COMMISSIONER'S CORNER

If you haven't noticed, re-districting has been all over the news the last few weeks. This affects who represents you in the State House and Senate and who represents you in Congress. The Texas House, Senate and Congressional maps are drawn by your elected representatives in the Texas Legislature. At this time, a three-member Federal Court of Appeals in San Antonio has re-drawn those maps. The changes are substantial from the maps drawn by your elected officials and could have major implications concerning who will be representing you. On Monday, November 28, 2012, Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott filed an appeal with the United States Supreme Court concerning the maps drawn by the San Antonio judges. He is asking the Court to overturn the judges' ruling and re-instate the maps drawn by our elected representatives. Hopefully a decision will be made soon.

The Tarrant County Commissioners Court also re-districts our precincts every 10 years. Tarrant County is the fastest growing urban county in the State of Texas with a population of 1,809,034 according to the 2010 census. Re-districting requires that we balance the population in each precinct while working to maintain communities of interest. Our new average precinct, according to the 2010

census, is approximately 452,000 residents. Precinct 3 (NE Tarrant County) has 485,000 and is the largest precinct while Precinct 1 has only 417,000. This means that Precinct 3 has to move about 35,000 residents into Precincts 1, 2 & 4. Most of the affected population will be in an area south of the H-E-B area which includes parts of northeast Fort Worth, west Grand Prairie and north Arlington. Other areas affected in Precinct 3 are two voting precincts between IH-35W and US 287 and two voting precincts that are west of SH 377 and south of North Tarrant Parkway. The Commissioners have also completed re-districting for the Justices of the Peace and the Constables' precincts. The Commissioners Court requested that the Justices of the Peace and the Constables review the current maps and make a recommendation to the Commissioners. It is not required that Justices of the Peace and Constables' precincts be re-districted according to population. Their recommendation was made to the Commissioners Court and approved in September. The Commissioners Court worked for five months on this re-districting project. At this time, we have received approval from the Department of Justice on the Commissioners precincts and are awaiting final approval on the

Spotlight on the Mayor

Mary Lib (Elizabeth) Saleh
Mayor, City of Euless



Mayor Saleh was elected as the first female mayor of Euless in 1993 after serving two years as a council member and two years as Mayor Pro Tem. Under Mayor Saleh's leadership, the City of Euless won the prestigious U. S. Conference of Mayors City Livability Award in 2006 for a composting program developed for its citizens. Euless was also selected in 2008 by *Business Week* as the Best Small City in Texas to Raise Children and by *Money Magazine* as one of the top Best Small Cities in the United States. The North Central Texas Council of Governments Regional Cooperation Award was shared by Euless, Bedford and Hurst for 2009, and Euless was honored with the Playful City, USA award

given to only 93 cities in the United States in 2009.

During her tenure, she has emphasized the benefit of public art in the community, and the city now has seven beautiful original bronze statues created by a Texas artist along with original paintings in city facilities. A glass art piece, "Blooms of Enlightenment" was installed in the library in 2005. Additionally, The Euless Library Foundation was formed by Mayor Saleh to enhance the artistic image of the library and educational programs of the arts. The Foundation has provided two bronze statues for the library grounds and additional statues inside the library. In addition to a great library, Euless is home to the beautiful Texas Star Golf Course, which was voted best municipal course in Texas, a premier park modeled after the great baseball stadiums in the U.S., a police and courts facility, a new fire station, and a Veterans Park dedicated in 2005 complete with a Liberty Bell bronze sculpture.

In addition to her love of art and the library, Mayor Saleh appointed the first Euless Historical Preservation Committee. The committee has been instrumental in researching the city's history, having historical markers placed around town, and is in the process of establishing a museum.

Tarrant County Human Services goes Mobile!

"Reaching out to our Communities"

As of October 2011, Tarrant County Human Services began operating "in the field" to bring assistance to those in need in their own community. Let us share a story about Nancy A., a Hurst resident and mother of two children, who was at her wits end. Her husband was diagnosed with cancer 6 months ago and was undergoing treatment. He was on medical leave without pay. She had been taking off work so much to be with him on his bad days or when he had to go to treatment that she had used up all her benefit time. This last month, she took off 14 days of leave without pay, and her reduced paycheck really showed that. She knew that in a few months things would be better. Her husband's treatment was working and he would be able to return to his job. However, in the meantime, their landlord had given them an eviction notice because they were late on their rent and the mailman just brought them a \$326 electric bill. What was she to do? Then a friend told her to call 2-1-1, an information and referral line that could tell her about available help in the Tarrant County area. She called and was referred to Tarrant County Human Services (TCDHS).

TCDHS is the County's general assistance program. The mission of TCDHS is to provide social services and economic assistance to individuals and families. Financial assistance is provided to eligible households for rent, mortgage, utilities, and hygiene items. Working under the supervision of the County Administrator's Office, the Director and other staff, including licensed social workers, TCDHS assists people who are disabled with no income, unemployed with no income, people who have been unemployed for a while and those who have just started a new job. TCDHS also assists families whose income has been reduced because a family member is suffering from a life-threatening illness, as well as households with very low income who are undergoing an unexpected financial "crisis." When funding is available, TCDHS provides utility assistance three (3) times a year to low-income households that are on Social Security and receive no other income.

Through another program, TCDHS will provide burial services when there are absolutely no other resources from the estate of the deceased or from family members. The family has the option of a simple but dignified burial or a cremation service. Financial assistance programs are income-based, and in most cases income must not be over 150% of the federal poverty level, which is \$1821 for a household of two, \$2756 for a household of four.

Formed by the Commissioners Court in 1961, TCDHS has assisted Tarrant County residents for the last 50 years. In Fiscal Year 2010, TCDHS assisted 4,462 unduplicated households with an average family size of 1.78 [7,921 different individuals]. It is mostly funded by the Tarrant County taxpayers with some additional federal funding and private funding. A person seeking assistance needs to call (817)531-5620. In the first contact the caller will provide some preliminary information over the phone, and then a caseworker will call the applicant and interview them – a Telephone Pre-Screening Interview. Many of the services can be done over the phone and by mail, and, if the client requires a face-to-face interview, they will be seen in their community.

Nancy A. called TCDHS and learned that her family was eligible for assistance. She was relieved because she knew that with this assistance her family would be okay until things could go back to normal.

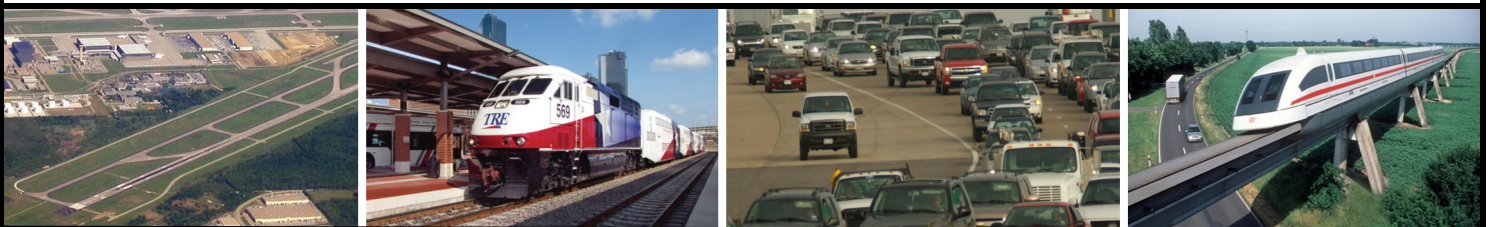

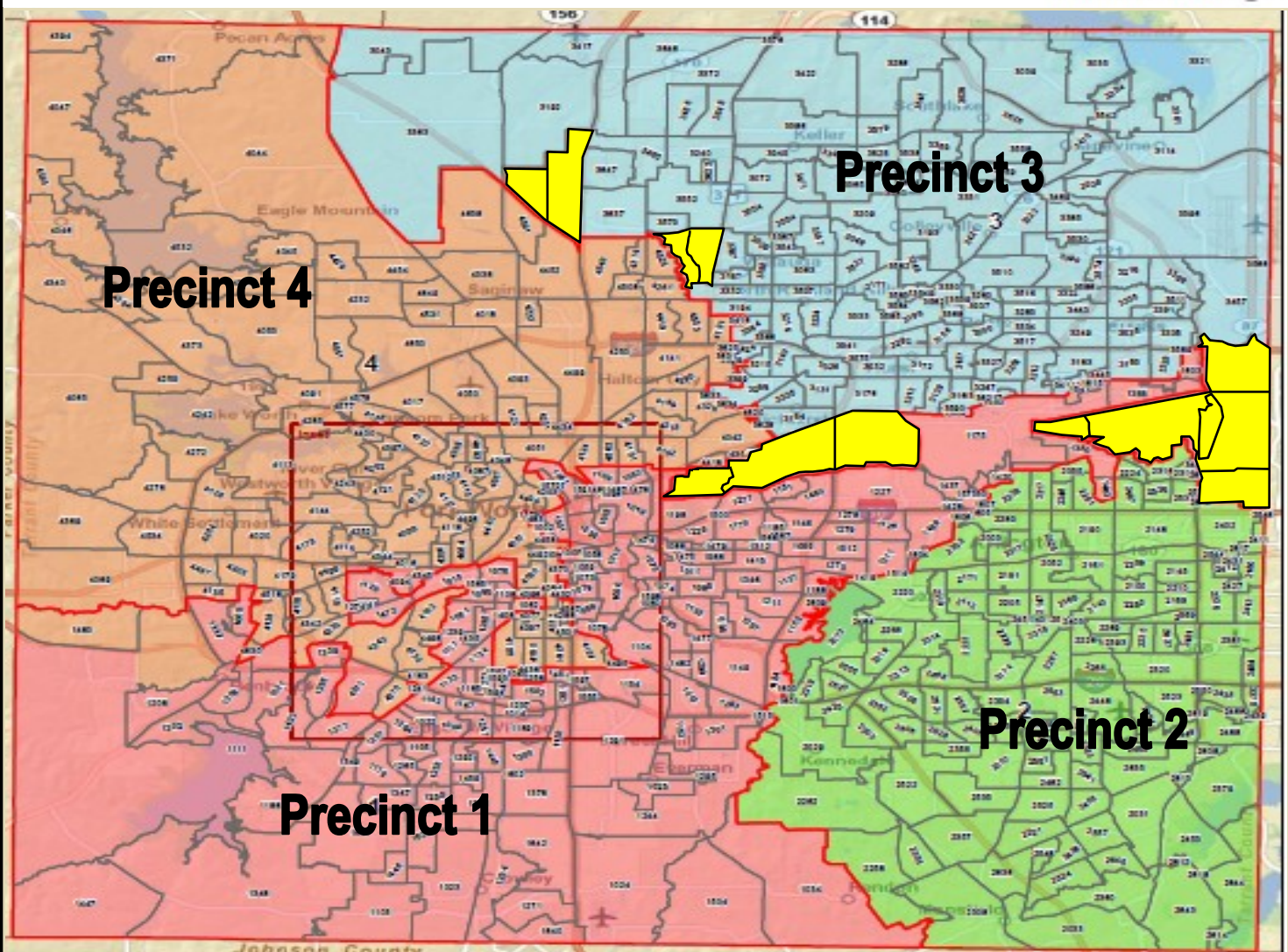
Please mark your calendar for our 3rd Annual Northeast Tarrant Transportation Summit on **Friday, February 10, 2012** at the Hurst Conference Center. This program was started three years ago to help keep citizens and business leaders up to date on the two major highway projects in our area: The DFW Connector and the North Tarrant Express. Both projects are well under construction at this time. During the past two years we have been able to provide information on other transportation issues such as rail improvements at Tower 55 in Fort Worth, details on DFW International Airport improvements, and High Speed Rail for Texas. At this year's Summit we will continue the annual updates on our two major highway projects plus a panel discussion on Regional Rail presented by DART, Denton County Transportation Authority, and the Fort Worth "T". The Texas Department of Transportation Executive Director, Phil Wilson, will be our main speaker.

An Historic Moment In Time

SANTA CLAUS BANK ROBBERY

The Santa Claus Bank Robbery was one of Texas' most infamous crimes and led to the largest manhunt ever seen in the state. It all began on December 23, 1927, when Marshall Ratliff, Henry Helms, Robert Hill, and Louis Davis, held up the First National Bank in Cisco. Three or four Texas banks a day were being robbed and the Texas Bankers Association offered a \$5,000 reward to anyone shooting a bank robber during the crime.

Ratliff donned a Santa Claus suit and led the way into the bank. Mrs. B. P. Blassengame and her daughter entered the bank, realized the danger and were able to flee into the alley and alert Chief of Police G. E. (Bit) Bedford and most of the citizenry about the robbery. Robert Hill then fired a shot through a window and a shot was returned followed by gunfire as many citizens who owned guns were now outside the bank. Two small girls, Laverne Comer and Emma May Robertson, were taken as hostages. Chief Bedford and Deputy George Carmichael were mortally wounded. Ratliff and Davis were also wounded in the shootout.

As the four began their escape with their hostages, they realized they were almost out of gas and one of their tires had been shot out. They commandeered an Oldsmobile belonging to the Harris Family. Fourteen-year-old Woody gave them the car but took the keys. The robbers transferred their things to the Oldsmobile only to realize that they could not start the car. Davis was by then unconscious so they left him in the car and moved back to the first car. They did not realize until later that they had left the money with Davis. The angry mob found Davis and the money and temporarily gave up the chase. They had stolen \$12,400 in cash and \$150,000 in nonnegotiable securities. Besides the two police officers, there were six townspeople wounded in the shootout. Davis died that night at a Fort Worth hospital.

The robbers abandoned their car and the hostages several miles from town and eluded their pursuers for several days until they were finally taken into custody in Graham without a fight.

Hill was sentenced to 99 years in prison. He was paroled in the mid-1940s, changed his name, and became a productive citizen. Helms was executed on September 6, 1929. Ratliff was sentenced to 99 years in prison. His mother filed for a lunacy hearing and Ratliff convinced his jailers that he was insane. During an escape attempt from the Eastland County Jail, he wounded one of two jailers. A crowd began to gather demanding Ratliff. The jailer was overpowered and the mob dragged Ratliff out, tied his hands and feet to hang him on November 19, 1927.

The First National Bank still stands in Cisco. It features a painting of the robbery along with newspaper clippings and pictures. In 1967, the Texas State Historical Survey Committee placed a medallion on the bank commemorating the robbery.

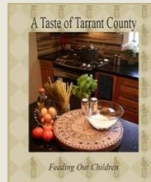

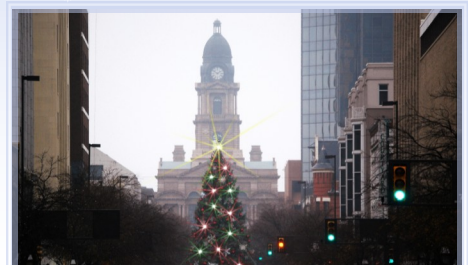

The November traffic switch for all north and southbound traffic to the new pavement from SH 114 to Sabine has been changed to occur in late December. During the last couple of weeks, Dove Road traffic has been switched with eastbound traffic traveling on new sections of pavement. The contractor has built a significant amount of concrete railing on the east side of the project.

During the next couple of weeks, the contractor will be working on the sub grade at both Dove and Solana intersections pouring the remaining concrete areas of the intersection.

Concrete paving on northbound SH 26 between Pool Road and Kimball Avenue is continuing and could be completed before the end of the year, weather permitting. From Kimball Avenue to south of SH 114, a retaining wall and additional drainage will be installed before paving begins on that segment early next year.

The intersection improvements at Mustang Drive have been completed, and all four lanes of Mustang Drive at SH 26 were opened the first week of November.

Motorists will be shifted to the new northbound lanes summer of 2012 so that the southbound lanes can be reconstructed. Throughout construction two lanes of traffic will be maintained in each direction.
