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Bill Waybourn

Mr. Waybourn began his career in service when he joined the U.S. Air Force in 1978, serving in both the active duty and reserves. On April 30, 1981, after serving active duty, Bill began working for Dalworthington Gardens Police Department. He was promoted to Chief of Police on June 1, 1984, making him the youngest police chief in the State of Texas. Later, he transitioned the city through combining the police and fire services making him the Chief of Public Safety.

In his 31 years as Chief of Dalworthington Gardens, he has testified on numerous cases as an expert witness, pioneered the Texas model for DWI "No Refusal" program – which is now being used as the model for several surrounding states, and testified before the state legislature on a diverse array of issues relating to the Second Amendment and civilians carrying firearms. He worked with state legislatures on Texas' original concealed handgun license laws in the 1990s, as well as the most recent open carry law that passed in 2015. Also, he was extremely honored to help the Chris Kyle Bill become law in Texas – a bill that streamlines the process for military service men and women to become police officers.

He has a bachelor's degree in criminal justice and a master's degree in conflict resolution. Bill is a graduate of the FBI National Academy, the Texas A&M Police Academy and is a black belt in Tae Kwon Do. He currently teaches college and police instructor classes ranging from criminal justice and criminal procedure to firearms safety and self-defense. Bill is the current President of the Peace Officer's Angels Foundation and feels strongly about protecting the fatherless. He is married to Laura and they have nine children, seven of which have been adopted.

Tarrant County Auditor's Office Duties and Responsibilities

In 1905, the County Auditor was created by statute. The Auditor is appointed by a Board of District Judges. This separation from Commissioners Court established the independence necessary to carry out the duties and responsibilities of the County Auditor.

Renee Tidwell, the Tarrant County Auditor has, for over 21 years, served the Tarrant County residents as an independent auditor overseeing financial accounting and reporting results of operations to the County Commissioners Court and the District Judges of Tarrant County. This includes maintaining books and records reflecting all financial transactions of the County.

Additionally, the Auditor's office responsibilities include developing and implementing cash management programs and investing idle funds. When requested, financial advice is provided to Commissioners Court.

The Auditor provides general audit oversight of the books and



records maintained by the elected and appointed officials of the County, as well as processing vendor payments and payroll. This requires strict enforcement of laws governing County finances.

Other responsibilities include reviewing financial compliance and reporting for funds received under federal, state, and local grant programs.

As a result of the November 2, 1982 constitutional amendment abolishing the office of Tarrant County Treasurer, the County Auditor's office executes the duties of County Treasurer.

A quote from a 1997 U.S. Court of Appeals, 5th Circuit Court case, Patrick E. Higginbotham, Circuit Judge states, "In other words, Texas gives county auditors responsibility for guarding the public purse and using the authority of the auditor's office to ensure that local governments comply with the law."

Precinct 3 **Maintenance Center News** April 2017



Winter appeared to have pasted us over this year, allowing for an early jump on what is shaping up to be a very busy year.

One of our big county projects this year is the completion of a safety improvement project to reconstruct, and add shoulders, on Willow Springs Road north of Avondale Haslet Road. This once quiet roadway which only served a couple hundred county residents has exploded into a very busy corridor serving thousands of homes and schools. A right turn lane was also added at Avondale Haslet Road to help with peak hour congestion.

In addition to our project on Willow Springs, we have a very full schedule of County and Interlocal Projects planned:

The all-new 104,000 square foot Public Safety Building opens this summer. Grapevine citizens voted in favor of a new Public Safety Building in 2013 as a part of the

\$68 million bond proposal package which also included the funding of The REC. This state-of-the-art facility will be home to the <u>Grapevine Police Department</u>, Municipal Court, <u>Grapevine Fire</u> <u>Department</u> Administration and the Information Technology Department. This multi-level facility will boast three different buildings on one campus.

Taxes were also lowered in 2016. This past September, the Grapevine City Council approved an operating budget of \$172.8 million for the 2016-2017 fiscal year that began October 1, 2016. The budget allows Grapevine to maintain the high quality service levels that residents have come to expect. The city council also approved adoption of a property tax rate of \$0.289271, which represents a 12% decrease from the previous year.

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NEUROFITI FOUNDATION & PAT

Nestled in behind a Fuzzy's Taco shop on West Euless Blvd. is one of the bestkept secrets in Euless. The Neuro Fitness Foundation gymnasium certainly doesn't want to be a secret, though it is an exclusive club. In order to join, one must be disabled. Those members of this underserved population who do find us think it's pretty special to have a fitness facility where the equipment is modified to accommodate the wheelchair-bound and other special needs. In fact, it is the only




facility of its kind in the DFW area! Not surprisingly, 20% come from beyond Tarrant County to work out. They enjoy the benefits of a fitness director and become part of a

"family," of sympathetic friends with equal or more challenges in life. Our success stories prove that exercise improves health and helps the disabled gain more independence.

The non-profit foundation currently serves some 200 adults, ages 18-80 with disabilities caused by neurological issues or other life-altering health events. This includes stroke, MS, spinal cord injuries, accidents, traumatic brain injury, muscular dystrophy, Parkinson's disease, cerebral palsy, or any paralysis. There are no contracts to sign, and no limitations on visits. Some come every day, others more intermittently. The cost to join is a monthly donation -- \$30 suggested - of whatever amount is affordable, if any. No one is turned away, but a doctor's note giving permission to exercise is required.

The facility is dependent on corporate sponsors, grants, generous donors, volunteers and two fundraisers to be self-sustaining. A golf outing is scheduled for May 19. See our website at www.NeuroFitnessFoundation.org for

A Historical Moment In Time Hell's Half Acre

Established in the early 1870s, Hell's Half Acre was originally designated from Tenth Street to Fifteenth Street while intersecting with Houston Street. Main Street. and Rusk Street with Throckmorton and Calhoun Streets established as boundaries. The economic driving forces that led to the progressive development of the red-light district was the Chisholm Trail and the Texas and Pacific Railway.



Only those looking for trouble and excitement ventured into "the Acre," known for its two story saloons, dance halls, brothels as well as a few legitimate businesses. Activities included rowdy gambling, cockfighting, and horse racing.

Hell's Half Acre expanded in all directions to reach the size of 2-1/2 acres. Local citizens had become alarmed at the level of crime and violence and elected Timothy Isaiah (Longhair Jim) Courtright as their city marshal mandated to tame the Acre's wilder activities. With news of train and stagecoach robbers using the Acre as a hideout, local authorities intensified their law enforcement efforts.


Two events, a shootout on Main Street that left Courtright dead and the gruesome murder of a prostitute, combined with the first prohibition campaign in Texas, helped to tame the Acre in 1889.

Urban growth began to improve the image of the Acre, as new businesses and homes moved into the south end of town. The popularity and profitability of the Acre no longer attracted outlaws however, cheap variety shows and prostitution still remained. In 1911, Rev. J. Frank Norris launched an offensive against racetrack gambling and used the pulpit of the First Baptist Church to attack vice and prostitution. He used the Acre, both to lash out at the leadership of Fort Worth, and advance his own personal career.

violent crime in Fort Worth occurred in the Acre. After Camp Bowie was located on the outskirts of Fort Worth in the summer of 1917, martial law was brought to bear against prostitutes and barkeepers of the Acre. Fines and stiff jail sentences curtailed their activities and by 1919, the Acre was nothing but a piece of Fort Worth history.

Even the most unexpected places can become breeding grounds for mosquitoes and the illnesses they can carry. Tarrant County Public Health (TCPH) and County officials are asking for your help to protect our community. Do your part and help Tarrant County Be Mosquito Free:

- Wear long sleeves and pants •
- **Use EPA-approved insect repellent** •
- **Dump standing water** •
- Keep vegetation trimmed

Specific North Texas mosquitoes that carry disease

Imported cases of both Zika and Chikungunya could make local spread of both viruses possible because the Aedes mosquitoes that transmit those viruses are found in Texas. While the Culex mosquito that carries West Nile Virus is active and bites only from dusk to dawn. Aedes mosquitoes, which carry Zika and Chikungunya, are active and bite during the day – so it's important for people to do what they can to eliminate mosquito breeding sites and to protect themselves against mosquito bites at all times.

Because symptoms of these viruses are similar, TCPH encourages physicians to consider Zika virus, Chikungunya and Dengue infection when examining patients who show acute onset of fever and joint pain and patients who have recently visited areas where at least one of the viruses is present.

Severe Weather Safety Tips

Are you prepared for an emergency situation? Learn how to Build an Emergency Kit and Have an Emergency Communication Plan **Tornado:**

- \Rightarrow Go to a pre-designated area such as a safe room, basement, storm cellar or the lowest building level. If there is no basement, go to the center of a small interior room on the lowest level (closet, interior hallway) away from corners, windows, doors, and outside walls. Protect your head and neck.
- \Rightarrow Put on sturdy shoes.
- \Rightarrow Do not open windows.
- \Rightarrow If you are in a manufactured home, get out immediately and go to a pre-identified location such as the lowest floor of a sturdy, nearby building or storm shelter.
- \Rightarrow If you are outside with no shelter, lie in an area noticeably loser than the level of the roadway and cover your head with your arms and a blanket, coat or other cushion if possible. For more safety tips and information on safety precautions to take before,


