund, it was determined to raise a substantial fund for that purpose. Accordingly, a public dinner was given on March 17th, 18th and 19th, 1907, under the auspices of the Council, the committee having charge of that novel way of raising money, consisting of the President of the Council, Mrs. Theodore Mack, Mrs. A. M. Friend, Mrs. L. G. Schenck, Mrs. M. Alexander, Mrs. H. Brann, Mrs. D. Brown, Mrs. Jac. Mayer, Mrs. S. Miller.

In addition to these ladies, nearly all of the Jewish women of the City lent their aid. As a result, the sum of about \$500.00 was realized, and this sum was tendered Beth El congregation as the first donation of the Fort Worth Council toward purchase of real estate

(The property for the location of the Temple was secured, and eventually a suitable building was erected at the southeast corner of Fifth and Taylor streets. There was a room in this Temple where the Council of Jewish Women held their meetings. This room the



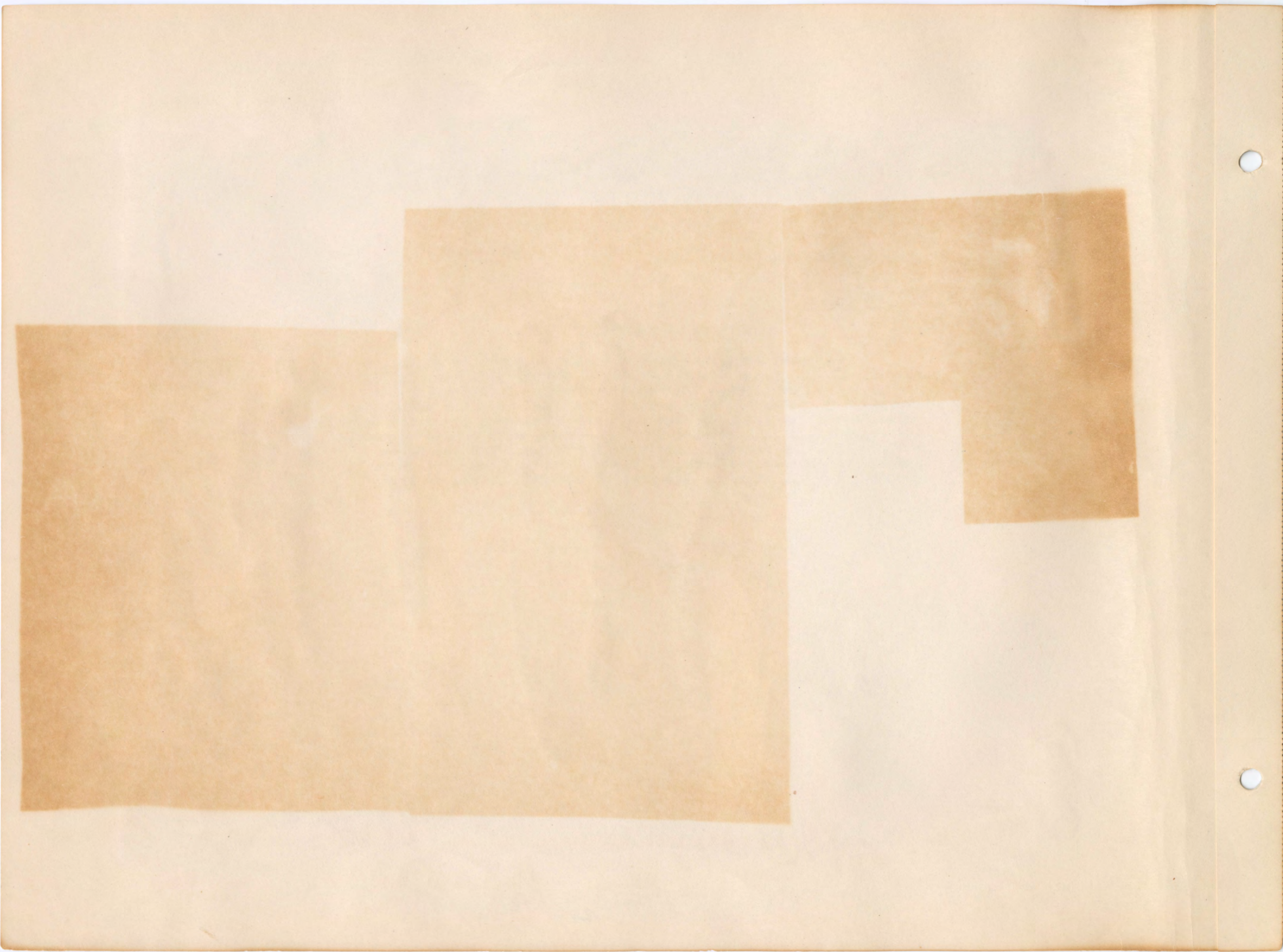

This society has maintained an active charity committee. It also meets every Monday for the purpose of pursuing various studies. For a period of several years the Council has conducted a night school for immigrants, with marked success. During its eight years of existence the Council has had these successful Presidents: Mrs. H. Brann, Mrs. M. Alexander, Mrs. T. Mack and Mrs. N. Stiefel, the present occupant of the chair." **

Americanization School Work - 1948

Americanization School To Be Opened Wednesday

The Americanization School sponsored by the Council of Jewish Women will be open to the public beginning Wednesday at 1 p. m. at the Hebrew Institute.

Persons wishing to obtain their citizenship or to receive further instruction may attend classes in citizenship, English, spelling and reading. No fee is charged for attendance at the classes meeting twice a week.

Schedules will be set up at the Wednesday meeting and final plans announced later, Mrs. Louis Rosenstein, teacher at the school, stated.

In the past the school, which

has been in operation for approximately 10 years, has made it possible for 30 persons to obtain citizenship papers. During World War II it helped to rehabilitate refugees who came to this country. It operates on a non-sectarian basis.

Americanization School Is Melting Pot; Council of Jewish Women Sponsor It

It is a real melting pot, the Americanization School that the Council of Jewish Women conducts. It is one of their services to all peoples from all countries.

Every Tuesday and Wednesday, from 12:30 to 2:30 p. m., women of all ages and many races make their way to the Hebrew Institute, 817 Taylor, where they are taught to speak and to write English. Those who are farther along than others also are taught how to take out their citizenship papers.



Mrs. Deen A REAL FRIEND to all these foreign-born people is Mrs. Abe Rosenstein, an understanding, sweet-faced woman, who for 16 years has been helping people of many races to become Americans.

Two evenings a week, from 7 to 9 p. m., on Mondays and Thursday at her home at 3112 Jennings, she teaches a class for displaced persons composed of eight men. Skilled artisans of several trades, tailors, mechanics and cobblers, find their way to her house, and she helps them to master the English language so that they may obtain better jobs.

The Council of Jewish Women sponsors this night school for men too. It is a part of their national program. Because their own people have suffered for so many centuries, as they have been pushed from first one country and then another, they have great feeling for newcomers in a new land. And for that reason their school embraces all people, not just those of the Jewish faith.

They must understand the workings of the Constitution of the United States and be prepared to answer legislative, judicial and executive questions on the government.

A REAL FRIEND to all these foreign-born people is Mrs. Abe Rosenstein, an understanding, sweet-faced woman, who for 16 years has been helping people of many races to become Americans.

BOTH THE DAY and the night school represents a real melting pot. There are war brides from Scotland, Ireland and England. There is a chauffeur from Mexico. And there are three women who have come from Greece since the war. Also there are displaced persons from Rumania, Poland and Germany, and this class is adding numbers all the time.

The council's service does not end with the newcomer. It helps people who go on having problems long after they have become citizens of this country.

In Mrs. Rosenstein's class at the Institute is an elderly woman who came into this country as a bride in her twenties. In a few years she had a family of five children and was too busy rearing these children to have time to learn to speak English. Now all of her children are living in other towns. She is learning to write English, so that she may communicate with her children.

IN THE CLASS also is an old lady who started her life in this country in the river bottoms. For many years she peddled second hand clothes. Her husband was a cobbler. They worked hard together. She learned to make a dollar go far.

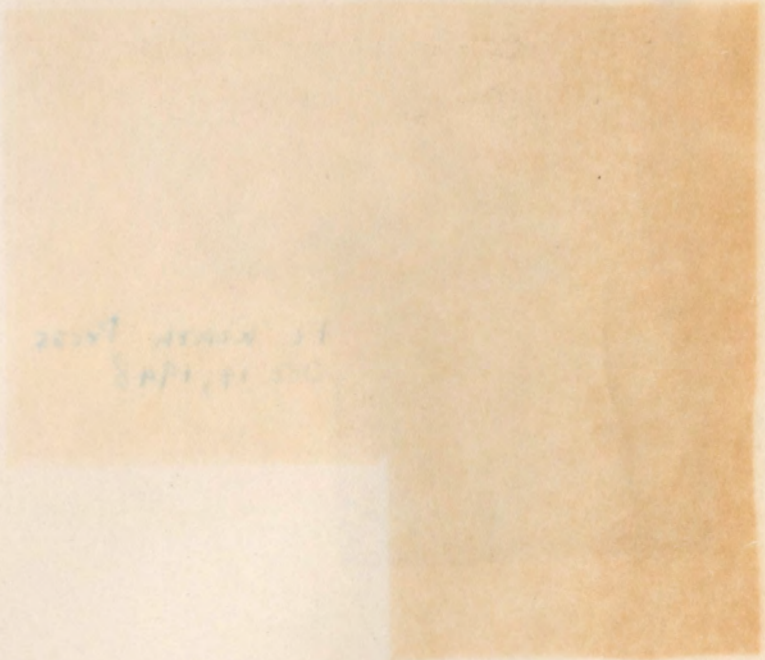
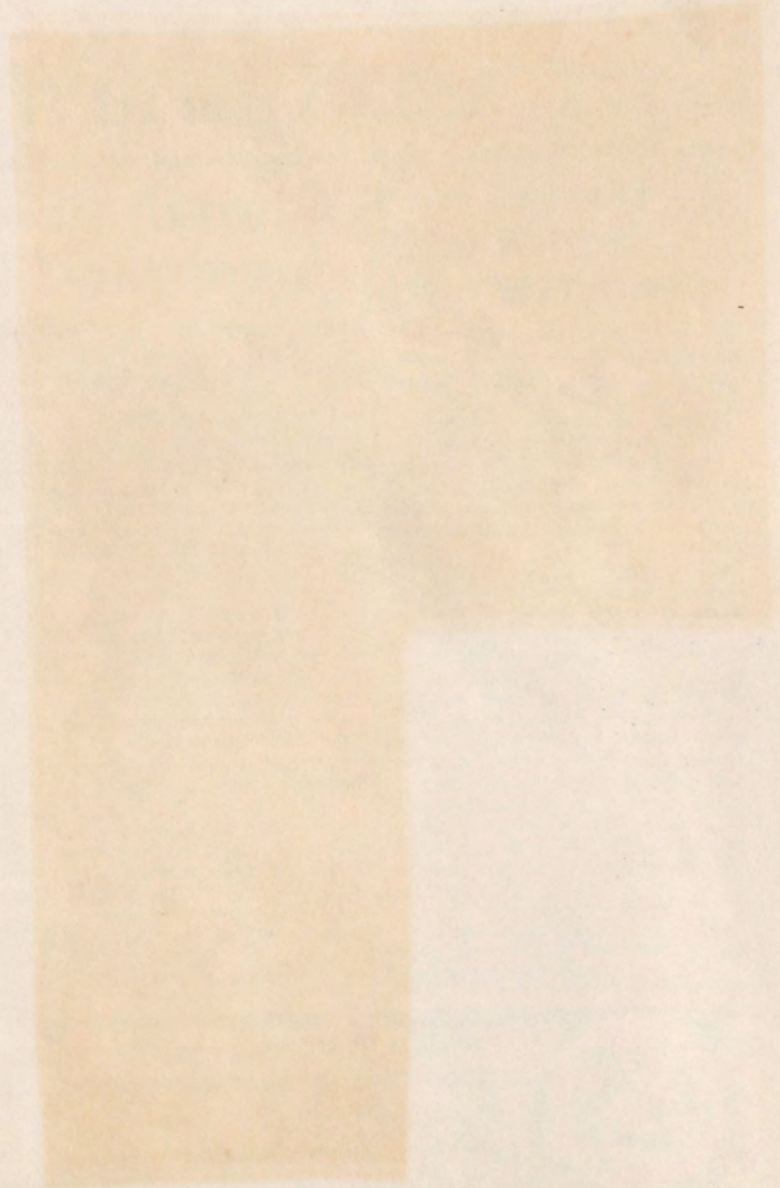
Even during the housing emergency she always seemed to be able to find ways to convert a part of her house into another apartment. And always she saved her money. Today she is comfortably fixed, but can not do what she would like to do most, and that is write her daughters who live in California.

In the council's Americanization School, she is learning how to do this. Mrs. Rosenstein could write a book on persons who have made up the school, for she has become more than a teacher to them. She has become a real friend.

They call on her frequently. Maybe it is over the telephone, to ask her how to spell bedspread. Maybe it is a personal visit, and they want counseling on a personal problem.

It is all a part of the service of the Council of Jewish Women, of which Mrs. Henry Mack is president, and which is back of the Americanization program with its more than 400 members.

Jewish Women Sponsoring Drive for Used Clothing

The Thrift Shop at Clinton and NW 25th, sponsored by the Council of Jewish Women, today announced another drive for old and used clothes.

Proceeds from the drive will be used for national and local welfare projects, including maintaining homes in Athens, Greece, for homeless girls, providing a fund to enable students from Europe to come to this country and receive scholarships to various universities in fields in which they can help rehabilitate Europe and to provide funds to help with the local Cerebral Palsy Center, Children's Hospital and Lighthouse for the Blind.

The drive will be started with a style show tea at 2 p. m., Dec. 1 at Temple Beth-El, Galveston and Broadway. Admission will be a bundle of clothes, preferably winter clothing for men, women and children. Toys and jewelry are also sought by the shop.

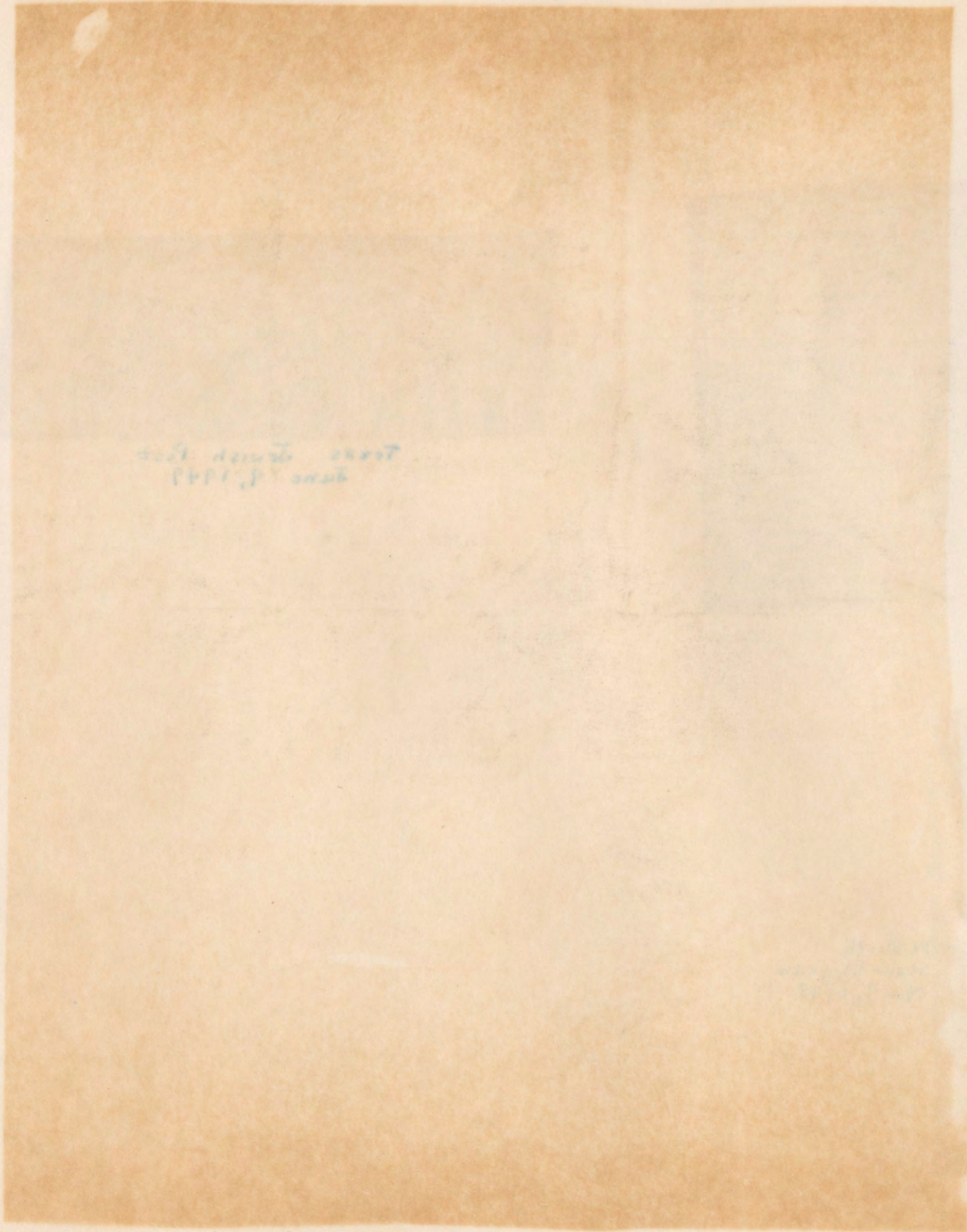
SOS Silver Tea Set Tomorrow at Beth-El Center

BY-LAWS FOR FORT WORTH SECTION
NATIONAL COUNCIL OF JEWISH WOMEN

ARTICLE I

NAME

The name of this organization shall be the FORT WORTH SECTION, NATIONAL COUNCIL OF JEWISH WOMEN.

ARTICLE II

OBJECT

The object of this organization shall be to promote the purposes, ideals and program of the National Council of Jewish Women with such adaptations as local conditions warrant or demand.

ARTICLE III

MEMBERS

Section 1. Any woman may become a member of this Section of the National Council of Jewish Women by sending to the Section her name and annual dues for the current fiscal year.

Section 2. A member of any Section of the National Council of Jewish Women taking up her residence in this community may, upon presentation of her membership card, become a member of this Section for the current fiscal year.

ARTICLE IV

FISCAL YEAR

The fiscal year shall extend from January 1st through December 31st.

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ARTICLE V

DUES

Section 1. The annual dues for all members shall be four dollars, payable in advance.

Section 2. This Section shall send to the National Office such annual per capita dues as shall be determined by the National Council of Jewish Women.

ARTICLE VI

OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS AND THEIR ELECTION

Section 1. The elected officers of this organization shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, (a Social Secretary), a Financial Secretary, an Assistant Financial Secretary, a Treasurer, an Auditor, and a Historian. They shall be elected at the March meeting to serve for one year, or until their successors are elected and qualify.

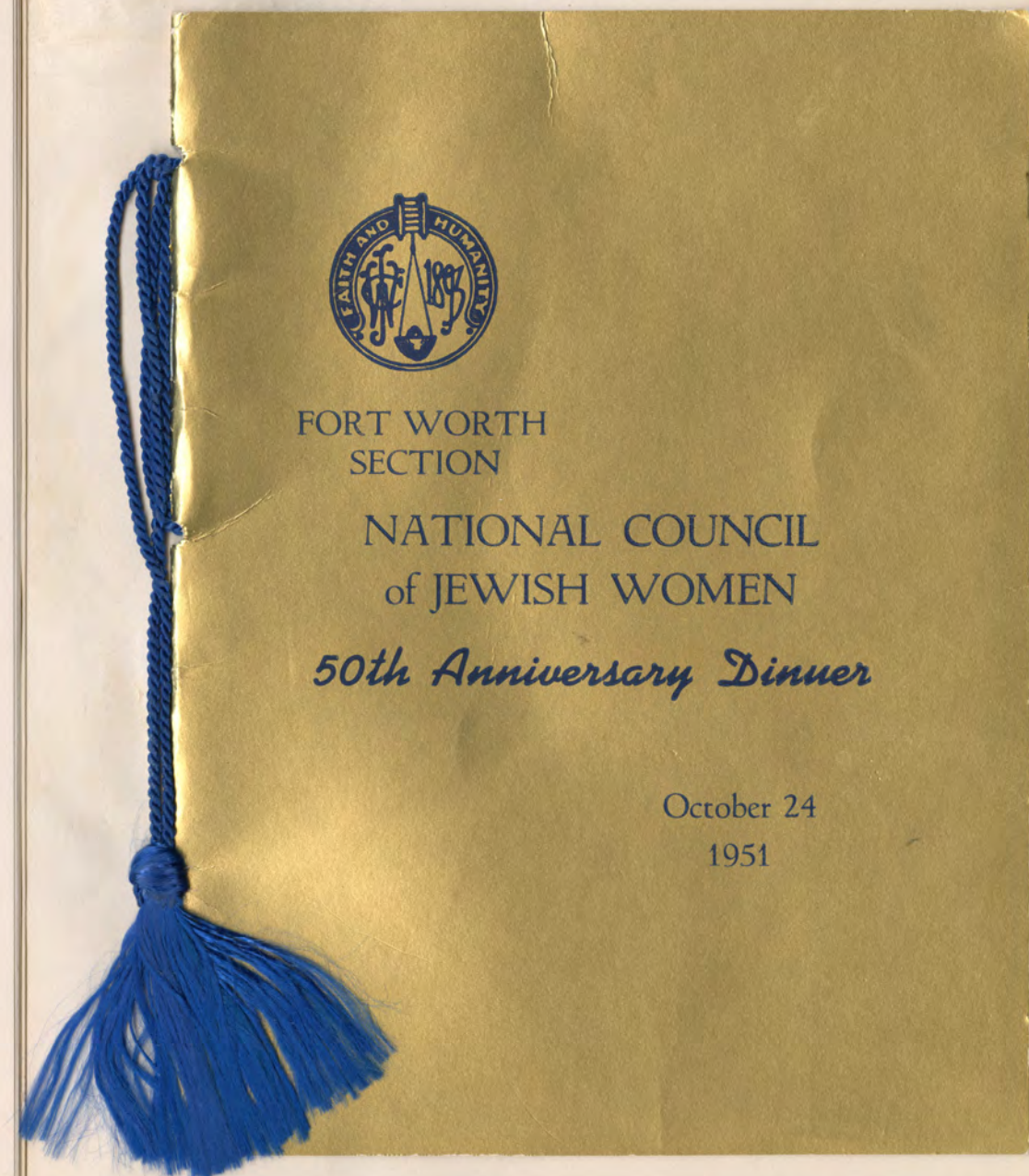
It is recommended that the President and Treasurer not be changed in the same year.

Section 2. There shall be an elected Director for each fifty members. One-half of the Directorate shall be elected at each annual meeting to serve for a period of two years, or until their successors are elected and qualify.

Section 3. There shall be a Nominating Committee to be considered as a Standing Committee, appointed by the President with the approval of the Board of Directors, which shall consist of five (5) members, the Chairman and one (1) of whom shall be members of the Board and the remainder taken from the general membership.

Section 4. The report of the Nominating Committee listing candidates for the places to be filled shall be presented to the Board of Directors and filed with the Secretary at the regular meeting of the Board of Directors in February. The report of the Nominating Committee listing nominees for offices, direc-

torships shall be presented at the February general Meeting, at which time there may be additional nominations from the floor. The Nominating Committee shall also, from time to time, recommend to the Board of Directors names of persons to fill vacancies.

Section 5. Elections shall be held by ballot at the March Meeting, except where there is but one nominee for an office. A plurality of votes cast shall elect.

Section 6. A vacancy in any elective office or directorship shall be filled by the Board of Directors for the unexpired term.

Section 7. This Section shall be entitled to representation at National Conventions in accordance with the By-Laws of the National Council of Jewish Women and at Regional Meetings in accordance with the By-Laws of the Southwest Interstate Conference of the National Council of Jewish Women. Delegates and alternates to National and Regional Conferences shall be nominated and elected at a General Meeting at least one month before the conference.

ARTICLE VII

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. President: It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings of the Section and of the Board of Directors. She shall appoint the Chairman of all Standing Committees and such Special Committees as occasion demands, with the approval of the Board of Directors. She shall appoint the members of all committees in consultation with the respective chairmen. She shall be ex-officio a member of all committees except the Nominating Committee. She shall make an annual report to the Section, a copy of which shall be sent to the National Office. She shall perform such other duties as usually pertain to the office and as are specified in these By-Laws.

Section 2. VICE-PRESIDENT:

A. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Presidents in their order to perform the duties of the President in her absence or inability to serve.

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B. Each Vice-President shall supervise and control such group of activities of the organization as the President shall determine.

C. The Vice-Presidents shall succeed to the Presidency in order.

Section 3. RECORDING SECRETARY: It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep a record of the transactions of the meeting of the membership and of the Board of Directors. She shall be custodian of all records belonging to the Section.

Section 4. CORRESPONDING SECRETARY: It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to conduct the business correspondence of the Section and the Board of Directors and to send out all notices of the meetings. She shall keep a full and correct list of members with their correct addresses.

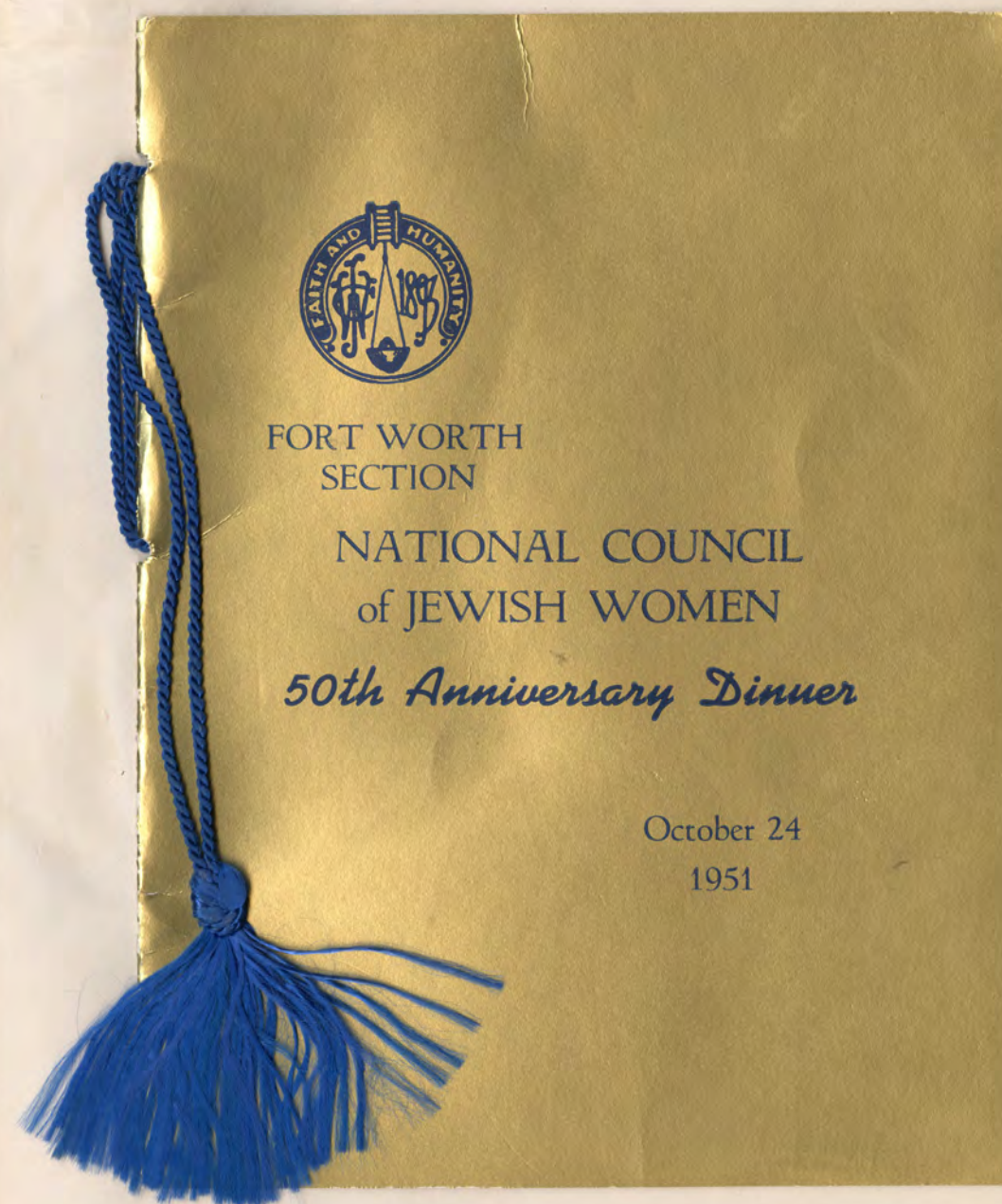
Section 5. SOCIAL SECRETARY: It shall be the duty of the Social Secretary to conduct the social correspondence of the Section.

Section 6. FINANCIAL SECRETARY: It shall be the duty of the Financial Secretary to issue bills to members and to collect all dues. She shall keep an accurate record of all financial transactions pertaining to membership. She shall send regularly to the National Office such reports as shall be required.

Section 7. ASSISTANT FINANCIAL SECRETARY: It shall be the duty of the Assistant Financial Secretary to assist the Financial Secretary in all duties of that office.

Section 8. TREASURER: It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to collect and receive all money due the Section and to be custodian of all its funds. She shall be bonded in such sum as the Board of Directors of the Section shall determine. She shall send to the Treasurer of the National Council, in accordance with its rules and regulations, annual dues for each paid member. The Treasurer shall disburse from the remainder of the funds only upon order of the Section or the Board of Directors, signed by the President. She shall be a co-signer with the

President of all checks. She shall submit a written report at the Annual Meeting and at all meetings of the Board of Directors. She shall send a copy of the annual report, after it has been audited and accepted by the Section to the Treasurer of the National Council.

Section 9. AUDITOR: It shall be the duty of the Auditor to audit the accounts of the Treasurer at the close of the fiscal year and to submit a report at the Annual Meeting of the Section.

Section 10. HISTORIAN: It shall be the duty of the Historian to preserve a scrap book of clippings, mementos, etc., of the Section and its work.

ARTICLE VIII

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. The elected Officers and Directors, the past-presidents, and the Chairmen of Standing Committees shall constitute the Board of Directors.

Section 2. The Board of Directors shall hold meetings monthly on the Wednesday preceding each General Meeting. Special meetings shall be held at the call of the President or upon the written request of three (3) members of the Board. A quorum for a meeting of the Board shall be one-fourth of the members of the Board.

Section 3. The Board of Directors shall have general supervision of the work of the Section, including budgeting and control of finances, and shall perform such other duties as the Section shall decide.

Section 4. A member of the Section holding office in the National Council of Jewish Women or in the Regional Conference shall, during her incumbency, be ex-officio a member of the Board of Directors of the Section.

ARTICLE IX

MEMBERSHIP MEETINGS

Section 1. ANNUAL MEETING. The annual meeting for the installation of Officers and Directors and the presentation of annual reports to the membership shall take place in May of each and every year.

Section 2. REGULAR MEETINGS: Regular meetings of the Section shall be held once a month from October to May inclusive at such time and place as the Section may determine, except when deemed inadvisable by the Board.

Section 3. SPECIAL MEETINGS: Special meetings may be called by the President and the Board of Directors or upon the written request of ten (10) members.

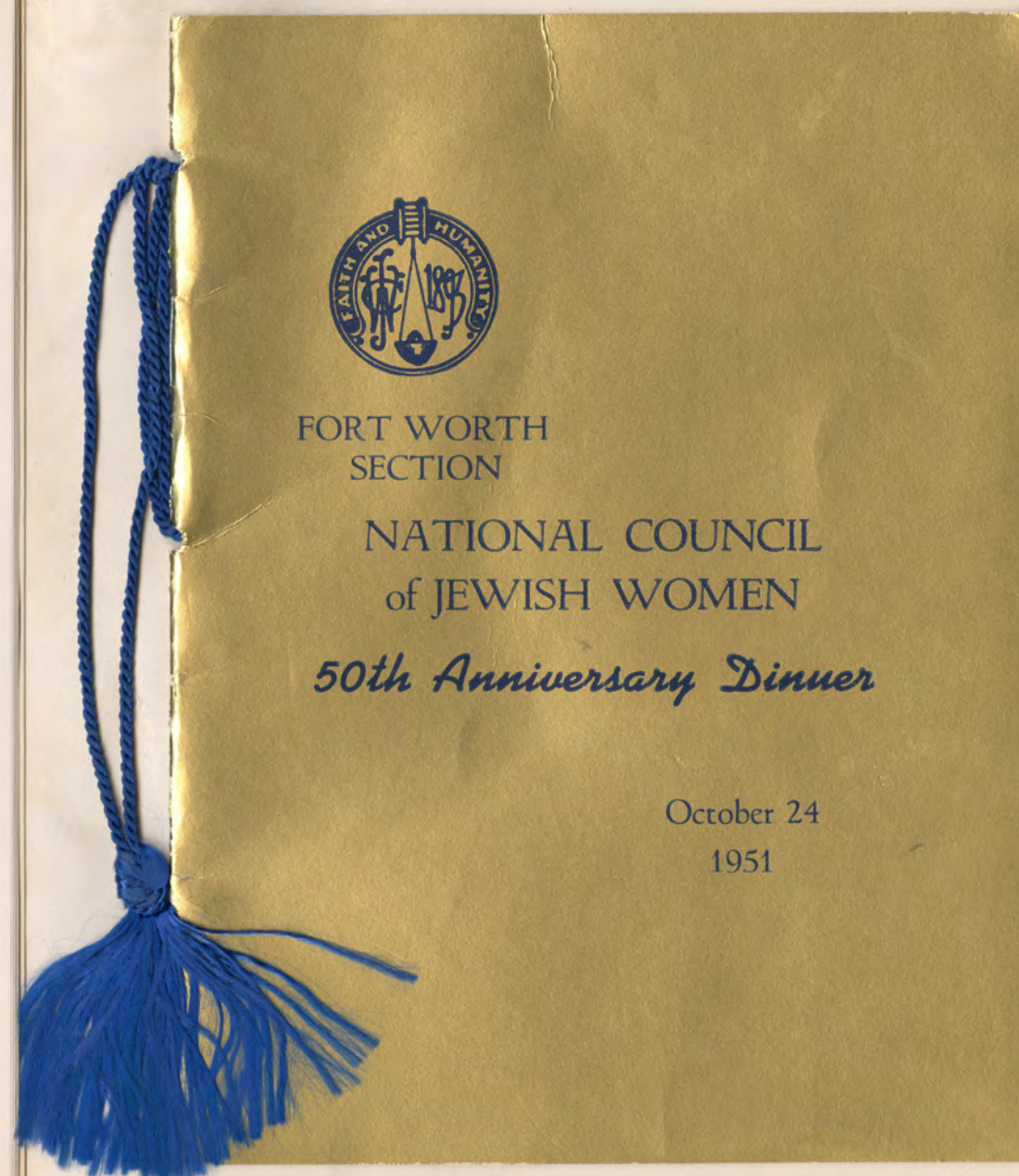
ARTICLE X

Section 1. A. There shall be as many Standing Committees of at least three (3) members each paralleling the National Committees as are necessary to carry on the National program as well as such additional Committees as are necessary to the work of the Section.

B. The President shall appoint the Chairmen and shall appoint Vice-Chairmen, and the Chairman shall appoint her committee members in consultation with the President.

Section 2. The President may also from time to time appoint Special Committees which may be necessary.

Section 3. Within a reasonable time after its appointment, each Committee shall submit to the Board of Directors a comprehensive program of the work which it proposes to do. It shall render a report whenever called upon by the President to do so and shall also submit its annual report to be filed with the Secretary, giving a resume of its work of the club year of the Section. Copy of such report shall be sent to the National Office, when requested.

Section 4. There shall be an Executive Committee composed of the President, immediate Past-President, First Vice-President, the Recording Secretary and one member at large who shall be chosen by the body which shall meet when called by the President. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to make a preliminary survey of some matters which may require the attention of the Board of Directors, so that when the Board of Directors is required to make a decision with respect to any matter properly before it, it will have all available details.

Section 5. There shall be a Finance Committee, which shall include the Financial Officers. This Committee shall prepare the budget for approval by the Board of Directors and shall be responsible for the overall financial operations of the Section.

ARTICLE XI

PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

The rules contained in Robert's "Rules of Order Revised" shall govern this Section in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the By-Laws and the By-Laws of the National Council of Jewish Women.

ARTICLE XII

AMENDMENTS

These By-Laws may be amended by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of those members present and voting at a general meeting regularly called, after one (1) month's advance notice has been given and a copy of the amendment has been mailed to each member at least ten (10) days before action is to be taken, and provided that the proposed amendment is not inconsistent with the Articles of Incorporation, the By-Laws and the Policies of the National Council of Jewish Women. Amendments are proposed upon the recommendation of the Board of Directors.

POLICIES

POLICY AND PROGRAM

When a fundamental change in Section policy or program is contemplated by the Fort Worth Section, National Council of Jewish Women, said policy should originate with the Executive Committee, be recommended by the Board, and ratified by the general body.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

A. The Executive Committee shall be responsible for the supervision of all efforts related to carrying out the annual program of the Section. In particular, it shall follow closely the trend of income, shall control expenses, and shall take the initiative in effecting changes in the operating program and budget if unanticipated developments suggest that necessity.

B. Affiliation with or participation in organizations and conferences not previously considered by the Board, and emergency action not contemplated in the usual duties of this committee shall be referred to the Board for review, ratification or disapproval, not acted upon by this committee alone.

PUBLICITY

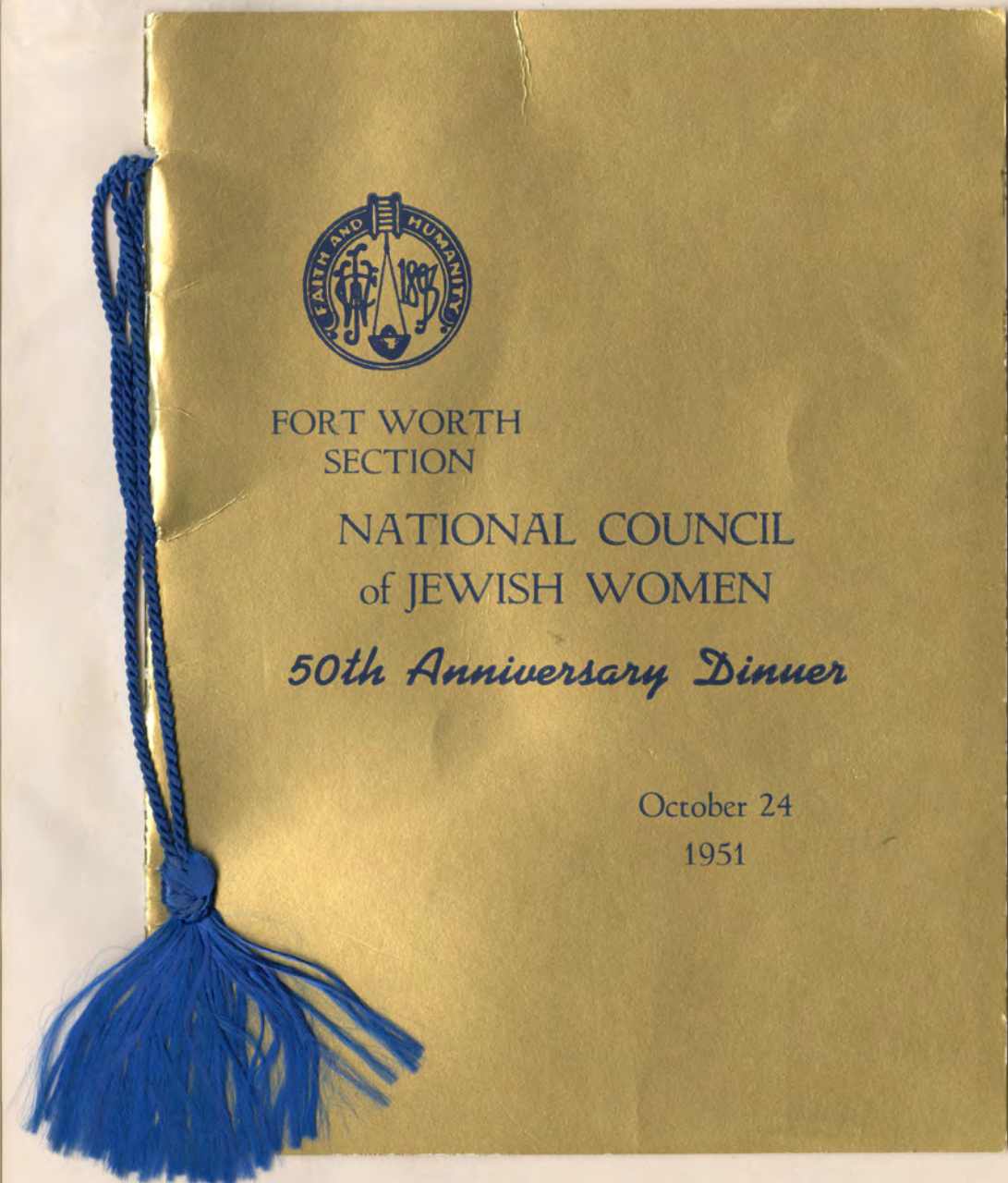
No publicity concerning this Section or its activities shall be released by anyone other than the President, the Vice-President in charge of the Department of Administration, or the Publicity Chairman.

CIVIC COOPERATION

The President shall appoint all representatives to other organizations, and they shall be members of the Public Affairs Committee, or other members duly authorized by the President.

DELEGATES

The Section shall pay all the expenses of at least one delegate, and the Registration Fees of all delegates, to all National and Regional Conferences.

LEGISLATION

The Section may not, as a Section, work against National Council's stand on any legislative matter. The Section shall not, as a Section, publicly support National Council's stand on any legislative matter until that matter has been studied and voted upon by the Section.

CONTRIBUTIONS

All funds raised by the Section are raised for Council work, either national or local. Therefore, as we are ourselves a service organization, no sum shall be given to any other group or organization from the General Fund in excess of \$25.00; as funds are available they shall be spent on Council's own community welfare projects for the benefit of the entire community.

FUND RAISING

All fund raising projects shall originate with the Ways and Means Committee, and shall be approved by the Board of Directors.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

1950 - 1951

A report to you of your work and your accomplishments for the year now ending is so much a continuation and amplification of last year's report that it might well be entitled "Episode II" For indeed Council's goals are service to our fellow Jews everywhere, welfare work in our own community, and education of ourselves and others to be intelligent citizens of our own country and of the world. And these high aims can have no beginning and no ending, no "club year" and summer vacation." Let us analyze this year's installment, and see how our Section has met its responsibilities.

The Service committees, under the capable and devoted supervision of the 3rd Vice-President, began the year's duties. The Service to Foreign Born department found itself committed to a greatly enlarged obligation to our New American families. There were Council committees, each with a Chairman, Co-Chairman and many workers, in charge of meeting the newcomer at the train and being a "big sister" to the family until its orientation was complete; of finding an apartment for each family unit; of seeing that that home was furnished, clean, equipped, and stocked with food; of attending to the clothing needs of the family. These tasks involved countless hours of exhausting, dedicated work, and every woman who worked on this project deserves the gratitude of the entire membership; their actual reward, I am sure, lies in the fine adjustment being made by the families they have served. The other phase of our Service to Foreign Born job, our schools, has also had a successful year, under the leadership of its director, and the many volunteers who have helped her. The night school, for our own DP families, continued throughout the summer, teaching English to 12 men and women. The day school served 15 men and women, of all religious faiths, and of many, many nations of origin, teaching them English, helping them apply for citizenship, and assisting them in passing their final citizenship examinations. An innovation at the day school, this year, was the nursery, without which the school could not have functioned, and which was manned by some of our most faithful volunteers.

The Community Welfare Committee cooperated with the Service to Foreign Born workers by sponsoring, planning and carrying out a full day's institute to train our workers with New Americans. This training course, headed by the director of our Jewish Federation and two professionals from Dallas, was an excellent one, and its success was due to the planning of the Community Welfare Chairman and Co-Chairman. This committee has been busy during the last few months in laying the groundwork for our 50th Anniversary welfare project for the Fort Worth community, and has had interviews with the Council of Social Agencies, the Volunteer Bureau, the Sociology Department of TCU, and the department of special services of our public schools. This work is not yet completed. Its Chairman and Co-Chairman have also represented us at meetings of the Council of Social Agencies, ASW and Red Cross.

Community services contributed by us during the year just ended included:

1. Volunteer workers and financial assistance to the Light-house for the Blind, under its Chairman.
2. Parties given to the children at the Cerebral Spastic Center, and Board membership of the chairman of that committee.
3. Small financial assistance and Board membership at the Children's Hospital.
4. A spring party for the children at the All Church Home.
5. Some clerical assistance to the Jewish Federation.
6. A party, under the direction of the chairman of our committee for the Jewish Social Service Agency, for one of our young DP's who was called into the armed services.
7. An intensive month's work, by almost fifty Council volunteers, in the March of Dimes campaign.

Our Sewing Room, under a series of chairmen, completed a project for the Red Cross, and are currently working on children's clothing, with material supplied by Hadassah, to

be distributed by them, a cooperative project which is most commendable.

The Memorial and Happy Day Fund, thanks to its efficient custodian has this year been able to furnish not only the customary scholarship for a Fort Worth teacher to attend the summer institute of Human Relations at the University, but has also been able to contribute a helpful sum to the operation of our night school.

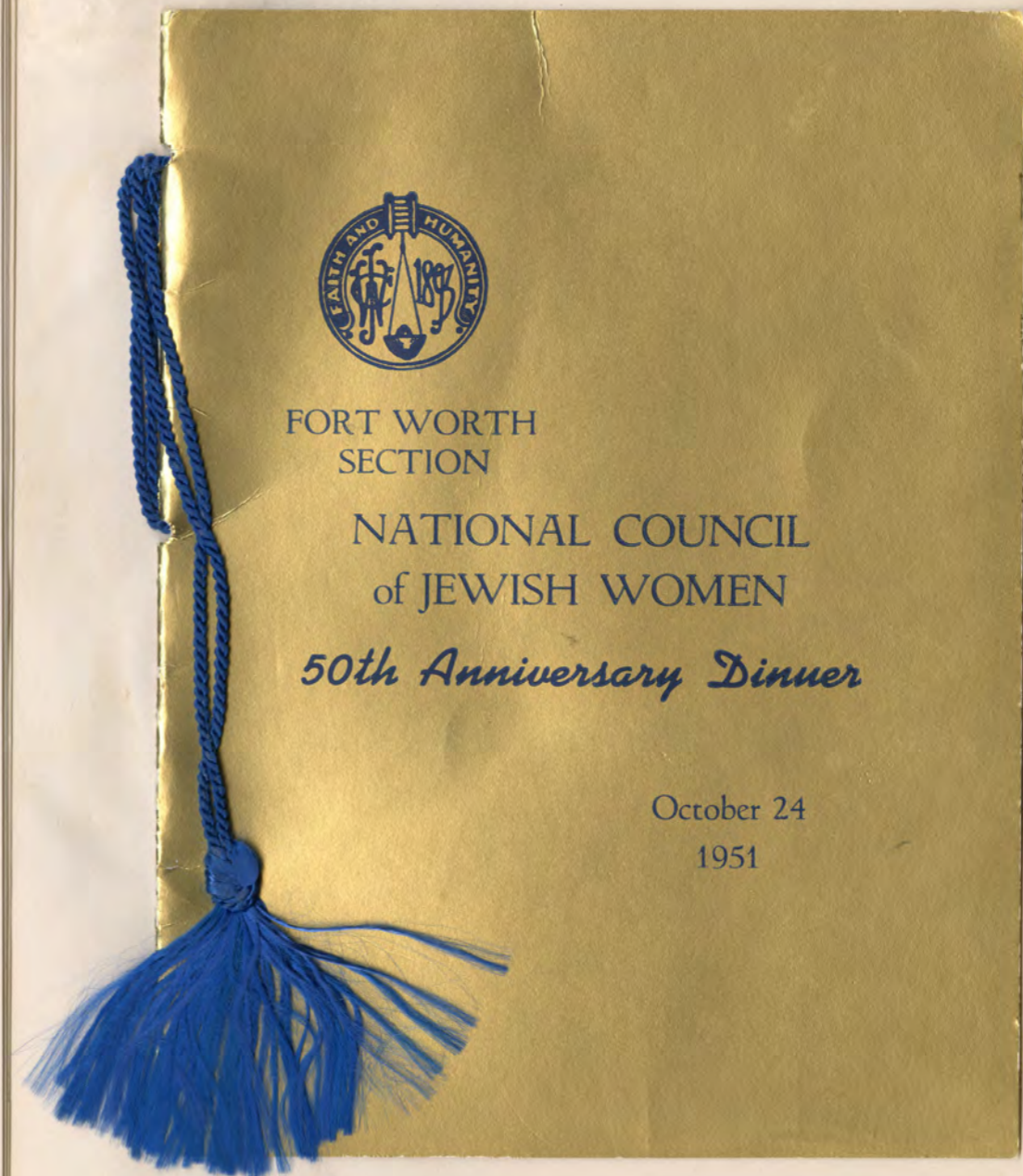
The Community Cooperation committee, with its day chairman and night chairman, has faithfully attended all civic and organizational meetings to which Council was invited.

I am happy to report that this year saw the re-activation of our Section's Ship-A-Box activities, with six boxes sent to the school in Morocco which has been newly assigned to us. Both the Ship-A-Box chairman and Co-Chairman, and the Overseas chairman, are responsible for the successful resumption of this important service.

Now for the record of our year's activities in the field of Education and Social Action. Our 2nd Vice-President has served as Education Chairman, coordinating the work of all the Education committees, and her leadership has been an inspiring one. The Study Group represented the combined efforts of the Chairmen and Co-Chairmen of each of the three Education committees, and it is to these women, to those who served as discussion leaders and resource chairmen, and to the members who so generously offered their homes for meetings, that we owe our thanks for a year's unusually stimulating study course. When its work is complete, we will have had three meetings each on Contemporary Jewish Affairs,

International Affairs, and Social Legislation (one state and two national). In addition, the Social Legislation committee had its own "Pay Your Poll Tax" campaign, and brought calls to action to the membership to be voted on when necessary. Many letters were written by them to our congressmen and legislators. A digest of "Spotlight" was brought to the general meetings several times during the year.

The Education department is indebted to our National



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Chairman, Mrs. Willen, for the inspiration of her visit. She was able to explain the discussion technique to our chairmen, and it seems the consensus of all who attend the study group that it has been an excellent innovation.

To the Program Chairman, and her Co-Chairman and committee, we owe our thanks for the planning and execution of the delightful programs of our luncheon meetings, covering, this year, the following Council themes: membership, Education, Service to Foreign Born and Overseas Projects, plus a recording of the Council Day broadcast. This committee was also responsible for the excellent program presented at our Donor Affair.

The Council Sabbath chairman and co-chairman planned a memorable Council Sabbath, held this year at Ahavoth Shalom Synagogue, with a sermon by a Council member, readings from the prayer book, and followed by a Purim Oneg Shabbath.

So much for your year's work in the fields to which your membership in Council dedicates you: Service and Education for citizenship. What of the cooperation required in the administration of these mammoth duties?

Under the supervision of the 1st Vice-President, these committees began the year last May, with the working out of a Budget by the finance committee, and its adoption by the Board. Then it became the duty of the Ways and Means Chairman and her committee to work out ways to meet these budget demands. In October, two of our members presented a Style Show that was as magnificent as any such show ever produced here, with clothes and models graciously provided by a local shop. This not only brought in a sum at the door, but also enabled us to collect rummage, which was later sold by our hard-working clothing chairman, her co-chairman and committee, to net us almost as much again. Most of our funds this year, however, were raised at our February Donor Brunch, an affair that was completely successful both financially and socially. The beauty, enjoyability and financial success of this project were due to the top leadership and hard work of four women, plus the help of their committee of workers, and the cooperation of so many of you members. Council also re-

ceived this year, from an anonymous benefactor, a magnificent chest of flat silver, the proceeds from the sale of which are to be used for local welfare work. Our gratitude to this donor is boundless, and we will express it by finding a project which will bring the most possible good to the most people in the community.

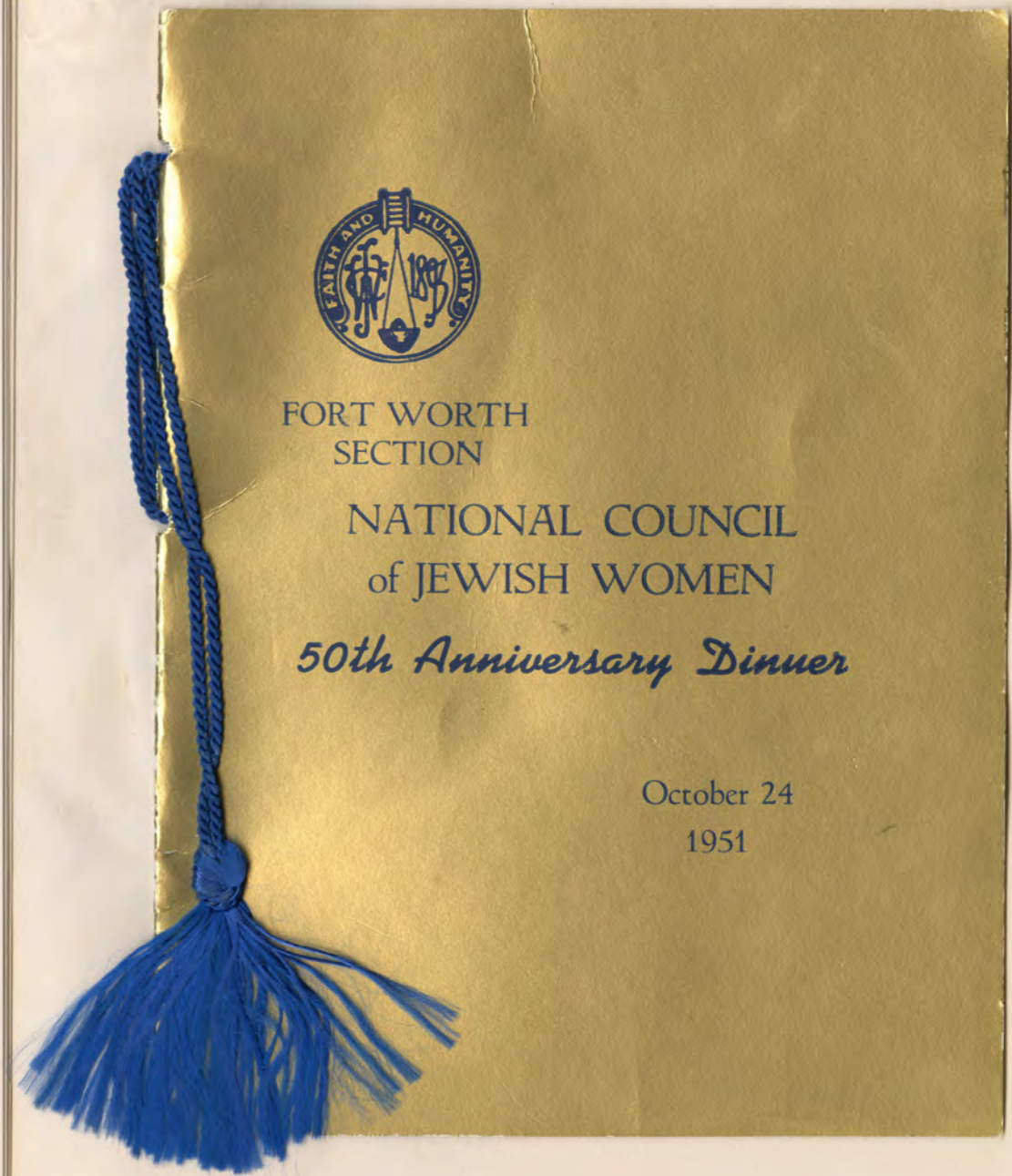
The Membership committee, during its summer campaign and all the rest of the year, brought us thirty-two new members. The chairman and co-chairman of this committee were most alert, and secured every new member possible, and it is no fault of their, or of the Section's, that our total membership has taken a sharp drop during the past two years. In the current year alone we have lost five members through death, and twenty-five have moved from the city, and there have been a number of resignations, all from valid personal reasons. It will be a challenge to the new administration to bring our membership figure back up again, and this will require the cooperation of every Council member.

The Yearbook Chairman, Co-Chairman and committee produced another useful, attractive and efficient yearbook, containing all information necessary for the membership to have available.

The Personnel Chairman, with her Co-Chairman and committee, completed the file of the membership's aptitudes and interests, for the use of officers and committee chairmen.

The combination of Publicity-Bulletin and Clerical committees proved an unbeatable one, in terms of the Section's public relations and membership service. These three chairmen, and their committee members, undertook the huge task of collecting, editing and digesting all the news of the many activities of our Section, and then transmitting that news to every medium of publicity in the community, and to the membership through direct mailings. Eight bulletins were mailed to the membership, plus an extra mailing for the Donor Brunch.

The Nominating Committee has a job that is a year round one, beginning with submitting to the Board of a fifth member for the Executive Committee, proceeding with the filling of vacancies, which seem to occur annually, and culminating in

the task of filling an entire slate in the spring. This year's committee's fine work is evidenced in our outstanding slate of incoming officers.

The success of our general meetings (and thus of our Section itself) depends on a number of factors. It depends on the sort of Program Committee whose work has been described above; on a Telephone Committee with a Chairman and a Co-Chairman who not only must spend countless hours at the phone, but who must evidence a real interest in the results of their task, plus some forty committee members, loyal and devoted; on luncheon committees willing to prepare and serve lunch to between 100 and 150 women, on a shoestring allowance; on a hospitality committee which is on hand to make newcomers feel at home; and on a Decorations Committee which can make the luncheon tables delightful on no budgetary allowance at all! All of these we have been fortunate in having this year, to an unusual degree of efficiency and helpfulness, and they deserve, and I'm sure receive the appreciation of the membership.

Since your officers' reports have been given separately, I find that I have nowhere mentioned the devoted service to Council that each of these women has given during this year. Each has had a year-long job, and each has performed with the most complete willingness, and lack of fuss and bother, and with a very minimum of supervision. Also I must acknowledge my own and the Section's indebtedness to our National Board Member, who has been so generous not only with the advice and counsel expected of her, but also with hours of work in all our departments.

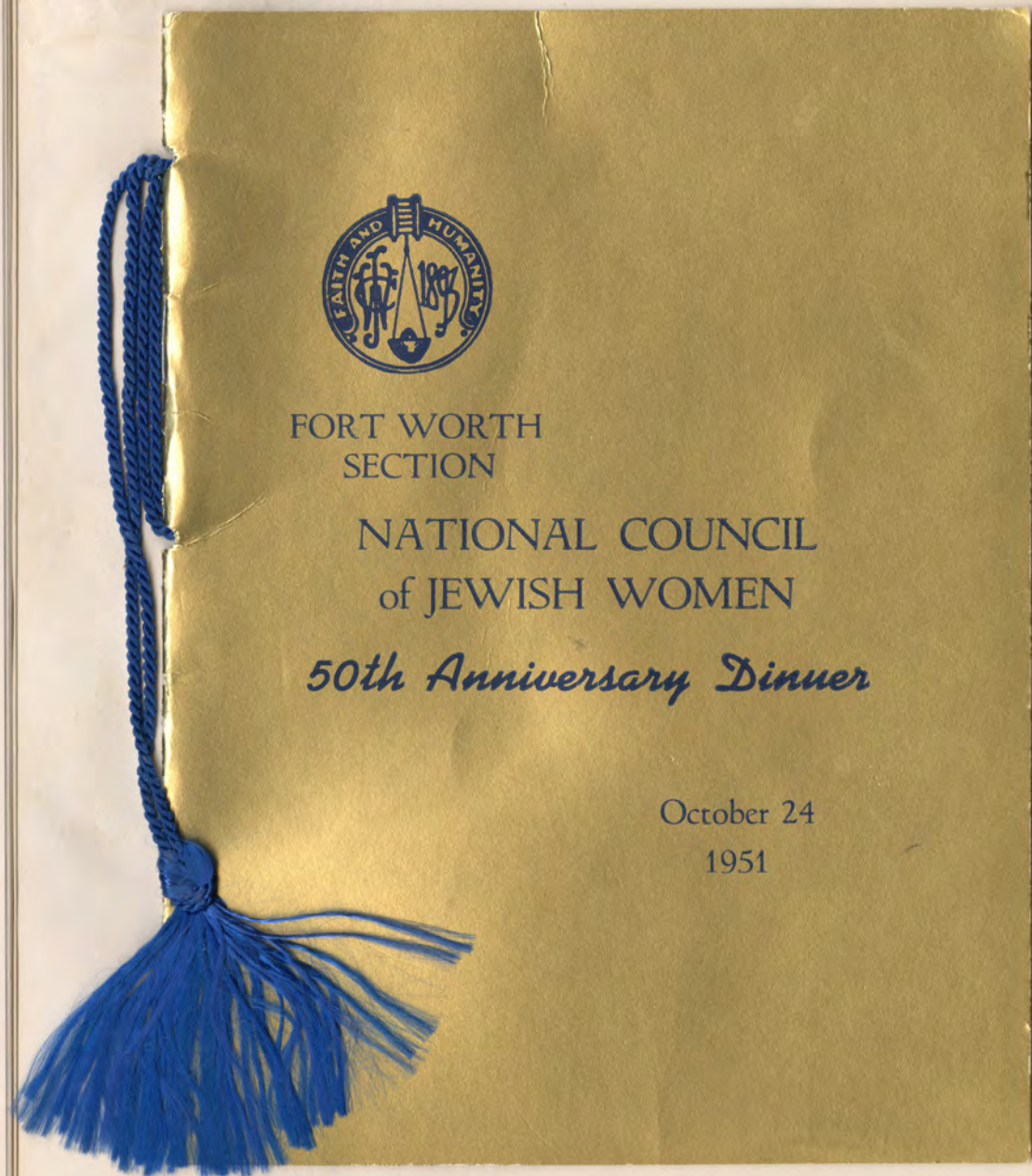

Fort Worth Council Of Jewish Women Celebrates 50th Year

Council Then

Report of Fort Worth, Texas as Section of Council of Jewish Women, read at Triennial in Cincinnati, November, 1908 by Mrs. Theodore Mack.—

AFTER HAVING listened with deep interest to the official record of the achievements of metropolitan sections whose existence is coeval with that of the National body, I fear that a brief resume of the accomplishments of poor little Fort Worth section as reflected during the past three years will prove somewhat disappointing to those who are intoxicated, I might say, by the success of their local sections.

The story of Fort Worth section is a simple one indeed. Its membership averages about 35 in a community of about 55 Jewish families. Thus far, it has not seen fit to publish a year book for no other reason save that it has always found other more necessary fields for the use of its rather modest treasury. Ever since its existence in 1901, we have had a very successful study class which is always attended by about one-third of our membership. During the past three years of my incumbency as presiding officer, we have read and discussed under the leadership of our Rabbi, The Jew in English Fiction, "Lady Magnus" Outlines of Jewish History, the Immigrant Jew in America, The Poems of Emma Lazarus and the Reminiscences of Dr. Isaac H. Wise.

While, in our City built up in an Agricultural Community, squalid property and tenement house conditions do not exist still the demands for charity and relief have ever been present and we have expended about \$400 for local relief during those three years, at the same time making our annual contributions to the National Hospital for Consump-

tives, the Consumptives Relief Society at Denver, the Orphans home at New Orleans, and the National Farm School, as well as responding as generously as we could to the victims of casualty and oppression. While not affiliated with any local or State Federation we had our representative on the City Board of Charities and were among the patronesses of the free Kindergarten and Social settlement.

Perhaps, more lasting and beneficial in its far-reaching effects has been the Night School we conducted for Jewish immigrants. We are now entering upon our third year, officered by volunteer teachers. It has been our aim to welcome immigrants, to instruct them in the language of our Country, to cause them to assimilate its customs and to feel that each pupil is himself an apostle of Human Liberty. To that end, each of the semi-weekly sessions of the classes is concluded with a short talk upon the Constitution of our Country, its Declaration of Independence, significance of its National and State holidays and thus do we try to eradicate the ignorance of these "Strangers in a Strange Land."

The HOPE OF SUCCESS has ever been our stimulating and sustaining power. Jew and Gentile in Fort Worth look upto our section for inspiration, and we do to our National Council with all its splendid beauty, its glorious works, its noble and holy affections, teaching us that we have a high duty to perform and a higher destiny to fulfill, which ends can only be attained by being more closely united by the cohesion of sympathy and interdependence.

"The purpose of the National Council of Jewish Women was then, and continues to be, service and education," says Mrs. M. M. Goldman, local president. From a total membership of 35 in 1908, the Fort Worth section now boasts a membership of 434. Not only has it grown in participants, but also in its activities.

The responsibility of the local council extends services internationally, nationally, and for its own civic needs to Jew and Gentile, whenever called upon.

In Fort Worth, it cooperates with Council of Social Agencies, Lighthouse for the Blind, Children's Hospital, Spastic Nursery, Red Cross, March of Dimes, Federation of Women's Clubs, Adult School and the Armed Forces.

For the Jewish community, it aids the New Americans through education and rehabilitation, providing housing, clothing, furnishings and supplies. In the Americanization school, Jew and Gentile, newly-arrived in this country may learn English, American ideas and ideals.

At its inception, in 1901, the Council study groups concentrated wholly on Jewish affairs, but now, in 1951, members are given the opportunity of participating

in discussions of contemporary world affairs. Through its Social Legislation committees, the council voices its opinion in our national government.

The international work of Council includes the shipment of toys and clothing to an orphanage in Morocco, and contributes to a scholarship fund which brings young women from all over the world to the United States for graduate study.

Another of Council's projects is its sewing room where committee members meet once a week to make clothing for orphanages or to help other funds. In the past few years, the Memorial and Happy Day Fund, donations given at times of sorrow and joy, has provided money for scholarships to foster better relations between Christians and Jews.

Fifty years ago, a nucleus of Jewish women started the Council organization to provide service and education. Not only has the body grown in strength and membership, but also in its ideals and its year-to-year accomplishments.

May the good that Council does, continue and expand in the next 50 years to meet the needs of mankind.

IN MEMORIAM---NETTIE STIEFEL

Hundreds of sincere friends and admirers throughout the country have learned with a sense of personal loss of the passing of Mrs. Nettie Stiefel in this city on June 17th.

Ever modest, unassuming and averse to accepting public honors, her great worth was nevertheless recognized and her untiring services accepted by a number of outstanding organizations, both Jewish and non-Jewish. She was one of those rare souls of whom it can be said that she not only had an inspiring faith but that her everyday life was a complete embodiment of her lofty creed. This is the unanimous testimony of those who knew her.

Mrs. Stiefel came of a distinguished family, being the daughter of Isaac Lowenstein and Caroline Newbower of New York and closely related by marriage to the merchant prince, D. Gimble. Originally she settled in Galveston, Texas, but the great flood of 1900 caused her family to move to Ft. Worth where her husband died shortly afterwards. In that city she became an active worker in the Council of Jewish Women and in turn held the offices of Secretary and President. She was also Secretary of the federation of Women's Clubs; an officer and organizer of the Tarrant County Humane Society; a teacher in the Ft. Worth night school for Jewish immigrants, etc.

After a brief residence in the east Mrs. Stiefel brought her family to Los Angeles and at once became active in Jewish and civic affairs in her newly adopted home. In the administration of Mrs. Albert Ancker as President she served as Corresponding Secretary of the local Council. She also was active as Chairman of the Hospital Visiting committee of the B'nai Brith Sisterhood. But she steadfastly refused all offers to promote her to higher offices.

Funeral services at the Halverson Funeral parlors in Huntington Park were conducted by Dr. Joseph Jasin, formerly of Ft. Worth and a close friend of the family, in the presence of a gathering representative of the various interests she had served. As befitted such a life, both the prayers and the eulogy were entirely devoid of the note of lamentation. The prevailing sentiment was that a triumphant life had gone on to a new and higher stage of living.

The following memorial gifts have been announced to date: A contribution to the May W. Goldman Scholarship Fund of the local C. J. W. by Mrs. Albert Ancker; a contribution to the Memorial Flower Fund of the Federation of Jewish Welfare Organizations from Mrs. Jacob Reich; a donation to the Rebecca L. Hecht Ice Fund of Chicago from Mrs. D. H. Keene.

Mrs. Stiefel at the time of her passing was in the care of her daughter, Mrs. Lillian Baum of Southgate. Other surviving children are Mrs. Charles A. Lehman, Milton Lewis and Arthur Lewis, of Los Angeles, Mrs. Irving Rosenzweig of Walnut Park, and Mrs. George Fox of Chicago.

WELFARE PROMOTION.

Each council pledges itself to promote welfare work in its community. Toward that end the local council co-operates with social agencies and has been a strong supporter of the Children's Hospital, the Lighthouse for the Blind, the Cerebral Palsy Center. Members also were instrumental in founding a summer day camp for mothers and children and have supported work with the handicapped and have supplied women for volunteer work, for board memberships, and have made gifts to all sorts of service organizations here, and have participated, on a large scale, in civic and welfare drives, in home-front work during two world wars. The organization maintains a year-round sewing room where garments are made for distribution by agencies and the "ship a box" program which sends boxes of toys and clothing to children in overseas orphanages.

ained through relatives, to obtain his release from the concentration camp, Richker said. He speaks German, Swedish, Danish, Norwegian and Hebrew and some English. He lives here with a cousin, Louie Richker.

Wolf was a lieutenant in the Austrian infantry in the World War and was decorated several times for bravery. He had built up a substantial dental practice when Hitler swooped down on Austria, stripped him of money, automobile, home and business, and tossed him into a concentration camp. There he spent six days before following his wife, children and brother to America.

Wolf, now 42, spent 11 months in Vienna, his birthplace, after Hitler entered Austria, but they weren't a pleasant 11 months.

"We had to 'Heil Hitler' and the Nazi officials constantly, and why? Because at a parade there would be a Gestapo member or a Nazi soldier at our backs and the persons that didn't salute weren't around much longer.

"Seventy per cent of the Austrians didn't want Hitler or Hitler rule, but what could we do? The German army threat was too much."

The Allies will win the current war, Wolf believes, although he also thinks the present Nazi-Russian tie will continue for some time.

Jewish Women Sponsor Strange School for Education of European Refugees

BY BILL SHERRILL.

Refugees from Europe in Fort Worth are learning their three R's over again—the American way—and are elated at the opportunity to do it.

It's a strange class, this Americanization School sponsored at the Hebrew Institute by the Council of Jewish Women, with its mixture of peoples from half a dozen or more of Europe's stormy nations.

And the great majority of the 16 pupils are mothers—some as old as 60 years. Many have been here many years—as long as 27 in one instance—while others are refugees of but a few months from wartorn Europe.

They make a strange contrast to the other beginners in America's schools, the 6 and 7-year-old American children just now finding their way into the Nation's school system—but their interest is more intense and their avidness for learning more pronounced than that of the little tots.

For many have known fear, persecution, and insecurity so long, and have seen needless death, destruction, and despotism so many times—they are eager for the relief America can bring to their tired minds and bodies.

And their study is spurred by the realization that the Americanization School leads to what they desire more than anything in the world—their United States citizenship papers.

At the school, which meets three times weekly and over which Mrs. Abe M. Rosenstein has presided for six years, they receive instruction in civics, English, spelling, reading, conversation, etc.

It all leads to that banner day when they can proclaim themselves naturalized American citizens. Like Mrs. Annie Rutlader, who came here from Poland nearly nine years ago, received her citizenship papers last December—and is still talking about the event.

"You Americans can't realize how fortunate you are and why refugees from Europe are so tremendously excited over the chance to come here and live in this marvelous country," asserted Erwin Wolf, a Vienna dentist for 16 years who was stripped of all his possessions when Hitler occupied Austria.

"It's a different world—a different life here," he exclaimed. "No Gestapo, no tyranny, no fear and uncertainty in America."

Erwin Richker, an accomplished linguist and decorator who was born in Berlin, echoes Wolf's assertions. He left Germany after spending six weeks in a Nazi concentration camp, and he's not at all anxious to go back.

"Over here I can sleep nights," Richker said. "If there's a knocking on the door after midnight or a noise in the hall, it's probably just the milkman or something similar—not the Gestapo. They came for me in the middle of the night, made me pull on some clothes, and hurried me off to a concentration camp."

"Why? I don't know—and there you have no right to ask. You're in a Nazi prison, and that's all there is to it. They won't even tell you why."

Miss Theresa Zulouf is happy because she left Poland four months before Nazi Germany showered her nation with bombs.

"Even then, we feared it was going to happen, but we hoped that it could be averted," she said.

Miss Zulouf lives with her aunt and uncle, Mr. and Mrs. A. Engler, here.

Richker spent a year in Norway, and some time in Denmark and Sweden, before coming to the United States. He said the Norwegians were most sympathetic toward refugee Jews, and they were permitted to work on farms.

It took a visa to Denmark, ob-

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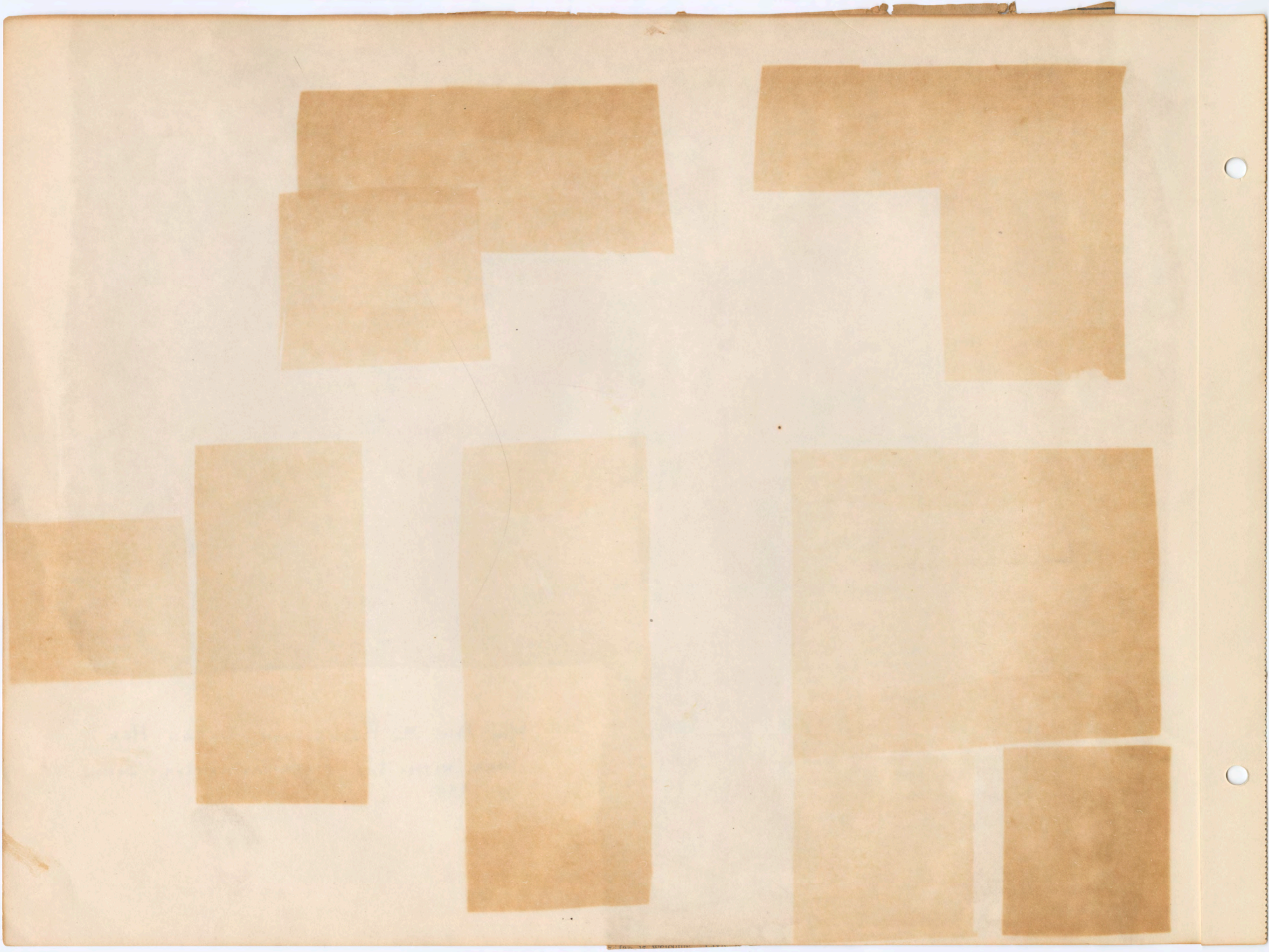

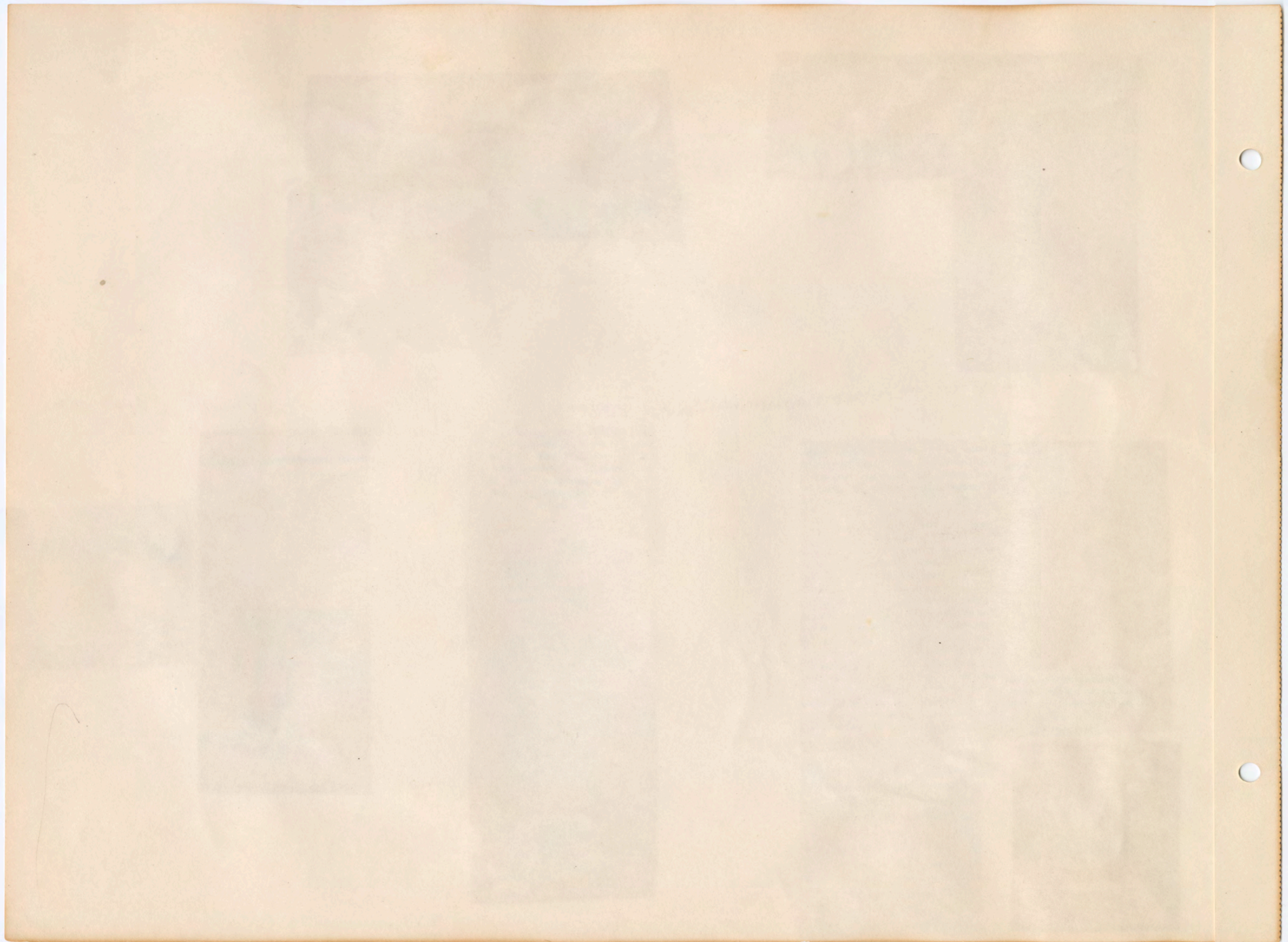
The sales room will be open week days from 9 a. m. to 5:30 p. m. until Oct. 27. Proceeds will be used to buy materials and pay the workers for their labor.

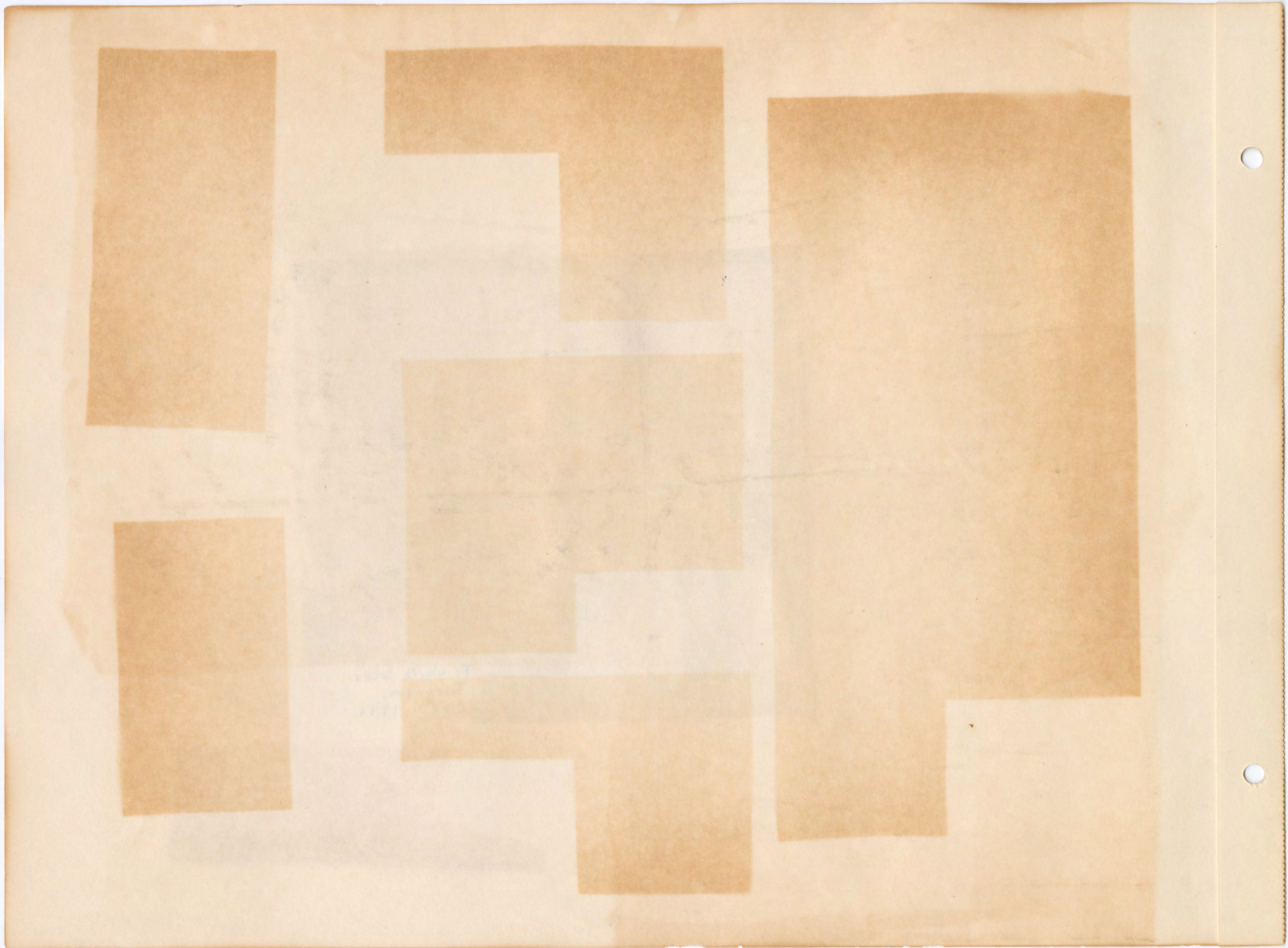

Continued From Page 1. man of the open meeting, received the crowd's vote of approval and urged that all interested in working on the project sign up for committee duty.

In the meantime, the sponsors are to be working to devise methods of channeling money to finance the upkeep of the home into the county treasury, it was emphasized.

More than 60 persons, representing both individuals and civic organizations, put their names on the list to help.

During the meeting Mrs. Johnson explained that the two organizations proposed purchase of the Jarvis home in the 3700 block on Decatur Ave.

The home can be purchased for \$25,000 and it would cost \$10,000 to renovate it. An estimated operating budget for one year would be about \$27,000.

\$15,000 Pledged.

The Junior League has pledged \$10,000 for the project and the Council of Jewish Women has pledged \$5,000 she said.

A panel composed of County Probation Officer Lynn Ross, Juvenile Judge Dave McGee, Crime Commission Chairman Clyde Weed, and Mrs. Anne Twiss, director of the Community Council, emphasized the need for such a home in Tarrant County.

Ross pointed out that in 1947 his department handled 550 delinquent children. In 1954, the department handled 1,327 delinquent children.

"This meeting will not eliminate juvenile delinquency," Ross said. "A school such as we are discussing would care for approximately 15 or 16 boys at the maximum and it would serve about 45 a year.

By discussing case histories, Ross emphasized that a place is needed for pre-delinquent boys between the home, county jail and the State School for Boys at Gatesville.

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Problem What to Do.

"There is no question in finding a boy delinquent," he explained. "He usually will admit what it takes to make him a delinquent. The problem is what to do with him."

Judge McGee referred to a bond issue proposal a few years ago which would have financed a county home for delinquents. The issue lost about 3 to 1, he said, and "if it ever comes up again it will be the best money ever spent."

Weed outlined the objectives of his organization and indorsed the proposed home fully.

"In talking with the commissioners court and Ross we believe we can solve this problem, but it is going to have to be on a state level," he said.

Weed said the commissioners indorsed the Jarvis home project, but "it is only a start and a needed start. We are going to have to get Mr. Ross sufficient case workers to do his job."

Mrs. Twiss outlined programs going on in other Texas cities and then emphasized:

"If we want to be progressive . . . then it is going to take a little more money. We point with pride to our buildings, our new industries and the many people who have moved in.

"But do we point with pride at what we are doing for our children?"

Major Step Forward.

She termed the plan to provide a home for 15 or 16 boys at a time "a major step forward of anything we have at the present time."

Groups to Discuss Home For Pre-Delinquent Boys

A proposed home for pre-delinquent boys under jurisdiction of the county probation department will be considered March 17 at 7:30 p. m. at a meeting at the Fort Worth Children's Museum.

The establishment of the home is proposed by the Fort Worth Junior League and the Council of Jewish Women.

County commissioners said Thursday they would attend the community meeting which is open to the public.

The need for such a home will be discussed by a panel made up of Judge Jack Langdon, Pro-

bation Officer Lynn Ross, Mrs. Anne Twiss, director of the Community Council; Clyde Weed, Crime Commission chairman, and members of the Junior League and Council of Jewish Women project committees.

In a joint statement issued Thursday by Mrs. J. Lee Johnson III of the Junior League and Mrs. Bernard Goldman of the Council of Jewish Women, it was pointed out that "the community must be wholeheartedly behind such a project if it is to be established in Fort Worth and Tarrant County."

It was emphasized that of the 175 burglaries cleared up by police in the past 60 days, 150 were attributed to youngsters from 10 to 17 years of age. During the past few months teen-agers were involved in 40 per cent of the rape cases, 14 per cent of the robberies, 20 per cent of aggravated assault cases and 44 per cent of auto thefts.

"We are proposing the immediate establishment of a home for pre-delinquent boys under the jurisdiction of the county probation department," representatives of the sponsoring groups said.

"This is the greatest need, according to our juvenile authorities—a place to put boys for short term housing, observation and counseling. For boys with problems, such a home might be the difference between a useful life and a life of crime. Currently, the only place at the disposal of the probation department is the county jail.

"Delinquents and criminals cost money. They destroy property until apprehended. When caught, the FBI estimates it costs \$25,000 in tax dollars to commit a man to the pen. It is more economical to prevent a crime at the outset," the statement said.

Mrs. Johnson and Mrs. Goldman said the Jarvis home in the 3700 block on Decatur Ave. has been offered at a nominal cost for use as a boys' home. It is believed the home could be purchased and renovated at a fraction of the cost of a new building containing 5,700 square feet—the footage of the Jarvis home.

Your DA Says of Local Crime Situation:—

'You Only Get What You Pay For'

I, too, am concerned about the recent outbursts of violence which have rocked our community. No decent citizen should simply shrug his shoulders and condone such acts of terrorism. Certainly no one deploras it more than we who must deal with these renegades.

In this connection, I would like to comment on the "Little Chicago" editorial which appeared yesterday in The Press.

Since published FBI figures show that the crime rate in Fort Worth decreased during both of the past two years while the crime rate rose in Dallas, in Texas, and throughout the nation during the same period, I feel that some exception could be taken to your conclusion.

BUT IT IS NOT my purpose here to enlarge the controversy by arguing the point, since such argument would obviously be foolish on my part. Rather than that, I would like to call to attention at this time a few existing situations which have direct bearing on the efficiency of local law enforcement.

I shall break these things down to three general categories—personnel, equipment and facilities.

The personnel situation is acute in all three law enforcement agencies. The sheriff needs additional criminal investigators, additional process servers, and additional administrative personnel. And a pay scale for deputy sheriffs ranging from \$265 to \$290 a month is hardly conducive to long tenure in office.

The Police Dept. needs to have a large increase in force. The Dallas Police Dept. was recently authorized a personnel increase. The increase was nearly as large as the entire field personnel of the Fort Worth department. And the pay allotted to Fort Worth officers is not in line with the times. They deserve and should get adequate pay.

The district attorney's office needs clerical assistance, investigators and above all money and authority to hire undercover investigators.

WE ALL NEED the adult probation office now pending in the legislature. And we all need the Juvenile Detention Home recently recommended by the Junior League and Council of Jewish Women.

In the equipment field, all three of us are short of modern technical requirements for a community the size of Fort Worth and Tarrant County. We need a lie detector. We need a crime laboratory. We need a workable system of detecting drunkenness. And we need other things too numerous to mention here.

As far as facilities are concerned, it is almost unbelievable that three departments as large as those we are now operating should be expected to work in the quarters to which we have been relegated.

The police station is so cramped that most interrogation by detectives is carried on in the hallway with people constantly walking and jostling by. There is no room for administrative personnel.

The sheriff needs better quarters for his identification bureau, for his criminal investigators, for his process servers.

I have 21 people working in a space originally designed to accommodate six people. And I have four more people quartered in another building, causing wasted time and money to maintain liaison.

BEFORE THIS criticism is leveled on our heads, shouldn't the facts be checked more thoroughly? If adverse situations do

exist in our law enforcement set-up, isn't it entirely possible that the responsibility should be shouldered by the citizens of this county for having placed an inadequate number of underpaid people with little or no equipment in untenable working conditions and then asking that they perform miracles unaided?

You only get what you pay for. If the people of this community demand better law enforcement and agree to foot the bill, they will get better law enforcement. If not, we are forced to stay where we are. Meanwhile, I can assure you that we will continue to do the best we can with what we have. And the record shows that even that is something to be proud of.

FLASH! NATIONAL CONVENTION.. The Solicitor-General of the United States, Simon E. Sobeloff, will be the banquet speaker at Council's National Biennial Convention in New Orleans. The Convention, to take place March 20-24 at the Hotel Roosevelt, will elect a National President and other national officers, and will review all national

programs and policies. About 800 delegates, representing 245 Council Sections throughout the country, are expected. Among scheduled events are a panel discussion by experts of American Jewish Family Life which will be open to the public and a luncheon at which speakers will include Mrs. Theodore Wedel, former Vice-President of the United Church Women, and Council's Overseas Scholarship Students.

U.J.A. UNITED-HIAS SERVICE AND ISRAEL BOND DRIVES.. In a letter to the Presidents of all Council Sections, National President Mrs. Irving M. COUNCIL OF JEWISH WOMEN

The Council of Jewish Women, with a membership now of 360, was established 50 years ago-----and took at that time as their project a program for Americanism, which included teaching immigrants to read and write--helping them prepare for the future. This group is now maintaining a day and night school for Displaced Persons. The night school being for employed persons. It is non-sectarian, and is open to all nationalities and creeds. Actually less than 1/3 of the Displaced Persons are Jewish. There is a real work to be done in this field in teaching these new Americans to read and write our own language. In addition to fostering the schools this organization has a housing committee that is active in obtaining suitable living quarters for a Displaced family locating in Fort Worth. They provide the furnishings, often donated by group members, see that everything is fresh, clean, and livable, and that the pantry shelves are filled with foods for this family which undoubtedly has seen hardships in the old country.

A project which is being considered by this group, and for which a need exists, is a telephone service to handicapped children whereby instruction may be carried to their bedside from the school room. Mrs. M. M. Goldman, newly elected president of the Council of Jewish Women, says prices are being obtained from the Telephone Company and it is hoped that this project will be provided for.

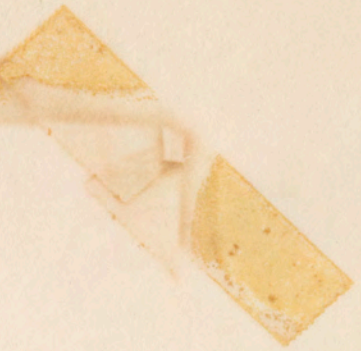
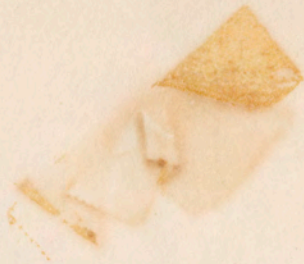

BY-LAWS FOR FORT WORTH SECTION
NATIONAL COUNCIL OF JEWISH WOMEN

ARTICLE I

NAME

The name of this organization shall be FORT WORTH SECTION, NATIONAL COUNCIL OF JEWISH WOMEN.

ARTICLE II

OBJECT

The object of this organization shall be to promote the purpose and program of the National Council of Jewish Women, with such adaptations as local conditions warrant or demand.

ARTICLE III

Section 1. Any women may become a member of Fort Worth SECTION of the National Council of Jewish Women by sending to the Section her name, address, and annual dues for the current fiscal year.

Section 2. A member of any Section of the National Council of Jewish Women taking up her residence in this community may, upon presentation of her membership credentials, become a member of this Section for the current fiscal year.

ARTICLE IV

FISCAL YEAR

The fiscal year shall extend from October 1st through September 30th which conforms to the period stated in the National By-Laws of the National Council of Jewish Women.

ARTICLE V

DUES

Section 1. The annual dues for all members shall be four dollars, payable in advance of which the stipulated amount set at the National Convention shall be paid into the treasury of the National Council of Jewish Women as per capita annual dues.

Section 2. New members may not be granted more than three (3) months' courtesy membership.

Section 3. A member who shall have failed to pay her dues by the close of the past fiscal year shall no longer be a member in good standing. The name of such a member, after official notice shall have been given her, shall be removed from the roster, and the National Office of the National Council of Jewish Women so informed.

ARTICLE VI

OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS

Section 1. The elected officers of this organization shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, Social Secretary, a Financial Secretary, an Assistant Financial Secretary, a Treasurer, an Auditor, an Historian, and a Parliamentarian.

Section 2. The officers shall be elected by the membership at the March meeting to serve for two years or until their successors are elected and qualify and shall not hold the same office for more than one term.

ARTICLE VII

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. **PRESIDENT:** It shall be the duty of the President to preside at meetings of the Section, of the Board of Directors, and of the Executive Committee. She shall appoint the chairmen of all Standing Committees and such special committees as occasion demands in consultation with the Vice-Presidents. She shall be ex-officio member of all committees except the Nomination Committee. She shall make an annual report to the Section, a copy of which shall be sent to the National Office. She shall perform such other duties as usually pertain to the office and as are specified in these By-Laws.

Section 2. **VICE-PRESIDENTS:** It shall be the duty of the Vice-Presidents to perform the duties of the President in her absence and to supervise and coordinate the activity of the chairmen assigned within their jurisdiction. The Vice-Presidents shall succeed to the Presidency in order.

Section 3. **RECORDING SECRETARY:** It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep a record of the proceedings of the meetings of the membership and of the Board of Directors, and Executive Committee. She shall be custodian of all minutes belonging to the Section.

Section 4. **CORRESPONDING SECRETARY:** It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to conduct the business correspondence of the Section and the Board of Directors.

Section 5. **SOCIAL SECRETARY:** It shall be the duty of the Social Secretary to conduct the social correspondence of the Section.

Section 6. **FINANCIAL SECRETARY:** It shall be the duty of the Financial Secretary to maintain an accurate membership

file, to issue due bills, collect due bills, collect dues which shall be turned over to the Section Treasurer, issue official receipts to members and maintain an up-to-date record of payments and delinquencies. She shall follow up for payment of dues by delinquent members. The Financial Secretary shall report on the total paid status of the Section membership at Board, General and Annual meetings. She shall send regularly to the National Office such reports on membership as are required in accordance with procedures established by the National Council of Jewish Women. She shall serve as a member of the financial or budget committee. She shall keep a full and correct list of members with their correct addresses.

Section 7. **ASSISTANT FINANCIAL SECRETARY:** It shall be the duty of the Assistant Financial Secretary to assist the Financial Secretary in all the duties of that office.

Section 8. **TREASURER:** It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to collect and receive all money due the Section and to be custodian of all its funds. She shall be bonded in such sum as the Board of Directors of the Section shall determine. She shall send to the Treasurer of the National Council of Jewish Women, in accordance with its regulations and rules, at monthly intervals, annual dues for each paid member. The Treasurer shall disburse from the remainder of the funds only upon order of the Section or the Board of Directors, signed by the President. She shall be co-signer with the President of all checks. She shall submit a written financial report at the close of the club year. She shall be responsible for seeing that the financial records of the Section are audited annually. She shall submit a written financial report at the Annual meeting after it has been audited. She shall send a copy of the annual financial report after it has been audited and accepted by the Section, to the National office. She shall serve as a member of the financial or budget committee.

Section 9. **AUDITOR:** It shall be the duty of the Auditor to audit the accounts of the Treasurer at the close of the fiscal year and to submit a report at the Annual meeting of the Section.

Section 10. **HISTORIAN:** It shall be the duty of the Historian to preserve a scrap book of clippings, mementos, etc., of the Section and its work and to bring the book to meetings.

Section 11. **PARLIAMENTARIAN.** It shall be the duty of the Parliamentarian to acquaint herself with Roberts Rules of Orders and to rule upon proper procedure when necessary.

b. The President shall appoint the Chairman and shall appoint Vice-Chairmen, and the Chairman shall appoint her committee members in consultation with the Vice President in charge.

Section 2. The President may also from time to time appoint Special Committees which may be necessary.

Section 3. Within a reasonable time after its appointment, each Committee shall submit to the Board of Directors a comprehensive program of the work which it proposes to do. It shall render a report whenever called upon by the President to do so and shall also submit its annual report to be filed with the Secretary, giving a resume of its work of the club year of the Section. Copy of such report shall be sent to the National Office, when requested.

Section 4. There shall be a Finance or Budget Committee which must include the Financial Secretary, Treasurer, Chairman of Ways and Means. This committee shall prepare the budget for approval by the Board of Directors, and it shall be responsible for periodic review of the finances of the Section for report to the Board.

ARTICLE XII

MEMBERSHIP MEETINGS

Section 1. ANNUAL MEETING: The Annual Meeting for the presentation of annual reports to the membership shall take place in May of each and every year. In an emergency, the Board of Directors may change the date of the meetings. In election years, the installation of officers shall take place at this time.

Section 2. REGULAR MEETINGS: Regular meetings of the Section shall be held once a month from October to May, inclusive, at such time and place as the Section may determine, except when deemed inadvisable by the Board.

Section 3. SPECIAL MEETINGS: Special meetings may be called by the President and the Board of Directors or upon the written request of ten (10) members.

ARTICLE XIII

PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

The rules contained in Robert's "Rules of Order Revised" shall govern this Section in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with these By-Laws and the By-Laws of the National Council of Jewish Women.

ARTICLE XIV

AMENDMENTS AND REVISIONS

Section 1. Amendments and revisions shall be proposed upon recommendation of the Board of Directors or a special committee appointed for that purpose.

Section 2. These By-Laws may be amended by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of those members present and voting at a general meeting regularly called, after one (1) month's advance notice has been given and a copy of the amendment has been mailed to each member at least ten (10) days before action is to be taken, and provided that the proposed amendment is not inconsistent with the Articles of Incorporation, the By-Laws and the Policies of the National Council of Jewish Women.

ARTICLE XV

POLICIES

Section 1. When a fundamental change in Section policy or program is contemplated by the Fort Worth Section, National Council of Jewish Women, said policy should originate with the Executive Committee, be recommended by the Board, and ratified by the general body.

Section 2. No publicity concerning this Section or its activities shall be released by anyone other than the President, the Vice-Presidents, or the Publicity Chairman.

Section 3. a. The President shall appoint all representatives to other organizations.

b. During her term of office, each President of the other women's organizations, shall be a guest member of the Council of Jewish Women, including the courtesy of our luncheon meetings, and all other affairs. It shall be mandatory that each President comply with this policy.

Section 4. The Section may not, as a Section, work against National's stand on any legislative matter. The Section shall not, as a Section, publicly support National Council's stand on any legislative matter until that matter has been studied and voted upon by the Section.

Section 5. All funds raised by the Section are raised for Council work, either national or local. Therefore, as we are ourselves a service organization, no sum shall be given to any

other group or organization from the General Fund in excess of \$25.00; as funds are available they shall be spent on Council's community welfare projects for the benefit of the entire community.

Section 6. All fund-raising projects shall originate with the Ways and Means Committee, and shall be approved by the Board of Directors.

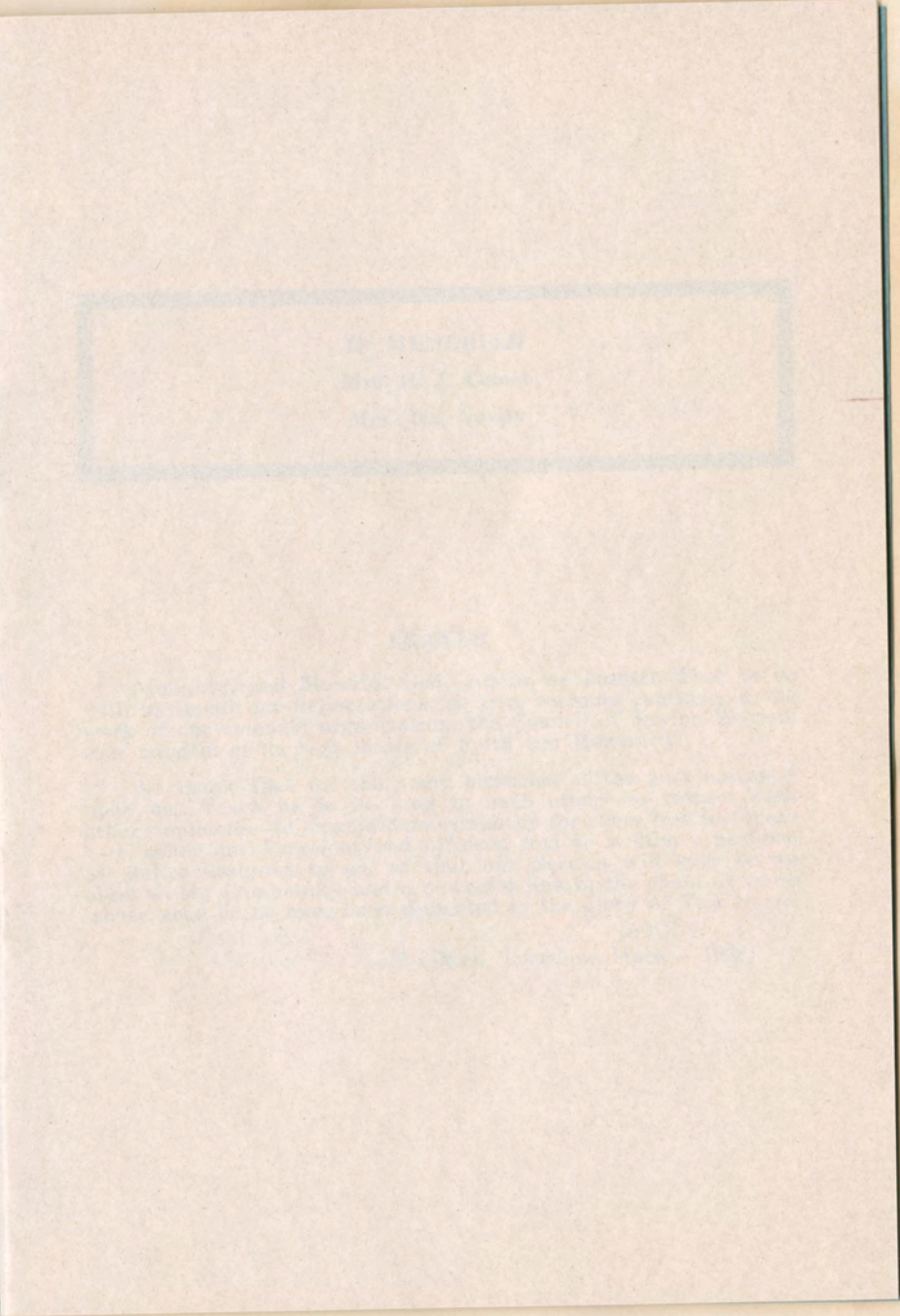
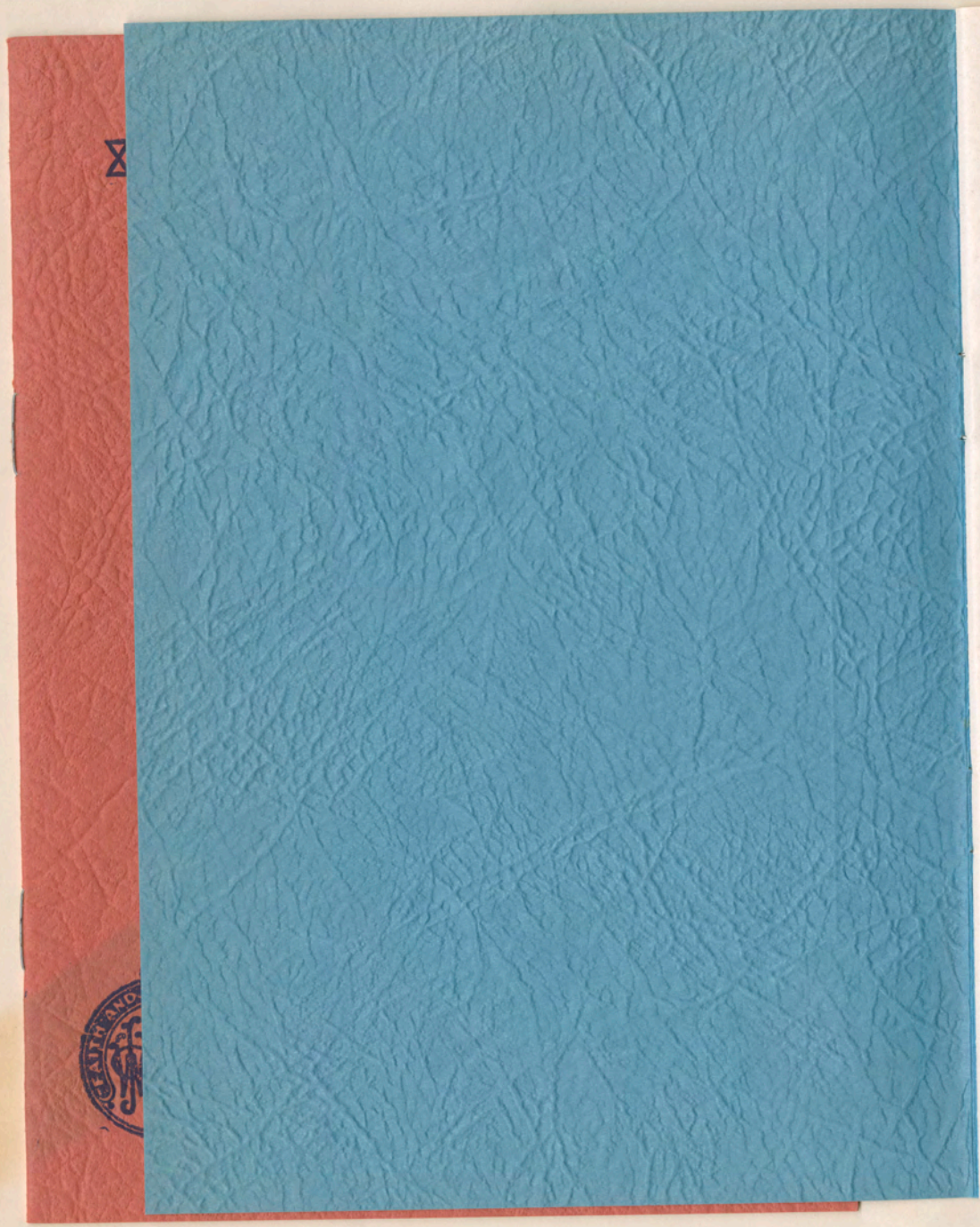

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

1953-1954

When I accepted the office of president last year I said, "Council is not a one-woman show. It is like a symphony orchestra. Beautiful music is made by the harmonious blending of all the instruments. Council members make up our orchestra. Together we can produce a magnificent concert, a fruitful council year."

Today I submit the symphony we have recorded. The record of your work, your inspiration and your accomplishments began last May, shortly after the closing meeting.

Your three vice-presidents met with the president to set up a frame-work for the year. These four officers have continued to meet at least once (and sometimes more often) each month to study and discuss the "Aids", sent from National, to co-ordinate, complement and plan the work of each department. Your vice-presidents have given the most devoted, conscientious service to Council. Each has magnificently supervised her department.

Your other officers have each given a year of devoted service to Council. Each has had a year long job, and carried out all responsibilities most capably. The Recording Secretary has kept careful and complete minutes of all meetings, the Corresponding Secretary has written 34 business letters, the Social Secretary has written 200 notes to members, the Treasurer has kept most careful account of your funds, the Financial and Assistant Financial Secretaries have collected the dues, and reported to National the membership statistics.

Last May the Budget Committee met to plan for the year. The Ways and Means Committee considered plans to meet these budget demands. Early in June the new Board met. A Board Workshop was conducted by Mr. Samuel Kaminsky, National Director of Section Service.

During the summer other committees met to prepare for the club year. The Yearbook chairman and co-chairman edited our attractive and efficient book containing all necessary information.

The alert and diligent Membership Committee interested 32 new members in joining Council. The Personnel Committee prepared cards listing members aptitudes and interests. They then spent several months re-working the files, which are now up to date, and have been useful and informative.

A delightfully informal morning coffee for new members was held in September. The Hospitality Committee welcomed new members at the coffee, and at all meetings.

A special meeting was called in September to consider a report from the new Projects Committee, recommending that we finance the cost of an assistant teacher for the Opportunity Center for Retarded Children. We voted to pay \$1,500 toward the teacher's salary. The program at our opening meeting described the needs of these children. Your interest and warm response have made it possible to continue this support.

Activities through the year have been the integrated efforts of the departments of Administration, Education and Service. Many members worked every month, and some members had specific limited duties.

The Bulletins have new features this year: The Council Calendar listing the months activities at a glance; Council Carnations highlight with appreciation current volunteer efforts; "Across the Nation", a concise report from the National office. Through publicity, we have had excellent coverage, and feature articles and pictures in the daily and Sunday papers. The Temple and Shule bulletins have graciously carried our announcements. The Texas Jewish Post has been most generous, not only with regular section news, but also national releases.

The Telephone and Board telephone committees worked all through the year to inform our members of the meetings. The success of our meetings depends on membership participation, and to these committees we owe our meeting attendance. The luncheon committees planned, shopped, prepared and served lunch to an average of 150 women per meeting. The decorations were provided by our Garden Club group, who with talent and ingenuity contrived the most attractive table decor at no cost. The luncheon funds were carefully collected by our competent doorwomen.

The Donor Brunch in November was an outstanding success measured by membership participation, financial gain, beauty, and pure enjoyment. In response to the top leadership of the chairman, and hard working committees, plus the appeal of our local project, we netted \$2,969.00.

The February Silver Tea was also a memorable affair, deftly executed by an extremely competent committee.

Two Rummage Sales added substantially to our funds. The chairman and co-chairman gave unstintingly of their time and energies, and were assisted by many volunteers.

The Nominating Committee very carefully presented a slate of officers, whom you have elected and will be installed today.

A special By-Laws Committee spent months studying and re-working the by-laws to bring them up to date. The complete new by-laws will be printed in our '54-'55 yearbook.

Now we present the record of the department of Education. Various phases of Council covered this year included Community Service, Contemporary Jewish Music, Overseas Projects, Membership and Education, as well as reports on Public Affairs from National. The programs included a skit, book review, music and movies, as well as dynamic speakers.

The Study Group committees have planned and carried out a most provocative program covering Social Legislation, International Relations and Contemporary Jewish Affairs. Topics discussed included the Bricker Amendment, History of Russia after 1917, Unity Among Our People, Social Security and Our Senior Citizens, European Defense Council, and Jews of Faraway Places. An Evening Discussion Group, open to the public, on Family Life, was added this year. This proved to be an excellent means of relating council to the home and family. The studies included the Pre-School Child, the Growing Child, the Troubled Teens, and Time On Your Hands. The Garden Study Group developed programs on beautifying the home and garden.

We are indebted to the many members who generously gave us the use of their lovely homes, and to the hostesses for their warm hospitality and refreshments.

Council Sabbath was held at Temple Beth-El. Our Religious chairman planned a lovely evening. Members participated in the service, and with original prayers. Our 1st Vice-President gave an inspiring sermon from the theme of the coming American Jewish Tercentenary celebration, "Man's Opportunities and Responsibilities Under Freedom."

We now record the beautiful melodies in our Symphony produced by Service. Countless hours to serve others have been given by so many women.

The Friendship Club met bi-monthly all through the year. This committee acted as hostesses, planned the programs and refreshments. The average attendance is about 30.

The Sewing Group met every week and finished 260 garments for shipment to Israel.

Ship-A-Box collected funds and supplies, packed and mailed seven boxes to Israel, containing school supplies and clothing.

The Lighthouse for the Blind committee sponsored the annual bazaar at our December meeting. Through the year these women brought joy to older blind people, who are usually secluded at home. This committee financed Golden Age parties, planned the programs and provided motor corps service for these shut-ins.

The March of Dimes committee addressed, folded and sealed 35,000 envelopes. Council received a citation from the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, in recognition of this aid.

In April, Easter Seals for Crippled Children were mailed by a committee. The chairman and co-chairman work for the Spastic Nursery all through the year.

The Adult School for New Americans has 9 students. Several have been referred to us by community agencies. This class continues to meet twice a week with a teacher and some volunteer help.

The annual Easter party for the children at the All Church Home was a happy affair.

Council hostesses have served at the Armed Services Canteen four times this year.

One of our members collects and distributes magazines and books to the City-County Hospital.

Community co-operation representatives have attended numerous civic meetings as Council representatives.

The Happy Day and Memorial Fund provided a scholarship to promote religious understanding between Christians and Jews.

And so the record ends for 1953-'54—"may the blessings of the past years be bestowed upon our future, so that our Section will ever be an asset to our Community."

Jewish Women Propose Changes in Immigration

NEW ORLEANS, March 23 (AP). The National Council of Jewish Women has passed resolutions calling for an overhaul of immigration laws and a nationwide program to combat juvenile delinquency. The council's 21st annual convention Tuesday termed the McCarran-Walter immigration act "outdated and discriminatory" and said it should be revamped to demonstrate to the world "our sense of justice and qualities of world leadership." The present law prevents many "potentially valuable and productive immigrants" from settling in the United States, the resolution said. It also scored the refugee relief act as "makeshift and inadequate," claiming that fewer than 20,000 refugees have been admitted under its provisions. The juvenile delinquency resolution asked for a vast program of federal, state and local reforms to solve the problem. Included were recommendations for slum clearance, public health and housing, more playgrounds and

expanded social and welfare services. The council also suggested a single agency be set up in each state to handle juvenile delinquency and other youth problems. Mrs. Moise S. Cahn of New Orleans was nominated president without opposition. She will succeed Mrs. Irving M. Engel of New York City.

Dear Civic Leader:

Of 175 burglaries cleared by the police in the past 60 days, 150 were attributed to youngsters from 10 to 17 years. During the past few months teenagers were involved in 40 percent of the rape cases, 14 percent of robberies, 20 percent of aggravated assault and 44 percent of auto theft cases.

There is something you as a citizen can do about these shocking statistics. The Junior League of Fort Worth and the Council of Jewish Women urge your attendance at a community meeting Thursday, March 17, 7:30 p. m. at the Children's Museum. Please be there; we need your interest and advice concerning a long overdue plan of action.

We are proposing the immediate establishment of a home for pre-delinquent boys under the jurisdiction of the county probation department. This is the greatest need, according to our juvenile authorities - a place to put boys for short term housing, observation and counseling. For boys with problems, such a home might be the difference between a useful life and a life of crime. Currently the only place at the disposal of the probation department is the county jail.

Delinquents and criminals cost us money. They destroy property until apprehended. When caught the FBI estimates it costs \$25,000 tax dollars to commit a man to the pen. It is more economical to prevent crime at the outset.

The Jarvis Home on Decatur Ave. has been offered at a nominal cost for use as a boys' home. It could be purchased and renovated at a fraction of the cost of replacing its 5,700 sq. ft. at current building estimates.

Come to the meeting and hear the details of the proposal. Judge Jack Langdon, Probation Officer Lynn Ross, Community Council Director Ann Twiss, Crime Commission Chairman Clyde Weed and members of the Junior League and Jewish Council project committees who have studied the juvenile welfare situation in Fort Worth during the past year will be there to answer questions.

The community must be wholeheartedly behind such a project if it is to be established in Fort Worth and Tarrant County. Please return the enclosed card immediately and mark the date, March 17, on your calendar.
