The TARRANT COUNTY ARCHEOLOGICAL SOCIETY (TCAS) is a non-profit organization that meets the second Thursday of each month, excluding December. The meeting place varies due to space availability, however anyone interested can contact the Society through any of the above phone numbers, or Society address, for additional information. The meeting announcements are mailed seven (7) to ten (10) days prior to the meeting date, giving details of the meeting and a map to help in locating the meeting.

The purposes of TCAS are:

(1) the promotion of scientific archeological exploration and research,

(2) the preservation and conservation of archeological sites and materials,

(3) the interpretation and publication of all data pertaining thereto,

(4) the education of the public on the importance of proper collection and preservation of archeological material, and

(5) the training of its members on the proper methods and technology needed to accomplish the above.

TCAS does not approve of the salvaging and selling of artifacts (historic, pre-historic, or older) for commercial gain, nor does it approve of trespassing on public or private property, especially for the purposes of searching for artifacts.

TCAS attempts to work with the professional archeologists, both to assist them in any way possible, and to increase its own knowledge base.

# OFFICE OF THE STATE ARCHEOLOGIST TEXAS ARCHEOLOGICAL STEWARDSHIP NETWORK

A network of experienced avocational archeologists have dedicated themselves to the preservation of archeological sites in Texas. Since the inception of the Stewardship program in 1983, the Office of the State Archeologist (OSA) has found this network of volunteers to be an invaluable asset. Many situations have arisen in which the OSA, because of severely limited staffing, could not respond in a timely manner. Because the stewards are located in various parts of the state, the OSA has been able to rely on them to handle many requests for assistance in their areas. In addition to field assessments and site recording, the stewards have actively documented private collections, given public presentations about archeology, coordinated the acquisition of protective designations for significant sites, and alerted the proper authorities when important sites were being threatened.

At the present time, there are only sixteen (16) members of this network, and many regions of the state lack representation. The OSA wants to add at least ten individuals to the network in order to better serve the citizens of Texas and to address archeological problems statewide. Preservation-minded avocationals with a good knowledge of archeological field and laboratory techniques will be given serious consideration. A field trip to Paint Rock, near San Angelo, is being organized. Be sure and put your name on the list if you wish to go. We need a head count for reservations and trip planning. Remember, Petroglyph is pecked into rock, Pictograph is painted on rock, and Hieroglyph is a symbol.

#### THAT'S NOT MY JOB!





# Banks and Ferring will lecture at Richland College

Larry Banks, Southwest Division Archeologist with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, will present "Hypothetical Origins of Clovis Cultures in Texas" on April 11 at Richland Community College. This presentation will focus on the most up-to-date research coming from South America and North America. Slides will illustrate recent work at Monte Verde, distribution of Clovis materials, submarine terraces, and Late Pleistocene ocean levels.

Larry has been a long-time friend and supporter of DAS and is always generous with time and expertise. As the senior ranking archeologist with the Corps, he has looked at sites and rocks for a long period of time. His latest publication From Mountain Peaks to Aligator Stomachs: A Review of Lithic Sources in the Trans-Mississippi South, Southern Great Plains, and Ajacent Parts of the Southwest is being published by the Oklahoma Anthropological Society and is due out at the end of March. It features 13 color plates, black and white photos and numerous figures and maps. The information it contains has been long awaited and should become a permanent fixture in the library of every lithic analyst.

Recently, Larry was selected as one of twelve specialists by the Newberry Library in Chicago to participate in a seminar which will focus on determination of research goals for the studies in native American populations for the next decade.



# **Clovis Point**

Dr. C. Reid Ferring, Assistant Professor at the University of North Texas, will lecture on "The Clovis Paleoindian Archaeology of the Aubrey Site" on April 12 at Richland Community College. The site has yielded one of the most important records of Clovis archeology in North America. A bison kill and two camp areas were exposed, revealing over 10,000 stone artifacts, thousands of animal bones, abundant pollen, and snail shells. Clovis people camped along the Trinity flood plain for a brief tim. 11,000 years ago and brought in stone from the Panhandle and Central Texas. The new data from this site will add to the already lively discussions of the First Americans, their lifeways, and their possible role in the extinction of Pleistocene megafauna.

Dr. Ferring received his doctorate in Archeology from SMU and is currently completing a second doctorate in Geosciences at the University of Texas at Dallas. His principal areas of research are Prehistoric Archeology and Quaternary Geology. He is now directing a long-term project studying the archeology, geology, and past environments of the Trinity River Basin, mainly at Lake Ray Roberts and Lake Lewisville. Two of his recent publications include "The Aubrey Clovis Site: A Paleoindian Locality in the Upper Trinity River Basin, Texas" in Current Research in the Pleistocene and "Archaeological Geology of the Southern Plains" in Archaeological Geology of North America.

# CONSTITUTION and BYLAWS

# of the

# TARRANT COUNTY ARCHEOLOGICAL SOCIETY

# CONSTITUTION

#### Article I NAME

The name of this association shall be TARRANT COUNTY ARCHEOLOGICAL SOCIETY, hereinafter in this Constitution and Bylaws called "the Society".

# Article II AIMS and OBJECTIVES

The purposes of the Society are the promotion of (1) scientific archeological exploration and research, (2) the preservation and conservation of archeological materials and sites, (3) the interpretation and publication of data pertaining thereto, and (4) education of the public to the aims of archeology.

#### Article III MEMBERSHIP and DUES

An individual may become a member by attesting sympathy with the aims and objectives of the Society and payment of annual dues as provided in the Bylaws.

#### Article IV GOVERNMENT

The government of the Society shall be vested in an EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE in such a manner as provided in the Bylaws.

#### Article V MEETINGS

The Society shall meet on the second Thursday of each month at a time and place to be determined by the Executive Committee. Members shall be notified by mail at lease five (5) days prior to the meeting.

#### Article VI AMENDMENTS

This Constitution and Bylaws may be amended by a two-thirds (2/3) vote at a monthly meeting, provided that a written notice of the proposed amendment has been sent to the members at least thirty (30) days prior to the meeting.

# TARRANT COUNTY ARCHEOLOGICAL SOCIETY

# BYLAWS

# Article I AIMS and OBJECTIVES

- Section 1. The purpose of this society shall be to promote and encourage, by precept and example, the scientific exploration, study of, and research into, the archeology of Tarrant County and contiguous areas.
- Section 2. The Society shall endeavor to encourage the proper collection and preservation of archeological material and the accurate reporting to recognized archaeological organizations and institutions of archeological information.
- Section 3. The Society shall assist and cooperate fully with all recognized archeological organizations and institutions in the furtherance of knowledge of historic and prehistoric man in Texas and the Southwest.
- Section 4. The Society shall engage in a program of educating the general public on the importance of proper collection and preservation of archeological and paleontological material.
- Section 5. The Society shall carry on a continuing program of instruction in archeology and related fields.
- Section 6. The Society shall keep the public informed of its activities and promote the general understanding of the archeology of this area by, from time to time, exhibiting archeological material in prepared displays at the local museums.
- Section 7. The Society shall prepare and keep a proper record of the archeological discoveries of this area; shall endeavor to publish such information for distribution to the membership and to recognized archeological institutions and organizations; and to periodically assemble, correlate and forward to the Department of Anthropology of the University of Texas, or other recognized archeological institutions upon request, such information for incorporation into their records.
- Section 8. The Society shall periodically conduct field trips and other joint activities for the proper and thorough exploration of areas of archeological interest.

- Section 1. The fiscal year of this Society shall be from January 1st to December 31st.
- Section 2. The regular meetings of the Society shall be held on the second Thursday of each month, with provisions that the time and place and date may be varied to suit prevailing circumstances. The place of meeting shall be designated at the previous meeting insofar as is possible.
- Section 3. The annual business meeting of the Society shall take place at the regular meeting in January of each year.
- Section 4. At least twenty-five (25) members present who have the right to vote shall constitute a quorum at all meetings of the Society.
- Section 5. Members of the Society with voting privileges shall vote in only one (1) capacity, and there shall be no voting by proxy.
- Section 6. Special meetings of the Society may be held at the call of the President, or upon written request of five (5) members of the Executive Committee. At least thirty (30) days written notice of such meeting shall be given, and the purpose of the meeting shall be stated in the call to the meeting.

## Article III GOVERNMENT

- Section 1. The executive officers of this Society shall be: President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Vice President of Projects, and Publications Editor. Assistants may be provided for as needed. The officers shall serve voluntarily and without remuneration or salary from the Society for a period of two years.
- Section 2. Elected officers shall take office at the January monthly meeting and shall serve the term as stated in the Bylaws or until their successors are elected.
- Section 3. Officers duties, as provided for in these Bylaws, are as follows:
  - a. The PRESIDENT shall serve as chairman of the Executive Committee, as Chief Executive Officer, and official spokesman of the Society. The President shall appoint all committees and serve as an ex-officio member of all committees.

- b. The VICE PRESIDENT shall succeed to the office of President should a vacancy occur, shall preside in the absence of the President, and shall serve as co-chairman of the Executive Committee.
- c. The SECRETARY shall serve as a member of the Executive Committee, and shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Executive Committee and the monthly meetings of the Society.
- d. The TREASURER shall serve as a member of the Executive Committee, and shall serve as custodian of funds. The Treasurer shall keep a record of all members and any other records that pertain to the Society's funds, and shall have authority to disburse funds for postage, stationery, etc., without application to other officers or members. Other disbursals of funds that exceed \$100.00 shall be by majority vote of members present and voting at any regular or called meeting.
- e. The VICE PRESIDENT of PROJECTS shall serve as a member of the Executive Committee, shall arrange for all field activities and any projects that include active membership participation.
- f. The PUBLICATIONS EDITOR shall serve as a member of the Executive Committee, shall be responsible for publishing the monthly news letter and The LETTER, and shall be responsible for the publication of all the Society's activities, bulletins, and reports pertaining to archeology and related subjects.
- g. The CONSULTING VICE PRESIDENT though not elected, shall be the immediate past president, and serve as a member of the Executive Committee.

# Article IV MEMBERSHIP and DUES

- Section 1. Any person over the age of eighteen (18) years who is interested in archeology or related subjects may become a member of this Society; age nine (9) through seventeen (17) with an adult membership.
- Section 2. No person shall knowingly be admitted as a member of this Society whose sole objective is to collect Indian artifacts for show or commercial disposal.
- Section 3. Dues of this Society, established by the Executive Committee, shall apply individually, but will include the spouse and any children under the age of eighteen (18). Dues shall be payable at the regular meeting in January of each year.

- Section 4. Dues not paid by the 15th of March shall be considered delinquent and the member's name dropped from the rolls. Members so dropped may be reinstated upon payment of back dues.
- Section 5. A member in good standing shall be a member who has satisfied the requirements for membership and is current in the payment of annual dues.
- Section 6. Members may withdraw their membership by notifying the Secretary of the Society in writing.

#### Article V NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS

- Section 1. Officers shall be elected every two (2) years at the November meeting.
- Section 2. At the September regular meeting, a nominating committee shall be appointed by the President. This committee shall consist of three (3) members in good standing. The President shall be a non-voting member of this committee. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate a candidate, with the candidate's approval, for each elected office. Additional nominations may be taken from the floor at the October meeting, provided that the nominees are members in good standing and have consented to the nomination.
- Section 3. The slate of candidates shall be presented by the nominating committee to the general membership present at the October meeting. If there are no nominations from the floor, the slate of officers will be considered elected by acclamation. Should additional nominations be made from the floor, each officer will be elected by secret ballot by a 2/3 majority vote of the members present at the November meeting.

# Article VI EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

- Section 1. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Vice President of Projects, Publications Editor and Consulting Vice President.
- Section 2. The committee shall have the power to transact necessary business between meetings, and shall report such transactions at the next regular Society meeting. The quorum of the committee shall be five (5) members, at least one (1) of whom is the President or Vice President.

Section 3. The membership has the right to remove any officer who fails to perform the duties of the office, by a 2/3 majority vote of the membership present at a regular or special meeting, provided that a written notice of the intention to remove that officer has been sent to the membership at least thirty (30) days prior to the meeting.

# Article VII COMMITTEES

- Section 1. All committees shall be established by the Executive Committee as deemed necessary, and shall appoint either three (3) or five (5) members for each committee established. A chair shall then be elected from within that committee.
- Section 2. The purpose of each committee will be to recommend and advise.
- Section 3. The Executive Committee has the right to remove, by majority vote, any chair or committee member who is negligent in the duties of that committee.
- Section 4. Should any chair or committee member be unable to serve for any reason, the vacancy may be filled with an appointment by the President to serve the remainder of the term.

# Article VIII FIELD SCHOOL

- Section 1. A field school may be conducted when practical to train members of the Society in disciplined archeological techniques.
- Section 2. A field school committee may be appointed by the Executive Committee, chaired by the Vice President of Projects, to make all announcements and arrangements regarding a planned field school. Field schools may be conducted as often as deemed necessary, or as requested by the members.

# Article IX ETHICS

- Section 1. A member may be expelled from the Society upon vote of the Executive Committee for violation of the terms and conditions of any of the Texas Antiquities Statutes as they exist or shall be hereafter amended or enacted, including, but not limited to:
  - a. The practice of buying artifacts with the intent to sell them for commercial gain.

b. The disregard of proper archeological field techniques.

- c. The willful destruction or distortion of archeological data.
- Section 2. The Executive Committee shall serve as an Ethics Committee and shall be responsible for upholding the ethical standards of the Society.
- Section 3. If a complaint is filed alleging a violation of the Texas Antiquities Statutes, it shall be processed in accordance with the Ethics Committee Guidelines for Disposition of Complaints.
- Section 4. The Executive Committee, acting as the Ethics Committee, shall establish and amend rules for the disposition of such complaints.

# Article X DISSOLUTION

- Section 1. The assets of the Society shall be used only to accomplish the purposes specified in the Constitution and Bylaws of the Society and no part of such assets shall inure, or be distributed to, the members of the Society.
- Section 2. Should the Society dissolve, any assets remaining shall be forwarded to an institution of archeological research.
- Section 3. This article is in compliance with 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

# Article XI RULES OF ORDER

Section 1. The latest edition of ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER, NEWLY REVISED shall be the authority governing the meetings of the Society, Executive Committee, and committees, where not in conflict with the Constitution or Bylaws of this Society.

# Article XII AMENDMENTS

Section 1. Amendments to the Constitution and Bylaws of this Society shall be made only at a regular monthly meeting, by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of members present. Written notice of any amendments must be mailed to all members at least thirty (30) days prior to that meeting.

I spent quite some time telling him about the artifacts, giving literature, and talking him importance of about the documenting The finds. conversation included a statement from him saying that he had come home to the ranch, because he couldn't find work in the city, and that he sure would like to sell these points so he could take his girlfriend to the movies. Unknown to me, of the professional one archeologists had overheard the conversation and told me later that I had done a very good job of trying to explain our goals and objectives.

In another part of the state, a very conscientious young man, who is trying to learn about artifacts and who catalogs his artifacts to the best of his ability asked, -"Do you think any of these arrowheads are good enough to be photographed and put in a book?"

Not long ago another young man drove a couple of us across ranch country. He wanted to know where, how, and what Indians did in his part of the country. Was he interested in "goodies?" No! Just interested in learning about prehistory.

How did many of us develop our interests in archeology? I know a number of well-known,

professional well-respected archeologists (I won't tell your names, guys) who began their "careers" as "arrowhead collectors." Archeology would lostmuch had these have professionals not gotten inspiration from their finds.

Technology today seems almost to have produced sterile sciences, forgetting personal personable factors. and Archeology like medicine and many other sciences has changed tremendously during the past few years. Looking back, where would medicine be today, if it weren't for the pioneers in the field, working to the best of their knowledge and ability to the treatment of improve would disease? Where today, if it archeology be weren't for the observations and recordings of pioneers in the field?

I certainly am NOT ignoring the commercial aspect of buying and selling of artifacts for profit by any or means. manner Unfortunately, there is much destruction for profit, which is DEPLORABLE! S (200) (A.

Many collectors have been eager to learn about their artifacts and have been willing to share their knowledge with anyone interested. Is the attitude of some people making them reluctant to share and is it scaring them "underground?"

How are we going to interest and EDUCATE children and adults with regard to preservation, protection, and understanding of the past, if we have an either-or attitude?

There are all shades of gray.


