COMMISSIONER'S CORNER

In our last Northeast Newsletter, we discussed the dilemma of the State of Texas redistricting situation. During the last 60 days, we've seen a number of changes and decisions made by different courts, including the Supreme Court. Unfortunately, none of these decisions has given us any clear indication of who will represent you or when we might actually hold an election. At this point, the April 3rd Primary election date will probably be moved to either April 17th or a date in late May or early June. There are also discussions about splitting the election with the Presidential primary and the U.S. Senate primary being held on April 17th and the Texas House, Senate, Congressional districts and all county offices held in late May or early June. Your guess is as good as mine on what might ultimately happen.

We will be having the Northeast Tarrant Transportation Summit on February 10, 8:30am-1:30pm at the Hurst Conference Center. The purpose of this event is to provide information concerning major highway projects in our area and discuss other transportation issues relevant to improving mobility for the citizens of Northeast Tarrant County. We will have updates on the DFW Connector and the North Tarrant Express projects.



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Spotlight on the Mayor



Richard Ward Mayor, City of Hurst



Hurst Mayor Richard Ward never dreamed that he would someday serve on the City Council of any city. Although he aspired to hold an elected office, he originally aspired to be on the Board of Trustees of a local school district. Mayor Ward's path took a turn towards local government when a couple of school children were hit by a rearview mirror while walking to school in his neighborhood. After the incident Ward decided to seek election to the city council and help

strengthen traffic safety. He became active in local politics and was "drafted" to run for the city council in 1976. His victory over a great individual was bittersweet, but he believed that he did what he thought should be done. He won the election by only a few votes and after serving two two-year terms he decided to run for Mayor. He was defeated by a couple hundred votes and decided to leave local politics and get serious about a career. Later that year he returned to school and completed his degree in human resources. After a successful 20-year career Mayor Ward retired and re-entered politics. He subsequently served four years on the city council and then decided to run against the 24-year mayoral incumbent. The margin of victory was a whopping three votes. He uses that story to encourage people to get

out and vote. "Those who say their vote is not important are the possessors of untutored brows."

Mayor Ward is a very proud graduate of Texas Christian University where his grandson will graduate this spring.

Rocky Top Therapy Center, a 501(c)(3) not-for-profit organization, established in 1990 is located on a working ranch in Keller, Texas. Rocky Top Therapy Center is a

Premier Accredited Riding Center qualified through the Professional Association of Therapeutic Horsemanship International (PATH). In order to obtain this premier accreditation very stringent guidelines and standards must be met: Administration (organization, emergency and safety, documentation); Programs (equine management, equipment, volunteers, participants, instructors and health professionals); and Facility (safety and maintenance of buildings and grounds).

Today, the Center operates six days a week, with a staff consisting of 16 employees who provide services for over



1500 clients annually with physical, mental or emotional disabilities or challenges. The therapy team is assisted by 55 specially trained therapy horses and over 250 volunteers each week who provide in excess of 18,000 hours of volunteer service each year. Rocky Top Therapy Center offers Hippotherapy, therapeutic riding, equine-assisted psychotherapy; edu-

cation and counseling services; and our newest program, **Horses for Heroes**, for veterans and their families.

Rocky Top Therapy Center was recently awarded a grant from the Texas Veterans Commission to provide

financial support to veterans or their immediate family members, and covers all costs for therapeutic riding, Hippotherapy or psychotherapy services. Rocky Top seeks assistance from the public to reach out to these American heroes who have faithfully served country and let them know about Rocky Top and how we might be able to help!

Volunteers are the heart of Rocky Top. Volunteer opportunities range from working with the clients (side-walking and leading the horses), caring for and handling the horses, maintaining facilities

and grounds, office and clerical assistance, assisting with Special Olympics, Chisholm Challenge, A.P.H.A. World Shows and other competitions, and assisting with special events and fundraisers.



To accommodate Rocky Top's continuing growth a capital campaign is underway to provide a covered arena

and additional office space along with meeting rooms, volunteer lounge and a parent observation room. This capital campaign has raised approximately \$1 million so far and needs to raise an additional \$500,000 to complete the project.





The city of Fort Worth was nicknamed "Cowtown" shortly after the Civil War, as cowboys stopped for supplies in the town while herding their cattle from South Texas to the Chisholm Trail. After the arrival of the Texas and Pacific Railway in 1876, various businesspeople in the town began erecting stock yards in an effort to become a greater part of the cattle industry. In 1883, the Fort Worth Stockyards were officially incorporated.

Local ranchers wished to facilitate interest in their cattle. A conversation between rancher Charles McFarland and Charles French, marketing manager for the Fort Worth Stock Yards, resulted in the first area stock show in 1896. This event was the first of what would eventually become known as the Southwestern Exposition and Livestock Show. The stock show was held along Marine Creek, in a location with no buildings or enclosures, and only a few trees to provide shade for the animals and patrons. Early-day cattle exhibitors and organizers were all Texans: Capt. William

An Historic Moment In Time

S. Ikard of Henrietta, a breeder of Herefords; I. K. Kimberlin of Sherman; Col. J. W. Burgess of Fort Worth, a Shorthorn breeder, and Col. B. C. Rhome of Denton and Wise Counties. These men were joined enthusiastically by operators of the Fort Worth Stock Yards Company, which was organized in 1893; Armour & Company and Swift & Company, meat packers; and officials of the various railway companies serving Fort Worth.



That first show was such a success that organizers gathered again in the fall of 1896 for a two-day event in October to coincide with the National Livestock Exchange Convention meeting. A parade opened the fall show. Most exhibitors preferred the spring dates, so the Show was established as a March event, to fit in with a series of major livestock shows held around the country, establishing a regular circuit for exhibitor herds.

The following year, the event was given a name, the Texas Fat Stock Show. Tents were erected for the animals, and visitors were charged a twenty-five cent fee to view the livestock.

Local ranchers promoted the show to northern meat packers in the hopes of

improving the local livestock industry. The citizens of Fort Worth raised \$50,000 and formed a company in 1904 to oversee the event. Under



the group's second president, Samuel Burk Burnett, the annual show was renamed the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show. During his term, which lasted from 1908-1922, the event dramatically expanded. The North Side Coliseum (now called Cowtown Coliseum) was built in 1908 to house the event. The new indoor judging arena created expanded interest in the Stock Show, and a carnival and midway were soon added. Commercial exhibit displays also increased in number, and exhibitors travelled from several surrounding states to participate. [1]

1) The structures group is continuing work on the eastbound SH 114 to southbound SH 121 bridge. We have set approximately 20,600 feet of girders on this new bridge. The group is also currently making progress on the new westbound SH 114 to southbound International Parkway bridge.

2)We have completed paving operations on the westbound SH 114 to northbound SH 121 ramp as well as the eastbound SH 114 frontage road from FM 1709 to the eastbound SH 114 on-ramp. To date, the paving group

has tied over 16.5 million pounds of steel and batched over 200,000 cubic yards of concrete.

3) Construction at Texan Trail will begin after the New Year as well as roadway construction at FM 1709.

4) The City of Grapevine, the Texas Department of Transportation and NorthGate Constructors held a milestone event this past month to celebrate substantial completion of the Main Street bridge and more than 50 percent completion of the project. The Main Street bridge will not be open to full capacity until spring 2012.

Construction activities are almost at their peak on the North Tarrant Express project. Utility coordination and relocation continues and all of the needed parcels have now been acquired. The major work areas are the I-35W/IH820 interchange, where new direct connector ramps are being constructed. Eastbound traffic between Beach St. and Denton Hwy. will soon be shifted to new pavement. Further to the east, bridge reconstruction continues throughout the mid-cities area. Drivers should also note the exit

ramp to northbound SH 121 from eastbound SH 183 is now from the left lane. As always, check the project website, www.northtarrantexpress.com, for the latest construction updates.

The North Tarrant Parkway project is ongoing, with the contractor anticipated to open additional travel lanes for use by the public in the near future. By the end of January, all signals in the corridor are expected to be fully operational with new controllers set to take advantage of improved intersection geometry and additional lanes. Work on the aesthetic components of the project (irrigation, landscaping, etc.) is expected to continue through Spring.

The FM 1938 contractor continues pouring sections of pavement at the Solana and Dove Road intersections. This work also includes portions of the enhanced pavement. Over the last several weeks crews have been laying steel reinforcement bars at Dove Road and on the section of FM 1938 south of Vaquero Club Drive in preparation of paving that occurred this week. The contractor also continues to work on retaining walls and the pedestrian underpass. We anticipate traffic being switched

to the new pavement on January 25th. At that time, the contractor will begin removing the old road and excavating excess soil along the west side which will become the southbound lanes.

Construction continues on-schedule. Concrete paving for new lanes and driveways continues on northbound SH 26 between Pool Road and Kimball Avenue. From Kimball Avenue to south of SH 114, a retaining wall is also being constructed.

Weather permitting, motorists will be shifted to the new northbound lanes this spring/summer so that the southbound lanes can be

reconstructed. Throughout construction two lanes of traffic will be maintained in each direction.
