THE CASE FOR THE 1938 FORT WORTH

Y. M. C. A. FINANCING PROGRAM

During the period of April 18th to 26th, 1922, a campaign was staged in Fort Worth, in which a total of \$375,000.00 was subscribed for a new Young Men's Christian Association building.

The corner stone of the new building was laid on April 14th, 1924.

For fourteen years the Y. M. C. A. building at Lamar and Fifth, made possible by the generous gifts of our citizens, has been used to capacity. A fine outstanding program of service to boyhood and manhood of Fort Worth has been carried on, in activities that serve to mark our city's balanced program for spiritual and material well-being.

When the building was first occupied it was found necessary to assume a mortgage of \$125,000.00 in order that the building might be opened with complete equipment and furnishings. Since 1924 this mortgage has been reduced until at present it is \$73,500.00. Despite the fact that the Board of Directors has paid out in excess of \$85,000.00 in interest during the past fourteen years, it has through careful business-like management, not only averted accumulation of indebtedness, but has made this very material reduction in the amount of its mortgage. Doubtless, it is fair to state that the record made by the Y. M. C. A. will compare favorably with that of the majority of industrial and commercial institutions of our city. At the present time there are notes held by local banks in the amount of \$8,815.94, making a total outstanding indebtedness of \$82,315.94.

On March 1st, 1940, the Y. M. C. A. will celebrate its fiftieth anniversary of service to Fort Worth men and boys. It seems eminently fitting that this anniversary mark an occasion when certain forward steps may have been definitely attained and that the association may inaugurate its second fiftieth year program in the strongest possible position. Therefore, the Board of Directors of the Young Men's Christian Association has duly adopted a program, with an objective of completing this by March 1st, 1940. The various phases of the program are as follow:

1. To celebrate the fiftieth anniversary by announcing that the association is free of all debt through the liquidation of the present building mortgage of \$73,500.00, and the notes held by local banks in the amount of \$8,815.94.
2. To modernize certain departments of the building and furnishings, to increase the facilities and service to the many groups who use the clubroom and residence facilities. The need of this modernization program is obvious when it is realized that for the past fourteen years no funds have been available for meeting depreciation, or renewing furnishings, or for making building changes necessary to meet new needs and new types of service demanded by changing social conditions.

After most careful thought by the Board of Directors and other outstanding business men, it has been definitely determined to ask the citizens of Fort Worth to join in creating a fund to be applied by the association upon its financial obligations. When it is recalled that for many years the association has not asked the community for financial support (aside from that annually included in the Community Chest budget) it would seem fair to state that our citizenship will respond generously to an appeal for funds to relieve the association of its indebtedness and its heavy burden of interest. Therefore, a financial objective has been set up as follows:

On May 15th, 1938, to have in hand a minimum of \$94,815.94, in bona fide subscriptions with which to pay the following items:

Rehabilitation Fund	\$7,550.00
Bank Notes Due	8,815.94
Mortgage	73,500.00
Administration of Fund, Collections, etc.	4,950.00

As rapidly as the debt and interest are reduced the saving will be applied to the very pressing needs represented by demands for further service through the various departments of the association, and to the upkeep of the fine physical equipment of the Y. M. C. A. building.

This, then, is the case which we present to the citizens of Fort Worth at this time. The intensive period of the 1938 financing program is set for May 2nd to 10th. During this time opportunity will be offered to the citizens to assume their share in this worthwhile project and to thereby make possible the completion of the program so auspiciously started in 1922.

Prior to May 4th, the Advanced Gift Committee will present this same opportunity to a limited number of people of outstanding substantial means. It is highly important that the work of this committee be fully completed on or before May 2nd.

Subscriptions are payable in four equal installments, starting June 1st, 1938, and running through October 1st, 1939. Amount subscribed is deductible from income tax in two tax-paying years.

The above data is designed to fully inform members of our 1938 Financing Program organization. Supplementary information will be furnished these workers from time to time.

The enclosed statement will set forth for your information the plans which the Board of Directors has adopted, looking toward the liquidation of our Y. M. C. A. indebtedness.

Supplementing that statement, there is this additional necessity for the debt retirement program. You know, of course, that the present mortgage notes have been past due since 1936 and that we are unable to re-finance or get an extension, due largely to the fact that our property under the original deed constitutes very little security. Under the circumstances these notes will be subject to the statute of limitations in 1940. There is no doubt that the mortgage holder, recognizing this fact, will shortly insist upon the payment of the principal sum, plus interest. We want to avoid this possibility.

We are now actively engaged in securing subscriptions from not only our guarantors, but from other citizens as well. Because of your interest in the successful on-going of the Y. M. C. A., as well as because you are a guarantor, I am sure you will subscribe at this time as liberally as is possible.

Please carefully consider this whole matter, and sign the enclosed subscription card blank, returning the same at your earliest convenience. You will note that the terms allow for payments over a two year period, and that subscriptions may be deducted from income tax in each of these two years.

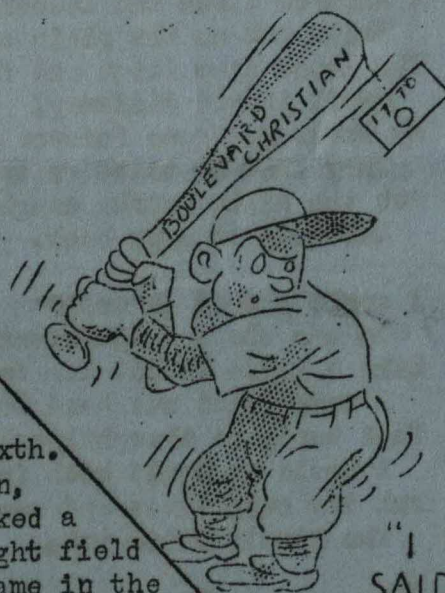
OUTCLASSED IN OPENER

scored three more in the second, and one each in the third, fourth, and sixth.

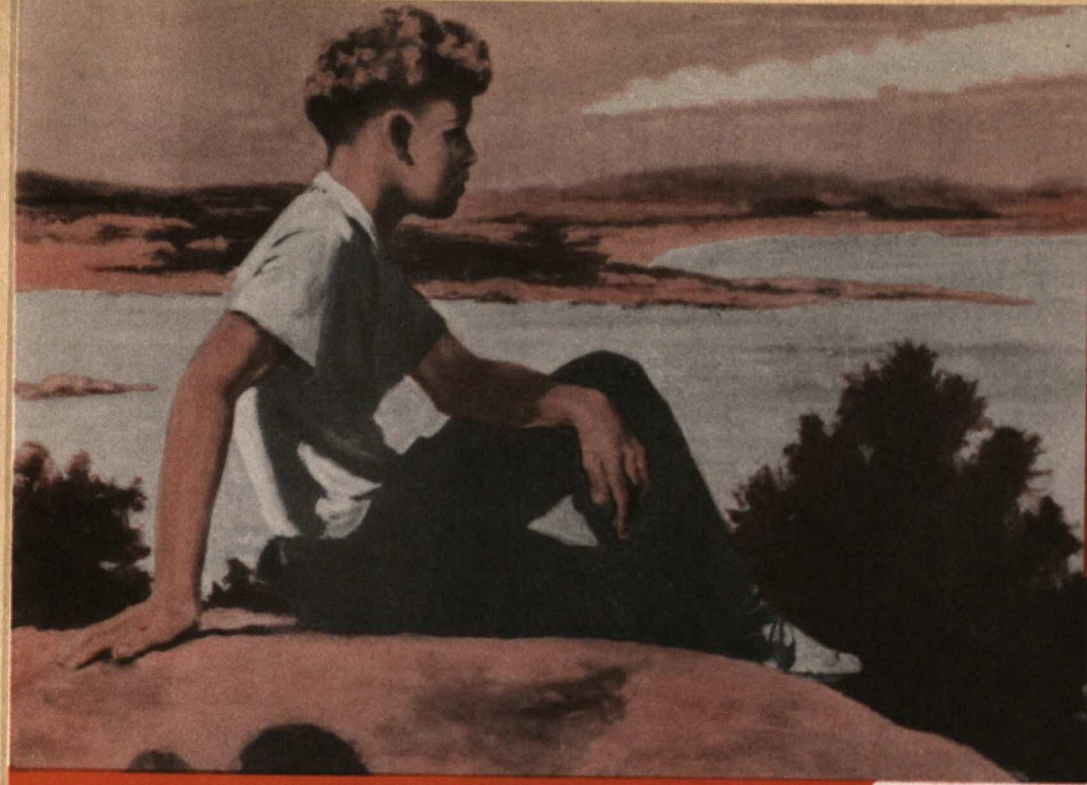

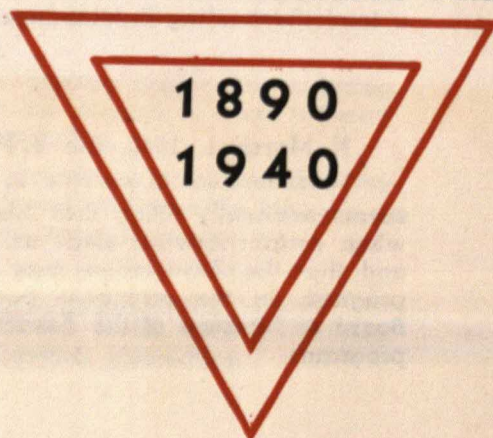

50 YEARS OF SERVICE TO FORT WORTH

THE YOUNG MEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION

Purpose:

THE PURPOSE of the Young Men's Christian Association, as stated in its Constitution, is "... to help young people develop Christian Character and to aid them in building a Christian Society."

In March, 1890, a small group of representative Fort Worth men met and organized the first Young Men's Christian Association. Through their determination and faith the present Young Men's Christian Association was made possible.

During the period of April 18th to 26th, 1922, a campaign was staged in Fort Worth, in which a total of \$375,000.00 was subscribed for the building of the present Y. M. C. A. structure at Lamar and Fifth.

For fourteen years the Y. M. C. A. building, made possible by the generous gifts of our citizens, has been used to capacity. A fine outstanding program of service to boyhood and manhood of Fort Worth has been carried on. Statistics might be given, but above and beyond statistical records of program activities and financing, stand the constructive results that the Association achieves in the lives of young men.

When the building was first occupied it was found necessary to contract a mortgage of \$125,000.00 in order that it might be opened with complete equipment and furnishings. Since 1924 this mortgage has been reduced until at present it is \$73,500.00. Despite the fact that the Board of Directors has paid out in excess of \$85,000.00 in interest during the past fourteen years, it has through careful business-like management, not only averted accumulation of indebtedness, but has made this very material reduction in the amount of its mortgage. Doubtless, it is fair to state that the record made by the Y. M. C. A. will compare favorably with that of the majority of industrial and commercial institutions of our city. At the present time there are notes held by local banks in the amount of \$8,815.94, making a total outstanding indebtedness of \$82,315.94.

50 Years of Service

ON March 1, 1940, the Y. M. C. A. will celebrate its fiftieth anniversary of service to Fort Worth men and boys. It seems eminently fitting that this anniversary mark an occasion when certain forward steps may have been definitely attained and that the Association may inaugurate its second fifty-year program in the strongest possible position. Therefore, the Board of Directors of the Association has adopted the following program:

1. To celebrate the fiftieth anniversary with the Association free of all debt.

2. To modernize certain departments of the building and furnishings, to increase facilities and service to the many groups who use the clubroom and residence features. The need of this modernization program is obvious when it is realized that for the past fourteen years no funds have been available for meeting depreciation, or renewing furnishings, or for making building changes necessary to meet new needs and new types of service demanded by changing social conditions.

The Financial Objective

FOR many years the Association has not asked the community for financial support (aside from that annually included in the Community Chest budget). With confidence that our citizenship will respond generously to an appeal for funds to relieve the association of its indebtedness and its heavy burden of interest, a financial objective has been set up as follows:

To have in hand subscriptions totaling \$94,815.94, with which to provide for the following items:

Rehabilitation Fund	\$ 7,550.00
Bank Notes Due	8,815.94
Mortgage	73,500.00
Administration of Fund, Collec- tions, etc.	4,950.00
Total.....	\$94,815.94

As rapidly as the debt and interest are reduced the saving will be applied to the very pressing needs represented by demands for further service through the various departments of the Association, and to the upkeep of the fine physical equipment of the Y. M. C. A. building.

This, then, is the case which we now present to the citizens of Fort Worth.

MEN and women who have accumulated, and are accumulating wealth, may, while still in possession of life and of its interests, witness the tangible fruition of their gifts. They may create memorials bearing their names or the name of some loved one, and for generations perpetuate their memories and character.

In no way can you render a greater and more enduring service than by devoting part of the reward of your industry to the Young Men's Christian Association.

And through the beneficiary of your wise provision, the City and State in which you have labored will steadily become a better City and State for those who come after you.

So, to all—those of great wealth and those of moderate means—the same opportunity is offered, the opportunity to join with the Young Men's Christian Association in its work of molding keen minds, strong bodies and Christian characters.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR DISTRIBUTION
OF PROSPECT CARDS

A.

Five lists (equal divisions of the alphabet) will be placed in the hands of the five division leaders. Workers in each division are seated together.

B.

Upon announcement and signal, each division leader will, in conference with his workers, select cards from the list in his hands.

C.

The division leader will place the number of the team selecting each respective card on the list in the column under "ASSIGNED TO".

D.

Each worker will place upon a requisition blank the number of the card selected and write his name and team number plainly on the bottom of the requisition blank.

E.

Messengers will pick these requisition blanks up when there are four or five numbers on them and take them to the table where the prospect cards are.

F.

The prospect cards will be divided into five equal files and each file clerk should familiarize himself or herself with the beginning and ending number of the file before him or her.

G.

The messenger will carry the requisition blanks to the file clerk who has the cards numbered from 1 to 151. That file clerk will immediately withdraw the cards requisitioned and check the number on the requisition blank and immediately pass to the second file clerk together with the cards drawn from the first file.

H.

The second, ~~six~~ third and fourth clerks will follow the same procedure.

I.

I.

As soon as the 5th file clerk has withdrawn the cards and checked the requisition blank, he or she will pass it on to those who are to fill the workers' carry envelopes. Cards will be placed in the proper envelope and the requisition blank filed.

J.

The above process requires unusual care in seeing to it that the cards are finally placed in the right envelopes.

K.

Messengers should circulate from division table to division table and pick up requisition blanks when they have four or five numbers on them, even though this may mean that the messengers will eventually get four or five requisition blanks .

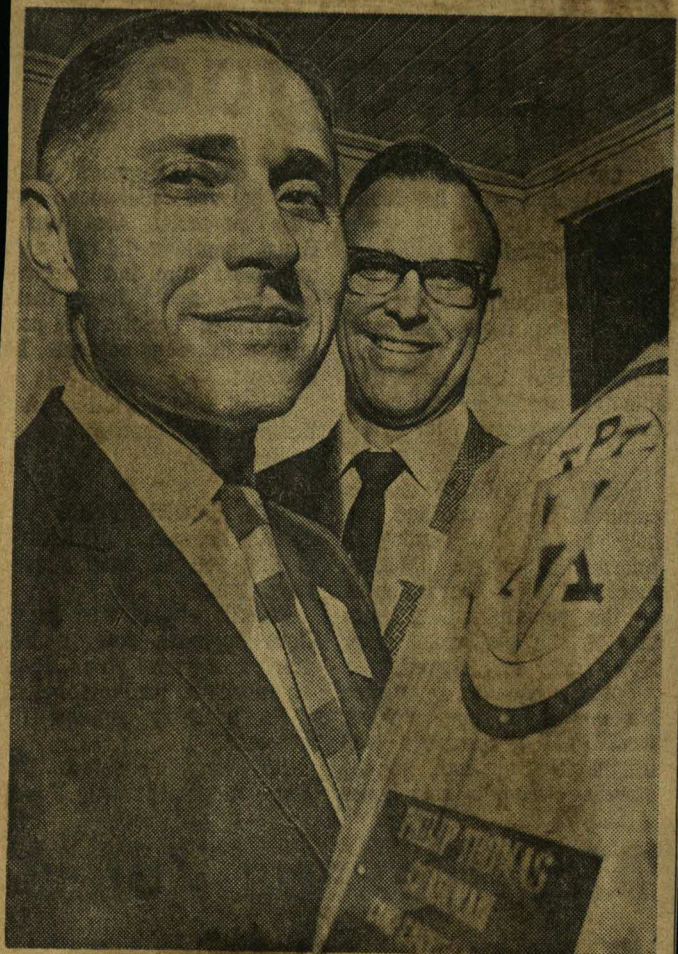

Chairman of 'Y' Campaign, Association Backer 35 Years

For 35 years the fortunes and future of Fort Worth's YMCA have been the particular concern of W. T. Ladd, one of the association's oldest members.

He has seen it grow from a small organization, which met in an old brick home on what is now West Seventh Street, into an association of some 2,000 members with its own building properties and extensive equipment.

To see this same association reach its fiftieth year of service in 1940 free from debt, and with a rehabilitated and improved building, is now his one hope.

Because of his loyalty to an association in which he is one of the few "old-timers," Ladd, despite a recent serious illness, has taken the field as chairman of the campaign central committee.

Ladd, now an honorary director of the "Y," loves to recall those old days when "Y" members gathered at the Hirschfield home for meetings. It was his interest in youth

then, as now, that prompted him to give so much of his time to the organization.

Later this property was sold and the association moved to quarters at Texas and Monroe, where the Salvation Army now stands. In 1913 Ladd became president of the organization and headed it for 15 years. He retired from this office after leading the campaign for the new building, which the association now occupies at Fifth and Lamar.

Leisure time activities of the youth of the city were the problem of the early day association leaders, just as they are now, Ladd recalls. In the old building there was a small swimming pool, there were games and sports on a small scale—and activities which were designed for character building. Retire the Y. M. C. A. Debt.

DIRECTORS of the Fort Worth Young Men's Christian Association have set out to retire the debt on the Y. M. C. A. property so that the community usefulness of the institution can keep pace with the demands upon it.

In the 14 years that the building has been occupied, a mortgage of \$125,000 has been reduced to \$73,000, while more than \$85,000 was being paid out in interest. Other notes issued by the Y. M. C. A. bring its total indebtedness to \$82,315, and rehabilitation and other needs lead to a total of \$94,815 which is being sought by the directors among public-spirited citizens to place the Y. M. C. A. in a desired position.

If not a single penny is donated to the fund, the Y. M. C. A. will still work out its salvation slowly in the manner of the past 14 years. That course will restrict the program among youths to a greater extent than the growing community can afford. Instead of the Y. M. C. A. having to pay interest on its debt, it would be far preferable if it could pay dividends in the form of more boys started toward a better manhood.

The people of Fort Worth would save money in retiring the Y. M. C. A. debt through the reduction to follow in crime and juvenile delinquency.

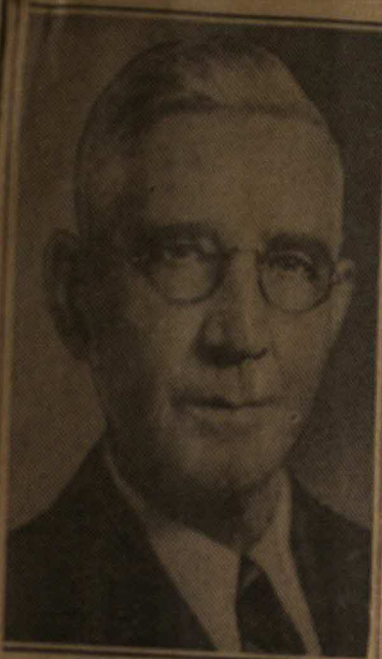

SEEK TO BREAK DOWN CLASS ATTITUDE

The Y. M. C. A. wishes to develop Christian character in boys of all economic levels, to break down any preconceived idea of class, and, above all, to refrain from designating certain boys as "underprivileged," C. G. Fairchild, executive secretary of the "Y," said Friday.

Fairchild pointed out that often it is not the boy in the shabby home who is the less-privileged. "The boy who can not do things for himself—who can not adjust himself to conditions—who can not play the game of life in a sportsmanlike manner is underprivileged, whether he is rich or poor," he said.

It is the association's idea to help boys become useful citizens—not to do things for them that will develop a 'gimme' attitude, he continued.

During the past year more than 500 boys have been given the opportunity for free swims; 55 boys—some of them in the so-called "underprivileged" group, have become Junior Optimists; free memberships have been issued to 60 boys and 30 have been given permission to work out memberships. One hundred Mexican boys have been helped—there are some 200 boys in the junior Hi-Y organizations in the city. In all these groups some 625 might be termed underprivileged, 920 otherwise.

Perhaps one of the biggest fields in boys' work for the association rests in plans for at least 60 neighborhood clubs over the city. This will require additional funds and additional staff supervision. There are now 26 such organizations functioning with boy members ranging in age from 7 to 24. More than 300 boys in all sections of the city are members.

Enlargement of this field, now under the direction of Roger Sutton, associate boys work secretary, calls for greater emphasis on strengthening the lay committee to deal with underprivileged boys' work.

The association's annual report reveals that 95,339 "Y" members, non-members and visitors attended activities or utilized the building facilities of the organization last year. The dormitory with its 142 beds provides not only a residence for young men employed in Fort Worth, but for transient guests—and even free beds for more than 100 young men each month.

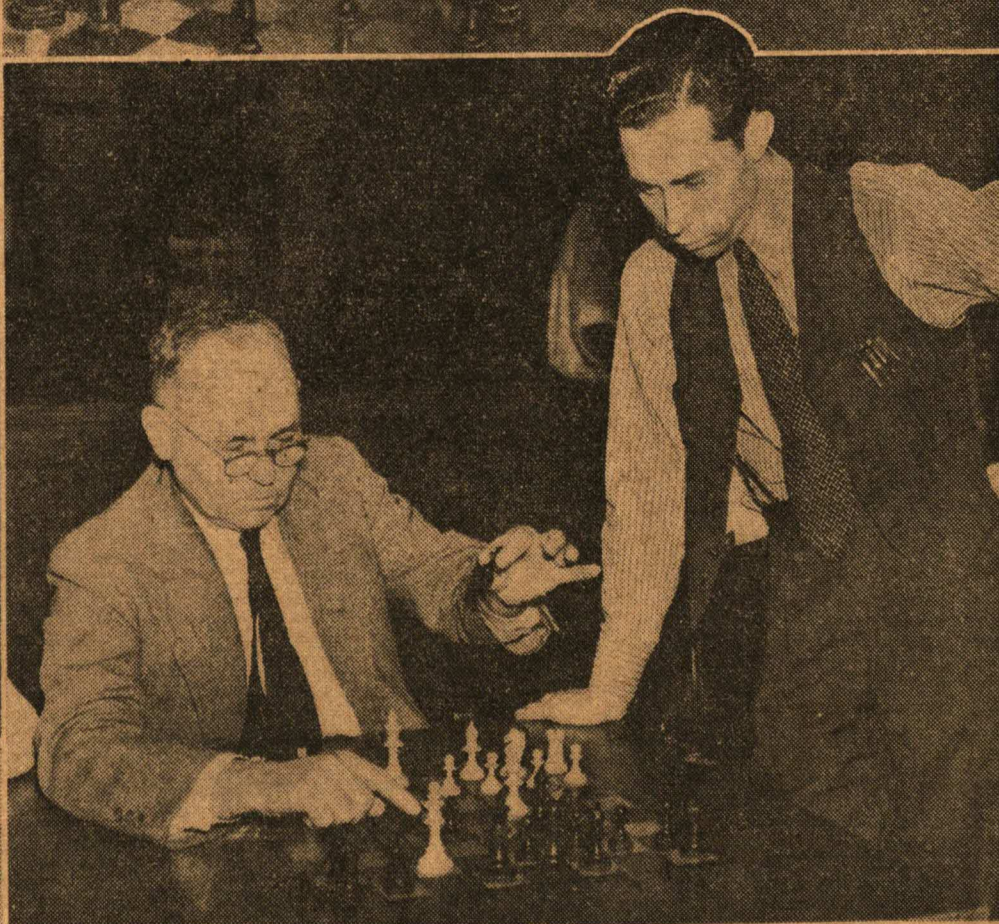
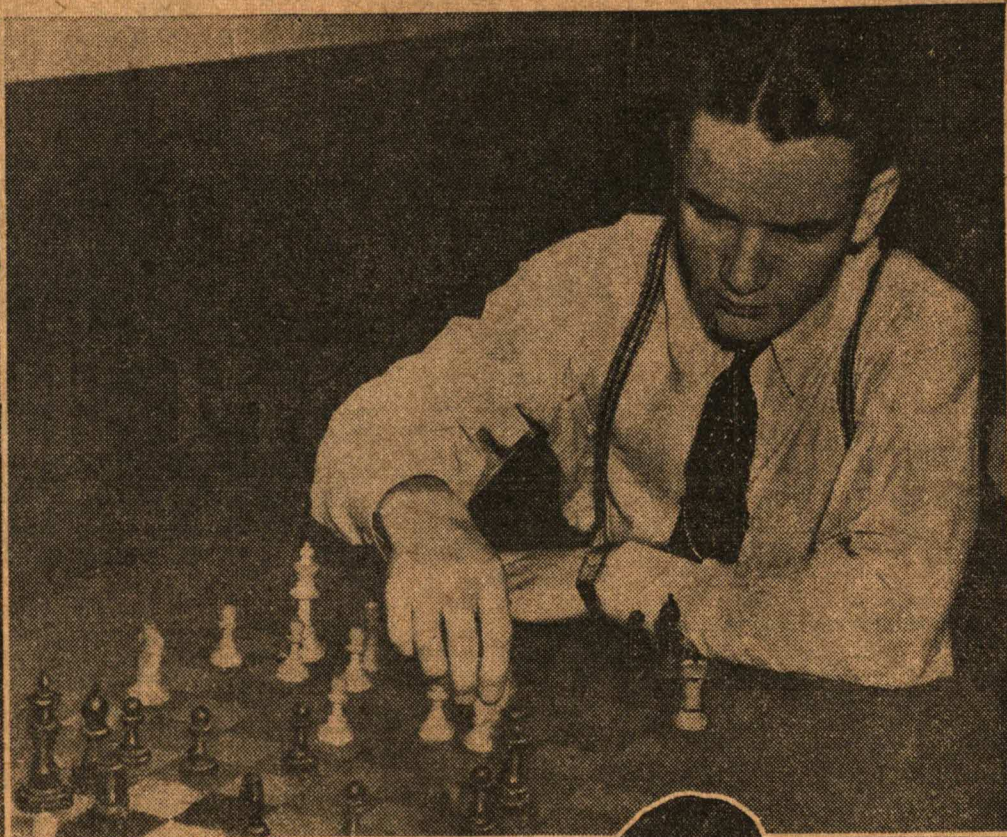
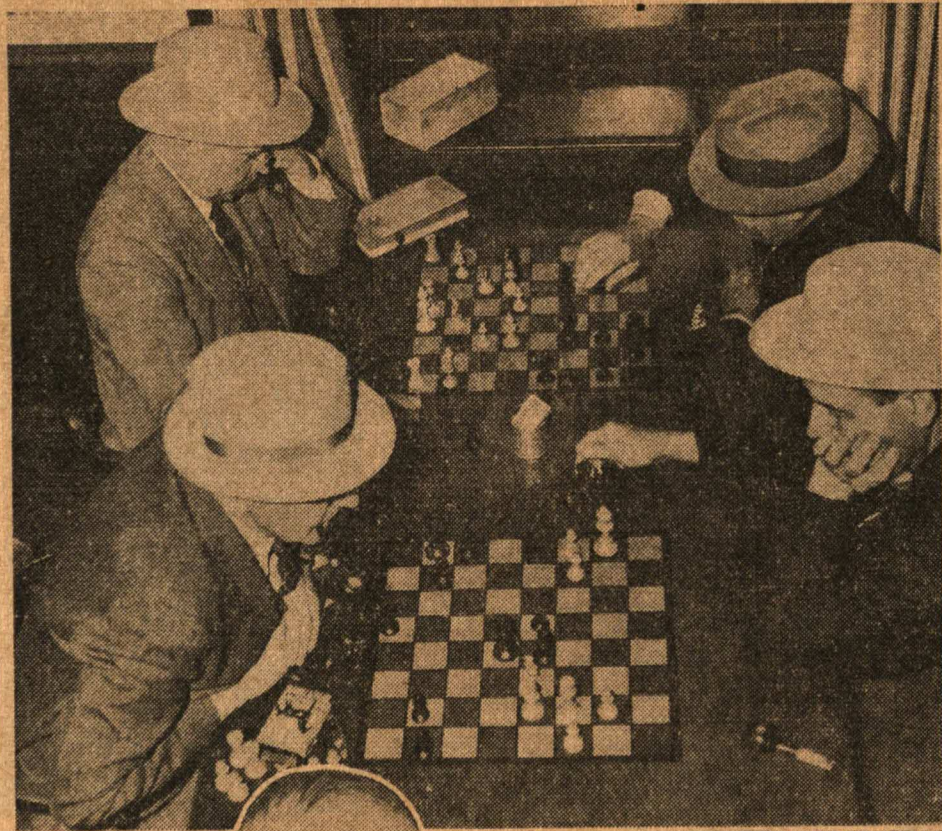

300 YOUTHS IN SUPERVISED PLAY CLUBS

Programs dealing with individual boy interests — whether it's harmonica playing or learning the lore of the Indians — have brought some 300 youths into supervised neighborhood clubs all over Fort Worth from the river bottoms to the select residential sections.

These clubs, started about four months ago under direction of R. E. Sutton, associate boys' work secretary at the Y. M. C. A., are increasing and one of the newest is now in the process of organization at Broadway Baptist Church, with the Ferguson Class, taught by Judge Tom Renfro, providing the leadership, it was announced Friday.

These groups, now numbering 23, meet once a week at a home, school or church in the community, with an adult leader in charge. The boys name their own clubs — and they range from everything from "The Flaming Arrow" to the "Tiger Tooth" — and they select their own programs. Sometimes its craft work, again it may be boxing, or any one of 50 suggested interested interests.

One club has a speaker each week, another already has given a musicale and still another, in addition to its regular program, will sponsor a quilt auction to raise funds for a club house—when the mothers club, organized in connection with this group, finishes piecing the quilt. Another group collected papers and magazines, which were sold, and still another aided in the Junion Chamber of Commerce's recent used clothes drive.

Club leaders undergo a training course at the Y. M. C. A. before they take over these groups, and case records and information files are kept. Leaders include Ralph Beaver, Jack Fry, Cecil McCorley, Robert Williams, Charles Prisk, Glenn Rothelle, Steve Oznick, N. H. Riviere, P. J. Manale, Wilbur White, P. D. Henry Jr., Will Rogers, Joe Pena, Tommy Norris, Richard Riddle, Don Cowan, Roy Miller, Dick Dixon, Rev. B. F. Jackson, Rev. W. L. Howse, James Clark and two groups sponsored by the Senior Optimists Club.

In addition to their weekly meeting in their own neighborhoods, these club members come one day a week to the Y. M. C. A. for an activity program. It is the highlight of the week to all the boys—but to one neighborhood group of 40 Mexican boys—it is the biggest event of all.

Correct Breathing Essential In Swimming; Inhale Through Mouth

(Editor's Note: The Press-Y.M.C.A. free swim school starts Monday. As an example of what to expect, Mr. Jeff Isbell, school instructor, has been giving illustrated tips the past few days, of which this is the fourth).

Breathing is very essential. Stretch out on stomach in shallow water, with body supported by hands on pool floor. Turn head to left, open mouth for inhaling. To exhale, close mouth, turn face into water, and breathe out through nose. The air will come in naturally, but exhalation must be slightly forced. Practice until you can exhale 20 respirations in water comfortably

without tiring and without stopping.
Co-ordinating breathing with kicking, kick twice while inhaling with the face turned leftward. Kick four times while exhaling with the face in the water.
This may seem complicated at first, but actually is simple when mastered.

Jane is Sure-Fire

Those writers who know their swimmers say that Jane, who is 17, seems "sure fire" for the Olympics. She shattered the American breaststroke mark for 100 yards in New Orleans, besting Kitty Rawls' accepted record of 1:18.5 by three-tenths second. Jane is called the "most colorful performer" of the meet.

Johnnie, 21, shared spotlight honors with Jane by winning three championships for the local team. He won the 50 free-style, lowered the 220 record in 2:30.4. And, not contented with that, he came back to break the oldest record on the books—Buddy Smith's 440 mark set Aug. 22, 1925, in Dallas. Crouch's time was 5:31.0—shattering seven-tenths of a second off Smith's 13-year-old mark.

SWIM RECORDS FALL BEFORE Y SQUAD

Fort Worth Y. M. C. A.'s swimming team splashed through one of the most dazzling campaigns in the Nation during the 1937 season.

The team, under the direction of Jeff Isbell, captured every meet it entered and closed things with an emphatic thump in August by winning the Southern A. A. U. at Ponchartrain Beach, New Orleans.

Tarlton Sets Record.

Led by Bob Tarlton, Johnny (Hondo) Crouch and Merrill Clubb, the Fort Worth boys compiled 42 points to the New Orleans Y. M. C. A.'s 37. Tarlton won the 100-yard back stroke, setting a new record. With Crouch, Clubb and Arthur Lippam, Tarlton swam on the Fort Worth team's winning 400-yard relay team.

Tarlton set a new Southern record, too, in winning the 220-yard back stroke. Crouch took the 50-yard free-style in excellent time.

First major swimming event of the year was a meeting at the "Y" pool between the Y. M. C. A. swimmers and University of Texas' squad. Adolph Kiefer, the Olympian, and Crouch were on the University squad.

These male stars were overshadowed that night, though, as pretty Jane Dillard, 15-year-old Fort Worth high school girl, swam the 50-yard breast stroke in world record-breaking time of 33.4 against time. This mark, authenticated by Bill Jarvis, district A. A. U. swimming commissioner, was 1.2 seconds lower than a mark set the first of the year by Katherine Rawls in Miami, Fla.

Juniors Also Win.

Jane and Nancy Dillard, coached by their father, Pop Dillard, trained religiously all of the season, swimming from 1,000 to 1,600 yards each day.

Ill with a cold, Jane Dillard still managed to take fifth place in the women's national 100-yard championship event at Chicago in April. Qualifying for the event, Jane had the second fastest time for the event of the day.

Merrill Clubb, a husky, 15-year-old Paschal boy, caught swimming fans' startled attention when he led the Junior "Y" team, also coached by Isbell, to a victory over Dallas Oak Cliff, in March.

Clubb, a powerful free-styler, and Kenneth Tarlton, brother of Bob, were the leading men in May as the "Y" juniors downed the strong Austin High team, coached by University of Texas' mentor, Tex Robertson. The "Y" boys won, 41 to 34, in the pool here. One of the fastest times was turned in the Fort Worth medley relay team of Clubb, free style; Kermit Hynds, breast stroke, and Willis Simpson, back stroke.

Dallas Meet Easy.

In July both the Y. M. C. A. junior and senior teams won Southwestern A. A. U. championships at Dallas Highland Park pool. Bill Bonnell, the husky airlines pilot who holds the Southwestern A. A. U. breast-stroke record; Crouch, Southwest Conference free-style champ; Bob Tarlton, Southwestern A. A. U. backstroke titlist, led the Fort Worth team as records were broken all over the Highland Park pool.

Austin High won the state high school swimming championship, scoring 49 points. But Paschal High of Fort Worth was second with 23. Twelve of these points were scored by Free-Styler Clubb, who tied for individual high scoring honors. Hynds, representing Poly, broke his own 100-yard breast-stroke record of 1:26.7, lowering it to 1:17.9.

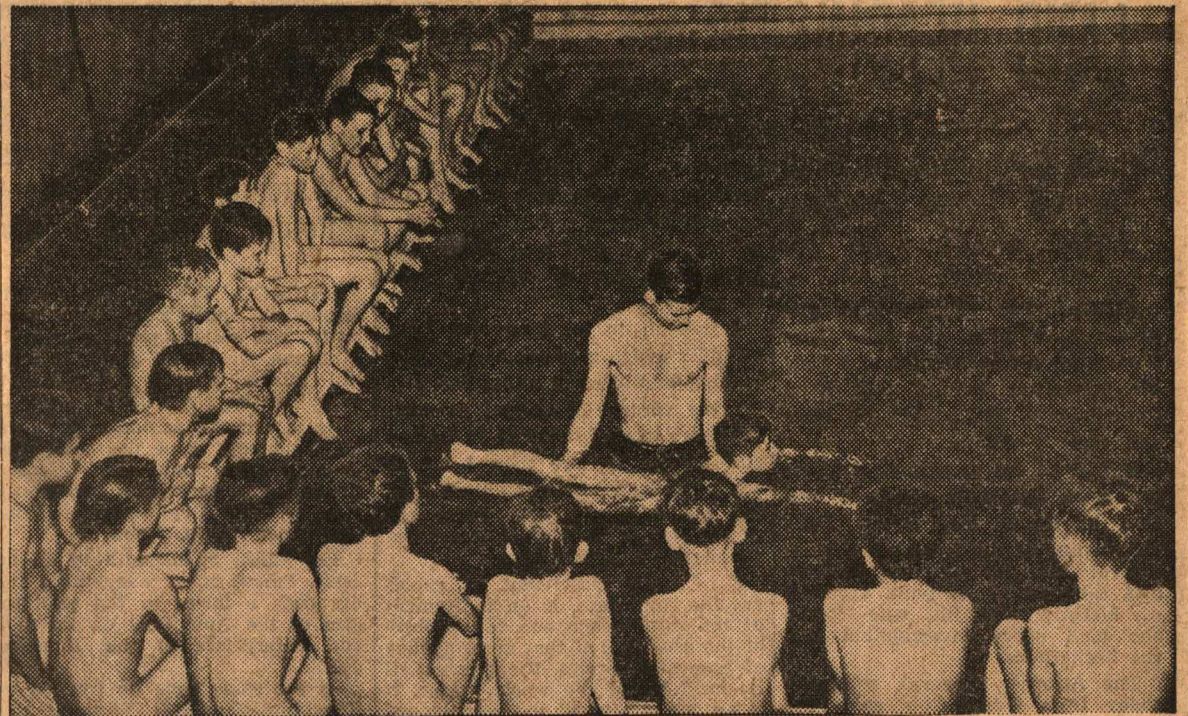

Men especially are urged to enter the classes.

Y.M.C.A. Residents Put Ban On 'Dormitory,' Hunt Name

A campaign to recall the word "dormitory" in speaking of the residential section of the Y. M. C. A. is being waged by the occupants.

Everything from "Fellowship Hall" to "Scott Hall," in memory of the late Winfield Scott, has been suggested. The new name hasn't been decided—but dormitory is out. Says "The Flash," weekly paper issued for the residents: "Dormitory sounds too much like a hash slinging boarding house. This is our home and we ought to name it to suit ourselves. Who wants to go around broadcasting the fact that he lives in a dormitory? They have dormitories at the Texas State Prison Farms. Also at the insane asylum and reform schools. Not that our own residence is to be compared with that of the occupants of the prison, but it is more fitting that we pick a name which is not so commonly known and one that will suit our place of residence."

The 142 rooms at the "Y" have been filled to capacity for the past two months and many applications have been turned down because of lack of space. A new ruling, which

went into effect this year, admits no man to residence over 35 years of age. At present there are 70 boys under 24 years of age living there. The youngest is 17.

They come from every State in the Union—the majority, of course, from Texas, but ranking next are Louisiana, Kansas, Missouri, Pennsylvania, California, Ohio, Arkansas, West Virginia and Oklahoma.

There are students, and those engaged in every type of business from government aeronautics to invention. There are student pilots, journalism graduates, oil company and bank employes, engravers, meat packers, dentists, junk dealers, peanut salesmen, hotel employes and foresters. They represent every faith—with Methodist and Baptist predominating. There are Hebrews, Catholics, Lutherans, Episcopalians, Presbyterians, Christian Scientists and members of the Church of Christ.

These young men—120 of whom are permanent guests, get together each Monday night for a dinner. At one of these dinners they will take a final ballot on naming their "home."

REV. ALBERT VENTING IS YMCA DINNER SPEAKER

Rev. Albert Venting, pastor of the Cleburne First Baptist Church, gave four reasons why fellowship was not universal in an address at a dinner meeting of the Fort Worth Y. M. C. A. last night when seven directors were chosen.

The directors are J. B. Thomas, George Angell and Floyd Carmichael, who were re-elected, and Rev. Sherwood Clayton, Sterling Holloway, J. Roby Penn and T. J. Harrell.

"Color, language, custom and religion are the main things that prevent good fellowship," Rev. Mr. Venting said. He suggested that members correspond with members of the organization in other countries.

'Y' GROOMS FORCES FOR DISEASE WAR

The health committee of the Y. M. C. A. today applied final touches to plans for its "War on Syphilis," which will be launched Monday in connection with a national movement urged by Surgeon General Parran.

Dr. C. P. Schenck, chairman of the committee, announced the general purpose as follows: "The campaign is to present actual facts regarding syphilis to the citizens of Fort Worth. It is to be purely educational in nature. No attempt will be made to establish clinics, advance any special cause for particular persons or organizations, or secure treatment or medical services for any person or groups of persons. We will attempt to acquaint the citizens of Fort Worth with the prevalence of syphilis in Fort Worth; the menace it is to our present social order, and the snare that is set our children; the ways by which it is passed from person to person, the insidious nature of the disease, the possibilities of cure when treated by recognized authorities; the danger and decreased chance of cure when treated by "rapid fire" methods and quacks, and the possibility of clearing our city of this menace. Our specific purpose is to create a desire in the people of Fort Worth to start a war on syphilis with the ultimate aim of clearing our city of this menace."

The association, working in cooperation with the Tarrant County Medical Society and the City Health Department, will sponsor the educational program.

Its intense campaign will continue for a week, with follow-up work afterward, David K. Briggs, physical department head, explained.

Health Week to Fight Venereal Disease

The nationwide drive against venereal disease, which has gained great momentum during the past year, will reach Fort Worth April 18 in a "Social Health Week" sponsored by the Y. M. C. A. and the Tarrant County Medical Society.

Dr. C. P. Schenck, a director of the Y. M. C. A., is general chairman, and Dr. A. H. Flickwir, city health officer, is honorary chairman. D. K. Briggs, Y. M. C. A. health education director, announced.

During Social Health Week speakers will appear before schools, clubs and civic organiza-

tions and on the radio, to explain the fight that is being made to stamp out venereal disease. Educational literature will be distributed and window displays and probably an educational movie program are planned.

The committee also plans a demonstration of the Wasserman test for syphilis.

The national campaign against social diseases started after U. S. Surgeon General Thomas Parran wrote a frank and trenchant article, "The Next Great Plague To Go," first printed in July, 1936, in the Survey Graphic.

Since that time, circulation of

the Parran article in newspapers and magazines has been estimated at over 7,000,000.

Medical authorities and civic groups which had feared to bring the "nasty" topic of venereal disease before the public were encouraged to educate the people to the possibility of eradicating what has been termed "the last great plague."

Unlike cancer, which still defies scientific research, venereal diseases are amenable to medical treatment and only public prudishness has prevented their control, according to Surgeon General Parran.

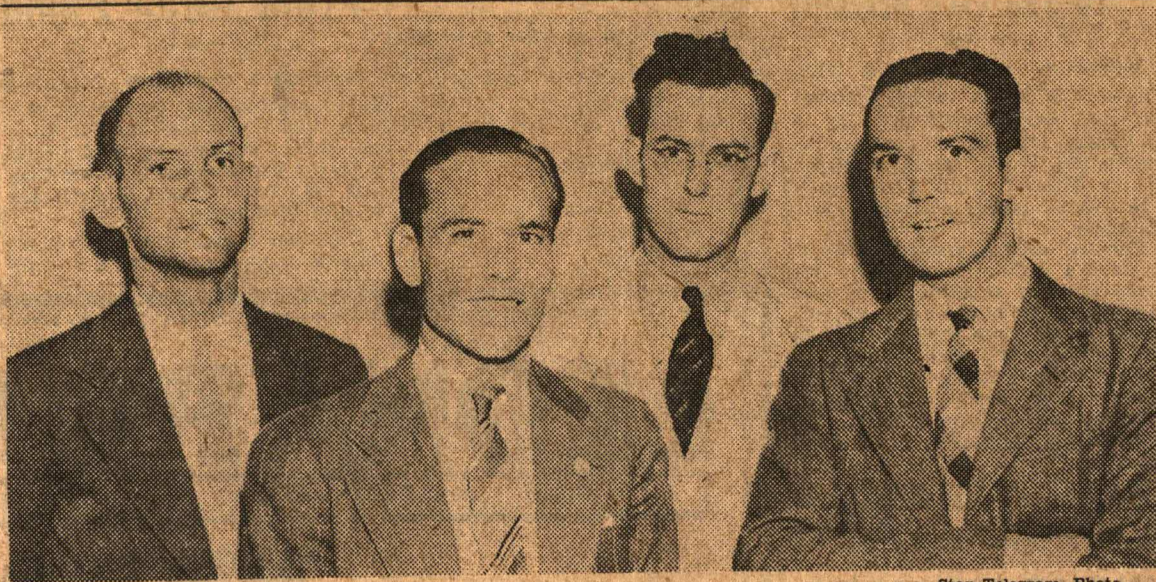

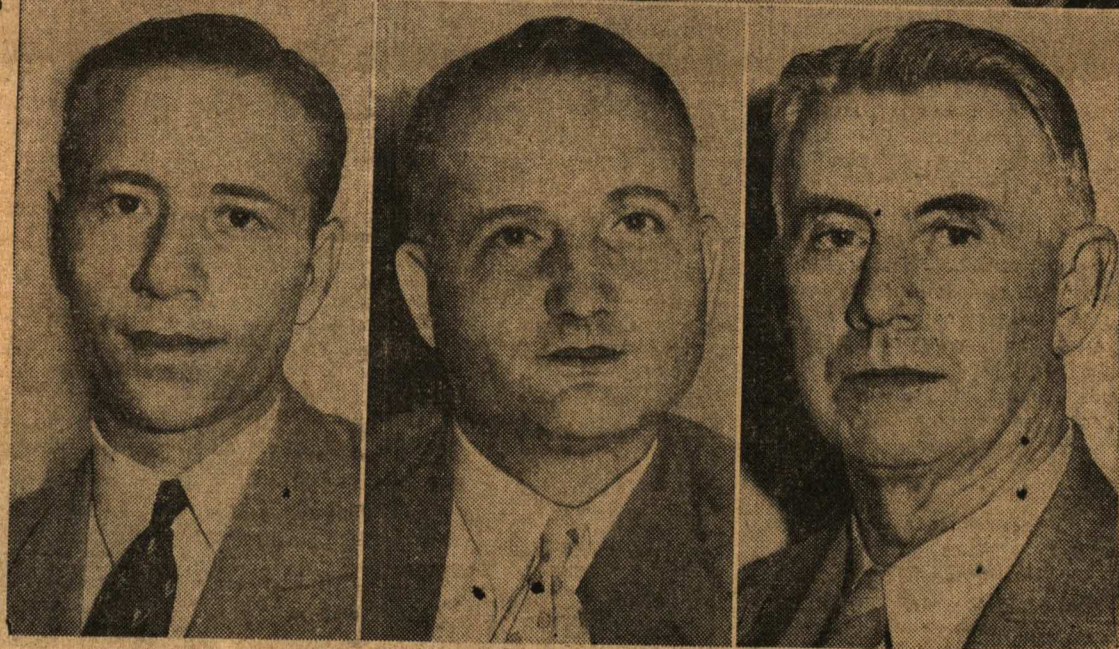

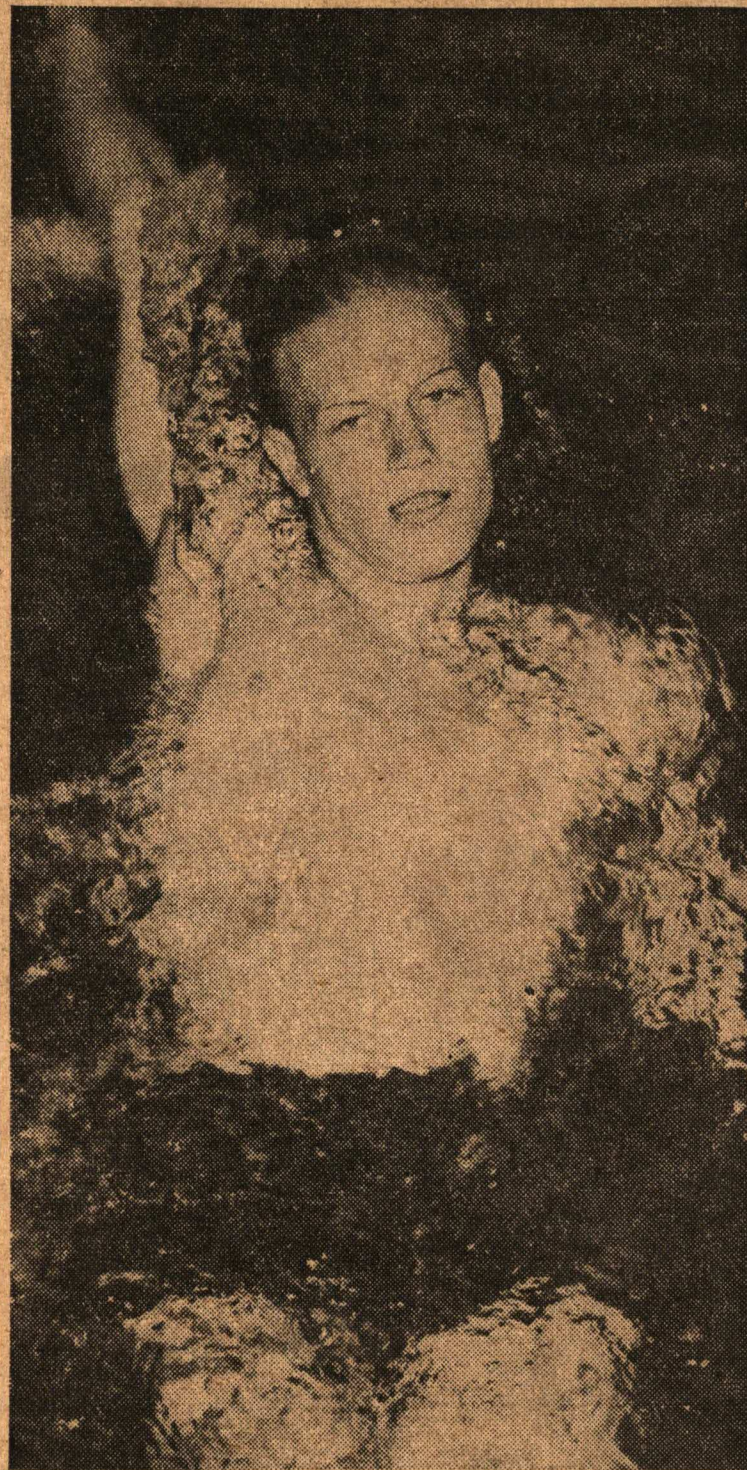

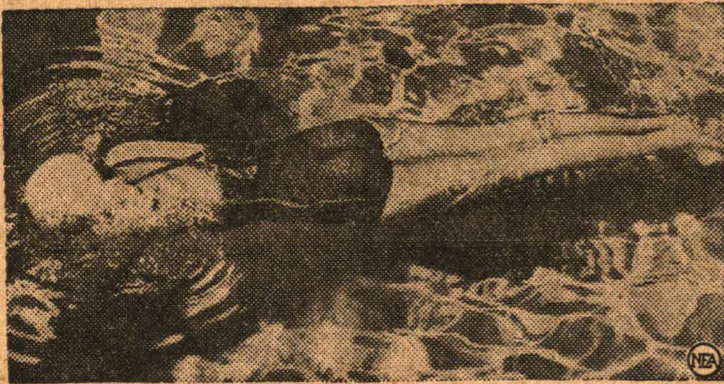

Breathing Is All Important In Learning How to Swim

Develop breath control by taking deep breath and submerging the face under water. Repeat until you can stay under from 15 to 20 seconds. This helps to overcome water fear.

Stretch out on the water, face down, legs and arms extended. Don't get rigid, relax. Give the body a slight push from the pool—and you can float, as pictured above.

With hands on the pool floor in shallow water, extend the legs and kick from the hip, swinging the heels from the water surface to 10 inches below. Not too fast. Two kicks a second is alright for practice.

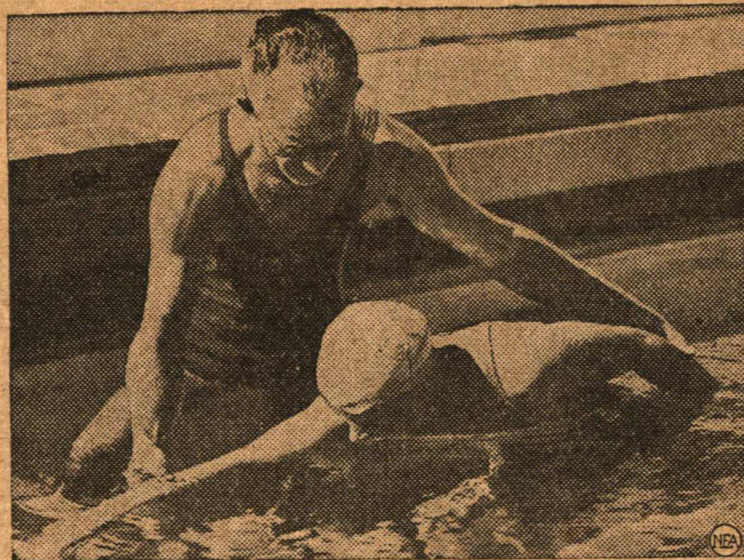

To learn arm strokes, brace yourself in waist deep water. Extend the right arm forward and pull it beneath the body in an arch. As the right arm completes the pull the left arm should enter the water as the right did.

The pull should be straight down and back, under the center of the body. When right arm enters water, right shoulder is lowered and left arm and shoulder are raised to permit relaxation in recovery. There is a slight bend in the elbow in the pull and recovery. Practice until you can coordinate pull and recovery with the shoulders before attempting to swim.

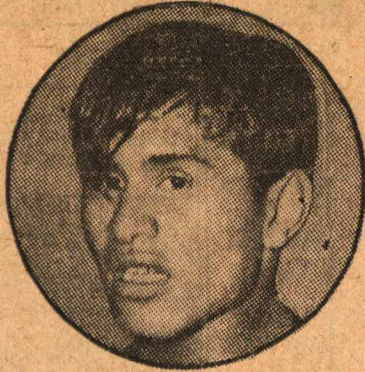

Armour Stewart, deputy boxing commissioner, and Jeff Isbell, of the "Y," have strong contestants in every division.

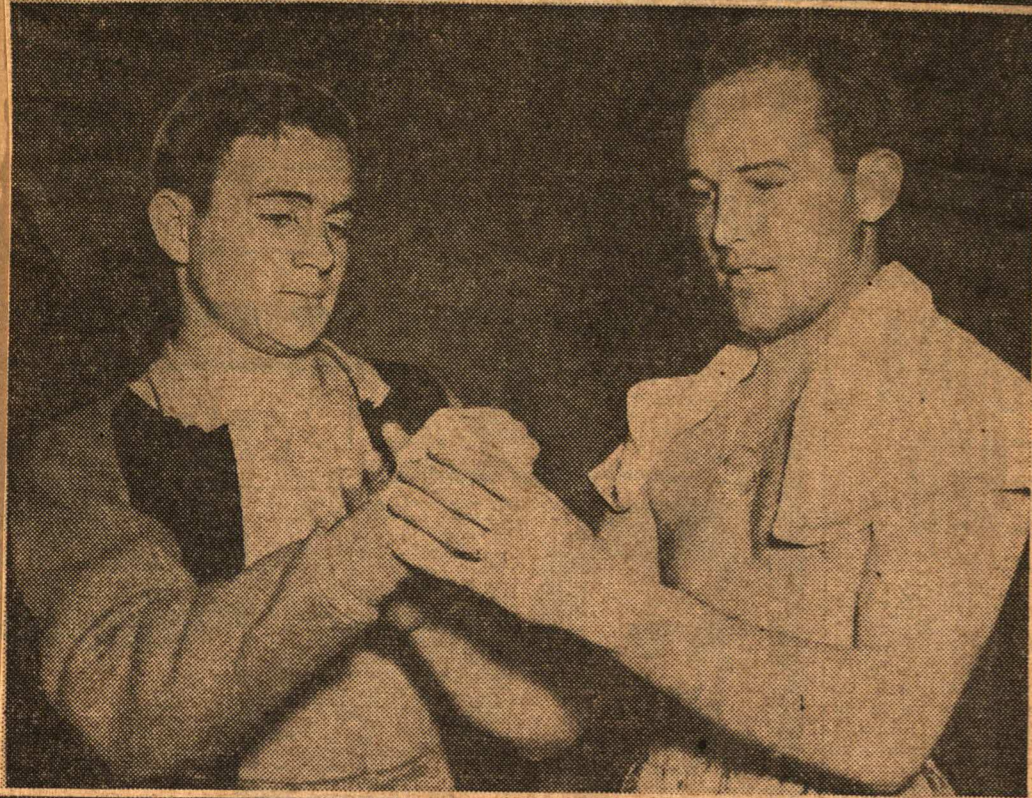
TIGER HOSEA, ROGERS WIN 'Y' BOUTS

TEXANS SHOW FINE FORM TO WIN

There could be few things more nightmarish than a slapping match with Jimmy Wortham, the Babe Ruth of volley ball.

Wortham is a bulky, active lad who has been named All-America spiker seven times while slapping the air out of volley balls for the Houston Y. M. C. A. teams.

Last night Wortham and his sprite-like Houston teammates won the ninth annual Fort Worth Y. M. C. A. tournament by mashing undefeated and almost unextended through a field of excellent opponents and then nailing Oklahoma City Y. M. C. A., 15-10, 15-8, with a masterful exhibition in the championship finals.

These exciting title proceedings were witnessed by a crowd that packed the Y. M. C. A. gym, which is not a way of saying that it was a gigantic throng.

Owens Aids Wortham.

In the business of arm-swinging for range and accuracy, Jimmy probably ranks tops. He whams that volley ball on the sweet spot as Ellsworth Vines hits a tennis ball. And Wortham hits with all the power of one of these riveting hammers.

And when one of his spikes banks off an opponent there is a terrific splatter of flying leather on flesh that is like the cushy sound of over-size boxing gloves landing.

And Jimmy is not all of the Houston team. There is another big spiker named Carl Owens. Owens must cover his face in shame and admit that he has made volley ball's All-America a matter of only four times.

Owens is as hearty a spiker as Wortham and is even more adept at driving the ball into unprotected enemy territory. Once he spiked a ball into the lap of an Oklahoman with such force as to send the Sooner spine-cruising back against the wall.

The Houston boys were very loud on defense, too. Every time they saw a spike coming, the three boys in the front line would rise with the cadence of an adagio team and present a fortress of six wide-spread palms to ward off the ball.

Present Trophies.

The Houston boys are coached by C. H. Winston, a small, alert man who has sent four teams of slappers through to the national championship. And Winston has coached more all-Americans than nine sports writers could pick on their nights off.

After the championship bout, E. O. Gillam presented a large trophy to the Houston boys and more eyepopperish cups to Oklahoma City for winning second, Fort Worth for taking third and Oklahoma City's second team for capturing the Class B championship.

The Oklahoma City team turned in a workmanlike job while beating Bartlesville, Okla., 16-14, 15-9, in the Class B finals.

In the first Class A game of the tournament yesterday morning, Oklahoma City whipped the Hughes Tool Company team of Houston, 16-14, 15-9. In the second round of the winner's bracket Oklahoma City drilled Dallas Y. M. C. A., 15-13, 15-5 and Houston stopped Fort Worth, 11-15, 15-10, 15-5. Houston then danced into the finals by whipping Oklahoma City, 15-9, 15-0.

But the tournament was a double elimination affair. And Oklahoma City got back into the finals by dropping Fort Worth again, 15-12, 6-15, 15-11.

Fort Worth had beaten Hughes down in the loser's bracket, 16-14, 15-12. The Fort Worth team had three fine shotmakers, tall Joe Killian and Buck Roberson, spikers, and Wilburn Young, one of the most clever setup men in the tournament.
