


FRONT VIEW OF BUILDING

BY-LAWS

Article I—NAME

The name of this association shall be G. E. Tandy Parent-Teacher Association of Fort Worth, a local unit of the Texas Branch of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers.

Article II—OBJECTS

The objects shall be to promote the welfare of children and youth in home, school, church, and community.

To raise the standards of home life.

To secure adequate laws for the care and protection

of children and youth.

To bring into closer relation the home and the school, that parents and teachers may cooperate intelligently in the training of the child.

To develop between educators and the general public such united efforts as will secure for every child the highest advantages in physical, mental, social, and spiritual education.

Article III—POLICIES

Section 1. The purpose of this association shall be educational and shall be developed through conferences,

committees, and projects.

Section 2. This association shall be non-commercial, non-sectarian, and non-partisan. No commercial enterprise and no candidate shall be endorsed by it. Neither the name of the association nor the names of its officers in their official capacities shall be used in any official connection with a commercial concern or with any other than the regular work of the association.

Section 3. The association shall not seek to direct the administrative activities of the school, or to con-

trol its policies.

Section 4. This association may cooperate with other organizations and agencies active in child welfare, such as conference groups or co-ordinating councils, provided they make no commitments which bind their member groups.

Article IV-MEMBERSHIP AND DUES

Section 1. Any person who is interested in the objects for which this association is organized, and willing to uphold its policies, and abide by its by-laws, may become a member upon payment of dues hereinafter provided.

Section 2. The annual dues shall be all-inclusive for membership in the National Congress, the State Branch, and the local unit and shall amount to fifty cents per member. The annual national portion, five cents per capita, and the annual state portion, twenty cents per capita, shall be paid by the treasurer to the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers Branch as provided in the state and national by-laws. Check for dues shall be accompanied by the name of each individual member paying dues.

Article V-OFFICERS AND THEIR ELECTION

Section 1. The officers shall be a President, 5 Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer, a Parliamentarian, Publicity Chairman, and three Council Delegates, elected annually at the March meeting, the term of office to begin at the May meeting.

Section 2. No person shall be eligible for the same office more than two consecutive terms of one year each.

Section 3. A Nominating Committee of five members, three from the Executive Committee and two from the Association, elected by the Association at its February meeting, shall present a complete ticket at the annual election meeting in March, to be installed in May.

Additional nominations may be made from the floor with the consent of the nominee.

Section 4. The election shall be conducted by three tellers, appointed by the chair. Voting shall be by voice or by ballot, a majority being necessary for election. If there are more than one nominee for the same office, the voting must be by ballot.

Section 5. A vacancy in office, except that of President, shall be filled by the Executive Committee for

the unexpired term.

Section 6. An office may be declared vacant by the Executive Committee and the place filled if an officer has not assumed duties by the November meeting, or has removed from the community.

Article VI-DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Association and of the Executive Committee, conduct them by a formal order of business, shall be ex-officio member of all committees, except the Nominating Committee, shall appoint special committees and shall sign all orders on the treasury.

Section 2. The Vice-President shall act as aide to the President, performing all duties of this office in absence of the President. She shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Executive Committee meetings and report same to the Association. She shall succeed to the office of the President upon the resignation or removal from office of the President for any cause.

Section 3. The 2nd Vice-President, as program chairman, shall prepare and submit a suitable program at each regular meeting, and at such other times as

occasion demands.

Section 4. The 3rd Vice-President, as membership chairman, shall seek to enlist as members all patrons of the school and other desirable persons. She shall as co-chairman with the room mother chairman, meet.

greet, and welcome all attending the meetings.

Section 5. The 4th Vice-President, as Room Mother Chairman, with the aide of the Principal, and the room teacher, shall select representatives known as "room mothers" from the mothers of each room. This chairman shall represent the room mothers on the Executive Committee and preside at all room mother meetings. She shall keep a roll of all room mothers and call them before each meeting. All plans and requests from the room mothers shall be submitted to the Executive Committee by this chairman. She shall, as co-chairman with the membership chairman, meet, greet, and welcome all attending the meetings.

Section 6. The 5th Vice-President, as Budget and Finance Chairman, shall develop a financial plan for procuring and apportioning funds, to meet the needs of the year's activities as planned by the Association. The plan to be presented to the Association for adoption

at their first meeting of the year.

Section 7. The Recording Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the Association and of the Executive Committee, and shall send a list of officers and delegates to both Council Secretary and Council Year Book Chairman following annual election, and to the State office.

Section 8. The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds belonging to the Association; shall expend money only when ordered by the Association, the order to be signed by the President and the Secretary. She shall make a monthly and an annual report. The books shall be audited annually by an auditing committee appointed by the President. She shall keep the record of the National and State portion of the membership dues separate from the record of the general funds of the Association.

Section 9. The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Association and shall

notify the Executive Committee of special meetings of the committee.

Section 10. The Parliamentarian shall advise in parliamentary procedure. Robert's Rules of Order Revised

shall be the recognized authority.

Section 11. The Publicity Chairman shall send to the newspapers notices and accounts of all meetings and be in charge of any publicity authorized by the Association.

Section 12. Council Delegates shall represent this Association at the Fort Worth Council of Parents and Teachers. Three delegates, one of whom must be a teacher and the President shall represent this Association. These delegates shall be elected at the same time and manner as the other officers.

Article VII—EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE STANDING COMMITTEES, AND ROOM MOTHERS

Section 1. The Executive Committee shall consist of the officers of the Association, the Chairmen of the Standing Committees, and the Principal of the school or a representative appointed by her. The members of the Executive Committee shall serve until their successors are elected.

Section 2. Such Standing Committees shall be created by the Executive Comittee as may be required to provide the objects and interests of this Association. The Chairman of the standing committees shall be selected by the officers and the Principal of the school or her representative. Their term of office shall be one year. The following committees shall be included: Hospitality, Historian, Art and Scrapbook, Legislative, Study Group, Yearbook, Radio and Television, Safety, Health, Civil Defense, Publications and Librarian, Goals, Project, Founder's Day, and Nursery. The Chairmen of all committees shall present plans of work to the Ex-

ecutive Committee, and no committee work shall be undertaken without the approval of the Executive Committee.

Section 3. The Executive Committee shall act for the Association in emergencies, fill vacancies in office, fill standing committee and pass upon plans of work

submitted by standing committee chairmen.

Section 4. The Executive Committee shall meet monthly on the second Wednesday preceeding the regular meeting. Special meetings may be called by the President or on demand of three members of the Committee. In all cases all members must be notified of the meetings by the Corresponding secretary. Five shall constitute a quorum.

Article VIII—DUTIES OF STANDING COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Hospitality Committee shall prepare and serve all teas for the Association.

Section 2. The Historian shall write and present the current history of the Association at the May meeting.

Section 3. The Art and Scrapbook Committee shall keep in a book provided by the Association all items of information concerning the Association, and shall have it on display at the annual District Conference.

Section 4. The Legislative Committee shall report to the organization all legislation affecting school and

child welfare.

Section 5. The Music Chairman shall assist the Pro-

gram Chairman.

Section 6. The Study Group Chairman shall promote

parent education study groups in the Association.

Section 7. The Yearbook Chairman shall compile and edit material for the yearbook of the Association and see to the printing of same.

Section 8. The Radio and Television Chairman shall report on programs that pertain to school, parent and

youth education.

Section 9. The Safety, Health, and Civil Defense Chairman shall encourage local and state movements and shall cooperate with local and state health projects.

Section 10. The Publication and Library Chairman shall solicit subscriptions for State and National Parent-Teacher magazines, and keep all books in the library available at all meetings and buy such books as directed by the Association.

Section 11. The Goals Chairman shall acquaint the Association with local and State goals, keep records and achievements of same and send reports to Council

and State Goals Chairmen.

Section 12. The Project Chairman shall work with the school in the interest of welfare and student aid, and in the promotion of well being of children in home, school, church, and community.

Section 13. Room Mothers shall serve on the Membership Committee, encourage attendance at meetings of the Association, visit in the homes, ascertain the needs of the room and report same through the Chairman to the Executive Committee.

Section 14. The Founder's Day Chairman shall plan and present the Founder's Day Program with the assistance of the Program and Hospitality Chairmen.

Section 15. The Nursery Chairman shall be in charge of securing adequate supervision for the children for all regular meetings of the Association, and any other special meetings as designated by the Executive Committee.

Article IX—MEETINGS

Section 1. Regular meetings of this Association shall be held on the second Wednesday of each month at 1:30 o'clock, October through May, at the G. E. Tandy School, unless otherwise provided by the Association or by the Executive Committee, five days' notice having been given. One fifth of the number enrolled shall con-

stitute a quorum.

Section 2. Special meetings may be called by the President, by the Executive Committee, or on written demand of five members, five days notice being given.

Article X-REPRESENTATION

Section 1. This Association shall be represented at the State Convention by its accredited delegates, as provided in the State By-Laws.

Article XI-AMENDMENTS

These By-Laws may be amended at any regular meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the members present and voting providing notice of the proposed amendment has been given at the previous regular meeting.

Article XII-RULES OF ORDER

The rules contained in Roberts' Rules of Order Revised shall govern this Association in all cases in which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistant with these by-laws and those of the State Branch and the National Congress.

Dr. Murphy cited not only statistic, experiments and research as a basis for his statement, but a recent test given on reading and spelling to members of a civic club and high school students in a Texas city in the Rio Grande Valley.

The high school students ran circles around their elders.

The professor warned parents against the idea that education was limited to the classroom. "The educative process you begin in the first five and a half to six and a half years in a child's life sticks to him better than mathematics we seek to teach him later," Dr. Murphy commented.

TV FORCEFUL.

Television, the educator said, is one of our most forceful teachers of children.

He listed needs of children to

include:

1. Recognition of the child as an individual with worthwhileness of self.

2. Emotional security built with an awareness of the limits to his own activities.

3. consistency in discipline.

4. Feeling of adequacy based on the child's feeling he has at least a 50 per cent chance of succeeding.

ceeding.
5. A sense of belonging.
Dr. Murphy urges parents to let their children make choices within their own limits as a part of their educational development.
"Let a child decide whether he wants wheaties or post toasties for beakfast. Nothing is more tragic than to see a young person who has reached college age and can not make a decision for himself because he never was allowed to reach a conclusion on his own," the professor told his audience.

(Spl).—Children are getting the three R's in today's schools better than they ever have got them.

Dr. A. C. Murphy, professor of educational phychology at the University of Texas, told delegates the conference of first district, Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers, at a banquet Thursday in the Baker Hotel.

Dr. Murphy cited not only star-

Dr. Murphy cited not only statistic, experiments and research as a basis for his statement, but a recent test given on reading and spelling to members of a civic club and high school students in a Texas city in the Rio Grande Valley.

The high school students ran circles around their elders.

The professor warned parents against the idea that education was limited to the classroom. "The educative process you begin in the first five and a half to six and a half years in a child's life sticks to him better than mathematics we seek to teach him later," Dr. Murphy commented.

TV FORCEFUL.

Television, the educator said, is one of our most forceful teachers of children.

He listed needs of children to include:

1. Recognition of the child as an individual with worthwhileness of self.
2. Emotional security built

with an awareness of the limits to his own activities.

3. consistency in discipline.

4. Feeling of adequacy based on the child's feeling he has at least a 50 per cent chance of succeeding.

ceeding.

5. A sense of belonging.

Dr. Murphy urges parents to let their children make choices within their own limits as a part of their educational development.

"Let a child decide whether he wants wheaties or post toasties for beakfast. Nothing is more tragic than to see a young person who has reached college age and can not make a decision for himself because he never was allowed to reach a conclusion on his own," the professor told his audience.

Her hobbies, if any, she says (besides hard work and trying to find more than 24 hours in a day) are collecting stories, shaving mugs, and her camellias. The latter are sadly neglected now, she says, "but children are more important than flowers"

REPORT OF CONVENTION RULES COMMITTEE

- 1. Each delegate or alternate must register for himself, presenting all-inclusive membership cards, identification cards and \$1.00 registration fee, where-upon badges, credential cards, and programs will be issued.
- 2. Visitors are requested to register. They will receive privileges of convention except those of voting, debating, and making motions.
- 3. Delegates are requested to wear badges during sessions. Delegates, coming late, are requested to stand in the rear of the convention hall until program number in progress is completed.
- 4. Delegates are requested to refrain from writing and passing notes while a speaker is talking.
- 5. When addressing the chair, a delegate, speaking from the floor, shall give his name in full and the name of the local unit represented.
- 6. A delegate may speak once only and no longer than two minutes on any question under discussion.
- 7. Nominations may be seconded by one member, seconding speeches shall be limited to two minutes.
- 8. Nominating speeches shall be limited to 3 minutes.
- 9. Member making nominating or seconding speeches shall avoid personalities, confining their remarks to the qualifications of the nominees for whom they are speaking.
 - 10. To vote—the voting card must be

- 11. The polls shall be open from 8:00 a.m., to 5:30 p.m., on Thursday, November 15, 1956. Voting places to be HERRING HOTEL, AMARILLO HOTEL and MUNICIPAL AUDITORIUM.
- 12. A motion must be presented in writing, signed, and filed imendiately with recording secretary.
- 13. No material may be distributed or exhibited at convention without the permission of the Executive Committee.
- 14. All exhibits must be under the supervision of the exhibit committee.
- 15. Publicity shall be under the supervision of the convention publicity chairman. Interviews on work of the Texas Congress may be given only as authorized by the State President.
- 16. Only resolutions, which have been presented to the Resolutions Committee before November 1, may be presented to convention body by the Resolutions Committee.
- 17. Announcements may be made only when called for by presiding officer.
- 18. The minutes of the convention shall be approved by a committee appointed by the President.
- 19. These rules may be amended or suspended by a two-thirds vote of the voting body.



Willis McDonald Tate was born in Denver, May 18, 1911, and became president of Southern Methodist University May 6, 1954, the youngest man to be named to that position.

Most of Dr. Tate's boyhood was spent in San Antonio, where he was graduated from the old Main Avenue high school. He is an alumnus of SMU, taking the Bachelor of Arts degree in 1932 and the Master of Arts degree, in sociology, in 1935.

He has done additional graduate work at the University of Texas and at the University of Chicago, and he holds honorary Doctor of Laws degrees from Texas Wesleyan College and from Centenary College, and a Doctor of Humane Letters degree from Oklahoma City University.

Dr. Tate was a member of SMU's Southwest Conference championship football team of 1931. He was an all-conference tackle that year and received honorable mention for all-America.

After his graduation from SMU, Dr. Tate entered the teaching profession. Early in this career he was principal of the Alamo Heights elementary and junior high schools in San Antonio. In 1942 the San Antonio Junior Chamber of Commerce awarded him the title of Outstanding Young Man of the Year in that city.

In April, 1943, he went to Houston, to become the executive assistant to the pastor of the First Methodist Church, which was then the largest church in Methodism.

In September, 1945, Dr. Tate joined the SMU staff as assistant dean of stu-

AMARILLO PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Amarillo's public school budget for 1955-57 is \$6,484,860, including the building debt. A \$1.23 tax rate—91c for local maintenance and 32c for the building debt—pays the school bills in Amarillo. The State of Texas pays for 42.9% of the cities educational costs.

More than half of the 35 public schools have been constructed since World War II, indicating the nature of the community. Business estimates place the city's growth at about 1,000 new residents per month.

There are 22,270 school age children in Amarillo, ages 6 through 17. There are 16,452 pre-school age boys and girls in the city—children who have not reached their sixth birthday. Pre-school age represents a span of six years, while the school-age is a twelve year span—yet there is only 5,818 difference in the totals.

Of the 22,270 school-age children in the city over 20,000 are now enrolled in the thirty-six public schools. About 2,200 Amarillo children attend private, parochial or out of town schools.

Amarillo's public school enrollment increased more than 1,000 pupils at the beginning of this school year. This is about par—for some 10 years the average September jump has been in the neighborhood of 1,000 pupils—or the equivalent of about 40 addition classrooms.


The public schools employ about 865 instructional personnel to educate the 20,000 boys and girls. Together with the clerical, maintenance, custodial and cafeteria people the total personnel in the school system is over 1300.

The cost of education—like the price of beef—isn't going down. This year the public schools will make a total educational expenditure of about \$325 per pupil. This figure includes our building debt.

Amarillo has the distinction of operating very few half-day classes. When the new Lawndale School opened on October 22nd, there were no half-day classes in the public schools of Ama-

dents. July 1, 1948, he was appointed dean of students, and November 15, 1950, he was made vice-president in charge of development and public relations.

In 1932 Dr. Tate married an SMU classmate, Joel Estes of Cleburne. They have two children — a son and a daughter.

rillo. Some of our classes are large—but not large enough to damage the academic achievement of pupils, according to the judgment of the instructional staff and superintendent. The average size of elementary classes is 27.5. The national average is over 30.

About a year ago the voters of Amarillo authorized more than six million dollars for public school construction. The School Board sold \$2,500,000 and held almost four million. An interest rate increase has the board scratching heads on whether to sell now or hold-out for a better market.

Amarillo's problem and pleasures are typical of many Panhandle and western cities. The schools are constantly adjusting to the changing times while trying to offer a stabilized curriculum that will enable the youth of the city to cope with these times.

To lend its beauty for the eyes of men.


A blue mood steals along the Palo Duro,

ANNUAL REPORT OF STATE PRESIDENT

It is with gratitude and pride that I come to the end of this administration to give an accounting of my stewardship as your president. The enthusiasm, harmony and efficiency that have marked our progress in the Texas Congress program of service these past three years gladden my heart and stir me with a renewed recognition of the great privilege that has been mine as your leader.

This past year has been successful and significant—successful because of the loyal support and cooperation of the 560,350 interested, informed and participating members; significant because a rich contribution to the community life has been made in all sections of the state where 2600 local units have functioned with a better understanding and deeper appreciation of the parent-teacher movement and the high ideals for which it stands.

One of the major emphases of this administration, mental health, came to fulfilment this June when 130 selected leaders came together after an eighteen months period of planning and preparation. This group prepared a beautiful and practical booklet—Mental Health Know-How—which has been the textbook used in the 26 district workshops. Already this publication has proven to be the best seller of recent Congress publications. This project was in cooperation with the Hogg Foundation for Mental Hygiene of the University of Texas.

Another emphasis this past year has been in the field of legislation. We in the Congress have endeavored to inform Texas citizenry of the great need and importance for an improved teacher retirement program by working for the passage of Constitutional Amendment No. 4.

The Congress is proud of the continued interest shown in legislation. A bulletin, titled Legislative Round-up, is sent from the state office to local units, advising them of the status of certain bills. The Congress legislative program is sent to local units for study before the convention so that delegates can come better prepared to vote.

We look forward to the completion of our long-term project—Reporting to Parents. This study has been finished and the report will soon be available for distribution.

Texas continues to lead in the number of national life members. The number of state life members steadily increases, providing more income for district extension services. This year there were 868 state life memberships given. The Texas Congress also presented one national life membership to Mrs. Chalmers W. Hutchinson, life member of the executive committee and a past state president.

Texas Congress life memberships were presented to Mrs. C. E. Sanderson and to Mr. Leon S. Price, the presentations having been made during the Fort Worth convention.

Promotion of the National Parent-Teacher magazine this year, through a state-wide slogen contest, will culminate in recognition of the winners during this convention.

The Texas Parent-Teacher subscription list now stands at approximately 17,000. In addition, about 10,000 copies of the magazine are mailed out, Congress paid, each month to the president, program chairman, publications chairman, and principal of local associations; to national and state board members; to past state presidents; to district elected officers and publications chairman, of city councils and to school superintendents; to president, publications chairman, vice presidents of county councils, and county superintendents.

The state program theme, "We, the People, Spotlight the Public Schools," is apropos and of vital concern just now.

Participation is increasing in study courses and in developing programs of community interest.

The Congress continues the scholarship program with the giving of 10 scholarships to in-service training teachers in the seven teacher training colleges, College of Arts and Industries, Prairie View A. & M., and a special education scholarship in the University of Texas. This program totals \$2000 annually.

The birthday of the Texas Congress was officially celebrated October 11 in the Hall of State at the State Fair, Dallas, with the presentation of a pageant, "With a Song in My Heart," depicting the history and achievements of the Congress. The review was beautifully presented by the students of O. M. Roberts Elementary School. Following this observance, the Dallas city and county councils were hosts for a fellowship hour.

Last spring an oak tree was planted on the grounds of the state office in Austin in memory of Mrs. M. A. Taylor, president of the Texas Congress from 1935 to 1938. It was during her administration that the first section of the building was constructed.

The state president has attended all national and state board meetings and, in addition to the regular duties of her office, has been privileged to represent the Congress and to participate in the following conferences and conventions.

INFORMATION REGARDING CONVENTION PROGRAM

Representation—State Bylaws, Article XIV, Section 2. The voting power in state conventions shall be vested in the membership of the State Board of Managers, presidents of councils or their alternates chosen by the council, presidents of local units or their alternates and accredited delegates from local units.

Section 3. Each local organization in good standing shall be entitled to send to the state convention its president or representative, and one additional voting delegate for each 20 members accredited on the books of the State Treasurer.

Section 4. Accredited delegates to state convention are those from local units whose dues have been received in the state office postmarked on or before October 27 preceding the convention. Names of delegates or alternates must appear on the membership roll on file in the state office.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS

STATE BYLAWS

ARTICLE VI-OFFICERS AND THEIR ELECTION

Section I. Only members of a local Congress unit may hold office in any division of the Texas Congress.

Section 2. The officers of the Texas Congress shall be a president, ten vice-presidents, and a recording secretary, elected by ballot for a term of three years or until their successors are elected and qualified. The officers shall be divided into three groups: (a) Group one shall consist of the president, first and second vice-presidents and a recording secretary. (b) Group two shall consist of the vice-presidents from Regions I, III, V, and VII. (c) Group three shall consist of the vice-presidents from Regions II, IV, VI, and VIII. One group shall be elected each year in numerical order.

Section 3. Group one shall be elected from the state membership at large. The state shall be divided, by the Board of Managers, into regions for the election of officers from group two and group three. No officer shall be eligible to be re-elected to the same office until after the expiration of at least one term. Only a member of a local Congress unit shall be eligible to hold office in the Texas Congress.

Section 4. Any vice-president establishing a residence outside of the region from which he was elected shall automatically forfeit his office.

Section 7. A nominating committee consisting of seven (7) members from the Board of Managers and representing different areas of the State, shall be elected by the Board of Managers at the regular post-convention meeting. An alternate for each member of the committee shall also be elected. The chairman and an alternate chairman shall be elected by the Board of Managers. The committee shall meet at least three months before the convention. In the event the chairman is unable to serve, the alternate shall call the meeting of the committee. It shall be the duty of this committee to solicit nominees whose qualifications shall be specified. The nominating committee shall elect the nominees by majority vote. Nominees shall be members of a local unit. A list of the nominees shall be attached to the Call for the convention. The committee shall report to the convention on the first day, at which time additional nominations may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the nominee has been secured.

The Committee designated to nominate officers of Group One, consisting of the president, first and second vice-presidents and a recording secretary, submit the following nominees:



Parents and Teachers Confer On Problems and Programs

Some 2,000 delegates to the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers here Wednesday re-viewed problems and programs and heard a noted educator de-scribe the function of education

Dr. Willis M. Tate, president of Southern Methodist University, spoke at the Wednesday night session which ended first-day activities of the three-day conven-

"Early recognition of the role of the school as a bulwark of our democracy is evidenced in every phase of our history," Dr. Tate told his audience.

"This is our responsibility. To attract our best to teach-to pay them at least as much as other professionals—to provide them with status and prestige that is not measured by the size of their car, but the size of their contribution. Is it important?" he asked. "It is our world."





ser quality," said Dr. J. W. Edgar of Austin, state commissioner of education, who gave the main talk at the final session.

"The Gilmer-Aikin bill has helped Texas schools to become more efficient, with sounder development and a steady economic basis," he steady economic basis," he said. He answers two questions prevalent in Texas today concerning the Gilmer-Aikin bill. During the past seven years there has been an increase of 463,000 students, 19,000 more teachers and 28 million dollars He answers two teachers and 28 million dollars

"Yes, we are getting our money's worth from the present education bill," he said. "It ishows all the way from the school board right on down to the classroom," he stated, giving facts and figures of current education improvements.

The educator asked for continued support of the current teacher recruitment program and the high school graduation requirement program, now going on in the state.







CHEF'S CORNER

The school lunch program is an integral part of the total educational program. An adequate school lunch program is absolutely essential to the welfare of our children. It provides a real situation where desirable learning can be related to the individual and community needs. In this area, teacher guidance plays an important role.

Resistance to disease, emotional stability, ability to think and reason, good vision and a capacity for work are closely related to good nutrition. The development and continuation of a sound school lunch program in this nation, as a part of the total education, will pay great dividends in the attainment of desirable objectives.

We have a good cranberry salad recipe for you this time but before I give it to you this little word of warning that I have clipped.

Before you prepare this recipe remember:

Some cooks will cook the wrong way, Of such I think we should say:

She guessed the pepper, the soup was too hot;

She guessed the water, it dried in the pot;

She guessed the salt and what do you think?

For the rest of the day, we did nothing but drink.

She guessed the sugar, the sauce was too sweet,

And by her guessing she spoiled the meat.

What of the moral? 'Tis easy to see School lunch cooks measure and weigh to a "T".

CRANBERRY ORANGE SALAD

2 whole oranges (medium)

1 qt. cranberries

2 cups sugar

10 oz. orange juice (canned or frozen)

2½ T plain gelatin

½ c chopped celery

½ c chopped nuts

Petite marshmallows if desired.

Process: Soak gelatin in 2 T of cold orange juice (5 minutes), add balance of orange juice that has been heated—stir until dissolved. Set aside over warm water until fruit is prepared.

Stem and wash cranberries; wash oranges and cut into fourths. Put both cranberries and oranges through food grinder or salad cutter; mix, add celery, nuts, sugar and gelatin, mix again. Add 2 T red food color. Pour into individual molds and place in refrigerator until set. Serve on lettuce leaf with salad dressing. Makes 12 individual servings.

Your car can be "four wheels to survival" for you and your family in a civil defense emergency. How well your car serves this purpose depends on a few commonsense advance preparations—things which may spell the difference between life and death for you and your family.

Your car helps you move away from danger

Many civil defense actions, especially preattack evacuation, depend on your ability to move away from a probable area of danger. Properly used, your car can move you and as many others as can be comfortably seated many times as far as the strongest of you could go on foot. To do this:

Keep your car in the best possible mechanical condition.





Keep your tires properly inflated.

Be sure the battery is always in tip-top shape.





Keep your gas tank more than half-full at all times.

Most cars today can move some 250 miles on a full tank of gasoline. You may not need to move that far at any one time under emergency conditions, but it may be difficult to obtain additional gasoline for quite a while after an attack.

Ways to conserve gasoline:

Keep your engine in proper mechanical adjustment.

Take opportunities to coast long distances

with engine off.

 Learn the most efficient operating speed of your engine. Usually between 30 and 40 miles per hour.

 Remember—you can push or pull another car with little increase in your own gaso-

line consumption.

tion, give a degree of protection against blast.

heat, and radiation.

Before an attack, roll the windows down to equalize pressures and to prevent glass breakage. Crouch or lie down, below the level of the windows. After an attack, windows should be raised to keep out as much dust as possible; it may be contaminated by radio-active fallout.

mation. Be sure it is working and marked with the civil defense frequencies of 640 and 1240.




