Living in North Texas, we are vulnerable to almost every form of severe weather. Storms are most likely to strike in the late afternoon and early evening hours. Monitoring local TV and radio stations for storm information, as well as broadcasts on weather radios, is the best way to remain aware for any surprise outbreak. TARRANT COUNTY RECORDS MANAGEMENT



When visitors walk into the Tarrant County Records Center they see a normal office environment with Tarrant county staff at their workstations working on their PCs, printers printing and phones ringing. But once they are taken through one of the doors where the records are stored, they always look amazed and they always look up towards the ceiling. Why? All they see is row after row of boxes from floor to ceiling. Thousands of boxes and books neatly stacked and labeled in a clean and orderly environment. How many boxes? Currently, the Records Center contains 118, 228 boxes and 17,399 volumes. The records come from every department in the county and are retained based on a retention schedule published by the Texas State Library and Archives Commission.

In 2009, the contents of the old Records Center were moved from a downtown building which is now the new jail. The new Records Center is located off of I35 approximately 15 minutes from downtown. Several departments, including the District Clerk, were involved in selecting a location that would meet the needs and requirements of the records and the staff of seven. All agreed that a central location with room for growth and security were important factors in the selection of the new location. Originally, the new Records Center's total square footage was 37,232. Shortly after this move was finalized, the County Clerk made the decision to move all of the boxed records and hundreds of volumes under her domain to the new center and added an additional 10,000 square feet to the overall storage space.

These are the seven employees that run the entire operations of the Records Center:

They are responsible for retrieving requested records from boxes, re-filing the records, delivering requested records to all Tarrant County departments, picking up boxes that need to be stored at the Records

Center, notifying departments when their records have met retention and can be destroyed, and training end-users on software use.

Average statistics for one month are 2,392 Records Requested, 2,030 Records Re-filed, 971 Boxes Picked Up for Transfer to Records Center, and 678 Boxes Pulled for Authorized Disposal.

Deliveries are made within 24 hours and if needed a "rush" delivery can be made.

There are many advantages to housing all inactive records at the Records Center under one system and in one building. Records are in an access controlled environment. Software is used to locate boxes and only boxes belonging to the owner can be accessed or requested. Records are stored in a secure environment that can only be accessed by Records Management staff. Unescorted visitors are not allowed. Daily temperature and humidity checks are conducted, fire suppression and detection systems are present, and security systems are in place that meet all of the most recent standards set by the Texas State Library and Archives Commission for Records Centers. Storing records at the Records Center also frees up scarce office space for more active records and reduces the need to purchase office filing equipment.

The mission of the Records Center is to provide effective, efficient and secure management of records and ensure preservation throughout their lifecycle. Our focus is always GREAT customer service for all Tarrant County departments.

GE Transportation invests in Tarrant County, growing jobs and economic vitality



More than a year ago, the facility near Texas Motor Speedway at Texas 114 and Farm Road 56, stood as a vacant building. Now, it is home to nearly 350 GE employees--currently among the state's first to manufacture advanced diesel-electric locomotives and drive systems for electric-haul trucks used in Off-Highway Vehicle mining.

"We're excited to expand our operational footprint in the U.S. and build on our more than 100-year commitment to the rail and related transportation industries," said Walter Amaya, the locomotive plant leader. "We hope to live up to the expec-

tations of being a great employer and good corporate citizen."

GE Manufacturing Solutions, a whollyowned entity of General Electric Company, comprises both locomotive and OHV plants under one campus totaling 1.3 million square-feet and representing a \$235-million investment overall.

Currently, the locomotive plant is producing three Evolution Series locomotives a week for Fort-Worth based BNSF Rail-




way, and since starting assembly in July 2012, the OHV plant has manufactured 500 drive wheels for Komatsu, the world's second largest manufacturer of construction and mining equipment.

Interesting facts about these products: One hundred drive wheels stacked endto-end will stand nearly as tall as the Empire State Building.

Evolution Series locomotive is so

powerful that one 12-cyclinder locomotive can pull the equivalent of 170 Boeing 747 jetliners Evolution Series requires more than 18,000 parts to assemble and moves one ton of freight approximately 480 miles on one gallon of fuel.

Question of the Month

Question: The City of San Antonio is certainly one of the most historic cities in Texas and the United States. Who were the original settlers and where were they from?

Answer: On March 9, 1731, sixteen Spanish families (56 people) who had been colonists in the Canary Islands, often referred to as the "Canary Islanders," or *isleños*, arrived at the Presidio of San Antonio de Bexar. By royal decree of the King of Spain, they founded La Villa de San Fernando and established the first civil government in Texas.







The Pro Players Foundation (PPF) is a Non-Profit 501c(3) organization composed of professional athletes, and business/community leaders, who volunteer their time and talents to assist youth in need. With the mission of "enriching the lives of disadvantaged children across North Texas through sports-based programs", PPF utilizes a variety of initiatives to help make sure every child has the opportunity to win in the game of life:

Instant RePlay – PPF partners with the Dallas Cowboys, Dallas Mavericks, FC Dallas, Texas Rangers and the Dallas Stars to create or renovate sports facilities and playgrounds at non-profit locations serving disadvantaged youth.



Character Camps – professional athletes conduct day-long instructional clinics in a particular sport interspersed with sessions on a full range of character coaching and life skills.



Play it Forward USA – high school athletes collect and refurbish gently used sports equipment which is donated to leagues, teams, and players.

Their most recent Instant RePlay program benefited the Wesley-Rankin Community Center in West Dallas. Working with the Dallas Mavericks Foundation, PPF transformed a dilapidated and empty gym into a state-of-the-art facility which provides services and activities to improve

health, fitness, and overall quality of life for youth in the local community. Through the Play It Forward program, PPF equipped the gym with new basketballs, benches, ball racks, and all the necessities to help the kids of West Dallas get in the game. At the community center dedication, on March 27th, 2013, local youth participated in a Character Camp with Pro Players; Darren Collison, Jae Crowder, Rolando Blackman (Director Player Development, Dallas Mavericks), Ira Terrell (NBA Stalwart), and Dallas Cowboys' Legend Charles Haley, coaching the kids in sports and life. PPF has completed seven projects in the last two years, and plans are under-way for three more projects this year.

In the coming months PPF plans to introduce two new programs: 1) a pilot, curriculum-driven education program called GamePlan; and, 2) a nutritional project called PPFeed the Need.

An Historic Moment in Time began hosting 3rd grade field trips in 1998. OLD BEDFORD SCHOOL HERITAGE PROGRAM Students arrive, ready to experience and learn should living and going to school in a



In January of 1991, the Old Bedford School, a building already 80 years-old and showing the wear and tear of those years, was set on fire and very nearly destroyed. What started out as an early project for the newly-formed Bedford Historical Foundation quickly turned into a full-scale restoration project. The building was originally built in 1915, one of the few brick school buildings in Tarrant County at that time, and is one of the last remaining rural schools built to serve the community as a social and cultural center, as well as a place of learning.

Currently, the Old Bedford School, which functioned as a school until 1969, is the home of a program developed in conjunction with the HEB school district and coordinated with the 3rd grade Social Studies curriculum. The OBS Heritage Program

Students arrive, ready to experience and learn about living and going to school in a small rural community during the early days of the school's history. By rotating through four stations, they are given the opportunity to learn about home life, visit a 1915 classroom, view a movie, and play at an old fashioned recess. Docents guide them through each station with discussions comparing and contrasting yesterday with today.

They are first seated in an area designed to resemble an old farm kitchen where they are shown several farm and home artifacts, and discuss chores and responsibilities. Next, they move into the classroom where they are seated at authentic wooden desks with benches, learn about the flag of 1915, the communal water bucket, the lunch pail, writing with pen and ink, the paddle leaning on the blackboard, and much more. During the movie, they hear stories told by former





students, teachers and a principal who share their memories of the school, including how the window was once broken, the use of outhouses, fetching a coke for the teacher, and using pocket knives to carve on

the large playground rock. Finally, it is time for recess. Outside or inside, the students are given a chance to play the old games of Marbles, Jacks, Jump ropes, Hula–Hoops, Paper Dolls, and small Chalkboards. By the end of their visit, the students have a better understanding and great respect for "how life was" and many consider it one of their "best field trips ever!"

Historic tours are also open to the public and can vary to fit your group's needs, such as various school groups, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, or Senior Citizens. Tours are set up by appointment. Contact amyvozar@yahoo.com or call 817-952-2290. Our website is www.oldbedfordschool.com.

most of the United States. Most people become infected through the bite of an infected mosquito. You can reduce your chance of getting infected by avoiding mosquito bites.

What Can I Do to Prevent WNV?

The easiest and best way to avoid WNV is to prevent quito bites.

- **DUSK & DAWN** are the times of day when infected mosquitoes are most active, so avoid being outside at these times.
- **DRESS** in long sleeves and long pants if you're outside. For extra protection, spray thin clothing with repellent.
- **DEET** is an ingredient to look for in your insect repellent. Follow label instructions.
- **DRAIN** standing water in your backyard or anywhere it accumulates to keep mosquitoes from breeding.

Richland Hills Public Library



"AWESOME!" is the way a 10 year-old library patron described the new look of the Richland Hills Public Library. The Library now has a coffee bar, a new leisure reading area, additional computer workstations and new book shelves. The changes will continue in Phase 2, which is already underway. The facility was originally built as a church. The large windows are a focal point in the structure. With that in mind, the renovations will create a themed look called "secret garden" for the public spaces. The children's area will have giant topiaries on the top of book shelves; an 8-

foot hollowed-out tree with mushroom seating that will draw children in to read and spark their imagination. The meeting room will have a permanent puppet stage created to look like a cottage right out of a fairy tale.

The Library has partnered with TCC to offer GED classes and is planning on adding computer classes for seniors as well as ESL classes this fall. On Saturdays, there are family-friendly programs called "Katies Korner" at 11:00 a.m. The library is in a consortium with six area cities. They share the integrated card catalog. This





gives Richland Hills residents access to over 1,000,000 titles. A courier service transports books and media to RHPL three times a week. Other services include wi-fi access, public use computers, print stations; Texas State Databases, downloadable books, book and music CDs, and large print books. 

• In April, the maintenance of traffic team opened the northbound SH 121 to westbound SH 114 flyover bridge. Crews also performed permanent striping work on westbound SH 114 from Freeport Parkway to International Parkway, northbound International Parkway north of DFW Airport and FM 1709/Northwest Highway bridge.

- In the coming weeks, NorthGate will open the new eastbound SH 114 and northbound International Parkway off-ramps to eastbound IH-635. Paving crews will focus on the westbound SH 114 frontage road from Texan Trail to Main Street and the northbound SH 121 bridge to eastbound SH 114.
- Finally, our grading crews reached a major milestone by performing demolition on the mainlanes of eastbound SH 114 east of International Parkway which are the last removals to be made on SH 114.

• As we enter the summer months, construction activity will continue at a brisk pace with more signs of progress. New frontage roads and on-ramps are opening in Hurst and Bedford, and bridge work continues in the west segment, particularly at Haltom Road, Denton Highway 377 and Riverside Drive. Pre-construction activities, including excavation and utility relocations, are also now occurring along I-35W north of I-820, as the next segment
