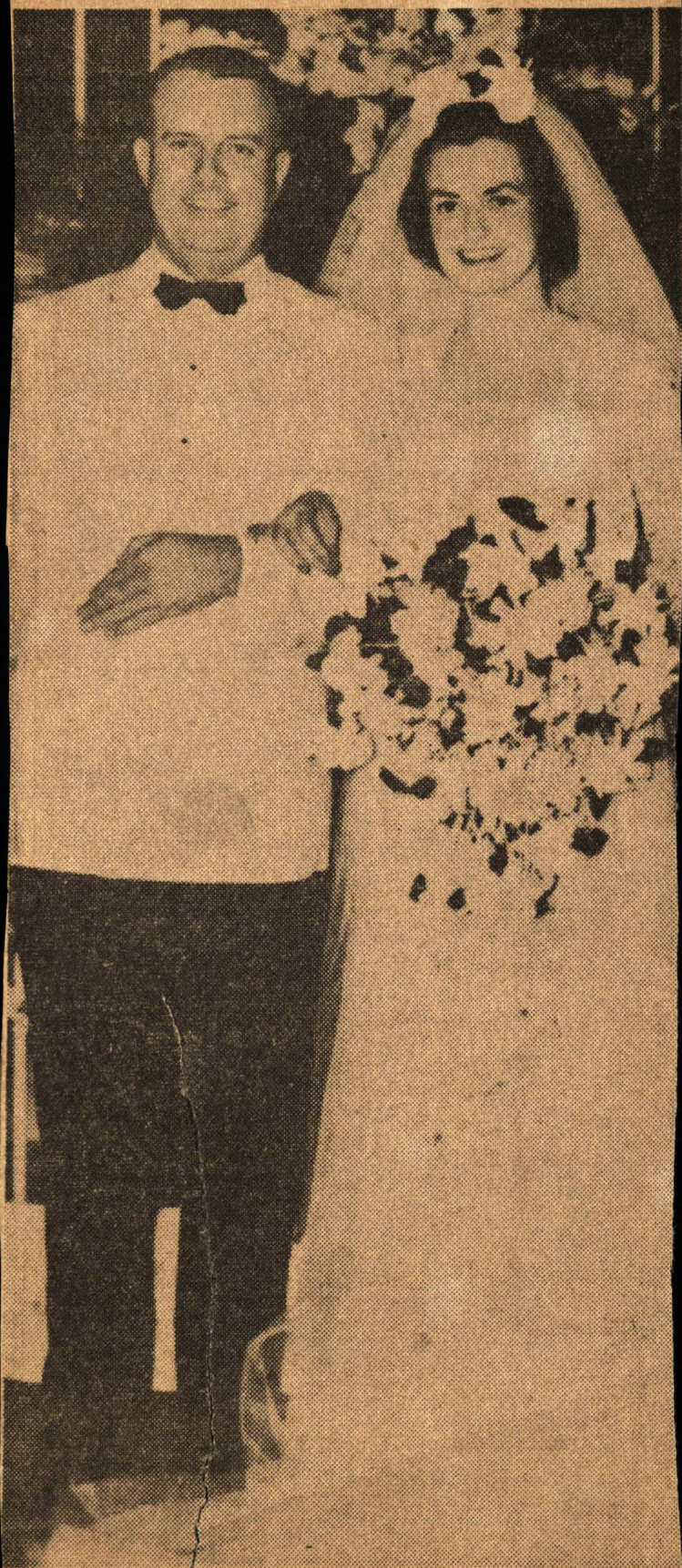

Miss Hedrick, Mr. Coffey Are Married

Friday Night Ceremony Is Held in First Presbyterian Church; Reception Follows.

Wearing an ivory satin gown and, as "something old," a princess lace veil which has been worn by several other brides in the family, Miss Pauline Stripling Hedrick became the bride of Mr. William Robert Coffey, son of Dr. and Mrs. Alden Coffey, 4117 West Seventh Street, Friday night at First Presbyterian Church.

The bride, who is the daughter of Mrs. P. K. French of River Crest and of Mr. Wyatt C. Hedrick of Westover Hills, was given in marriage by her uncle, Mr. Will K. Stripling. Her gown, which was designed and executed for her by Lenora Ormsby of New York, was of ivory satin made on classic lines with a little peak of the satin touching the hollow at the base of her throat. The gown was overhung by the princess lace veil which is a family heirloom. The bride carried an old-gold handkerchief holder, belonging to a friend of the family, which has been carried by 18 brides in Fort Worth. The bridal bouquet was of pink camellias and lilies of the valley.

Miss Elizabeth Ryan was her cousin's maid of honor, and other bridal attendants included Mrs. R. C. Barthold and Miss Anne Willing Ryan, also cousins of the bride; Meses. W. K. Stripling Jr. and R. E. Harding Jr., and Jean and Mildred Hedrick, the two junior bridesmaids. The maid and bride's other attendants wore period frocks of starched blue Chantilly lace, made over taffeta, with puffed sleeves and bouffant skirts. The maid of honor carried a bouquet of double pink tulips and Spanish iris. The others carried bouquets of the double pink tulips, and all wore Juliet caps of the starched blue lace.

The junior bridesmaids' long frocks were of blue marquisette with double pleating on the full, long skirts, worn with matching blue hair bows. They carried nosegays of Spring blossoms.

The altar rail was hung with smilax to simulate a garden wall, against which pink tulips were planted. The entire church, choir loft and sides, were draped with smilax and screens of the greenery flanked the wedding scene, in which a profusion of pink tulips was used.

Mr. W. J. Marsh, organist, played a "Minuet" of his own composition; and "One Alone," "My Heart at Thy Sweet Voice," "Liebestraum" and "Because" as pre-nuptial selections, and the "Lohengrin" wedding chorus, with the Mendelssohn march as the recessional.

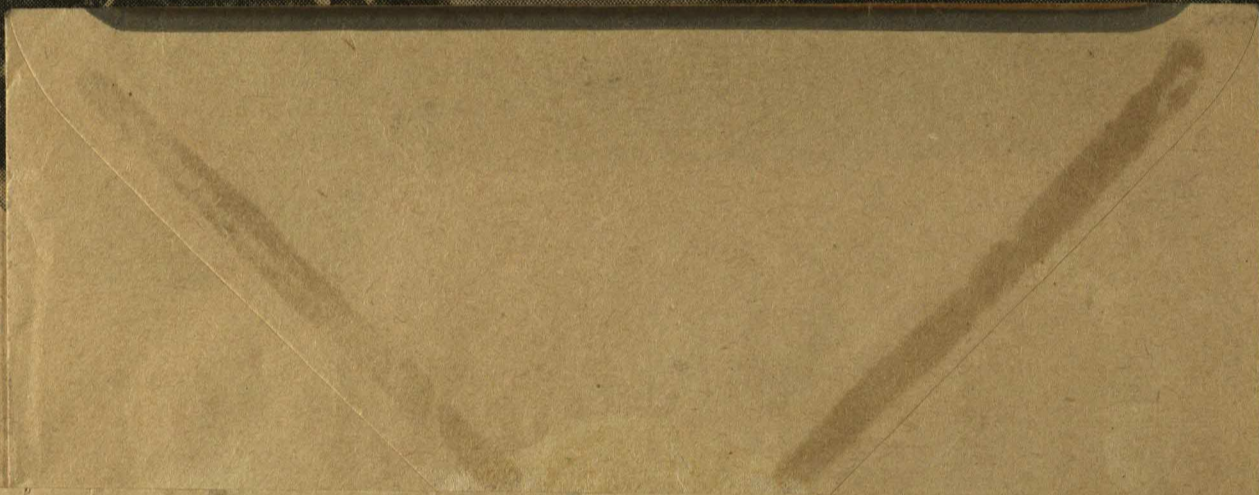

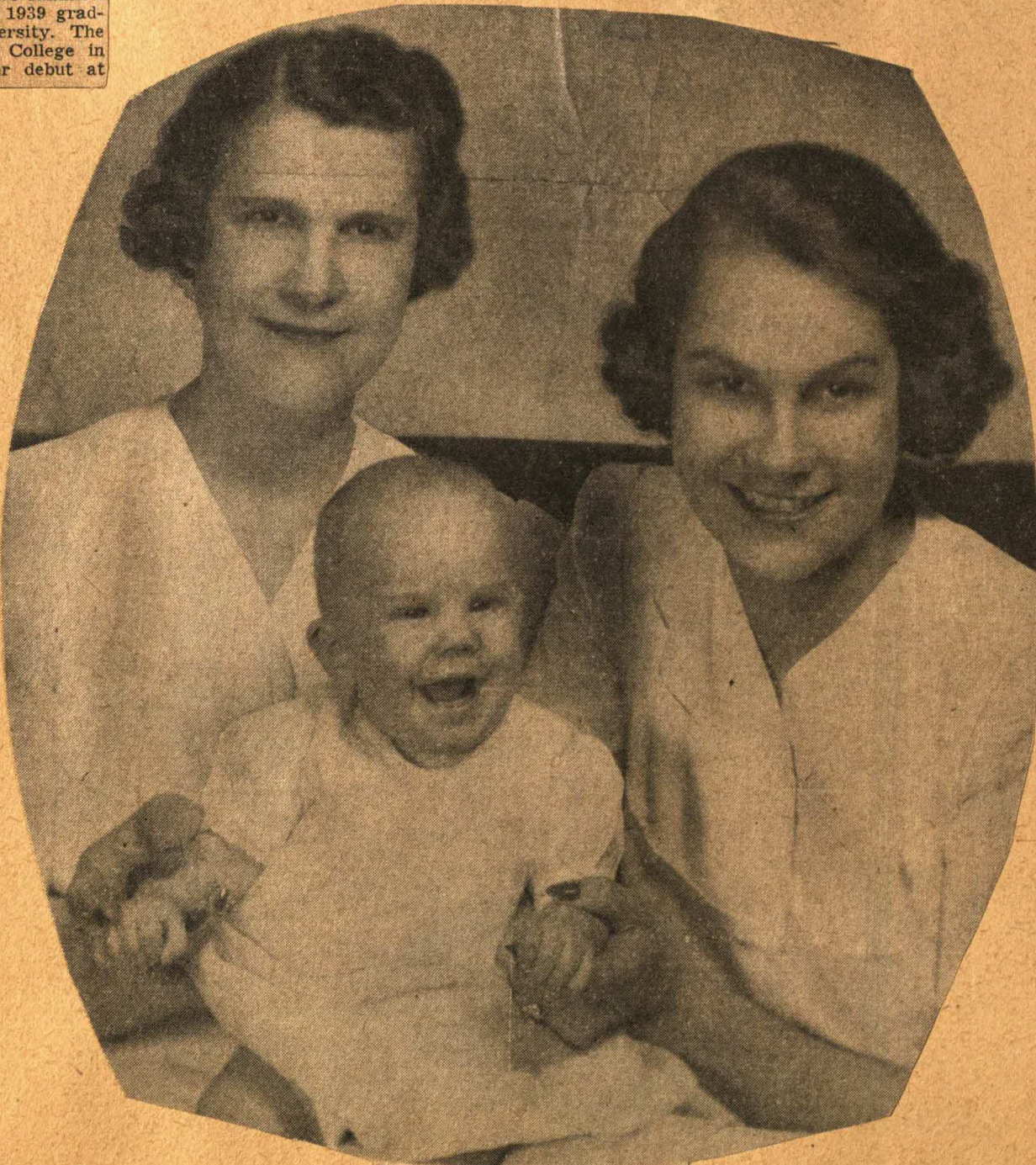

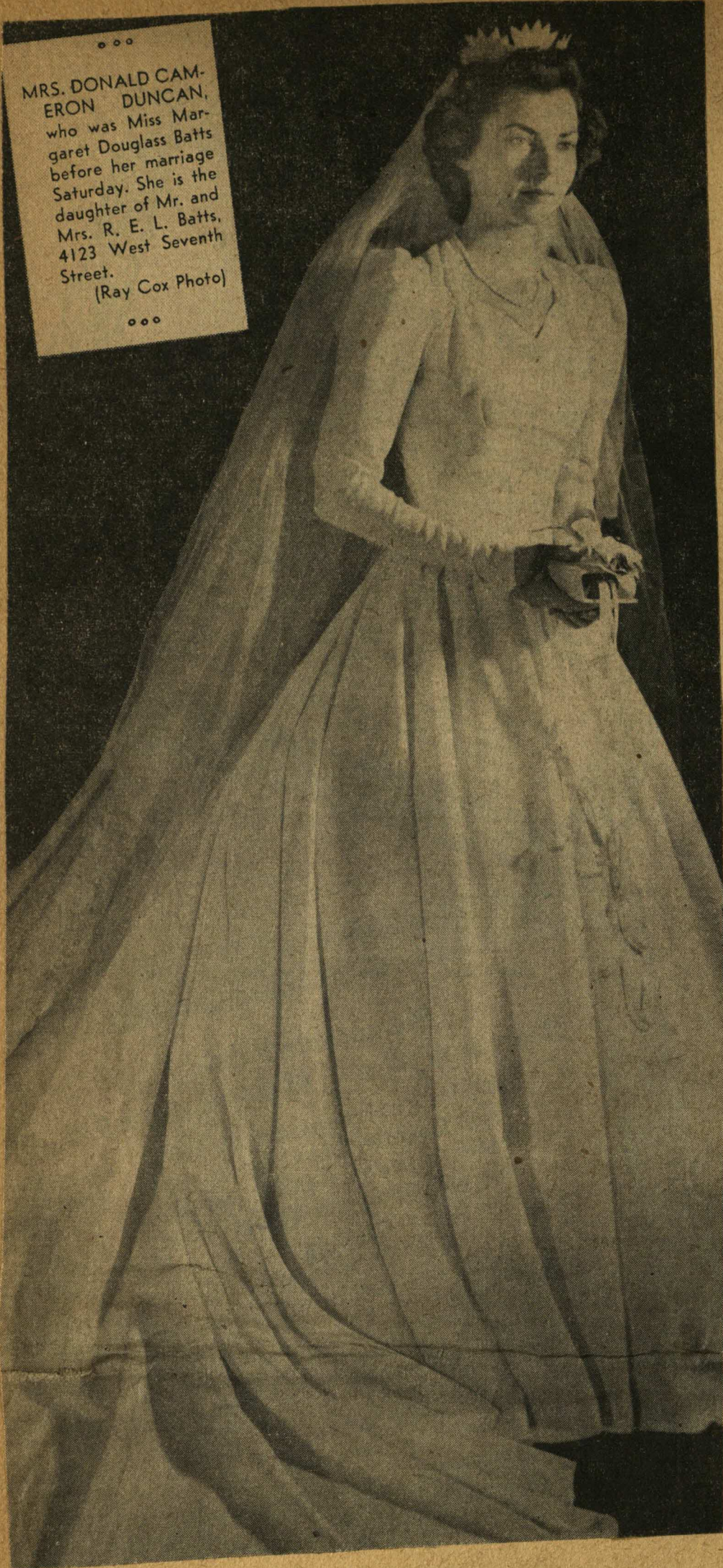

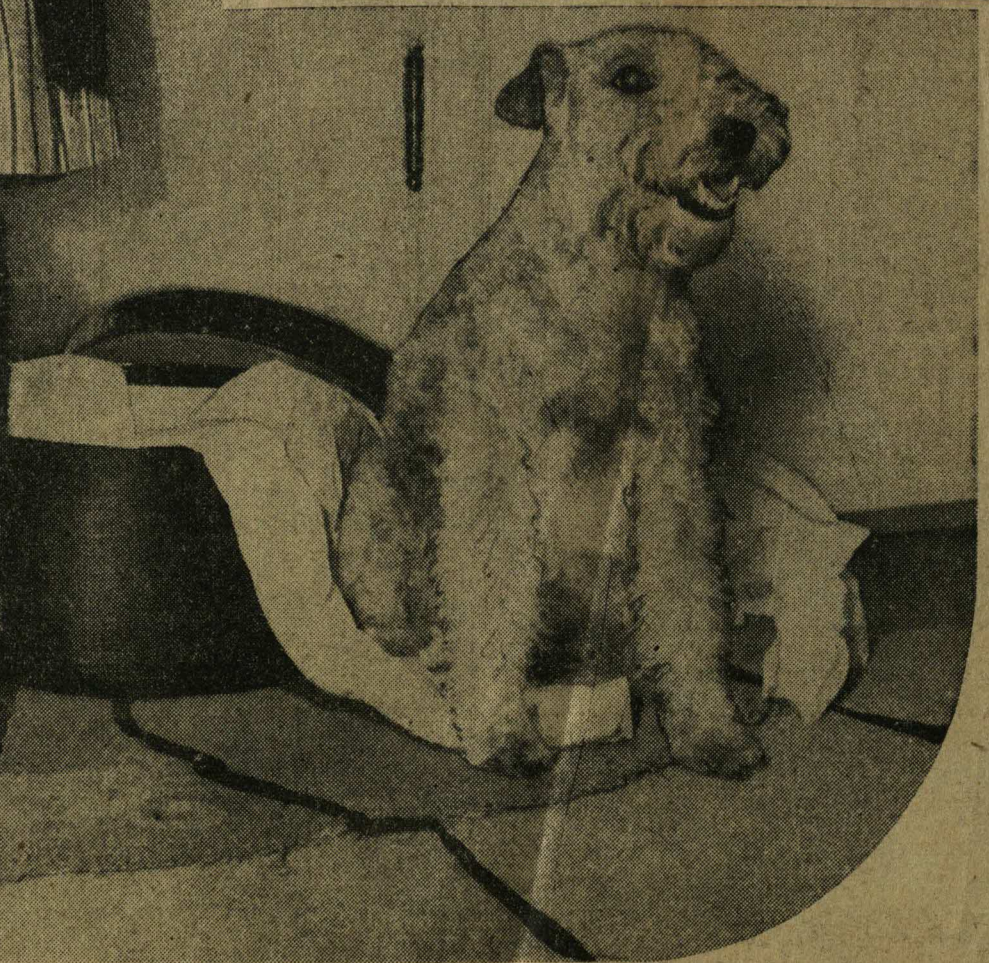
