






Faculty Decides Upon Final List of Graduates.


The public schools will graduate a class of ninety-three this June, the High School faculty having determined the list definitely Monday afternoon. The commencement program will take

The commencement program will take place Friday morning, June 8, in the High School auditorium, and the class exercises will be held probably the evening before. The programs have not been announced.


