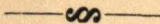

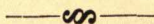

EXCEPTIONAL care was exercised in the preparation of this program. It has been published with the view that it might help the audience in understanding and enjoying the events which will be presented tonight.

Begin at the opening event. You will not only see the entries but will also learn the amount of money that will be awarded with prizes along with the ribbons. You will be told on what the judge will base his decision in picking the winners. Try yourself to select the best before the judge has announced his judgment through the presentation of the ribbons.

Because the program on the opening night is different from the other sixteen Coliseum performances during the remainder of the 1929 Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show it became necessary for a separate program to be prepared for tonight. In the Souvenir Program that will be used for the remainder of the Exposition will be found a history of the Rodeo, a cowboy dictionary, the rest of the Horse Show events for the Exposition, the amount of money to be offered in Rodeo and Horse Show events, a description of each contest and its rules and other interesting information dealing with the Rodeo. The cover will be a reproduction of an oil painting.

Ribbons will be presented in tonight's Horse Show classes by their colors will represent the following awards: Blue, first; Red, second; White, third, and Pink, fourth.

Sixteen Rodeos and Horse Shows

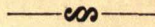
WORLD championships will be at stake when the sixteen Rodeo performances are held matinee and night during the eight full days of the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show. On each program will also be Horse Show events, presenting animals from many noted stables.

In recent years the Rodeo has shown great development as a real western sport contest. The Rodeo was once looked upon as "Wild West Show" or a circus. Today it is a contest. Cowboys and cowgirls match their ability and skill with the strength and viciousness of outlaw horses and wild cattle. They are not paid performers. They enter the contests to be judged by three judges who will determine which ones will win the championships and the thousands of dollars offered by the Show in premiums.

From many states the cowboys and cowgirls have entered. They come here, many of them, as experienced performers known to Fort Worth audiences. Others are new entries for this part of the country promising real competition for the others.

For the Rodeo, the best of livestock was obtained. It took months of searching before enough wild steers and part Brahmas could be obtained for the steer riding and bulldogging contests. From Chugwater, Wyoming, 100 bucking bronses have been sent to the Exposition. This is said to be the world's largest string of bronses that are used exclusively for the Rodeo.

Eight Days of Fun and Frolic



WITH the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show of 1929 now under way, the many departments of the organization are prepared to present eight days of fun and frolic. There will not be one dull moment on the entire program.

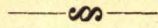

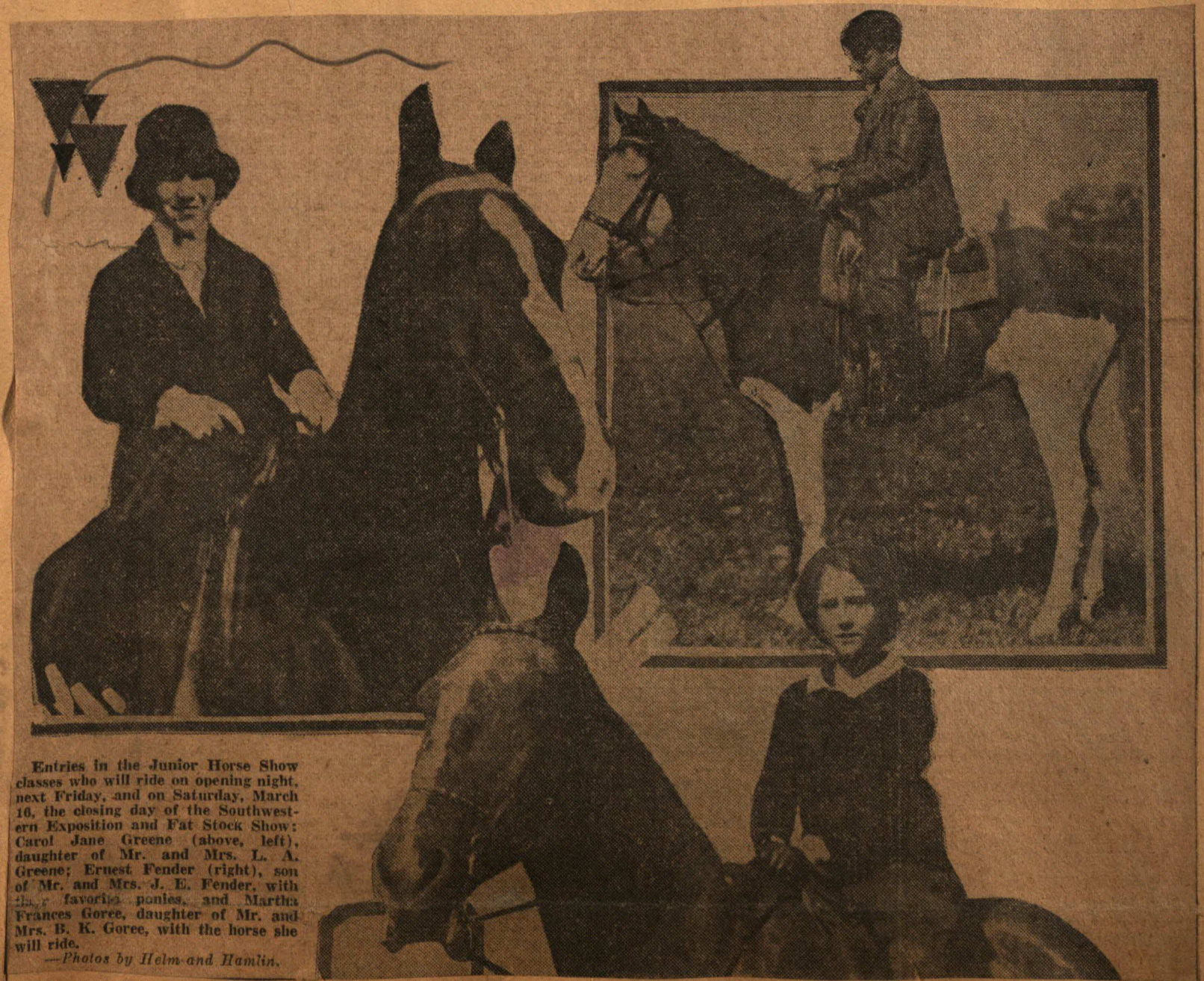

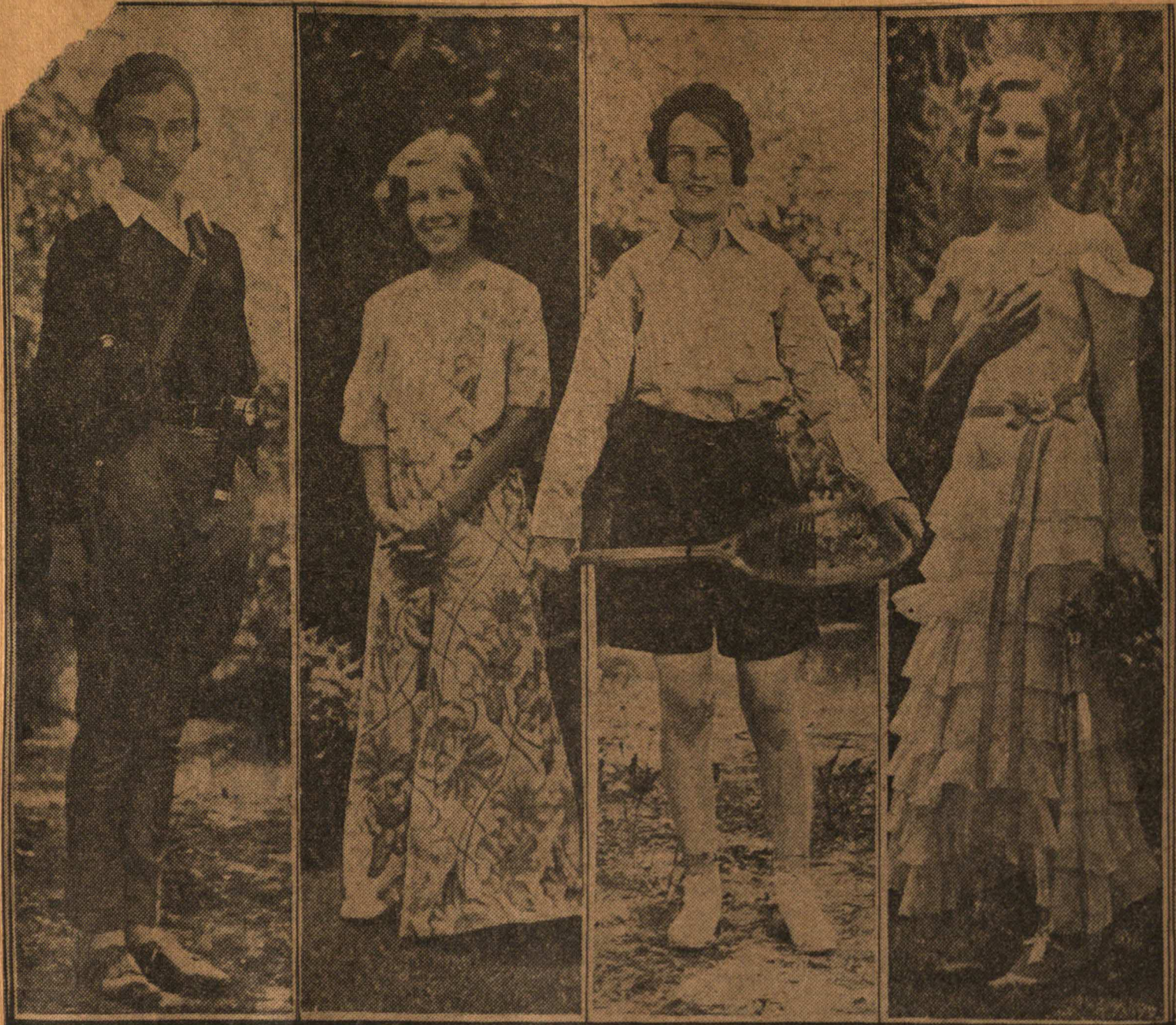

Naturally he is afraid to return the queen and have it ruffed, which will establish the jack in dummy, and he is afraid to lead a small spade, for fear the declarer will get a discard on dummy's jack. So he switches, and returns a small club.

This, of course, West wins with the queen, but now the hand cannot be defeated because declarer is able to establish a spade in dummy for a diamond discard, thereby losing only two spades and a club and making his contract.


Miss Florence Coleman received the primary medal for general excellence,

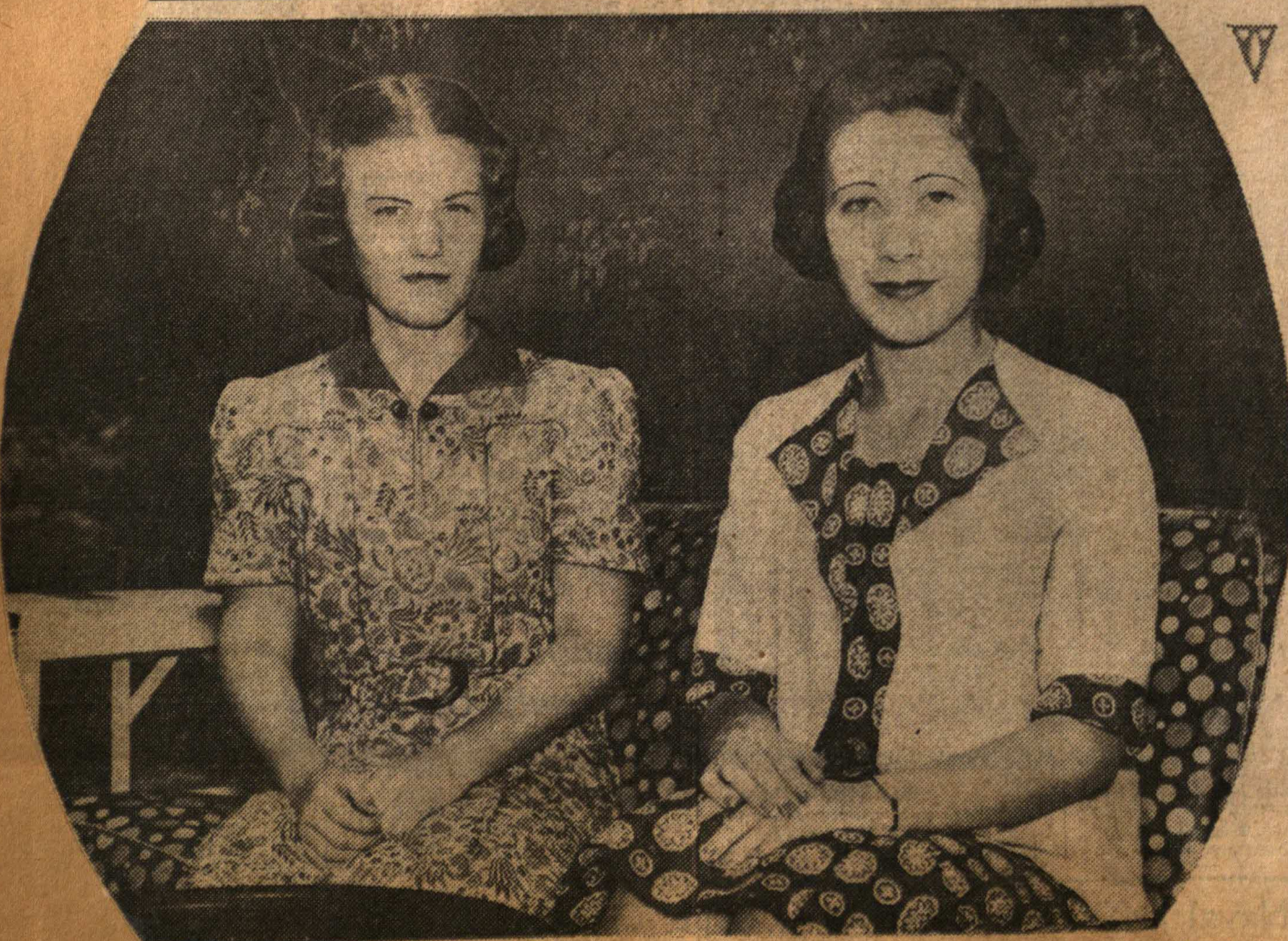

Ballroom Picture One to Remain Vivid Many Years for Debutantes

A hush fell over the big ballroom. The orchestra began the lilting strains of "A Pretty Girl Is Like a Melody."

One by one, 14 smiling young debs stepped into a horseshoe archway on a silver platform and made a deep bow. Taking the arm of her escort, she promenaded the length of the ballroom while fond parents beamed and enthusiastic friends applauded.

Such was the picture Monday night, the 1937 Assembly debutante will put away in her book of memories of one of the most exciting events of her young life—her coming out party.

It was a night that will remain vivid in her memory for many years—the Crystal Ballroom of Hotel Texas elaborate in its ornamentation of silver, the 500 guests handsomely and stylishly gowned and the thrill of being the "belle of the ball."

Debs and Escorts.

Farmer Jr.; Miss Maidee Williams and Mr. Gordon Arnold; Miss Sally Trigg and her brother, Mr. Henry Trigg; Miss Josephine Walker and Mr. Jim Phillips; Miss Mary Ellen Lilly and her brother, Mr. Artice Lilly; Miss Loretta McDermott and Mr. William Waltman Jr. of Borger; Miss Kathryn Hutt and Mr. Ed P. Then they descended and joined in the grand march, led by Mrs. Beall and Mr. Berney, Dr. Beall and Mrs. Berney and Mr. and Mrs. Ed P. Byars. Mrs. Byars is secretary of the Assembly.

Shep Fields and his Rippling Rhythm Orchestra, under a white canopy hung with silver leaves, began to play that Casa Manana favorite of Fort Worth, "The Night Is Young and You're So Beautiful," and the debs and their escorts put on the debutante dance.

Shortly after midnight supper was served on the mezzanine floor. The debutante table again featured the silver decorations in keeping with the silver anniversary celebration of the Assembly. Calla lilies and silver leaves in an oblong antique silver bowl on a mirror reflector was the centerpiece. Gowns trimmed in sequins, paillettes and iridescents, worn with orchids and jeweled hair ornaments, made a brilliant background for a coming out party.

The debutantes were gowned as follows:

The north end of the ballroom was marked by three tall modernistic silver screens on each side of a wide central silver arch, backed by silver and outlined in calla lilies. Diagonally up each of the six screens was a garland of silvered smilax, thickly studded with calla lilies. The archway of the door was outlined with another formal garland of the leaves and lilies, and at each side of the flanking screens stood silvered Eucalyptus trees. The Assembly's gifts to the girls were imported crystal ball watches, each wrapped in silver and tied with silver.

Mrs. Beall wore a white chiffon gown with a beaded bodice and a full skirt. Her slippers were silver, and on her shoulder were a pair of orchids sent to her by the 1937 Assembly debutantes.

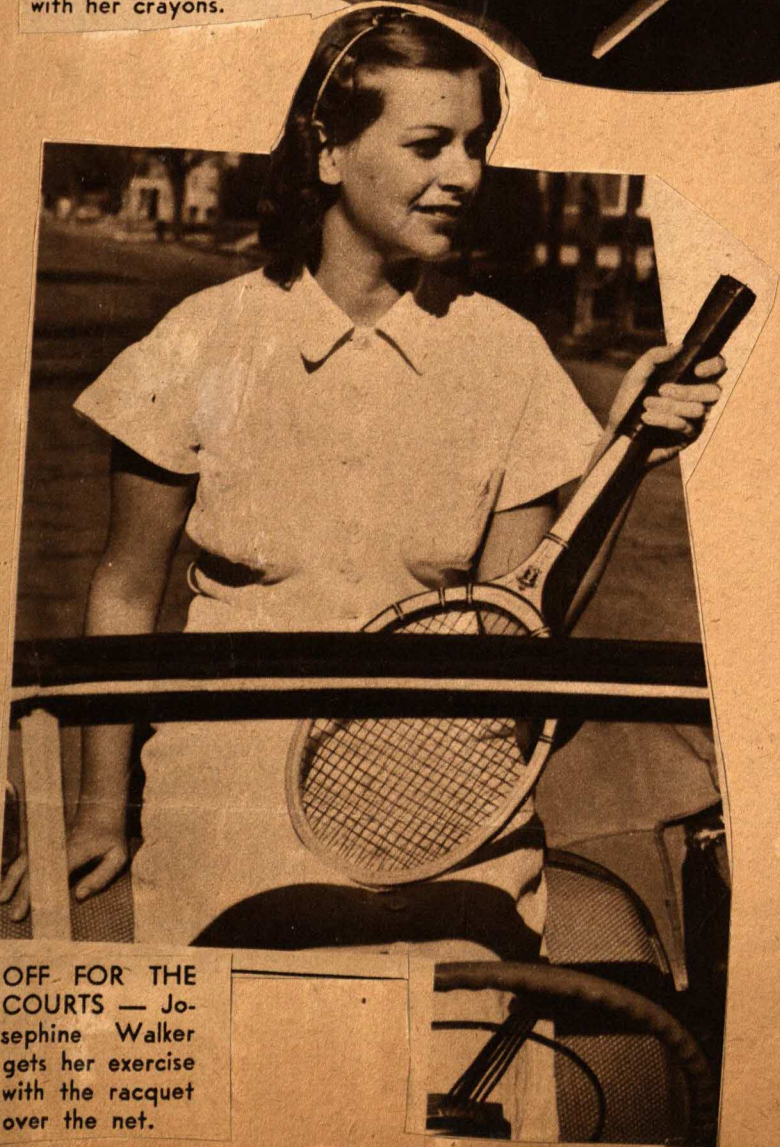
