Mayor Hector F. Garcia





Mayor Hector F. Garcia has lived in the City of Watauga since 1968 with his wife, Wendy. They have two children and one grandson.

Mayor Garcia served in the United States Air Force from 1958 to 1968, serving in Korea, Turkey, England and the United States. He worked for General Dynamics as an Aircraft Assembler and Supervisor. After receiving an Associate Degree in Applied Science specializing in Aviation Technology he was moved to the Engineering Planning Department where he retired after 35 years of service.

Mayor Garcia served as Co-Chairman of the first Watauga Charter Commission in 1979. In 1980 he was elected to Council Place 3, and served for 6 years. In 1994, he was Chairman of the Watauga Zoning Board of Adjustment, and in 1995 he was elected Mayor and served in that capacity until 2002. During his tenure as Mayor he served as Chairman of the Mayors' Council of Tarrant County (at the time included 39 cities). Additionally during his tenure as Mayor, 3 major shopping centers and several smaller businesses were built in Watauga. The housing subdivision west of the rail road tracks was also established. He oversaw the creation of 2 major parks, and the purchase of the Water system.

#### An Historic Moment in Time

#### The Chisholm Trail Lives Again

Markers like the one pictured here at the Sheraton Hotel, 1701 Commerce Street, Fort Worth, show the route millions of



longhorn cattle trod up the 1,200 mile Chisholm Trail from south Texas over Indian Territory and into Kansas.

Billy Cate of Cleburne and Steve Myers of Fort Worth are engaged in a project to mark the

Chisholm Trail in Texas, using this same style of cement post markers. The marker was designed by Bob Klemme of Enid, Oklahoma, who erected 400 markers along the Chisholm Trail across Oklahoma.


These markers will draw tourists and provide education on the history of Texas. The project ties to H. R. Bill 2849 in the 110<sup>th</sup> Congress to designate the Chisholm Trail and Great Western Trail a National Trail System.

Fort Worth's Diamond Jubilee, November 1923, marked the route of the old cattle trail that traversed the heart of the city with 16 small stobs with the inscription "McCoy Cattle Trail 1867." This old trail enters the present city limits near Ryan Place and College Avenue and pierces the heart of the business district. None of the old markers exist today.

The cattle trails in Texas were called many different names over the trail driving years and the Mc Coy Trail was one of them.

Texas cattle drivers used a route blazed

by trader Jesse Chisholm which extended from Wichita, Kansas, across the Indian Territory (presentday Oklahoma) to the Red River. As a result over time, his name became linked to the great move-





ment of Longhorns from South Texas to central Kansas.

The Trail Drivers of Texas estimated 25,000 to 35,000 men trailed six to ten million head of cattle and a million horses northward from Texas to Kansas and other distant markers between the end of the Civil War and the turn of the century.

#### Question of the Month

**Question:** Did you know that one of Fort Worth's best known hospitals was named for a former Texas Ranger lawman?

**Answer:** John Peter Smith came to Texas and Fort Worth in 1853. In 1854 Smith opened a private school. He later studied law and was admitted to the bar in 1860. During that same year he enlisted in the Texas Rangers.

His service as a Ranger took him to New Mexico, Arizona and Louisiana during the Civil War. Upon returning to Fort Worth, Smith became one of Fort Worth's most

prominent citizens and one of the cities largest land owners. In 1882, he was elected mayor and served six terms. Smith also was instrumental in the development of the Fort Worth Stockyards.

Sadly, he died in 1901 in St. Louis, Missouri, after he was attacked and robbed while on a business trip.

#### There are two ways of requesting a speaker:

The most common way is to go the internet: http://health.tarrantcounty.com and then scroll to "Speaker **Bureau**" located along the right hand column. Click on the icon and follow directions for completing the request form. Chronic Disease Prevention (CDP) has a special Community Service Request form and they need at least 4-6 weeks advanced notice of your request (unless otherwise stated). Please note, submission of the request form does not indicate confirmation. The division manager will contact the group with confirmation.

If you don't have access to the internet, you can call Public Health's Main Campus to request a speaker at (817) 321-4710, ask for Glenda Redeemer, Chronic Disease Manager.

#### **Other Divisions:**

To make a Public Health formal request for other divisions: via phone (817) 321-4700 customer line, ask for the speaker bureau or a speaker on the topic of interest.

1. Complete request form. Save a copy of the request form. Return the request form as an attachment by email or print and fax to the appropriate public health division give at least 2-3 weeks in advance (unless otherwise stated). Submission of the request form does not indicate confirmation.

#### **Senior Scams - Protect Yourself!**

Medicare Fraud - Senior citizens are frequent targets of Medicare schemes, especially by medical equipment manufacturers who offer seniors free medical products in exchange for their Medicare numbers. Because a physician has to sign a form certifying that equipment or testing is needed before Medicare pays for it, con artists fake signatures or bribe corrupt doctors to sign the forms. Once a signature is in place, the manufacturers bill Medicare for merchandise or service that was not needed or was not ordered. Tips for Avoiding Health Care Fraud or Health Insurance Fraud:

- Never sign blank insurance claim forms.
- Never give blanket authorization to a medical provider to bill for services rendered.
- Ask your medical providers what they will charge and what you will be expected to pay out-of-pocket.
- Carefully review your insurer's explanation of the benefits statement. Call your insurer and provider if you have questions.
- Do not do business with door-to-door or telephone salespeople who tell you that services of medical equipment are free.
- Give your insurance/Medicare identification only to those who have provided you with medical services.
- Keep accurate records of all health care appointments.
- Know if your physician ordered equipment for you.

• The maintenance of traffic team opened the new northbound SH 121 bridge to eastbound SH 114 and the westbound SH 114 bridge to southbound SH 26. Crews also performed permanent striping work on westbound SH 114 at Texan Trail and the northbound SH 121 off-ramp to Main Street, putting traffic into its permanent configuration.

• In the coming weeks, paving crews will focus on eastbound SH 114 from FM 1709/ Southlake Boulevard to SH 26, and southbound SH 26 at SH 114.

• Out with the old and in with the new! The NTE project team is hard at work finishing up demolitions to the remaining bridge structures along the corridor (of which there are 18 total). A series of extended changes to eastbound Airport Freeway are now in place as contractors work on building new on- and off-ramps. Activity is also picking up along I-35W


north of I-820, known as segment 3B of the North Tarrant Express. As your summer winds down and you get ready for back-to-school, we encourage you to check our website for new traffic configurations, lane closures and alternate routes so that you can get to your destinations safely.



TxDot - N Tarrant Office 817-399-4300 www.txdot.gov • SH 26 - Grapevine: The SH 26 project in Grapevine has recently completed the construction of decorative medians, sidewalks and signal installation. Ongoing work includes landscaping and additional striping. During this remaining work, two lanes of traffic will be maintained in each direction. The \$12 million

project, which is nearing completion, will improve safety and mobility for motorists traveling through the Grapevine area. Completion is estimated for later this summer.

• SH 26 - Colleyville: The \$11.4 million project from Brumlow Avenue/Pool Road to John McCain Road in Colleyville is progressing. The installation of box culverts and additional drainage improvements on the northbound lanes has been completed, and ongoing work includes the prepping of the roadway for pavement. Pavement installation for the northbound lanes is estimated to begin later this summer. Two lanes of traffic will be maintained during peak driving times. Motorists will be shifted to the northbound lanes later this year. The project is widening the road to three lanes in each direction with raised curb medians and left turn bays and is estimated for completion in 2014.

• The FM 1938 Water and Sewer Utility Relocation Project is currently out for bids. Estimated date to present the recommendation of the award of the bid to the City Council is on the August 20, 2013 City Council agenda. Based upon this projected date of award, construction is anticipated to begin on the FM 1938 Utility Relocation Project at the end of

September or early October. The construction project is anticipated to take 9 - 12 months to complete. This work is a precursor to the franchised utility relocation efforts and the TxDOT roadway expansion project.

• Currently, the TxDOT roadway expansion, which extends from south of the FM1938/FM1709 intersection north to the Randol Mill Bend, is on the TxDOT schedule for letting in FY 2015. That means the project could be let as early as September 2014 if all of the right of way is acquired and all franchise utilities (gas, phone, electricity, cable providers, etc.) have cleared the right of way by relocating their facilities. Construction on the roadway expansion most probably will begin in calendar year 2015 and take several years to complete.
