Dr. Robin Ryan joined GCISD as Superintendent on June 15, 2010, and has lived in Grapevine with his family since 1995. His wife, Dr. Cindy Ryan, is Associate Minister at First United Methodist Church of Grapevine. - Implemented a 1:1 technology initiative at all elementary schools.
- Developed special programs including STEM Academies, the ASPIRE Academy for gifted and talented students, and two-way dual language programs.
- Created a Technical Education and Career Center (TECC).
- Offered flexible opportunities for students with a virtual school, iUniversity Prep, and The Collegiate Academy at Tarrant County College, where students may earn both their high school diploma and an associate's degree.

The district continues increasing the level of rigor in classrooms to address expectations of the community and better prepare all students for success in college and their future careers. Precinct 3 Maintenance Center News



As the summer approaches and the spring rains start to thin, we have a full construction schedule of projects planned to complete within the next several months. One of our big county projects this year is the completion of the turn lanes on Bonds Ranch Road. Roadway construction of the turn lanes at Willow Springs was completed last summer before the opening of the new NWISD V.R. Eaton High School. This year we are extending the turn lanes to provide access to the Van Zandt Farms and Fossil Creek Estates Subdivisions. We just completed the extension of the bridge at Big Fossil Creek and should have the remaining roadway work completed by early June.

Additionally, this spring we will start preparing the right-of-way for utility relocations along Willow Springs Road north of Avondale Haslet. After utility adjustments are completed this fall, we will begin construction to add shoulders to this segment of the roadway and a turn lane at Avondale Haslet.

In the meantime, we have a full schedule of county and interlocal projects:

Interlocal Projects

These projects are a cooperative effort between the county and cities to complete needed rehabilitation and reconstruction projects on city streets. The city provides the material funding, and the county provides the labor and equipment to perform the work. Projects we have completed or scheduled for this spring/summer include:





Improved Mobility = Economic Development

In North Richland Hills, the recent completion of the North Tarrant Express has made a widespread positive impact on our business community. Sales tax revenues along the NTE have quickly exceeded pre-construction levels, and the project has been a catalyst for new development and redevelopment throughout the highway corridor. The intersection of Rufe Snow and I-820 is now home to Chipotle Mexican Grill, Winco Foods, and Taco Cabana and will see more commercial development in the coming year. The improved roadway has also aided in the sale and development of

ty, such as the former Home Depot Expo building which will soon open as Total Shooting Sports in Summer 2016.

With NTE construction complete, the City will now begin improvements on other major arterial roads to further enhance travel around NRH. This month, construction will begin on Rufe Snow Drive north of Mid Cities to add lanes in each direction and improve traffic signalization and pedestrian access. These improvements will enhance traffic flow, provide better access to existing businesses, and encourage new business growth on undeveloped land. This project is estimated for completion in early 2018.


Improvements to two intersections along Davis Boulevard are also in the works at Mid Cities and Smithfield. The project at Mid Cities and Davis will provide additional turning lanes to reduce traffic backup during peak hours. Additionally, the Smithfield Road connection to Davis will be relocated to the existing intersection of Davis and

Bridge Street to improve safety and traffic flow by providing signalization for drivers entering Davis from Smithfield. These projects will also aid in the development of undeveloped land on all sides of these major intersections. Roadway projects, both local and regional, always have a major impact on economic development, as they enhance connectivity and traffic flow.

It seemed like a long time coming when TXDOT was finally able to announce that the much needed expansion of what

came to be called North Tarrant Express was going to commence. Then came the shock that there was over 300 parcels of land that TXDOT would begin to work with on right-of-way acquisition to clear the way for all the additional lanes. Each month, as the negotiations for land progressed, it became more and more evident that many new, exciting opportunities were presenting themselves. In Hurst, ten businesses were displaced, but six of them were able to find new homes in the City like Starbucks Coffee and CiCi's Pizza. In some cases there were partial parcel takings and landlords worked together to put remnants together that would create enough land where new buildings were welcomed. The transformation began and in Hurst, its busiest intersection of Precinct Line and the highway, where most of the highway lined businesses were, became more attractive than ever. This intersection

maintained the highest traffic counts along the 13.5 mile stretch.

To properly market the new opportunities, the city branded its most prominent intersection as the "50-yard line" helping drive home to potential retailers that Hwy 121/183 and Precinct Line offered the "best seats in the house". Numerous 30-year old or older buildings were taken down and replaced with many new restaurants with their latest prototype design and architecture. They offered area as well as regional consumers many new restaurant choices and reasons to stop and shop in Hurst. Examples include **Dairy Oueen, Golden Chick, In-N-Out**

Burger, Pollo Tropical, Potbelly Sandwich Shop, Subway and Pei Wei Asian Diner. Landmark Hurst restaurants

were able to enhance their presence by relocating to newly constructed restaurants offering a more attractive look and layout with even greater seating capacity like

Abuelo's Mexican Restaurant and the Outback Steakhouse.

The net impact was twelve additional new businesses offering a greatly enhanced look and total transformation of the city's most prominent intersection! And the 40% additional vehicle capacity that the expanded highway created is already allowing these businesses extremely high sales volumes, making business owners and consumers happy. They now can enjoy one of the area's most significant redevelopment projects in its history.

Meals On Wheels, Inc. of Tarrant County is excited to announce the opening of their new meal production and distribution center, located at 5740 Airport Freeway in Haltom City. The new 63,500 sq. ft. facility gives the agency the capacity to meet the anticipated 75% increase in services in the next 15 years. "It's an exciting day for Tarrant County seniors," said Keith Harrison, Manager of Marketing and Communications for Meals On Wheels. "Many people are surprised to learn that we currently serve close to 1 million meals per year to our homebound elderly and disabled residents. Tarrant County is in the midst of a tremendous population explosion, and of course, the Baby Boomer generation is entering the

stage of life where many people need help preparing a nutritious meal for themselves. Over the next few years we will have to produce an *additional* 750,000 meals each year just to keep up with the demand."

The Meals On Wheels Board of Directors felt that the most feasible and cost-effective solution was to construct a new facility. "We have always had

overwhelming support from the community," Harrison said, "and this project was no exception. We set out on a nearly \$15 million capital campaign just five years ago, and believe it or not; we were approximately 90% funded before we ever broke ground. That's a real testament to the generosity of the people of Tarrant County."

Home-delivered meals are available to those who are homebound for any length of time, are physically or mentally unable to prepare a nutritious meal for themselves, and have no one to help them on a regular basis. Some people may be recovering from an illness or hospital stay and will only be on the program for a short period. Others have a long-term need and will be on the program on an ongoing basis. Each meal is

planned by a registered, licensed dietitian, and meets 1/3 of the daily nutritional requirements



established by the State of Texas.

Meals are delivered Monday through Friday by caring volunteers. It takes just over an hour, just one day per week, to deliver meals in a location that is convenient to your home or office. In addition to home-delivered meals, the agency provides professional case management, diabetes screening and intervention programs, nutrition education and counseling, a medication management program, and companion pet meals for those who need assistance feeding their beloved pets.

A Historical Moment In Time THE BANKHEAD HIGHWAY IN TEXAS



A hundred years ago, America's roads were awful. They were mainly dirt and barely usable in wet weather, even by

horse and buggy. Few roads went any distance. With automobiles becoming more affordable and numerous, citizens began to realize that although building and maintaining better roads was expensive, the economic cost of coping with poor roads was even more costly.

In the early decades of the 20th century, highway associations were formed, and a few were more successful than others. The Bankhead Highway became the first transcontinental road in America that could be relied upon year-round because its route from Washington, D.C. to San Diego traversed the Southern states and avoided the mountains and winter weather that plagued the most northern routes.


John Asa Rountree had established the United States Good Roads Association in 1913 and served as its Secretary. The South still struggled economically years after Reconstruction, and Rountree understood that better roads were the route to economic recovery. So, he conceived the idea of a transcontinental highway across the South, and he named it after his friend and fellow Southerner, Senator John Hollis Bankhead.

The Senator from Alabama, later referred to as the "Father of Good Roads,"

played a key role in the passage of the Federal Highway Aid Act of 1916, making federal funds available to state highway departments to share the costs of building and maintaining roads.

Federal funds used to build these roads were allocated to states based on mileage, and Texas was in line to receive the lion's share of funds for the Bankhead since 850 miles of the road passed through the state. One roadblock was that Texas did not have a highway department! That was remedied in early 1917 and no time was lost in drawing up plans for Texas Highway 1, the portion of the Bankhead that would connect Texarkana to El Paso.


After World War I, the 1920s roared with sounds of road construction. Oil-rich counties such as Eastland were better able to fund road improvements—including the



Thurber brick roads that still cross the county—but the Bankhead was not hard-surfaced all the way across the state until the 1930s.

In 1926, the Federal Bureau

of Public Roads coordinated a system of numbered highways to eliminate confusion. The Bankhead through Tarrant County became part of US-80. During the 1930s, the Bankhead Highway assumed yet another designation, one intended to boost tourism—it was part of the "Broadway of America"—and now the Bankhead name lives on, as do miles of the original Bankhead pavement from the 1920s.

Which president held the first televised news conference?

Answer: John F. Kennedy. On January 25, 1961, JFK became the first president to hold a live televised news conference. The president read a prepared statement regarding the famine in the Congo, the release of two American aviators from Russian custody, and impending negotiations for an atomic test ban treaty. Afterwards, he opened the floor for questions from reporters. He addressed queries on a variety of topics, including relations with Cuba, voting rights, and aid to impoverished Americans.




OLDER AMERICANS MONTH







• The \$20.6 million TxDOT project will widen the roadway to two lanes in each direction with raised curbed medians and includes dual left turn bays at the intersection of FM 1938 and FM 1709. The project also includes landscaping along the roadway with illumination and sidewalks on both sides of the roadway provided by the City of Southlake. The 1.6-mile project is estimated for completion in 2017.
