

County, Extension programs are as diverse as the population. From agriculture literacy to childhood obesity we have educators in the communities across the county each day addressing the issues that people are facing in their daily lives.

Through our nutrition and health education program we have programs focused on making healthy food choices, stretching food dollars and food safety. Our Walk Across Texas and Step Up and Scale Down worksite programs are ideal for individuals on the go and offer real life solutions to making changes for better health.

The current economic climate has many families working hard just to make ends meet. Through our financial literacy education programming, individuals can learn how to live within their means, save money and plan for their financial future.

The 4-H & Youth Development program provides youngsters the opportunity to be involved in a local club, participate in leadership, community service, and hands on learning. Through our Expanded Food & Nutrition Education program, and our Cooperative Extension program of Prairie View A&M many of those same experiences enhance classroom learning. Annually, an event called Pizza Ranch brings agricultural





literacy under one roof by providing youth in the 3rd and 4th grades the opportunity of learning about the production of their food.

The Extension's Horticulture program addresses needs in both community and home landscape by providing education for those who are employed in landscape maintenance and homeowners who want to manage their own private landscape. In addition Extension has a corps of trained Master Gardener volunteers who provide over 55,000 hours of volunteer service through community education each year.

LIGHTHOUSE for the Blind of Fort Worth

TIME TO TELL THEIR STORY

The Lighthouse (LBFW) has been serving Tarrant County for over 77 years but for many of those years, the nonprofit was a well-kept secret or viewed as a simple provider of mops and brooms. Located off of downtown Fort Worth, they take pride in being one of the few socially entrepreneurial nonprofits investing their dollars in programs, services and jobs. As the only local employer fully committed to the hiring of individuals who are totally or legally blind, LBFW's goal is



to increase outside sales which will result in the expansion of operations, inventory, and an increase in employment opportunities and services for community citizens who are blind or visually impaired.

In the past three years, the direct blind labor force has grown from 65 to 95 blind/visually impaired team members. Sales revenue has increased from \$15,000,000 to \$23,000,000. Community outreach has doubled and community awareness has soared with an updated video, website and Facebook page. However, there is more to do to effectively connect with the estimated 37,000 Tarrant County residents



who live with significant vision impairment.

Even more important is making sure that anyone, any age, have access at no charge to the life-changing programs and services that will provide them the tools, skills, and connections needed to be active, contributing participants in the world around them. LBFW commits to being the premier e-source and advocate for the blind community by providing and

expanding employment opportunities, rehabilitation services and community activities that will enrich the lives of any child or adult who is blind.

Whether it is a retired teacher on the Fort Worth's west side



who is dealing with Macular Degeneration or a young boy in Bedford who has been diagnosed with Juvenile Batten disease or a homeless man off of Lancaster Street who is blind because of a gunshot or one of our very own employees who has been blind since birth, the Lighthouse for the Blind of Fort Worth stands ready to provide quality vocational, social and rehabilitation services to anyone whose life has been affected by significant vision loss.

Nettleton, President of the Grapevine Garden Club, became aware that the Cotton Belt Depot was

going to be demolished in 1973, she was instrumental in creating the Grapevine Historical Society as a nonprofit corporation and in 1974 became its first President. After the depot was moved to Heritage Park at the corner of Ball and Wall Streets, she began soliciting donations of items of local historical significance to display in the Depot as a museum - thus the Grapevine Historical Museum was begun with Society volunteers serving as docents.

In 1976 Alberta heard that the Torian Log Cabin was going to be torn down and once again she drew members of the

When Alberta Society together to save the cabin. Working with the City to find a location at the corner of Main and Wall Street, the Torian cabin was reconstructed in Liberty Park on Main Street.

> In 1994, the Historical Society was able to return the restored Depot and Museum to its original location at the current site of the Cotton Belt Railroad on South Main Street. Today, as progress continues, the Society is planning for yet another move onto West Hudgins Street where it will be a part of the historical museums located in the Ted R. Ware Plaza. A Museum Fund-



raising Campaign is currently underway to help with this new facility. The facade will

served the people of Grapevine from the early 1940s until it closed in the 1970s. This new building is an exciting venture for the Grapevine Historical Society as it continues to serve the people in the Grapevine area preserving many of the historical artifacts which continue to tell the story of our town from its beginning in 1844 and continuing into present-day. How did TCU acquire the "Horn Frog" mascot?

Answer:

In 1898 the Horn Frog was chosen for the name of the yearbook and mascot back when the school was still Add-Ran Christian University and located in Waco! In 1902 the school changed it's name to Texas Christian University. In 1910 the main building burned, and Fort Worth offered the school a 50 acres campus and \$200,000. to move to Fort Worth (pretty good deal for both!).

• We've opened three new bridges in the past two months, including: FM 1709/Northwest Highway, northbound International Parkway north of DFW Airport and the southbound SH 121 bridge to westbound SH 114. Our next project milestones include the east side of Texan Trail bridge and both sides of William D. Tate Avenue bridge.

• In the upcoming months, our paving crews will begin working on the westbound SH 114 frontage road between Main Street and Texan Trail, southbound SH26 at Ernest Dean Parkway, the

westbound SH114 main lanes between Main Street and William D. Tate Avenue and southbound SH121 to eastbound SH114.

• Our bridge demolition crews have been hard at work as well, demolishing the old northbound International Parkway bridge recently. There are only three more bridge demolitions left on the entire project. (Pictured: In early August, crews opened the new FM 1709/Northwest Highway bridge, as well as the new north and south intersections in Grapevine and Southlake.)





With the planting of the final shrubs and trees, the North Tarrant Parkway project is finally complete. Local residents are actively using the miles of new sidewalk and area commuters now have much greater capacity and signal efficiency along the corridor. Public feedback has been overwhelmingly positive about the new roadway, and area neighborhoods are very pleased with the final product.

In the coming months, the City of Keller will be making additional enhancements to the corridor with the installation of a new traffic signal light at the intersection of North Tarrant Parkway and Keller-Smithfield Road.

Construction began on the Golden Triangle Boulevard project in the fall of 2010, and completion is estimated for early 2013. The \$19 million project will build a 3.4 mile, four-lane divided roadway with raised, grass me-

Progress continues to be made on the SH 26 project in Grapevine. This is a \$12 million project that will improve safety and mobility for motorists traveling through the Grapevine area.

The reconstruction of the southbound lanes is now ongoing through the entire length of the project. Motorists will be shifted to the new southbound lanes later this fall. After this shift, traffic will be on the permanent lanes for both the north and southbound side. Construction on the medians and left turn lanes will follow. During construction, two lanes of traffic will be maintained in each

direction. Completion is estimated for summer 2013.

The reconstruction of State Highway 26 in Colleyville began in July. The \$11.4 project from Brumlow Avenue/Pool Road to John McCain Road will widen the road to three lanes in each direction with raised curb medians and left turn bays. As part of this project, the bridge over Big Bear Creek will also be reconstructed. Motorists have been shifted to the northbound lanes so construction can begin on the southbound side. Two lanes of traffic will be maintained during peak driving times. The project is estimated for completion in summer 2014.

TxDOT is also resurfacing SH 26 from John McCain Road to FM 1938. The seven-mile project is estimated for completion by the end of October, weather permitting.

TxDOT appreciates motorists' patience while crews complete these projects.
