The new educational building is the latest addition to Arlington Heights Baptist Church at 3730 Camp Bowie Blvd. Sunday school space has been quadrupled by completion of the structure. Value of the combined church facilities is now estimated at about \$390,000.

Arlington Heights Baptist to Hold Open House for Building

The church that was known back in World War I days as Soldiers Memorial Baptist Church in tribute to its many Camp Bowie doughboy visitors, is building for the future. Arlington Heights Baptist Church, 3730 Camp Bowie Blvd., on Sunday, Sept. 11, will have an afternoon open house to celebrate the completion of its new, modern educational building. Rev. T. E. Durham, pastor of the church 31 years, said leading Baptist pastors from over the Southwest have been invited to attend the ceremonies. The new educational structure, adjoining the sanctuary, has quadrupled the church's Sunday school space and made possible use of the latest methods in the teaching ministry, Mr. Durham said.

THE ARLINGTON Heights church was organized as Trinity Park Missionary Baptist Church on Sept. 24, 1912, with 67 charter members.

Services then were held under a tent at the corner of W. Seventh and Curvy. In 1918, the name was changed to Soldiers Memorial Baptist. About that time, the

church bought new property and a building on Madison Ave., near Montgomery.

In 1926 the church purchased its present property and changed its name to Baptist Temple. In 1925, it became Arlington Heights Baptist Church.

Back during the depression when Rev. Durham took over the pulpit, the church property was valued at about \$20,000.

TODAY, WITH a newly-built educational structure, it is worth about \$390,000. It includes the main auditorium, built in 1949, and the pastor's home, built in 1958 and deeded to Rev. and Mrs. Durham for their lifetime, as well as a former parsonage, now being used as residence for the minister of education.

The old educational building was torn down in January, 1955, but despite adverse housing conditions, both the Sunday School and Training Union have maintained high attendance records during the construction.

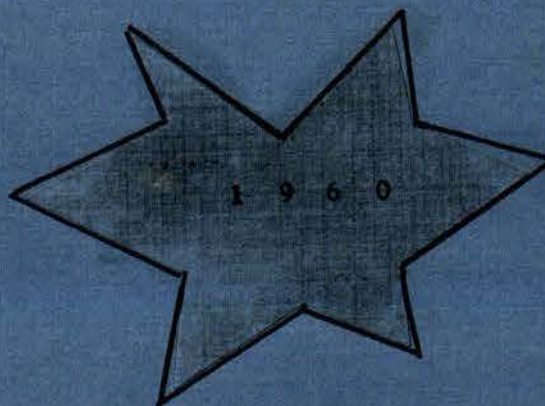
Laverne Biser is chairman of the church's building committee. Serving on the panel were John Cowser, Leonard Polk and J. D. Ballard. C. F. Keith has

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Dr. Arthur E. Travis Resigns as Pastor of Gambrell St. Baptist Church After 13 Yrs. of Effective Ministry

Dr. Arthur E. Travis was born Feb. 22, 1909 at Chattanooga, Tenn. Mrs. Travis (Jewel York) was born Sept. 13, 1911 at Capitan, N. Mex.

Dr. Travis finished high school at Mosheim, Texas and Mrs. Travis at Abilene. Dr. Travis graduated from Hardin-Simmons and from Southwestern Sem. with Th.M. and Th. D. Mrs. Travis attended Hardin-Simmons.

Dr. Travis was saved at age 13 and was baptized by his Bro. Huey. He was licensed to preach by East 4th St. Baptist, Big Spring, by S. B. Hughes and was ordained by University Baptist Abilene 1931, C. A. Powell, pastor, and S. B. Hughes assisting.

Brother and Mrs. Travis have two children and two grand-children. Mrs. Grady Allison (Glorietta) whose husband is pastor Wooster Baptist in Baytown attended Hardin-Simmons and Southwestern Seminary.

She and her husband have two children: Carroll and Melissa. The son, Arthur Travis, Jr. graduated from Hardin-Simmons and Southwestern Seminary where he received the Walter T. Conner award in theology for outstanding scholarship. He is now working toward the Th.D. degree. Arthur was married to Miss Sammie McLallen of Hereford, Texas in 1960.

Dr. Travis has held pastorates at Colorado City First, Wahiawa, Oahu, Hawaii, and several student pastorates before coming to Gambrell St. He taught Bible at Camp Copass, Central Seminary at Kansas City, and Hardin-Simmons University. He served as Chaplain in the U.S. Army from 1943-46.

Dr. Travis has served his denomination as member of Foreign Mission Board, State Ex Board, Board Dirs. Baptist Standard, Pres City Pastor's Conference and Moderator Tarrant Co. Baptist Ass'n. He has recently been called to be Interim Pastor of First

OUR RANCH FOREMAN, WILL BULLOCK "BIG" UN" (275 lbs when farming in Lubbock cotton country-sawed off lower ½ of T-model Ford steering wheel to get 54 inch belt under wheel; and School "Marm" Sis, "Booky" Miss Ruth Bullock. Too, The Bullock nieces-nephews came in: CLAUDE BULLOCK, JR., and Co., retired from USN "believe it or not" in his 30's Claude Jr's "Partner" Jerry; and his sister, Gladys Bullock Tillmon and "Partner" Limestone Co. Commissioner, Boyd Tillmon

WHAT A DINNER!! "But the most important thing," Baker said, "is Baylor's contribution in intellectual services—things like its lecture series, its Conference on American Ideals, its entertainment, its music, football, theater, and in dozens and dozens of other fields."

Baker praised Baylor for its academic freedom credited that factor as his reason for remaining at the university.

"Some of the minor do's and don'ts—like the no-smoking rule—often have made Baylor seem narrow," Baker said. "But it's been my experience that no other university in the world could have given me the basic freedom to develop my particular endeavor. I've found that if you have an idea and work toward it, Baylor will back you 100 per cent."

"This not always is allowed at other institutions. Baylor alone allows its faculty and students an unlimited amount of freedom and growth."

Baker praised Waco's efforts in assisting Baylor through the Baylor-Waco Foundation. (\$100,000.00 annually). He said its efforts could well push Baylor's progress ahead 10 to 15 years and could be "a tremendous step toward turning the Baylor campus into the greatest and most beautiful in the world."

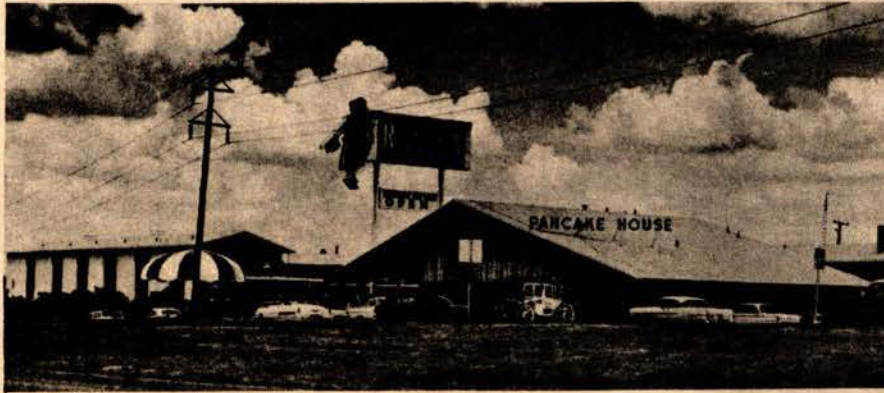

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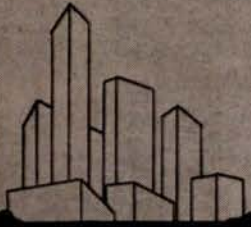

"Dr. Harry H. Ramsom of the University of Texas, self-styled "ex-English teacher converted to administration," is president of the Main University.

His varied interests include copyright law, bibliography, Texas history, students' transition from high school and special programs for superior students.

Dr. Ramsom fathered the Texas Quarterly, a publication that is creating international interest, and the Undergraduate Academic Center, to be completed in about two years. He has been instrumental in establishing the University as the humanities center of the Southwest through the acquisition of a number of important new collections for the library.

Since he joined the English faculty in 1935, Dr. Ramsom has worked enthusiastically in general education experiments, chiefly through "Plan, II, "a liberal arts curriculum which the University offers to top graduates of Texas high schools. He originated the new "Junior Fellows' 'plan for the top

25 students in each year's freshman class, and a blueprint for new departmental honors programs.

Dr. Ramsom, who has been described (by Lon Tinkle of the Dallas Morning News) as the "energetic and imaginative galvanizer of educational life at the University of Texas," was honored by his Alma Mater, the University of the South at Sewanee, Tenn., with a Doctor of Letters degree in 1958 and by Baylor University with the degree of Doctor of Laws in the same year. He has Master of Arts and Doctor of Philosophy degrees from Yale University.

Before he became Main University president, Dr. Ramsom had served as its vice-president and provost, College of Arts and Sciences dean and Graduate School associate dean. His teaching experience includes positions at North Dakota State Teachers College and Colorado State College. He served as director of research for the International Copyright League in London immediately after receiving the Ph.D. degree. During World War II, he attained the rank of major in the U. S.

Air Force and received the Legion of Merit for his work in editorial intelligence.

He has contributed numerous articles to the Saturday Review, the Sewanee Review and Texas Studies in English and has served as associate editor of the Southwestern Historical Quarterly. His extensive writings in Texas history include a biography of Sir Swante Palm. His principal research is in the field of copyright law, and the University of Texas Press in 1956 published his definite study of the first copyright statute.

The Texas Quarterly's regular "Arts and Sciences" editorial is his principal contribution to the periodical. Many of the Quarterly's articles on literary subjects have grown out of the University's "Program in Criticism" which Dr. Ramsom established and which brings distinguished visitors to the campus each year.

One of the chief exponents of the University of Texas' emphasis on excellence in teaching and learning, Dr. Ramsom has said,

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No Doubt About It

Of course, we are talking about the prayer of faith and not the mere mumbling of a few pious platitudes and phrases addressed to the Almighty. "If any of you lack wisdom, let him ask of God, that giveth to all men liberally, and upbraideth not; and it shall be given him. But let him ask in faith, nothing wavering. For he that wavereth is like a wave of the sea, driven with the wind and tossed. For let not that man think that he shall receive any thing of the Lord" (James 1:5-7).

Jesus, who was a mighty man of prayer himself, took much pains in teaching his disciples, where to pray and when to pray. For he realized the tremendous power of prayer, that it could make available to the individual resources unknown to the natural man. "And the Lord said, If ye had faith as a grain of mustard seed, ye might say unto this sycamine tree, Be thou plucked up by the root, and be thou planted in the sea; and it should obey you" (Luke 17:6).

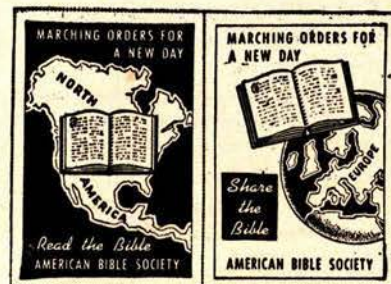

It is even more powerful than the atomic bomb in bringing about a permanent and enduring peace throughout the world. It is indeed a sacred entrustment, one for which we shall have to give an account in the great day of assize.

What shall we do with our rich heritage? Certainly we should thoroughly acquaint ourselves with its contents by constantly and prayerfully searching for its hidden treasures. But that is not all. We should share it with our fellow Americans and with all the nations of the earth. It was given to us for that very purpose. We dare not hoard it lest we lose it. By sharing it with others we greatly enrich them and fulfill our Master's marching orders for a new day.

During these terrible days of conflict and hatred the American Bible Society has had a very large part in making available to men of every clime and nation "the Holy Scriptures, which are able to make men wise unto salvation through faith which is in Christ Jesus" (2 Tim. 3:15). More power to the American Bible Society, which is worthy of our support.

IS YOUR CHURCH DOING ITS DUTY BY MISSIONS?

From a survey of the reports of the churches to their district associations it is revealed that 12,319 Southern Baptist churches, or 50.61 per cent of the total number, give less than 25 per cent of their total budgets to missions and benevolences; 1,665 churches give from 25 per cent to 33 1-3 per cent of their total budgets to denominational work; 1,565 churches put from 33 1-3 per cent to 50 per cent of their total budgets into missions and benevolences; while 501 churches give more than one-half of their total budgets to the general work of the denomination.

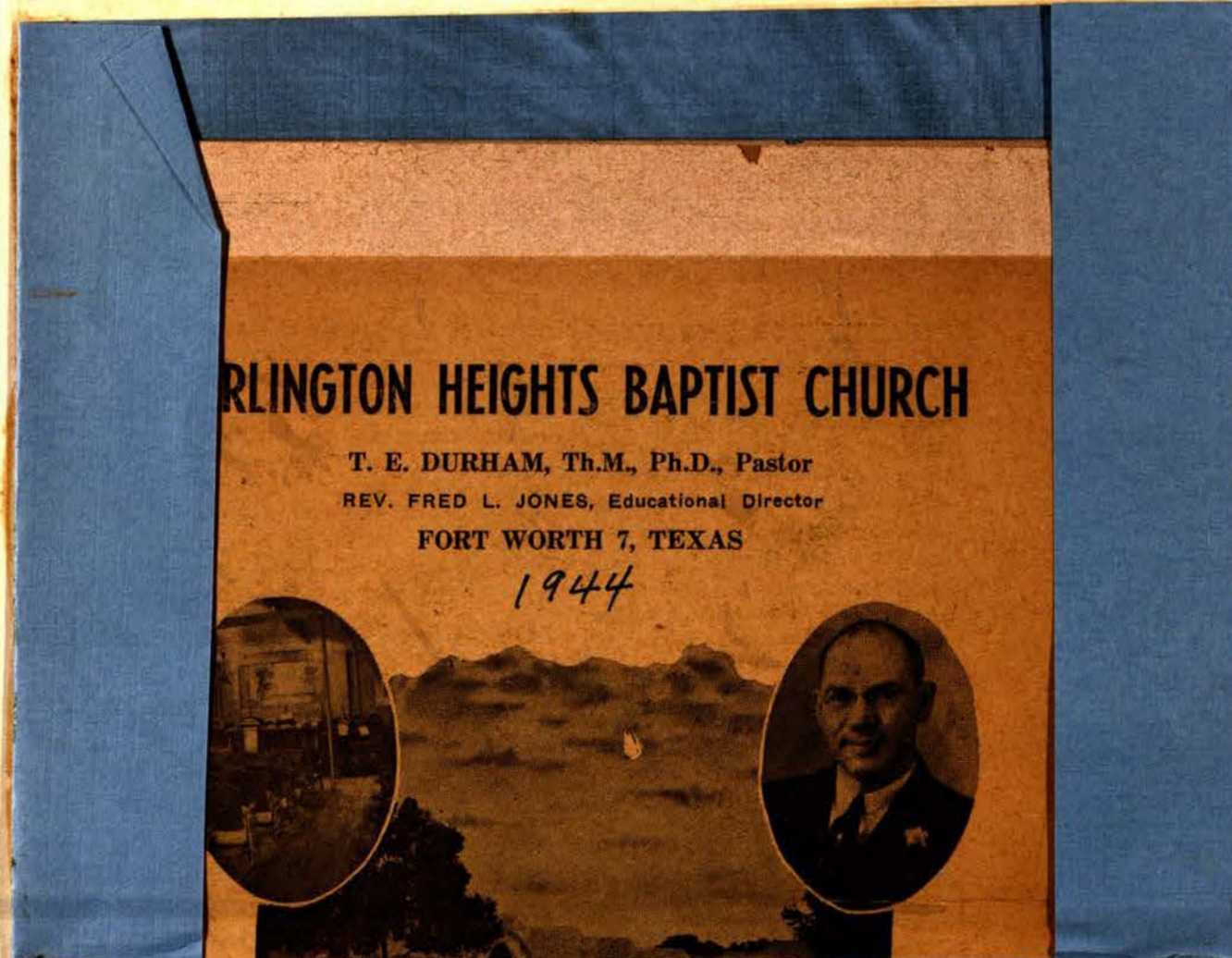

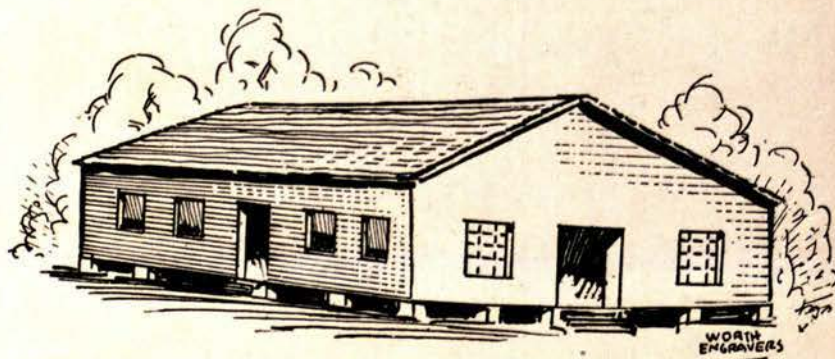
The Mother Church of the Arlington Heights Baptist Church was founded and organized September 24, 1912. The Church was named "Trinity Park Missionary Baptist Church," with sixty-seven charter members. Services were held under a tent at the corner of West Seventh and Curry Streets.

In 1918 the name was changed to "Soldiers Memorial Church," in honor of the many soldiers of Camp Bowie in its fellowship. During this period the church had purchased property and a building on Mattison Street, near Montgomery.

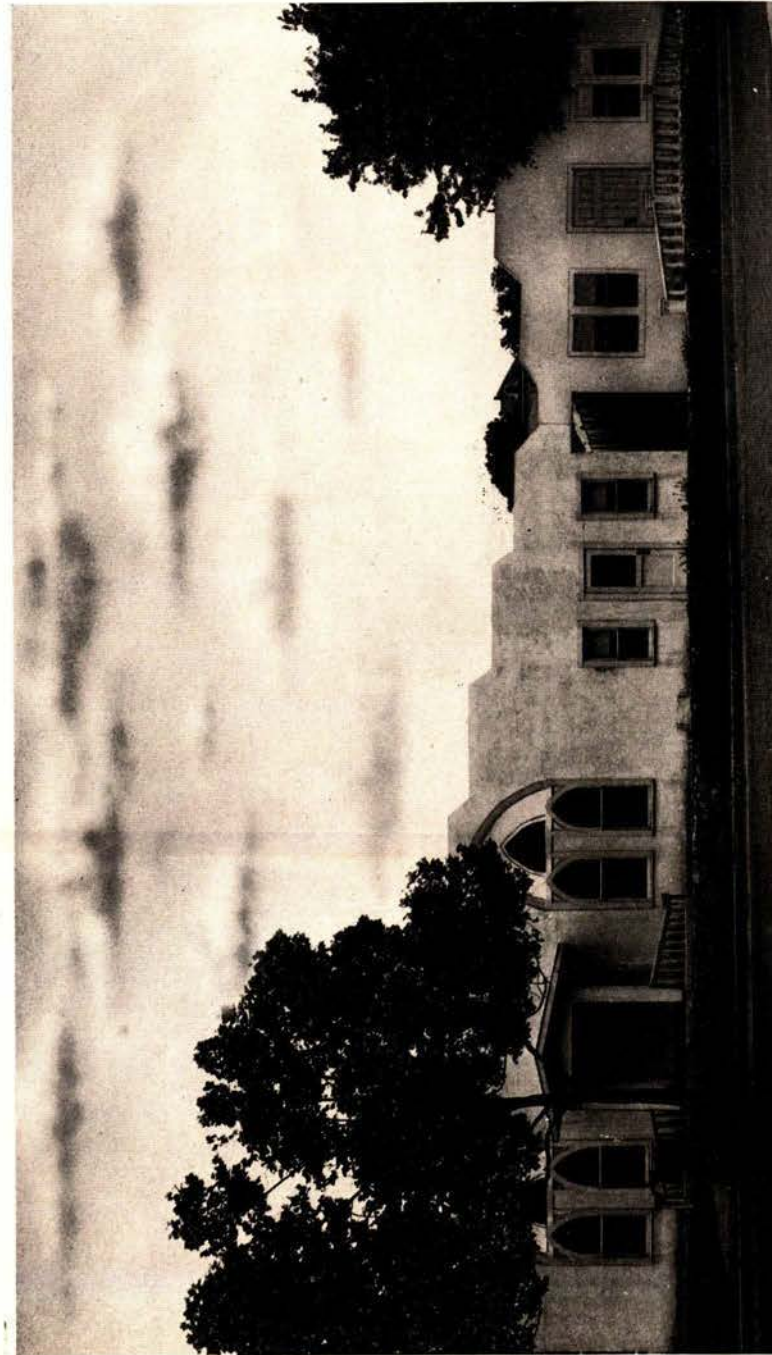
In 1926 the church purchased its present property and changed its name to Baptist Temple.

The Doctrinal Name of Baptist Temple was confusing to many so, in 1935, the church adopted the present name to be retained for all time.

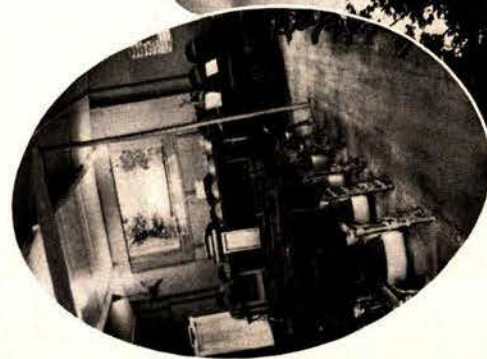

THE HOUSE BY THE SIDE OF THE ROAD

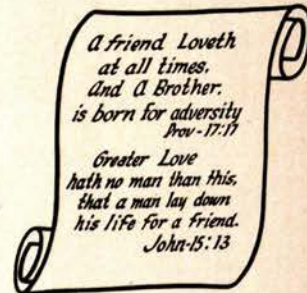

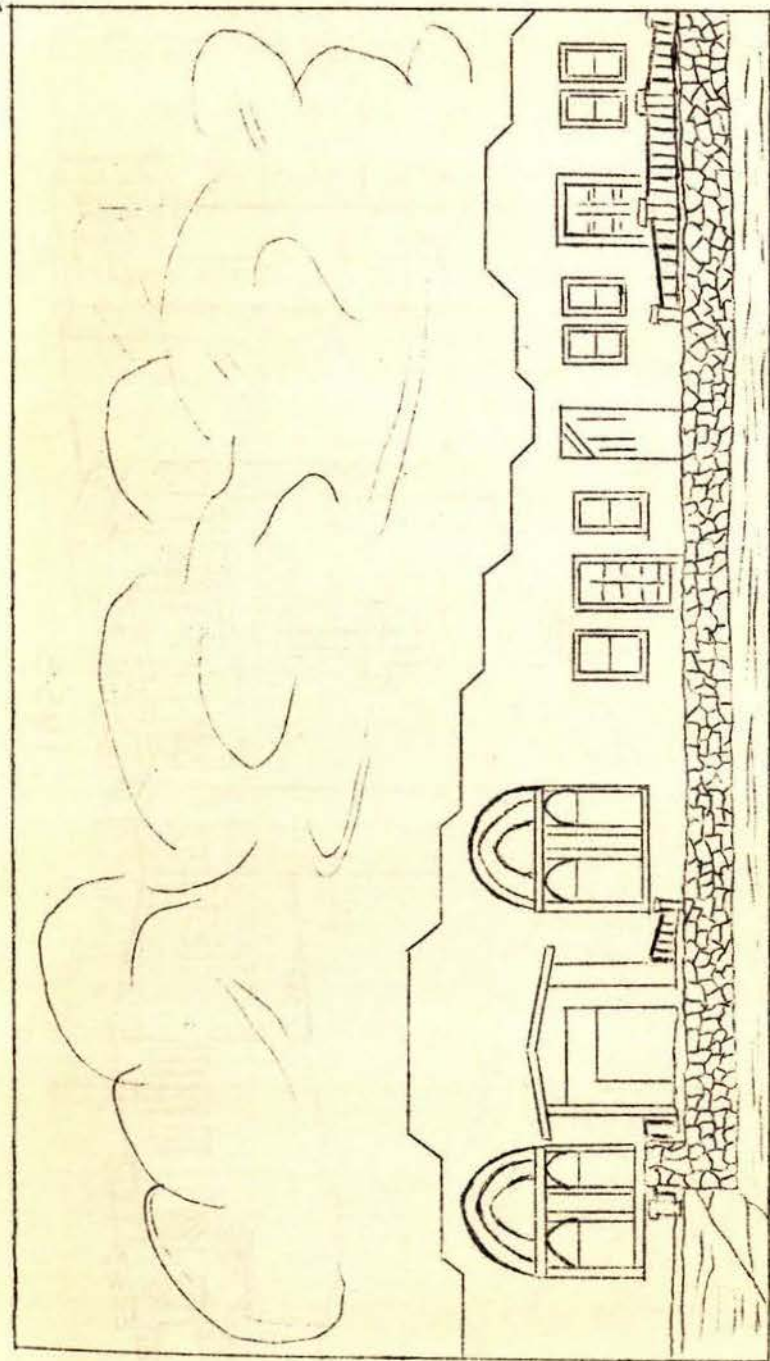
The Mother Church of the Arlington Heights Baptist Church was founded and organized September 24, 1912, and was named "Trinity Park Missionary Baptist Church," with sixty-seven charter members. Services were held under a tent at the corner of West Seventh and Curry.

In 1918 the name was changed to "Soldiers Memorial Church," in honor of the many soldiers of Camp Bowie in its fellowship. During this period the church purchased property and a building on Mattison Street, near Montgomery.

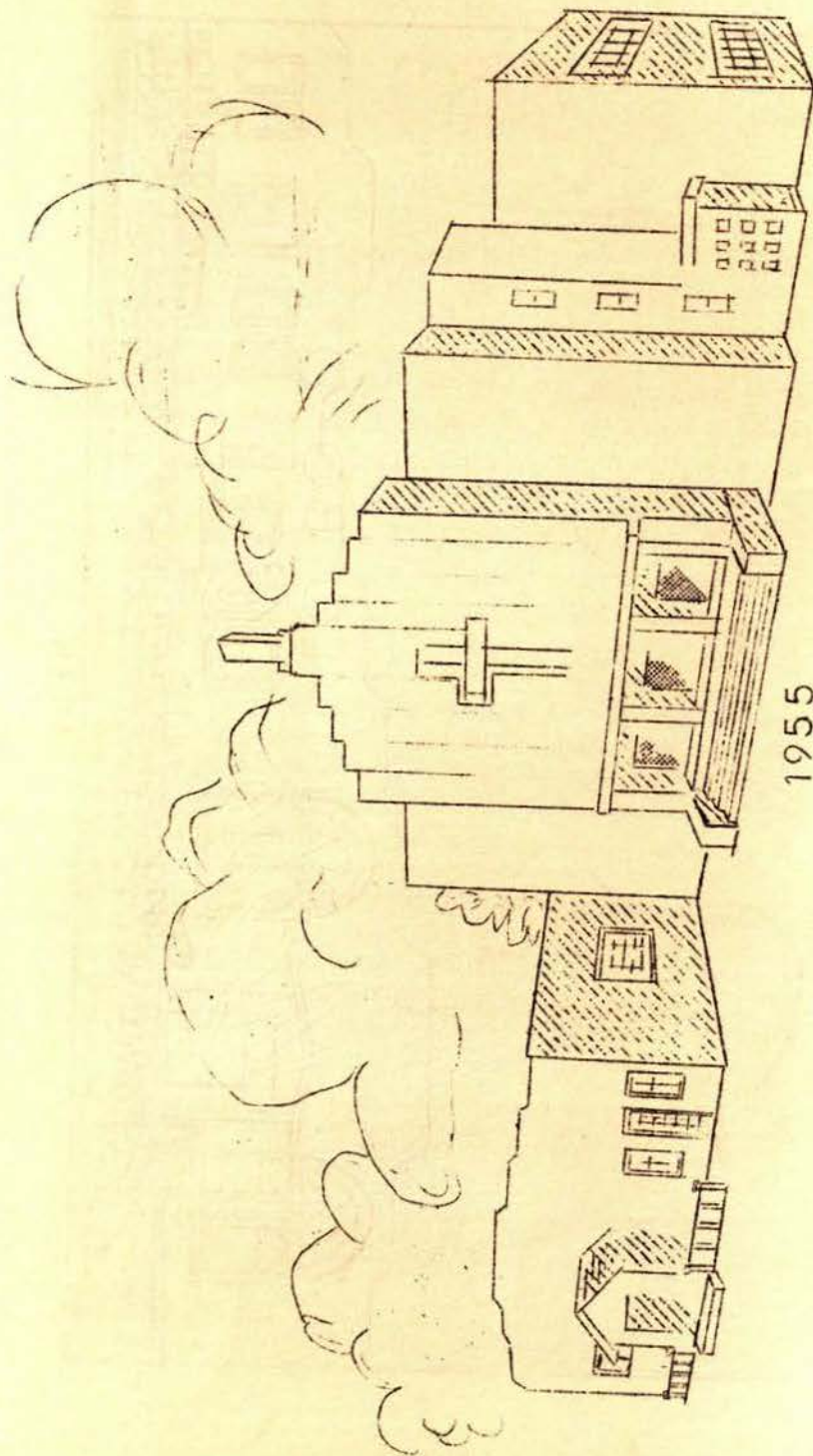
In 1926 the church purchased its present property and changed its name to Baptist Temple, but the name of Baptist Temple was confusing to many so, in 1935, the church adopted the present name to be retained for all time.

A LIFE OF SERVICE FOR OUR LORD

Dr. Durham first came to our church in May, 1929. At that time the average attendance was thirty-five. During his ministry eighteen hundred members have been added, and our present membership is 966. The church budget has increased from \$3,000 to \$30,000. The property value has increased from \$20,000 to \$209,000. At least twelve Southern Baptist preachers have received training here.

Dr. Durham has been active in the General Ministers Association, having served as chairman of every committee of that organization. At the present time he is secretary of the General Ministers Association. He served as moderator of the Tarrant Baptist Association for 1953-1954, at which time there were 135 churches in the association.

In 1941 Dr. Durham inaugurated the Bible in the High School for Fort Worth. He has been sole dean for thirteen years and has been elected to that position by the General Ministers Association for life. During those thirteen years, 5,200 students have completed the course. This program is carried out independent of the state, and \$45,000 has been raised to support the program.

In addition to the above contributions, Dr. Durham has been active in worthy civic affairs.

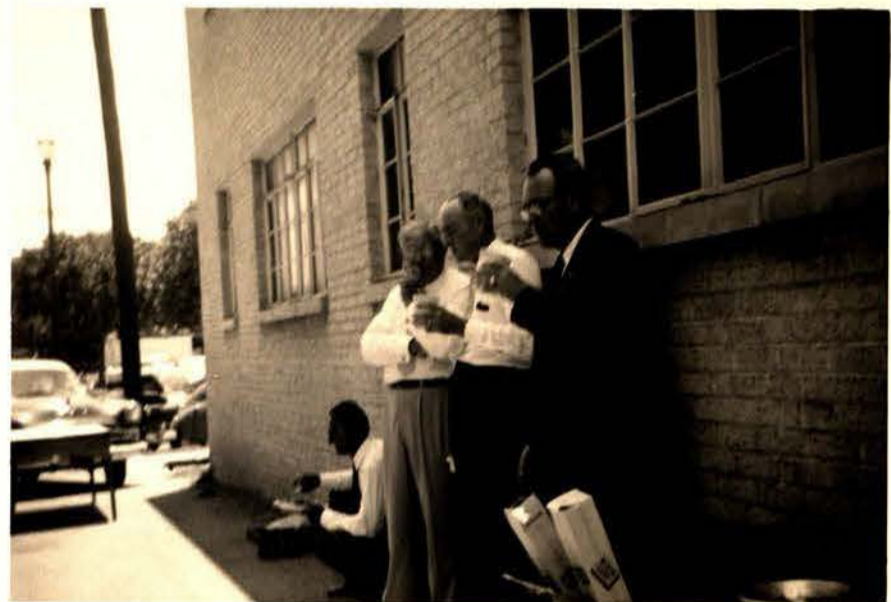

5,000 Texas Baptists to Open Session Tonight

Convention Meeting To Be at Coliseum



DOMES OF KNOWLEDGE—The architecturally interesting Swarthwestern Baptist Theological Seminary Memorial Building, in the heart of the campus, has provided shelter

for thousands of budding Baptist preachers and religious workers. The structure includes Fleming Library, Scarborough Hall, Truett Auditorium and a central rotunda.

The building includes the seminary infirmary, post-office, book store, student center, printing and photography offices.

An estimated 5,000 Baptist "messengers" representing the smallest country churches to the state's largest congregations will begin the 77th annual session of the Baptist General Convention of Texas Tuesday night.

Sessions will be at Will Rogers Memorial Coliseum and Auditorium. Total attendance for the convention is expected to reach 10,000, but only about half the number will be official "messengers" representing Baptist churches.

The messengers are intentionally not called "delegates" because they are not delegated the authority to take any action that would usurp the autonomy of the local Baptist church.

Major business expected to come before the representatives of the 1,700,000-member BGCT includes consideration of a proposed \$14,876,807 missions budget for 1963, election of more than 300 trustees for 26 Baptist institutions, and consideration of acquiring ownership of three new state Baptist institutions.

The convention will vote on accepting the gift of a proposed new \$5,000,000 hospital in Amarillo offered to the Baptists by the Amarillo Area Foundation. The hospital gift has already been approved by the 192-member Texas Baptist executive board.

SPIRITUAL SOLOISTS ON PROGRAM

Two locally-owned Latin American schools, Mexican Baptist Bible Institute in San Antonio and Valley Baptist Academy in Harlingen, will be accepted as new state-owned institutions, if the convention approves. Both schools are primarily designed to teach future Latin American Baptist preachers.

Much of the convention will be devoted to inspirational messages featuring some of the top speakers in the Southern Baptist Convention, said Rev. James H. Landes of Wichita Falls, president of the BGCT.

The convention opened at 7 p. m. Tuesday with the evening session featuring addresses by Rev. Mr. Landes, Dr. H. Leo Eddleman, president of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary; and Rev. Herschel H. Hobbs of Oklahoma City, president of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Dr. Eddleman will also speak during two other convention sessions—Wednesday morning and Thursday morning.

Rev. Vernon Elmore, pastor of Baptist Temple church in San Antonio, will deliver the annual convention sermon Wednesday morning.

The Wednesday evening session will feature an address by a medical doctor, Robert Hingson of Cleveland, who led a recent mass inoculation project in Liberia.

A special report on the 1963 Japanese Baptist crusade, sponsored by Texas Baptists, will also come during the Wednesday night session.

The vast evangelistic effort will be designed to reach more than 94,000,000 people in Japan with the Gospel message through radio, television, five central crusades in major population centers featuring evangelist Billy Graham as a principal speaker, and more than 150 revival meetings in Japanese cities.

The Wednesday night Japanese crusade report will be brought by Rev. C. Wade Freeman of Dallas, Texas Baptist evangelism director; Rev. K. Owen White of Houston, chairman of a special Japan crusade committee; Dr. T. A. Patterson, Texas Baptist executive secretary; and C. H. Humphrey, Amarillo attorney.

EDITOR TO GIVE DOCTRINAL SPEECH

Special music during the Wednesday night session will be brought by Negro spiritual soloist Ethel Waters, famed for her version of the spiritual "His Eye Is on the Sparrow." Dick Baker of Dallas, evangelistic singer who has written several hymns, will also have a part in the Wednesday night music program.

Convention Music Director J. T. Adams of Sulphur Springs, and his male choral group "The Men of Texas" will also provide special music throughout the convention. Adams, minister of music for the First Baptist Church of Sulphur Springs, has written a song on the convention's theme, "God's Word for God's World," especially for the meeting.

The annual Texas Baptist Press Award will be presented Thursday morning to Louis Hamlett, longtime city editor of the Wichita Falls Times. Hamlett will be honored for "outstanding contributions to Christianity in the field of journalism."

Principal speaker for the Thursday morning convention session will be Rev. Carlos Paredes, pastor of the First Latin Baptist Church in Austin and president of the Mexican Baptist Convention of the BGCT.

Rev. E. S. James of Dallas, editor of the Baptist Standard, will deliver a doctrinal message on the second coming of Christ, and William H. Crook, president of San Marcos Baptist Academy, will speak during the Thursday afternoon convention session.

A special message on "Christians and the Threat of Communism" will be presented during the Thursday night session by Ross Coggins of Nashville, Tenn., associate in the Southern Baptist Christian Life Commission.

Other speakers for the three-day convention include Dr. Howard C. Bennett, president of East Texas Baptist College in Marshall; Rev. Brooks Wester, pastor of Park Place Baptist Church in Houston, and Rev. James Riley, pastor of Second Baptist Church in Houston.

The convention will end Thursday night with an evangelistic and dedication service led by Rev. Baker James Cauthen of Richmond, Va., executive secretary-treasurer of the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board.

Theological School Ranks With Best

Nestled on a 70-acre campus in south Fort Worth known as "Seminary Hill," Swarthwestern Baptist Theological Seminary is the largest evangelical seminary in the world.

More than 20,000 students from every state in the nation and scores of foreign countries have attended Swarthwestern. More than half of the missionaries appointed by the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board have attended the school.

Students enrolled in the School of Theology are required to take courses in two other schools at the seminary—the School of Religious Education and the School of Music.

All three schools are designed to carry out the seminary's main objectives—preparing men and women for the ministry of the gospel, said Dr. Robert E. Naylor, president.

Chartered in 1908, Swarthwestern moved to its present location in 1910. Control of the seminary was transferred from Texas Baptists to the Southern Baptist Convention in 1925.

During the seminary's 53-year history, it has been headed by Presidents Dr. B. H. Carroll, Dr. L. R. Scarborough, Dr. E. D. Head (now president emeritus and the only living ex-president), Dr. J. Howard Williams and Dr. Naylor.

A total of 60 full-time faculty members taught the 1,704 students enrolled in the seminary during the first semester of 1961.

The campus includes five main buildings, seminary housing units, parking lots and other

Texas Back New Crusade For Japan

Texas Baptists are co-sponsoring a vast nationwide evangelistic crusade in Japan next spring in an effort to make "the land of the rising sun" into the "land of the risen Son—Jesus Christ."

The Baptist New Life Movement, as the crusade is called in Japan, will be designed to take the gospel to every person in Japan through radio and television and revivals in about 150 cities.

There are more than 93,000,000 people in Japan who have never had a personal relationship with God through Jesus Christ, said Texas Baptist Executive Secretary T. A. Patterson who has played a major role in planning the crusade.

For the first time in the history of Christian missions, Southern Baptists will have an opportunity to reach an entire nation for God through radio and television and mass evangelism, said Dr. Patterson.

"At present we are as free to preach the gospel in Japan as we are in America," said Dr. Patterson, "and a great radio broadcasting system has offered to put our message all over Japan, into all of Asia, India, and even into Russia."

The evangelistic potential of the crusade has spread enthusiasm throughout Asia, and Baptists in Okinawa, the Philippines, Taiwan and Korea have requested Texas and Southern Baptists to send teams of evangelists to lead revivals there.

More than 150 Baptist pastors, 100 musicians, and 300 laymen from throughout the Southern Baptist Convention will lead revival meetings during the Japan New Life Movement.

Evangelist Billy Graham will be one of the principal speakers for the crusade, delivering major addresses during five area-wide crusades beginning March 30 and ending April 10. The area-wide meetings will be in Tokyo, the world's largest city, Sapporo, Osaka, Kokura, and Fukuoka.

Four series of revivals will follow the area meetings, with city-wide crusades in more than 150 Japanese cities where Baptists have missionary work.

"Revival fires are already burning in Japan," said Shuichi Matsumura of Tokyo, director of the New Life Movement, when he visited in Texas last month.

Texas Laymen Pay Meeting Expenses

More than 100 Texas Baptist laymen paid their own expenses to conduct revival meetings and personal soul-winning efforts in California and Colorado this year.

The result was nearly 100 conversions and hundreds of lives rededicated to Christ.

This is just one example of the projects sponsored by the Texas Baptist Brotherhood, dedicated to promoting local church work and to leading others to a stronger spiritual relationship with God. The organization has a statewide enrollment of more than 90,000 members.

The Brotherhood emphasizes world missions, personal stewardship and Christian witnessing.

But perhaps the most important single project is the Royal Ambassador program which enlists more than 34,000 boys in more than 2,380 churches.

The boys participate in programs of study, recreation and work designed to mold Christian character, said Robert Chapman, state RA secretary.

Regional RA rallies will be conducted this fall at Howard

Payne College, Brownwood; Baylor University, Waco; Hardin - Simmons University, Abilene; and the University of Corpus Christi. Attendance at the rallies last fall was 5,761.

Boys from churches throughout Texas participated in the RA athletic program which includes basket ball and baseball.

Summer district RA camps in 1960 were attended by 6,375 boys and leaders. More than 9,000 men attended district Brotherhood encampments in 1961. Programs emphasized evangelism, stewardship and missions.

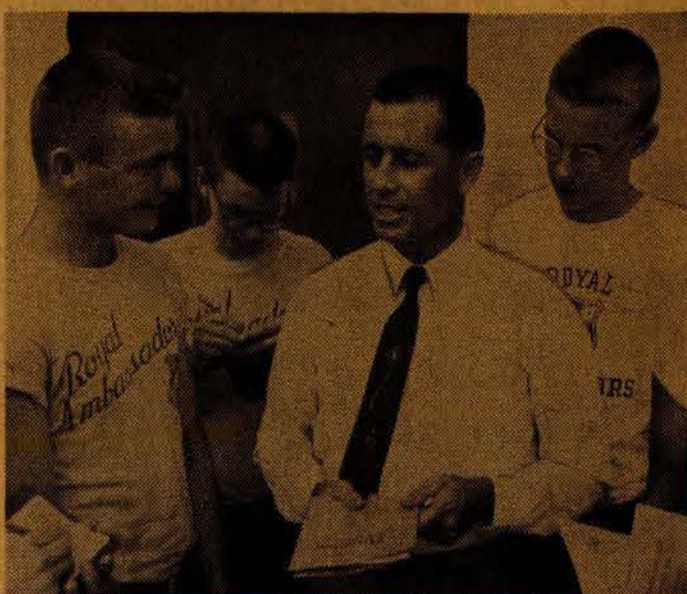
The Brotherhood emphasizes the work at associational and district levels as well as in the church, said L. H. Tapscott, state Brotherhood secretary.

Principal meetings of the year are the Texas Baptist Brotherhood Convention Monday and Tuesday in Fort Worth, and the RA Congress.

The statewide Congress was conducted in Tyler on April 20-21, 1962, with 1,220 boys and men attending.

Leadership training has been emphasized during the year with 1,345 awards issued to Brotherhood and Royal Ambassador workers in 55 associations up to Sept. 30.

A series of survey and enlargement campaigns for strengthening and enlarging Brotherhood and Royal Ambassador organizations were held in seven associations in seven districts, with 89 churches participating. Others are planned for early in 1963.

layman's meeting in Japan and a giant youth rally, 46 Japanese men made decisions to enter the ministry as Baptist pastors, and spontaneous prayer meetings began to erupt in Japanese Baptist churches, Matsumura said.

One Japanese Baptist church with only 11 members — the Ichikawa Baptist church in a city of more than 270,000 — has rented a 1,500-capacity auditorium for a citywide revival meeting next spring.

The church's pastor, Nobuyoshi Togami, said the 11-member church also plans to enlist a 100-voice choir to sing in the revival, and the pastor plans to do special evangelistic witnessing to the choir members, enlisted from school and civic and choral groups in the city.

"This is one of the greatest examples of the expectancy and tremendous faith we have ever encountered in Japan," said Southern Baptist Missionary W. H. (Dub) Jackson.

The dream for the vast Japan crusade was first born in the heart of Jackson, a former World War II pilot who bombed the Japanese and later returned to Japan as a missionary.

His enthusiasm for a vast crusade spread, and the Japan Baptist Convention sent Pastor Matsumura, the crusade director, to the United States in 1960 to invite Billy Graham to lead a crusade in Tokyo. Later the concept and the plans for the crusade grew and expanded to include all of Japan.

The Baptist General Convention of Texas meeting in Austin last year voted unanimously to co-sponsor the crusade in cooperation with the Japan Baptist

Convention and the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board.

Messengers to the convention elected a nine-member committee to co-ordinate plans for the crusade, and to raise a minimum of \$300,000 to help finance the crusade. The crusade has expanded to the point that at least \$500,000 to \$1,500,000 is needed to do the most effective job and to provide funds for new churches that will spring up as a result of the crusade.

Crusade leaders are hoping that local Baptist churches will pay the travel expenses of their pastor or music director selected to participate in the crusade. Laymen may want to pay their own expenses as a contribution to the missionary effort.

The nine-member Texas Baptist committee co-ordinating plans for the crusade is composed of Dr. K. Owen White, chairman, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Houston; Dr. Paul M. Stevens, director of the Southern Baptist Radio and Television Commission in Fort Worth; Rev. James H. Landes, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Wichita Falls and BGCT president; A. J. Kincaid of Dallas, president of the Texas Baptist Brotherhood Convention; and Mrs. Bert Black of Crosbyton, president of the Texas Baptist Woman's Missionary Union.

Advisory committee members include Dr. Ramsey Pollard, Memphis, Tenn., Baptist pastor; Dr. Herschel H. Hobbs, Southern Baptist Convention president from Oklahoma City; Dr. George Schroeder, Southern Baptist Brotherhood commission head; and William H. Souther, professor at New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary.

TV Stations Learn Of Politicos' Nerves

Area television stations learned during the last two days how edgy political candidates become as they see election day bearing down on them.

WBAP-TV, the Star-Telegram station, announced Monday that a proposed telecast of the program of the Dallas League of Women Voters which featured the three governor candidates was canceled at 5:30 p. m. Sunday because Republican Jack Cox would not give written permission for the reshowing.

The program was shown instead by WFAA-TV, Channel 8. Backers of Democrat John Connally wanted the film rerun because Cox took an unclear stand on canalization of the Trinity River during the program.

Another Republican, Del Barron, asked KTVT-TV, Channel 11, Monday for 30 minutes of free time at 8 p. m. Sunday. The congressional candidate claimed in a telegram to the station a program Sunday which featured his Democratic opponent, incumbent Jim Wright, was of an "obvious political nature."

He sent a copy of the message

to Newton Minow, chairman of the Federal Communications Commission.

Wright appeared on the "Your Point of View" program with three other Texas congressmen.

GOP SENATOR JOHN TOWER will campaign for Barron at a coffee at 9 a.m. Monday at Republican headquarters at W. 7th and Henderson.

REPUBLICAN COUNTY Chairman John Edwards said Monday a voter is not legally bound to support in the general election the party in whose primary election he cast his ballot.

The primary election is a nominating process. Voters may, according to the law, vote for whomever they choose in the general election, even though they may be voting against a man they helped nominate.

First Church Formed in 1834

The banner of Mexico still waved over Texas when the first Baptist Church was founded in the state in 1834.

Charter members of the church — called Providence Baptist Church—gathered along the banks of the Colorado River near Bastrop for their first meeting.

No doubt the founders of that first church would have found it hard to imagine that by 1962 there would be 1,700,000 Baptists in Texas in 4,384 churches and missions.

Settlers From U. S. Seeds of Texas' largest religious denomination were sown even before Stephen F. Austin led the first band of settlers, including 11 Baptist families, into the state in 1820.

Baptist settlers were among the first to cross the Sabine River into Texas after the purchase of Louisiana from France in 1803. As early as 1812, Baptist pastors visited the state to preach to the scattered settlers. The first Sunday School was organized in 1829 by T. P. Pilgrim, a Baptist layman from New York. Within a short time, others were begun at Matagorda and Wharton.

By 1848 the number of Baptist churches in Texas had grown to 85 and the first state convention met at Anderson in Grimes County. Fifty men rode horseback to attend that meeting.

Little they knew that the pattern they started by giving \$94 for foreign missions would in 1962 result in Texas Baptists giving more than \$14,000,000 to world missions.

Sixth of Population The convention they started has grown into a denomination embracing one-sixth of the people of Texas.

Total assets of the Baptist General Convention of Texas

are in excess of \$450,000,000. It operates 11 colleges and universities, eight hospitals, four children's homes, two homes for the aged, a Baptist Building and a Baptist Foundation.

Included among these institutions are the world's largest home for dependent children, the largest Baptist university and the largest white Baptist church on earth.

Texas Baptists also sponsor the oldest junior college, DeCatur Baptist College, and the oldest woman's college, Mary Hardin-Baylor, operated by any evangelical faith west of the Mississippi.

The Baptist Standard, weekly news magazine of Texas Baptists, has the largest circulation

of any publication in the state, 370,000.

192-Member Board

Elected boards carry out responsibilities for various phases of Baptist work, hiring employees to function in specialized categories. The principal hiring medium is the 192-member executive board, which meets quarterly.

A four-story building in Dallas houses the work of four commissions, special service agencies, the Baptist Foundation and the Woman's Missionary Union.



EIGHT BAPTIST HOSPITALS

900 Patients Accept Christ

One out of every seven unchurched patients admitted to Texas Baptist hospitals in 1962 made a profession of faith in Christ.

Conversions in the eight hospitals totaled more than 900, citing the importance of the evangelistic ministry being carried on at the institutions, said Dr. James Basden, secretary of the denomination's Human Welfare Commission.

Another important part of the work is charity. Last year 25,000 patients who had no money received free treatment valued at about \$1,000,000.

These are only two of the aspects in a total program that provided medical service for more than 117,000 patients, and trained hundreds of student nurses, residents and in-

ternes, and X-ray and laboratory technicians during the year. Included among the trainees were 24 mission volunteers.

BEGINNING ITS ministry of healing in 1904 when the doors of Baylor University Hospital in Dallas opened, the Baptist General Convention of Texas has developed a hospital system with a total of 2,779 hospital beds and 458 bassinets.

Their total annual operating budget is \$28,000,000. In 1963 the institutions will receive \$756,000 from the co-operative program of Texas Baptists.

Six years ago Texas Baptists began operating what is believed to be the first denominationally owned hospital for the care of the chronically ill, aged people with admittance on a non-denominational basis.

Located in San Angelo, Baptist Memorial Geriatric Hospital has recently raised its capacity to 225 residents with the completion of a new administration building and a residence hall. The new buildings have a value of \$475,000.

The institution has also begun a program on its 62-acre campus in which aging people build homes around the hospital where they can have the security of the hospital's facilities near by. When the home owners die, the homes will accrue to the hospital to be leased to other aging people.

AT HOUSTON, one of the Southwest's first satellite hospital systems was initiated by Memorial Baptist Hospital in 1962. The 100-bed branch hospital located in a southwest Houston suburb is fully equipped and has all the educational and training programs of the big 546-bed downtown hospital, said Administrator W. Wilson Turner. In addition, the satellite will be able to draw upon the facilities of the main unit for treatment of patients.

The 270-bed Baptist Hospital of Southeast Texas at Beaumont completed a new nurses' home, auditorium and library made possible by a \$520,000 gift from Mrs. Harry C. Wiess of Houston.

Hillcrest Baptist Hospital, Waco, recently completed a \$2,200,000 addition to provide 138 additional beds and 30 bassinets, new laboratories and X-ray facilities, a complete maternity division, a children's division, a new chapel and a new central service and pharmacy.

PLANS ARE NOW in progress to remodel the older part of the hospital and to expand some of the service departments, said Administrator Julian Pace.

Overcrowded conditions at Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene have brought about construction of the seven-story Minnie L. Anderson Building. The addition, expected to be completed by June 1963, at a cost of \$1,308,000, will provide 84 private rooms, in addition to offices, laboratories, emergency rooms and other facilities.

Texas Baptists' other hospitals are the giant Baylor University Medical Center in Dallas, which provides 774 beds for patient care, and the Valley Baptist Hospital, serving the Rio Grande Valley area with 153 beds and modern medical facilities.

Norwegian Freighter Smashes Into Pier

VANCOUVER, British Columbia, Oct. 29 (AP) — The Norwegian freighter Granville smashed into a pier in dense fog Monday, causing damage which port officials said could run as high as \$400,000.

The ship slammed into Lapointe Pier, tearing up 130 feet of the structure and knocking down two 75-foot towers and two sections of an overhead grain-loading gallery.

One man suffered minor head injuries and five others escaped the falling debris as they stood by to tie up the vessel.

Port Manager Capt. Barney Johnson estimated the damage at \$400,000 or more, depending on the foundations of the pier. Damage to the freighter was not estimated.

MIDAUBAN, France, Oct. 29 (Reuters) — A gypsy family of three men, two women, and two babies was killed near here Monday when their car collided with a truck.

Land Program Needs No Funds

AUSTIN, Oct. 29 (AP) — Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler advised Governor Daniel Monday that the veteran's land program would not need any general revenue funds for the next four years.

Sadler is required by law to report on the program's status in advance of each legislative session. He said vouchers were made Monday out of maturing investments to make the \$2,565,000 bond installment payment due Dec. 1.

Sadler said the land program has more than \$17,000,000 set aside for such payments while the entire obligations for the next two years amounts only to \$15,847,000. For reserves, the land office will collect \$3,000,000 interest from federal securities the next two years and will receive an estimated \$16,500,000 in installment payments from veterans purchasers.

My good friend and neighbor, Jeff Glick of Miami Shores, a former president of the American Contract Bridge league, has been for many years the guiding force behind organized bridge activities in the Florida area.

During the recent Nationals in Minneapolis I had occasion to seat myself behind Mr. Glick for a quick kibitz. He was generous enough to provide me with the chef d'oeuvre featured today, in which he defeated a four-heart contract which was fulfilled by most of the other North-South pairs who encountered the deal.

North was confronted with a choice of responses, and he chose the conservative course by bidding one no trump. It was his intention to take an aggressive step if partner made another move on his own steam. When South rebid two hearts, North invited him to go on by raising to three hearts, and South proceeded to game.

Glick, seated West, opened his singleton nine of diamonds, and declarer permitted the lead to ride around to his king in order to preserve the dummy's limited entries. A small heart was led from the closed hand and, when West played low, North's queen won the trick. A club was returned, and East rose with the king in order to return the queen of diamonds.

Most players in the West seat ruffed in at this point and, by so doing, put an end to defensive prospects for, after winning the return, South was able to draw the queen of clubs, and then enter the dummy with the diamond ace in order to discard his remaining diamond loser on the top club.

When East returned the queen of diamonds, Glick did not employ a trump. Instead he discarded a club, and declarer was helpless. He was forced to win the trick with the ace in dummy but the club suit was blocked, and there was no way to regain access to the North hand for a sluff on the ace of clubs. In the end South was obliged to concede two diamond tricks in addition to one heart and one club.

Many citizens of Fort Worth don't realize it but their home town is at the center of one of the largest denominational radio and television operations in America.

They call it the Southern Baptist Radio and Television Commission.

Dr. Paul M. Stevens is director of the Southwide agency which has offices at 6248 Camp Bowie Blvd. in the Ridglea Shopping Center.

Eight weekly radio programs are now prepared and distributed by tape recording by the commission. The programs go to more than 1,000 different stations.

MOST PROMINENT of these programs "The Baptist Hour" celebrated its 20th anniversary this year.

Permanent preacher for "The Baptist Hour" is Dr. Herschel H. Hobbs, president of the Southern Baptist Convention and pastor of the First Baptist Church of Oklahoma City.

A weekly "congregation" estimated at 20,000,000 hears "The Baptist Hour" each week, and this year for the first time the program is being broadcast in Eastern Nigeria to a potential audience of 10,000,000 persons.

Other programs of the same length and format are broadcast in Spanish (La Hora Bautista), Italian (Buona Novella), and a 15-minute version in Russian beamed across the Iron Curtain.

"Master Control" is a 30-minute variety program produced by the commission which includes interviews with interesting persons in all walks of life. It also includes popular music, and brief vignettes of Christianity.

A 15-MINUTE version of "Master Control" is beamed via Trans-World Radio in Monte Carlo to Great Britain.

Other quarter-hour programs include "International Sunday School Lesson" taught by Clifton J. Allen of the Southern Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tenn.; and "Chapel Upstairs," a devotional program offered daily to radio stations.

In the field of television, the Radio-TV Commission produces films under "The Answer" series for use in television stations across the nation.

During the last six years, the Radio-TV Commission has produced 39 full-color, half-hour films for use in "The Answer" television series. An estimated audience of 100,000,000 persons have viewed the films, prepared for the commission by Family Films, Inc., a religious film company in California.

Thousands of letters have poured into the commission office in Fort Worth in response to the television shows.

One woman wrote after her husband watched the program, "My husband, an unbeliever in God, liked the show and asked me to write to you for him. He would like the booklet you mentioned. Pray that God will save him."

A couple from Chicago wrote asking for a "Baptist Hour" message concerning responsible parenthood. They told of having an unwanted baby and were even considering doing away with the in-

The Radio-TV Commission is involved, however, in a great many things besides the production of radio and television programs.

There are 10 departments of the commission, each with its own responsibility, and each working towards the commission's common goal. A promotion department creates news releases, posters, letters, and booklets with the assistance of the art department. The printing department prints, addresses and mails the items.

Another department contacts radio and television stations to provide outlets for the programs; and another distributes more than a thousand tapes and films to these stations every week. Still another department produces a monthly magazine, "The Beam," for wide circulation.

The commission is composed of 31 members, both laymen and pastors, elected by messengers to the annual Southern Baptist Convention, the work of the commission has grown tremendously, still the surface has only been

LAST MET HERE IN 1957

BGCT Messengers Will Be Welcomed Back

Opening Session Is Scheduled Tonight

BY JIM W. JONES

Welcome back. That's what the City of Fort Worth is saying this week as the state session of the Baptist General Convention of Texas returns to this city at 7 p. m. Tuesday.

The Texas Baptists last met in Fort Worth in 1957. One of the major convention decisions at that time was to defer action on taking over operation of the Wadley Memorial Hospital in Texarkana because federal funds were used in construction of the hospital.

Also, in the 1957 convention, the Baptists passed a resolution urging moderation and mediation, time and patience, in solution of racial and labor problems, chose Rev. E. H. Westmoreland of Houston for a second term as president, and adopted a \$10,500,000 budget.

The 1962 convention messengers—expected to number more than 5,000—will also make a decision on acceptance of a hospital.

Hospital Is Offered
They will vote on whether to accept the gift of a proposed new \$5,000,000 hospital in Amarillo offered by the Amarillo Area Foundation. The hospital gift has already been approved by the 192-member Texas Baptist Executive Board.

Other major business includes consideration of a \$14,876,807 budget for 1963, approval of a 1964 statewide evangelistic effort aimed at reaching Latin Americans, acceptance of the operation of the Mexican Baptist Bible Institute in San Antonio and Valley Baptist Academy in Harlingen and election of more than 300 trustees for 26 Baptist institutions.

Much of the convention will be devoted to inspirational messages featuring some of the top speakers in the Southern Baptist Convention, said Dr. James H. Landes of Wichita Falls, president of the BGCT.

The convention opens with addresses by Landes, Dr. H. Leo Eddleman, president of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, and Dr. Herschel H. Hobbs of Oklahoma City, president of the Southern Baptist convention.

Two Other Sessions
Dr. Eddleman will also speak during two other convention sessions — once Wednesday morning and again Thursday morning.

Rev. Vernon Elmore, pastor of Baptist Temple church in San Antonio, will deliver the annual convention sermon Wednesday morning.

The Wednesday evening session will feature an address by Dr. Robert Hingson, a Cleveland, Ohio, physician, who led a recent mass inoculation project in Liberia.

A special report on the 1963 Japan Baptist crusade will come Wednesday night.

It will be given by Dr. C. Wade Freeman, Texas Baptist evangelism director; Dr. K. Owen White of Houston, chairman of a special Japan crusade committee; Dr. T. A. Patterson, Texas Baptist executive secretary, and C. J. Humphrey, an Amarillo attorney.

Special music during the Wednesday night session will be sung by Negro spiritual soloist Ethel Waters, famed for her

version of the spiritual "His Eye Is On the Sparrow." Dick Baker of Dallas, evangelistic singer who has written several well-known hymns, will also have a part in the Wednesday night music program.

Male Choral Group
Convention music director, J. T. Adams of Sulphur Springs, and his male choral group "The Men of Texas" will also provide special music during the convention. Adams, minister of music for the First Baptist Church of Sulphur Springs, has written a song on the convention's theme, "God's Word for God's World" especially for the meeting.

The annual Texas Baptist press award will be presented Thursday morning to Louis Hamlett, long-time city editor of the Wichita Falls News-Record-Times. Hamlett will be honored for "outstanding contributions to Christianity in the field of journalism."

Principal speaker for the Thursday morning convention session will be the Rev. Carlos Paredes, pastor of the First Latin Baptist Church in Austin and president of the Mexican Baptist Convention of the BGCT.

Dr. E. S. James of Dallas, editor of the Baptist Standard, will deliver a message on the second coming of Christ, and Dr. William H. Crook, president of San Marcos Baptist Academy, will discuss "Christian Pasture in an Open World" during the Thursday afternoon convention session.

A special message, "Christians and the Threat of Communism," will be presented Thursday night by Ross Coggins of Nashville, associate in the Southern Baptist Christian Life Commission.

Other speakers for the three-day convention include Dr. Howard C. Bennett, president of East Texas Baptist College in Marshall; Rev. Brooks Wesley, pastor of Park Place Baptist Church in Houston, and Rev. James Riley, pastor of Second Baptist Church in Houston.

The convention will end Thursday night with an evangelistic and dedication service led by Dr. Baker James Cauthen of Richmond, Va., executive secretary-treasurer of the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board.

New Units 1963 Goal Of Drive

A goal of 400 new churches and missions in 1963 has been accepted by Texas Baptists as their portion of the Southern Baptist Convention's "30,000 Movement."

The "30,000 Movement," adopted by the SBC in 1956, aims for 30,000 new churches and missions by 1964, the year Baptists throughout North America celebrate 150 years of organized work on the continent.

Since the beginning of the effort, Texas Baptists have established 1,164 of the more than 15,750 new churches. So far this year, 222 new churches and missions have been started in Texas.

The plan calls for 10,000 churches and 20,000 missions, a mission being defined as "anywhere one or more members are sent from the local church or churches at regular intervals to preach or teach the word of God."

"Priorities for Texas Baptists," said Dr. Charles McLaughlin, director of the Baptist General Convention of Texas missions division, "should be in Wisconsin and Minnesota, mission areas for which the convention is organically responsible, and among the densely populated Latin American areas of the state."

"Only 20,000 of the 2,000,000 Latin American people of Texas are Baptists," he said.

1,200 GOAL Buildings Big Need For Future

Growing congregations will compel Texas Baptists to build 1,200 new church and mission buildings by 1975.

That's the prediction of the Texas Baptist Church Building Department.

Department Secretary Taylor Pendley heads a staff which also includes Dr. E. L. Clark, associate, and E. O. Hartwell, "pastor-builder."

The secretary and the associate spend a great deal of time in both office and field conferences helping churches find answers to such questions as "How Much Should We Spend?" "Where Shall We Build?" and "What Should We Build?"

The department also provides first unit plans and working drawings for new missions, makes available land loans for new missions, assists Latin American churches in obtaining loans and channels designated gifts on construction of new missions. These latter funds are obtained through the annual Mary Hill Davis offering for state missions.

Unique in the church building field is the function of a "pastor-builder," who lives in the field supervising construction of mission buildings and even serving as pastor until the buildings are completed.

Hartwell enlists volunteer labor from sponsoring churches, and is often able to save up to 25 per cent of the regular contract price of erecting a mission building.

Plainview Optimists Plan Flag Campaign

PLAINVIEW, Oct. 30 (AP)—The Optimist Club of Plainview has undertaken a project to make Plainview the "Flag Capital of the United States."

A campaign will open here Monday and continue through Nov. 10 when every home in Plainview will be called on to purchase a 3 by 5 foot American flag. The goal has been set for every home to be displaying the flag by Veterans Day, Nov. 11.

Congressman George Mahon, 19th District, presented the Optimist Club with a 5 by 8 foot flag which had been flown over the U. S. Capitol and commended the club on its efforts "to bring about a more extensive use of the flag, the emblem of our freedom, unity and strength." The flag was raised this week over the Optimist Club house.

\$500,000 To Be Spent By Baptists

Fort Worth's economy is expected to get a \$500,000 boost as a result of Texas Baptists coming to town for their annual state convention and the Brotherhood and Woman's Missionary Union conventions.

The average convention messenger will spend at least \$20 a day and will be in Fort Worth four days, Baptist leaders estimate.

Benefiting most from this economic upsurge will be hotels, motels and restaurants. However, at least half of the out-of-town Baptists will be women, which means dress shops, milliners and other retailers can expect to do their share of entertaining visitors.

The money individual Baptists will leave in Fort Worth is not all, however, said Texas Baptist Treasurer R. A. Springer of Dallas.

The four days of Baptist conventions will put money in the pockets of local contractors, and may mean jobs for extra personnel needed to help with staging and to keep the giant Will Rogers Memorial Coliseum in shape for the sessions.

Tarrant Baptist Association Backs Numerous Agencies

A non-profit day nursery for mothers of small incomes... literacy classes... recreation and training programs for more than 400 Negro boys and girls.

These are some of the activities sponsored by the Baptist Goodwill Center, an agency of the Tarrant Baptist Association.

The social work sponsored by the Southern Baptists of this county is led by Mrs. Robert Melton and her husband.

"We're only touching the hem of the garment—just scratching the surface," said Mrs. Melton, who also is on the social science faculty at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary.

Mrs. Melton uses many of her students at the seminary, plus many from Texas Christian University, Texas Wesleyan College and Arlington State College to help in the social science work which she began in 1945.

The activities are carried on at the center headquarters, a two-story brick structure at 915 E. Peach, and in various locations throughout Fort Worth.

Mrs. Melton's husband personally carries on a program of helping needy families to obtain food and clothing.

The Baptist Good Will Center is one of the little known projects of the Tarrant Baptist Association, an organization made up of 155 Southern Baptist churches and 14 missions.

Tarrant County Juvenile Probation Office and is led by a former Illinois resident, George W. Bain.

"County officials have told us we do \$80,000 worth of social work a year," said Bain.

Youngsters assigned to the Baptist group receive counseling from ministers and laymen and attend church services with them. "We try to work with the whole family," said Bain.

He mentioned the current case of three boys being handled under the juvenile program in which all members of the family have begun attending church services.

Such social activities are "applied Christianity" Bain said. "We are doing the things Christ did on earth. He was always ministering to the poor, to the sick, to the downtrodden, to the demoted."

The Tarrant Baptist Association, which has headquarters at

4825 West Freeway, is led by Bill Lucas, superintendent of missions; Rev. Elton E. Hinze, associate superintendent in charge of direct missions (which involves the social work) and Merle Basden, director of education.

Other staff workers include Dan Boling and Bill O'Brien, who direct activities at the Arlington State College Baptist Student Center; Mike Miller, Royal Ambassador director; Roy Ray, director of the TCU Baptist Student Center; Jim Sparks, Brantley-Draughon Business College BSU director; Miss Claire Abney, director of the BSU at Texas Wesleyan College; Mrs. Leon Wood, kindergarten teacher; Miss Evelyn Robinson, administrative secretary of the TBA; Miss Margie Johnson, missions and education secretary, and Mrs. Ernestine Killian, financial secretary.

Baptist Training Union Boosts Church Going on Sunday Night

There are lots of good television programs on Sunday night. But it isn't TV alone that has caused decreasing attendance at Sunday night church services, says Rev. Edward E. Laux, secretary of the Texas Baptist Training Union Department.

Too many times, he said, the churches themselves do not provide a challenging Sunday evening program that will hold the church members' interest.

Rev. Mr. Laux directs a program aimed at boosting Sunday evening attendance at Baptist churches and developing trained church leaders.

Enrollment in the Texas Baptist Training Union program has increased rather than declined since the advent of television, said Rev. Mr. Laux, with more than 480,000 now participating in the Sunday evening program.

The increase of 50,000 during the last 15 years can be largely attributed, said Rev. Mr. Laux, to improved programs and better leadership.

In order to help local church

leaders to improve their programs and train their leaders, the Texas Baptist Training Union Department sponsors and participates in briefing meetings, training and planning meetings, workshops, one-night clinics, enlargement campaigns, and week-long leadership schools for Training Union workers in Baptist associations.

The Training Union Department also sponsors a biannual state convention to teach improved methods to local and associational leaders.



Foundation Assets Rise 61 Per Cent

Baptist Foundation of Texas assets and earnings have increased more than 61 per cent in the last 10 years, according to the agencies annual report just released.

During the last year, \$1,941,450 was added in wills and trusts, bringing the total funds managed by the foundation to more than \$53,000,000, said Executive Secretary J. C. Cantrell.

Net earnings during the year reached a new high of \$2,231,757, an increase of \$158,845 over the previous year. The earnings are distributed four times a year to 36 Baptist causes served by the foundation.

The foundation was established in 1931 to administer gifts made by people who want their earthly possessions to live after them for Baptist institutions and agencies.

It has no assets of its own, and all income is distributed according to directions of individuals who created the funds.

Located in the Baptist Building in Dallas, the agency is headed by Cantrell. Before coming to the foundation seven years ago, he was in banking and insurance business and served six years as a county judge.

Foundation directors consist of 12 Baptist laymen who have established themselves in business and who are elected by the state convention. They receive no salary and take time out from their businesses to determine policies and give constant oversight to foundation investments and income.

President of the board is William Fleming, Fort Worth oil man and Baptist layworker, who has given millions of dollars to Baptist causes. He has served two terms as president of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

Other board members are Carr P. Collins, chairman of the board of Fidelity Union Life Insurance Company of Dallas; Ben Wooten, president of First National Bank of Dallas; Luman Holman, Jacksonville lumberman; A. E. Kerr, Houston oil and real estate leader; D. K. Martin, Waco real estate man; J. M. Waddell, Kermit rancher; Ross Sams, president of L. L. Sams and Company in Waco; W. A. Mays, Amarillo real estate man.

H. J. Blackwell, vice president of First National Bank of Dallas, serves as an advisory member of the investment committee and is assistant secretary-treasurer of the foundation.

Plant Starts Production Of Fertilizer

BIG SPRING, Oct. 29 (Sp) — An ammonia plant capable of supplying up to 70,000 tons of anhydrous ammonia fertilizer annually to farmers in West Texas and areas near by has been placed in production in Big Spring.

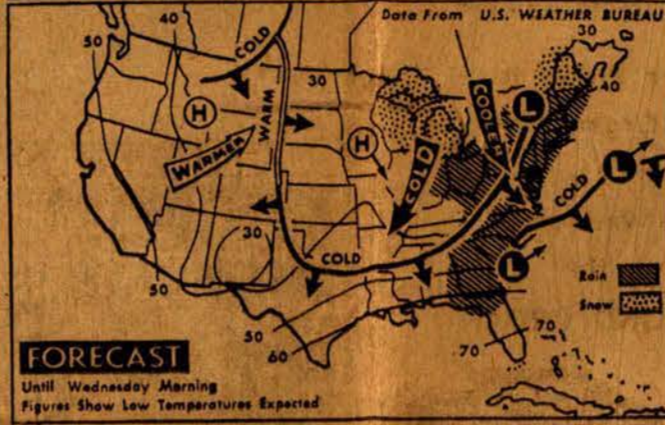
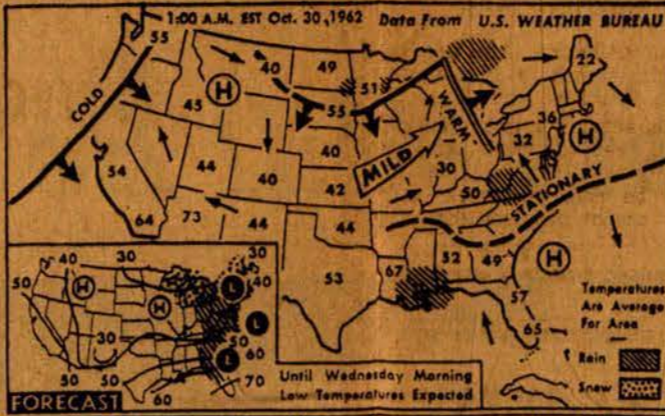
The plant was built for the nitrogen products division of W. R. Grace and Company. It is located adjacent to Cosden Petroleum Company, another Grace subsidiary.

Plant officials said the output of anhydrous ammonia will be sold in West Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Nebraska, Colorado and New Mexico for use in irrigated farming areas where grain sorghum, cotton, wheat and castor beans are produced.

Use of anhydrous ammonia is increasing rapidly in the intensive irrigated crop areas of Texas.

Christian Unity Goal Is Cited at Faith Festival

Bishop Leslie Newbigin of the Church of South India Monday night told a Festival of Faith audience of more than 7,500 in TCU's Daniel - Meyer Coliseum that Christian unity for all peoples is the goal of the ecumenical movement.

The British missionary, whose appearance at the ninth annual Festival of Faith here was sponsored by the Fort Worth Area Council of Churches, was instrumental in uniting Protestants to form the Church of South India there in 1947.

The minister told of his experiences during 32 years on the Indian mission front, recounting how a small colony of Christians in the Hindu nation were boycotted by landowners who traditionally employed them and their ancestors.

The Christians endured the hardships thrust upon them and did not waver from their faith, achieving respect, dignity and joy through worship of God although they were of lower caste, thus considered untouchable by the landowning class, he said.

"This was a turning point for Christianity in India when it happened 12 years ago," Bishop Newbigin said. "A new power, new spirit was abroad. People who traditionally had been no-

body had to be treated as somebody.

"God is the judge and king and savior of all men, not just part of them," he continued.

Methodist Bishop William C. Martin introduced the speaker, who is also an associate secretary for world missions and evangelism in the World Council of Churches, headquartered in Geneva, Switzerland.

Dr. Howard Sinner of Texas Wesleyan College directed the festival choir and the TCU Symphony orchestra of more than 100 members.

WMU Program Aids 100 Latin Americans

Nearly 100 outstanding Latin American students are attending Texas Baptist colleges this fall as a result of a scholarship program financed through the Mary Hill Davis offering of the Woman's Missionary Union.

The offering is one of three sponsored annually in Texas by the Woman's Missionary Union, in conjunction with special weeks of prayer. All three offering yield about \$3,000,000 for mission work annually.

More than \$278,000 was given for state missions through the Mary Hill Davis offering in 1961. The offering taken during the fall is named for an early Texas WMU president.

The 1961-1962 Texas Lottie Moon offering for foreign mission work topped \$2,249,000. Lottie Moon, the offering's originator, was a pioneer Baptist missionary to China from 1873-1912.

The other offering collected each spring for home missions is named in honor of Annie Armstrong, the first Southern Baptist WMU secretary. Texas Baptist poured more than \$335,312 into this offering in 1962.

Stewardship is but one phase of the Texas Baptist WMU, auxiliary to the Baptist General Convention of Texas. The organization also functions through prayer, study and witnessing. "It is dedicated to stimulating a missionary spirit and promoting stewardship for missions," said Executive Secretary Treasurer Eula Mae Henderson who co-ordinates the state WMU work.

Directing the work for young women and girls are three full-time workers, including Miss Mary Jane Nethery, Young Woman's Auxiliary; Miss Joy Phillips, Girls' Auxiliary; and Miss Joyce Gill, Sunbeams. State WMU president is Mrs.

Bert Black of Crosbyton. Principal meetings are the annual WMU Convention and the WMU House Party which was conducted this year in Waco with more than 2,500 women attending the conferences and inspirational sessions.

In addition, YWA House Parties are held each spring at Mary Hardin-Baylor College, Belton; Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene; and some other site chosen annually.

Girls' Auxiliary Queens' Courts are usually conducted annually at two or three Texas Baptist college campuses. However, the highlight of 1962 was a GA Galuxy which drew more than 6,000 young girls to San

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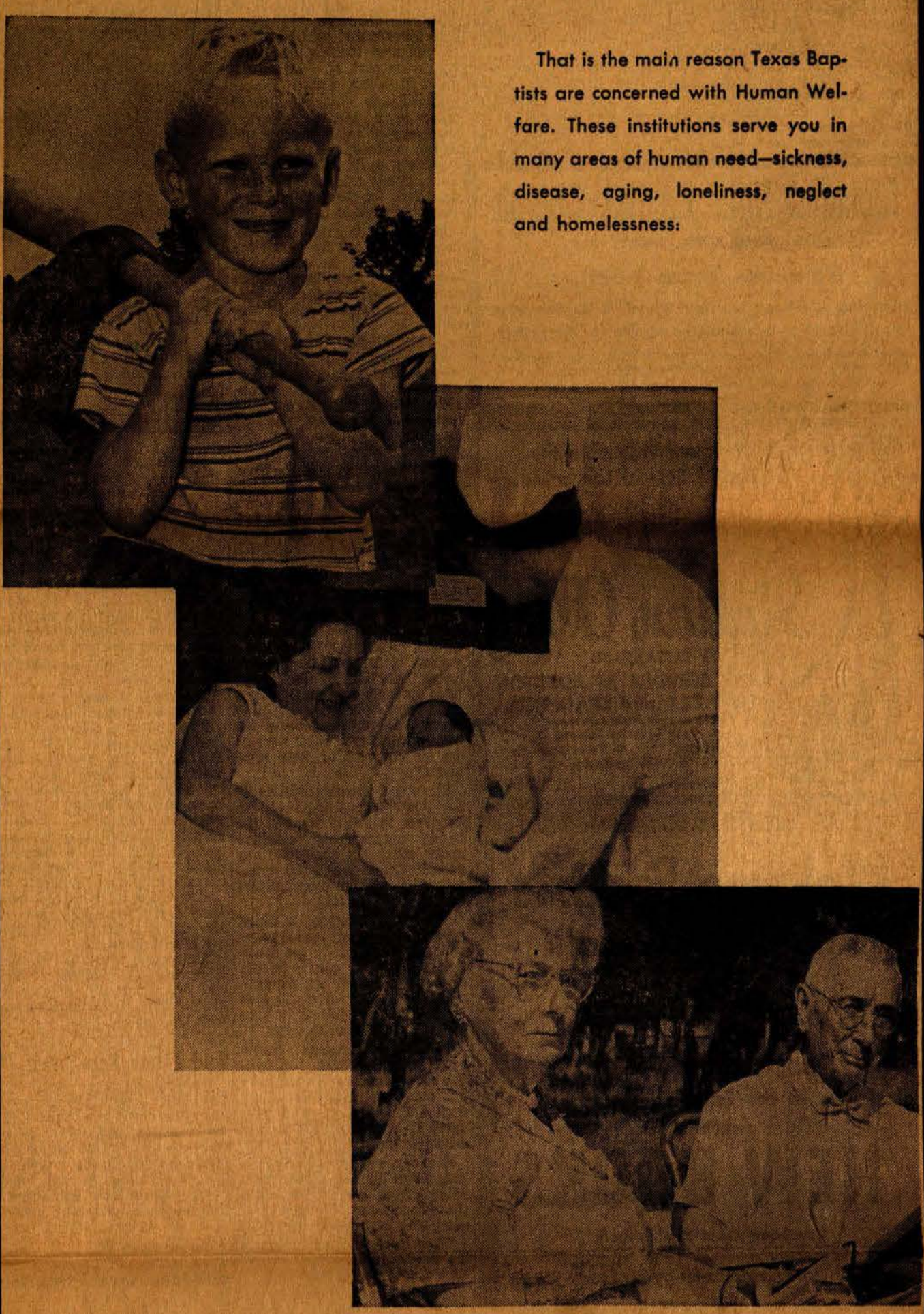

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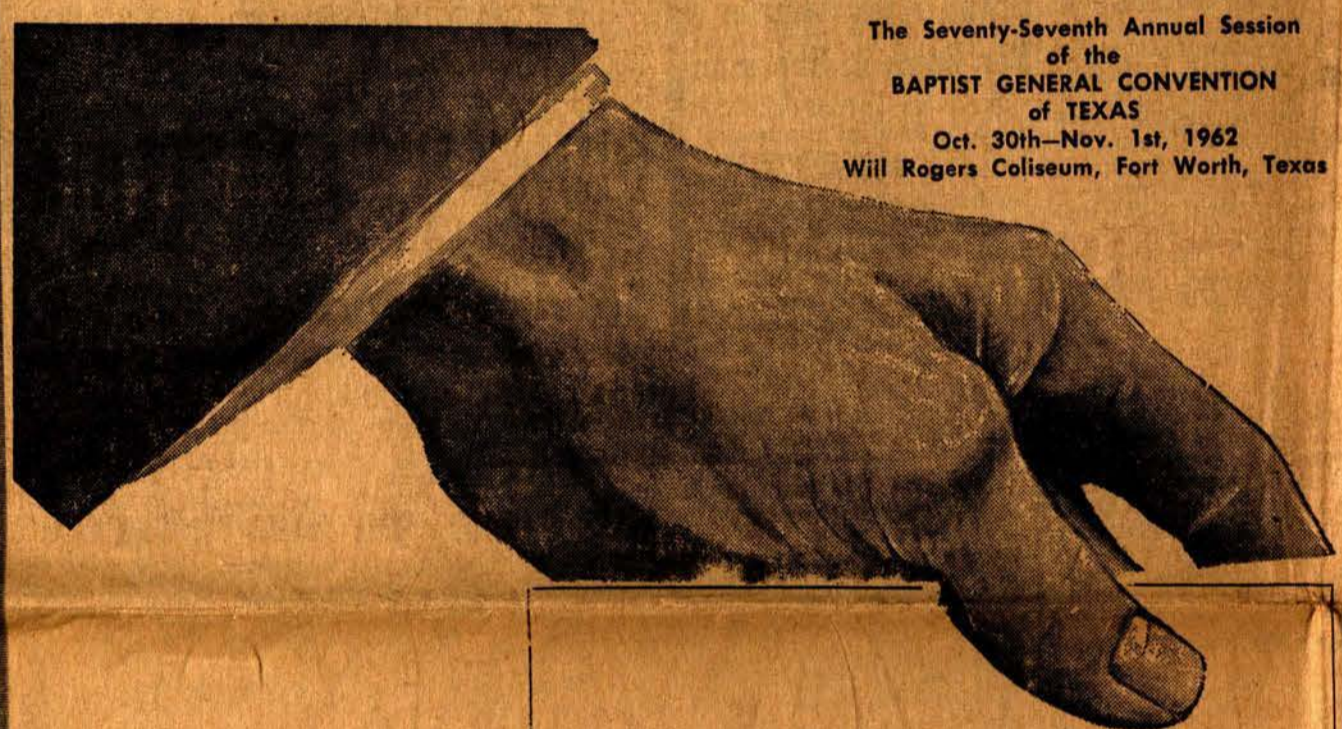

GOP Played Key Role, Ike Says of JFK's Cuban Stand

 SYRACUSE, N. Y., Oct. 30 (AP)—Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower says Republicans had a major role in giving the United States the armed strength that enabled it to take a strong stand against Russia in the Cuba crisis.

Eisenhower also told 10,000 cheering Republicans at a dinner-rally Monday night that GOP leaders had helped spur President Kennedy to forceful action.

Although tensions are now eased, the Republican leader said, "We have no reason to relax" and the Soviet threat "we will bury you" still stands.

Republican Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller, seeking re-election shared the platform at the Syracuse War Memorial Auditorium with Eisenhower, who has been campaigning through the country in support of GOP candidates in recent weeks.

Eisenhower endorsed Rockefeller as a man of integrity, sharpness of mind, energy and moral courage. The former President made no mention of Rockefeller's role as a potential candidate for the GOP nomination for President in 1964.

In addition to giving Republicans much credit for laying the groundwork for Kennedy's Cuban policy, Eisenhower again sharply attacked domestic policies of the Kennedy administration.

He hit at Edward M. Kennedy, the President's youngest brother who is Democratic candidate for the U. S. Senate for Massachusetts. Edward Kennedy is implying he has "free entry through all doors in Washington," the former President said.

Eisenhower's 21-minute speech, interrupted 17 times by applause, appeared to be designed to crack down Democratic efforts to monopolize credit for the Cuban developments and reap any political rewards involved.

The former President had these comments:

"Through eight years of a Republican (Eisenhower) administration, Americans ceaselessly worked to transform their armed forces from World War II patterns into an effective, modern instrument of defense . . . The present military readiness of the nation would not exist were it not for the work of those eight years."

"It was a recommendation of the Republican leaders of the Congress that first inspired the joint congressional resolution under which the President was able to act in this latest crisis forcefully and with congressional approval of his acts."

"So our Commander in Chief, sure of his ready military strength, fortified by the tradition of American unity in foreign crises, proclaimed our determination . . . Thereafter, the men in the Kremlin seemed to have some sober, second thoughts."

On the domestic scene, Eisenhower said that "The far frontier spokesmen have talked more and done less than even their most severe critics would have dared to predict" in the area of economic growth.

Kennedy was particularly critical, during his 1960 election campaign, of the manner in which the Eisenhower administration dealt with economic problems.

Eisenhower did not mention the President by name at any time during his speech.

The former President received a two-minute standing ovation when he arrived. He did not attend the dinner, but timed his arrival for his scheduled appearance on a live, local television broadcast.

Eisenhower left the auditorium immediately after his speech to 1,700 persons who had contributed \$100 each to the Onondaga County Republican Committee treasury for a dinner and more than 8,000 spectators who filled the galleries of the auditorium.

The former President was flown to and from an airport near his Gettysburg, Pa., home aboard Rockefeller's private plane.

Rockefeller returned to New York City. The governor will end his upstate campaign Tuesday at rallies in Troy and Schenectady.

In the spring of 1963, Texas Baptists will help conduct the nationwide evangelistic crusade in Japan, where more than ninety-three million people "have never had a personal experience with God through Jesus Christ," Dr. Patterson said.

In 1964, if the executive secretary's plans are carried out, a statewide evangelistic crusade will be scheduled, aimed at reaching more than 2,500,000 Latin Americans in Texas with the Gospel message.

His plans are aimed at vast numbers of people, but Patterson strives constantly never to lose sight of the importance of the individual.

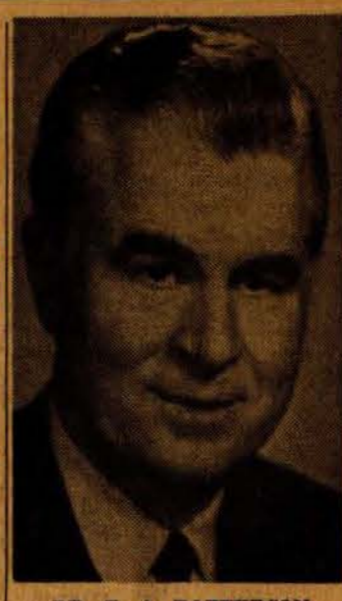
A 21-year-old Arabian boy will testify to that fact.

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in Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary here.

Reiko first met the Pattersons when she served as their interpreter during the Pattersons' first visit to Japan in 1959. Like David, she plans to return to her homeland to be a missionary.

During their 1959 visit to the Orient, the Pattersons again demonstrated their concern. In a dark corner of a dirty Korean hut, the Pattersons found six Korean children on the verge of starvation. They had been abandoned by their mother and left to die.

The Pattersons carried the children to a hospital in Seoul and placed them with an adoption agency.

Dr. Patterson, then pastor of First Baptist Church of Beaumont, influenced several families in his congregation to adopt the Korean babies.

During his 35 years as a minister, he has held pastorates in Roscoe, Hollis, Okla., Colorado City, Dallas and Beaumont, and was from 1937-1939 pastor of Evans Avenue Baptist Church in Fort Worth.

The entire Patterson family is involved in the ministry. Paige, the Pattersons' 20-year-old son, is a student at Hardin-Simmons where he is studying for the ministry. An ordained minister since he was 17, Paige has led revivals not only in Texas, but also in the Far East.

The Pattersons' daughter, Dorris Dawn, is the wife of Rev. Kenneth Aull, pastor of First Baptist Church at Mabank.

Bridge Deaths Jury Selection In Second Day

Examination of prospective jurors in a damage suit resulting from an accident which killed three Arlington girls and injured three others when their car plunged off a burned-out bridge was to get underway again Tuesday in 48th District Court.

Attorneys tried all day Monday to get a jury for the \$421,211.25 suit brought against the Rock Island Lines by two of the injured girls and parents of two of the dead girls.

60,000 THIS YEAR

Winning Converts Baptists' Concern

Southern Baptists always have been marked by their emphasis on winning converts to Christianity.

A prediction released by evangelism leaders indicates that between 60,000 and 65,000 converts will be baptized this year.

Dr. C. Wade Freeman, director of the evangelism division for the Baptist General Convention of Texas, said the denomination has baptized about 1,000,000 persons since 1947.

Purpose of the division is to provide an organized leadership for carrying the Gospel to every person in Texas.

This includes Latin Americans.

In co-operation with the Baptist Language Missions Department, Rev. Rudy Hernandez, an associate, participates in local church revivals in the more than 400 Latin American congregations in the state and organizes and directs simultaneous and citywide revivals.

Hernandez will lead in the 1964 major attempt to reach the unsaved Latin American for Christ.

Dr. Cecil Sherman, the newest member of the staff is charged with the associational evangelism clinics involving 123 associations, plus college campus evangelism.

Working with districts and as-

sociations, the evangelism division emphasizes three types of evangelism outlined in the New Testament — personal, church-directed and mass or revival evangelism.

In addition to Dr. Freeman, there are four staff members assigned to specific phases of work. Evangelism men also conduct about 50 revivals annually.

Bob Randall is charged with personal evangelism which involves the New Testament pattern of selecting, training and directing teams of witnesses to proclaim Christ's love to the lost. Soul winning schools are conducted in individual churches, on a citywide basis and in encampments.

Twenty five hundred churches are expected to participate in a statewide personal evangelism revival Jan. 20 through Feb. 3.

Heading the revival evangelism emphasis toward a spiritual awakening in Texas Baptist churches is Dr. O. Bryon Richardson.

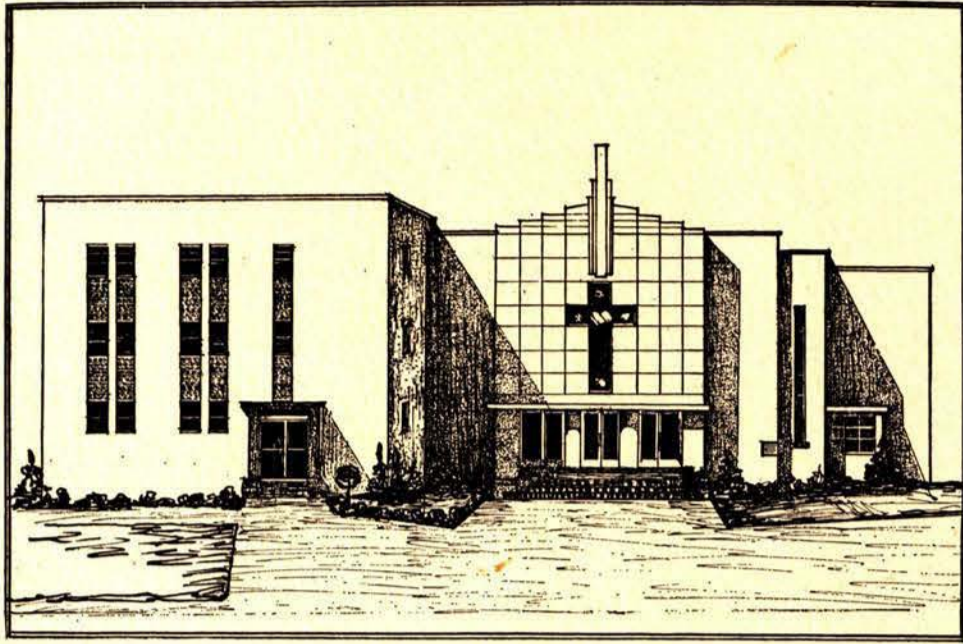

Foster Home Need Response Is Termed "Above Average"

A heartening response has been received to last week's Challenge article telling of the need for foster homes for school age children, according to George Bain, Tarrant Baptist Association, Family Services Director.

"Several families," says Mr. Bain, "have already indicated interest and inquired as to steps necessary to furnish foster home care, but many more are needed."

Specific information is available from Mr. Bain who may be reached in the associational office.

Some standards set up by Buckner Benevolences and by state officials include:

Foster parents must be faithful in their church attendance.

Foster parents must be capable of giving of the love that is so essential in the lives of children who have been deprived of it.

Foster parents receive \$50.00 per month per child. Medical and clothing needs are met by Buckner.

Foster homes must be approved and licensed by the State of Texas.

Tarrant County caseworker for Buckner makes periodic visits in the foster home. He is available for consultation at all times.

Foster parents are not prospective adoptive parents. Most children in foster homes are not available for adoption.

Foster home placement may be for a short period of time or it may be a long-term placement.

Tarrant Baptist Association and individuals are seeking to provide housing for youth groups during the State Youth Conference, June 27-30, 1965.

The program is being coordinated by the Youth Evangelism Committee, headed by Rev. Elton Hinz, Moderator of the conference.

Groups are being sought in the following areas: Dallas, Fort Worth, Tarrant County, and surrounding areas.

Groups are attempting to line up reservations for housing for matching incoming groups with churches that will pledge to care for that specific number," said Rev. Hinz.

Incoming church groups will be aligned with local Baptist churches, given their assignments before their arrival and detailed instructions on when and where to meet the local church group.

Incoming groups will be asked to meet at the host church for their housing assignment.

60 YEARS AT A GLANCE

It was in the fall of 1912, September 24, that the Mother Church of the Arlington Heights Baptist Church was founded and organized. It was named "Trinity Park Missionary Baptist Church", with 67 charter members. First services were held under a tent at the corner of West 7th and Curry Streets.

In the year 1913, September 25-26, at the 27th Annual Session of Tarrant Association held with Broadway Baptist Church, petitionary letter from Trinity Park Church was read by the clerk, and messengers Lon Garrett (Pastor), Joe Frankes, Mmes. John Graves, May Burchet and Hightower welcomed and seated by the moderator on behalf of the association.

A look at the records indicates that at the end of the first year, the membership had increased to 107. From the very beginning, this dedicated group was strongly mission-minded, contributing liberally of its means to all phases of missions. The pastor's salary was \$600 for the first year.

During the first decade (1913-1923), under the leadership of Pastors Lon Garrett, L. D. Reeves, J. B. Ward, H. A. Dana (Interim Pastor), L. Carlson and H. A. Ball, the membership grew to 207 (164 baptisms); total gifts, \$20,228.43; Sunday School officers and teachers, 38; pupils, 175, with an average attendance of 150. There were four Church Clerks: J. W. Burchet, George Morgan, Mrs. Iva Swann, Miss Nena White. There were three Sunday School superintendents: B. F. Hill, J. W. Burchet and W. O. Dinkins. WMS efforts were led by Mmes. Ward, White, Chantey, Simpson, Ratcliff and Hobbs, with total gifts of \$140. B.Y.P.U. was established in 1916, and progressed under the leadership of Presidents Lillian White, George Morgan, Marvin Tuttleton, Vernon G. Miles, and Grace Hampton (now Mrs. Grace Faubion), with total gifts of \$228.

In 1919, the name of the church was changed to "Soldiers Memorial Church," in honor of the many soldiers of

Camp Bowie in its fellowship. During this period, the church purchased property and a building on Mattison Street, near Montgomery, at a cost of \$3,500. By 1923, however, the value of the property was \$20,000.

During the next decade, which includes the long-to-be-remembered "depression" years, under the leadership of Pastors H. A. Ball, Woodie Smith and Dr. T. E. Durham, the membership grew to 319 (baptisms, 250). Total gifts to missions and local work were \$49,289.70. Miss Nena White served as Church Clerk during the entire period. Sunday School Superintendents were Marvin Tuttleton, J. P. Spearman and J. S. Boggs. There were 36 teachers and officers; 173 pupils, with an average attendance of 115. WMS Presidents Ratcliff, Spearman, Swann, Jenkins, Meserole and Morgan saw considerable growth in mission gifts, including Lottie Moon offering.

It was in 1926 that the church purchased its present property and changed its name to "Baptist Temple," but the name of Baptist Temple was confusing to many, so in 1935, the church adopted the present name to be retained for all time.

During the next 29 years, Dr. T. E. Durham continued to guide the destinies of Arlington Heights Baptist Church except for a 20-month period in 1943 and 1944 when he was pastor of a church in North Carolina. Rev. Chester Mason and Interim Pastor Fred Jones filled the pulpit during his absence for these 20 months. He returned to Fort Worth and Arlington Heights Baptist Church in December, 1944. The church grew under his leadership and by 1949 had passed another important milestone of progress -- it had moved from the old frame structure at 3720 Camp Bowie, which was formerly used by the YMCA to serve the soldiers in Camp Bowie during World War I, into the present modern, air-conditioned brick auditorium at the same address. The old frame structures were moved to the rear of the property and were utilized for religious educational school purposes until the present modern brick educational building was erected in 1960. As a small token of its love and esteem for them, in 1958, the church built and presented to Dr. and Mrs. T. E. Durham a beautiful home at 3735 Clarke Avenue. It is to be theirs as long as they live (either or both of them), and then revert back to the church. This brought the total value of the church property to \$450,000.

Early in 1962, Dr. Durham asked to be relieved of his duties as pastor. At the time his resignation was accepted, he was made Pastor Emeritus and was asked to be Interim Pastor until such time as a pastor could be secured. He served in this capacity until June 10, at which time the church called Rev. Alvin A. Loiry to be its leader.

The past years have seen our community change from residential to a near inner-city situation. Our church has been able to help others through increased mission gifts. Gifts to missions increased from \$3,726.00 in 1962 to \$9,654.00 in 1971.

Alvin A. Loiry served from June, 1962, to March, 1969. During that time the second floor of the main building was converted to a chapel made possible by the gift of Mrs. Barbara Wheeler Johnson. The chapel was named The Wheeler Memorial Chapel in memory of her father. At the same time she presented an Allen organ for the sanctuary. Bro. Loiry led in our sponsoring the LaLoma Mission, a Latin-American congregation on the northside. We sponsored LaLoma from September, 1964, to September, 1967. The parsonage which had been next to the church was sold and the lot was converted to a parking lot. A parsonage located at 3905 Lenox was purchased in 1968. Brother Loiry is now association missionary of Alto Frio Association.

J. Walter Axtell served from December, 1969, to January, 1971. During this time the sanctuary was remodeled. Completion of this project which included a new ceiling, arches, paneling and carpeting was accomplished in November, 1970. Brother Axtell now is pastor of the Calvary Baptist Church, DeSoto, Texas.

Paul H. Leber began service at the church on May 28, 1972. May we catch a new vision of the field of service that awaits us in the Arlington Heights section of Fort Worth.

May God bless The Church on its' anniversary day in particular and may He continue to provide you with a "fertile field" for the winning of lost people to his glory.

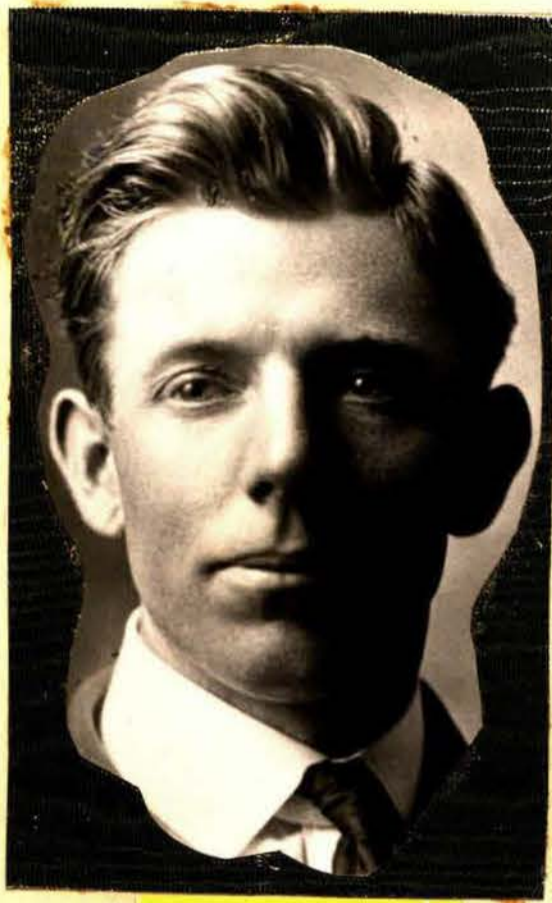

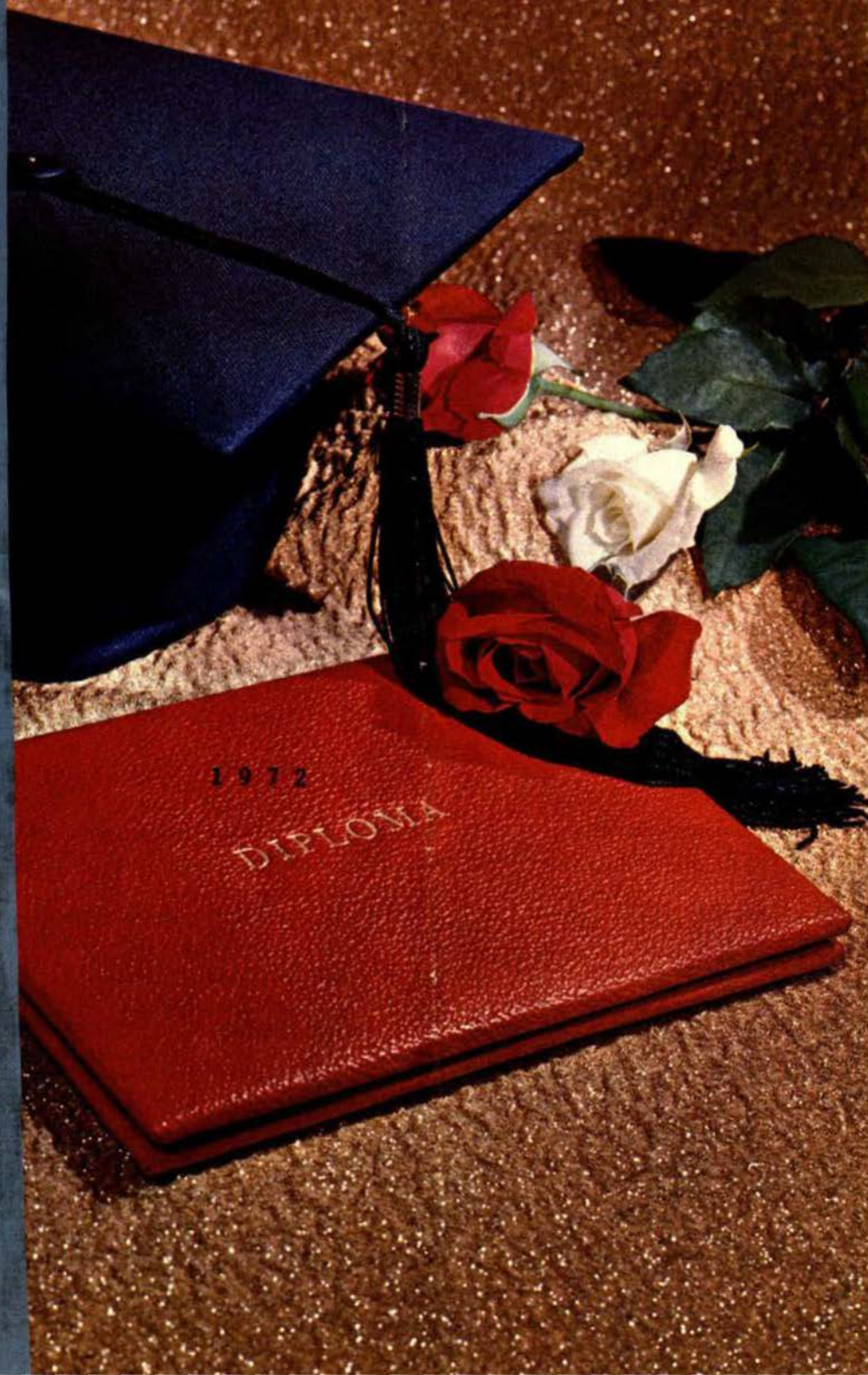
Our church operates on the basis that all of its members care enough to support its task. When only a few care, the church's work is hindered; yet when most church members care, then it will be used of our Lord.

Superintendent of Missions



Tarrant Baptist Association was organized in 1886 with 12 churches and 1302 members. In 1972 there are 164 churches and missions and over 132,000 church members.

ADMINISTRATION

The following written reports are from the Tarrant Baptist Association committees charged by the association with certain areas of responsibility.

The reports are not a detailed account of every task performed but serve as an outline to point in the general direction of the committee ministry.

These reports are printed primarily to save time in the two session Annual Meeting.

Association Loan Fund

The Association Loan Committee is responsible for all loans that come from the Tarrant Baptist Association churches requesting a loan from the special loan fund known as the Tarrant Baptist Association Loan Fund.

This special loan fund was set up in 1951 to be used for the churches for building, repairing or any emergency financing. With an interest rate of 4%, loans can be made up to \$1,500.00 for three years.

During the 1971-72 association year four churches were granted loans totaling \$5,500.00.

There are ten churches with current loans, with an amount of \$8,239.04 owed on these loans. At the close of September 30, 1972 there was a balance of \$2,622.29 in the loan fund checking account and \$9,500.00 in a savings account drawing interest.

Building and Equipment

The Tarrant Baptist Association office building, located at 4825 West Freeway, was completed in August 1960, with a total area of 4775 square feet, including storage rooms.

Maintenance of the building is contracted by a commercial maintenance company, and the Building and Equipment committee is responsible for the maintenance, replacement and improvements of the building and equipment.

This association year the carpet in the Superintendent of Mission's office, conference room and administration secretary's office was replaced. A floodlight to replace the one that was stolen was placed at the front of the building. Insurance to cover vandalism and theft was added to the building insurance.

Christian Life Committee Report

Lloyd Elder, chairman, attended an orientation meeting in November; the committee met later to discuss its work for the year.

In October, members of the committee joined others in successfully resisting the amending of City Zoning Ordinance of "E" Commercial to allow permits to sell mixed drinks.

In November, the committee expressed its understanding of the time-honored constitutional guarantee of freedom of religion by distributing a sermon by James G. Harris on "The Prayer Amendment." Pastors were urged to be in touch with their congressmen about the dangers of this ill-phrased amendment.

In January, a voter registration appeal was made through the pastors and Challenge. In February, the committee cooperated with the Christian Life Commission of the Baptist General Convention of Texas in its Annual Workshop at Southwestern Seminary and Gambrell Street Baptist Church. The areas of major concern were: drugs, race, family, religious liberty and citizenship.

In March and April, a report was made to the Executive Board concerning liquor and parochial aid bills before the State Legislature.

In August, the committee sponsored a Family Education Seminar at the Pastors' Conference. Dr. Charles Petty was the guest, highlighting areas where pastors could profitably lead family workshops in the local churches. In October and early November, a "Get-Out-the-Vote" emphasis is anticipated. Other associational programs are also anticipated in the approaching months.

Christian Literature

The Christian Literature committee made a general study of the weekly association publication, The Challenge with suggestions to include not only news of association promotions but to broaden the contents to include news of Tarrant Baptist church programs and ideas.

A continued effort was made in encouraging the Baptist Standard to be used as a part of the local Baptist church news and to set as a goal that every Baptist family in Tarrant Baptist Association receive a copy from their church each week.

Evangelism

The Evangelism Committee for the year 1971-72 were involved in the following activities:

1. Shared in making preparation for and serving as hosts to the Texas Baptist Evangelism Conference which was held in Tarrant County Convention Center, January 10-12, 1972. The conference had as its theme "God's Priorities in Evangelism." It was a most successful conference.
2. In conjunction with the conference some other important meetings were held.
 - a. The General Evangelists held their meeting in Broadway Baptist Church.
 - b. The Collegiate Dialogue which was designed to reach college students was held in the Fellowship Hall of the Broadway Baptist Church.
 - c. A meeting of our Latin-American leadership was conducted in First Mexican Baptist Church under the leadership of Carlos Parédes.
3. We cooperated with Campus Crusade for Christ in preparation for "Explo '72."

Encampment

The Tarrant Baptist Association Encampment, begun in 1967 on 140 acres of property near Glen Rose, Texas, part of which was given by Mr. J. T. Stevens, is in full operation with total investment of over \$750,000.00. Debt on the property is \$150,500.00 and is being paid for out of the regular association budget at \$35,916.00 per year.

The encampment operates directly under the control of the Tarrant Baptist Association executive board. The encampment committee gives guidance and advice concerning operation and capital improvements. Jack Mills is the Camp Manager.

During the past association year, the following building projects were undertaken:

1. Four additional leadership motel units were completed, bringing the total to twelve.
2. In May, the tabernacle/auditorium was started; completion to be before June, 1973.
3. The grounds were landscaped and all buildings repaired and renovated.

All capital improvements come from the regular voluntary gifts for the capital improvement fund from Tarrant Baptist churches. During the past year, these gifts totaled \$35,127.53.

Operational costs are subsidized out of the association budget, \$20,000.00 per year, and from fees and charges from those who use the encampment.

On the list of critical needs are two additional dormitories; the second cafeteria line unit; and the second disposal plant.

Results from the camps and retreats held this past year show 13,184 registered; 396 professions of faith; 908 rededications; and 310 for special service.

Finance

The Association Finance Committee is charged with the responsibility of the preparation and promotion of the annual association budget. Serving under the authority of the Tarrant Baptist Association Executive Board, this committee promotes the program of financial participation by the churches, using the following aims:

1. Giving regularly each month by the churches to Association Missions.
2. Giving 3% of undesignated receipts to the Association Missions Program.

The committee, also, reports to the executive board by a monthly report and a quarterly comparative report. There is a semi-annual audit report and new pastors are informed of the association finance program by correspondence and a luncheon meeting.

This committee is also responsible for both the continued growth of the Tarrant Baptist Encampment at Glen Rose, Texas, and the general budget and accounting of all funds for the encampment.

Insurance

The Insurance Committee is very much interested in our Tarrant Baptist Association Group Plan for our pastors and staff members. Our insurance coverage includes hospitalization, life insurance, long term disability, retirement and other extended benefits. Our coverage is through the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

The committee is aware of the present prohibitive cost of your insurance coverage, in particular, hospitalization. We are doing our best to stay abreast of plans of the Annuity Board to ease the burden of the high cost. But, as all of you know, there are great changes going on in insurance today.

We, as a committee, pledge our dedication in your interest as we work through our association with our Annuity Board.

There is a chance of some changes in the near future in our favor. In the meantime, we urge each and every one to stay in the program if you possibly can. We all need the coverage for our families.

Personnel

The Personnel Committee has the responsibility in matters of job descriptions and analysis, benefits, and general planning for the Tarrant Baptist Association staff.

A re-examination of all benefits, holidays, vacation time, sick-leave, and general lines of responsibility was made by the committee and found to be satisfactory.

Petitionary Letters and Credentials

The Petitionary Letters and Credentials Committee considered the petition of one church for membership in Tarrant Baptist Association.

Using Articles II and III of the Tarrant Baptist Association Constitution as a basis for membership, the committee contacted the pastor of the petitioning church, wrote the pastor of an adjacent church, and held a meeting to thoroughly examine and consult with the petitioning church.

The committee recommends that Pleasantview Baptist Church, Crowley be granted membership in Tarrant Baptist Association.

Stewardship and Cooperative Program

Because we believe that the proclamation of the Gospel throughout the world is the concern of every local church, a Stewardship Committee functions to encourage the churches of our association to be faithful in the support of world and associational missions. We strongly encourage our churches to increase their giving through the Cooperative Program because we believe the Great Commission to be a

mandate which requires cooperative effort.

Every new pastor coming into the association has received a letter of welcome from the chairman of the committee. The letter stated the amount of support his church had given through the Cooperative Program. He was urged to lead his church in a growing support for all mission endeavors. He was told that the association suggests that each church give 3% of its regular offerings to associational missions and an additional 1% to the support of the Tarrant Baptist Encampment.

A recent trend in Cooperative Program giving is of such major concern that it needs the prayerful concern and attention of all Texas Baptists. This trend is a decline in the percentage of church income (state wide averages) being given through the Cooperative Program. The record shows:

1967-----	10.5%
1968-----	9.9%
1969-----	9.7%
1970-----	9.5%
1971-----	9.1%

The amount of money given during these years has increased, but tragically not as fast as inflation has robbed from the Cooperative Program. As a result, in 1971, Baptists were able to support \$120,000 less than in 1967.

A Stewardship Conference was held on May 9 at Birchman Avenue Baptist Church. Dr. Cecil Ray reviewed the stewardship materials available and led in a discussion period. Dr. Charles McLaughlin delivered an inspirational message which climaxed an altogether profitable meeting. A standing duty of the Stewardship Committee is to be prepared to counsel with church stewardship chairmen of our association concerning their stewardship programs. Our churches are urged to call on this committee if help is needed.

Direct Missions

The Association's Direct Missions Ministries are designed to give assistance in areas of work which are more effectively accomplished by cooperative action than through the efforts of single churches working alone.

These ministries include such programs as church extension, christian social ministries, ministries to minority groups, church development, and disaster relief.

A new area of work called Inner City Ministries was developed during the 1971-72 associational year and began with the new associational year. It will be responsible in three areas, (1) working with the Rescue Mission and Central; (2) developing new ministries needed in the downtown Fort Worth area; and (3) working with struggling churches in the inner city areas to develop new outreach programs.

Other ministries aided, in addition to those listed in the following committee reports, include Crusaders Chapel, (a mission for the physically handicapped); and the Ft. Worth Indian Mission.

Extension and Survey

Steps were taken to begin a new church at the site purchased in South Arlington last year. One meeting has been held (on Sept. 17, 1972) and others are planned with regular services scheduled to begin in a nearby school building on Nov. 5, 1972.

Plans are being developed for construction of a building with \$100,000.00 to be donated by an Arlington builder.

The committee is endeavoring to purchase sites in Grapevine, between Watauga and Smithfield, and in the area between Arlington and Kennedale.

Church Development Program

The Church Development Program of Southern Baptists is sponsored jointly by the Missions Support Section of the BGCT and the Church Administration Department of the Sunday School Board.

There was very little activity in the program during this year with no Tarrant churches participating.

Disaster Relief

Texas Baptists' Disaster Relief Mobil Unit, named by a team of trained workers was active in meeting emergencies of persons living in the Seguin area following disastrous flash floods on the Guadalupe River in 1972.

Plans are progressing in cooperation with the statewide BGCT Committee preparations made to meet emergency needs resulting from natural disasters locally, or to aid in other sections of the state where such disasters might occur.

Baptist Family Services

This program includes four major areas of work, Youth Services, Buckner Benevolences, Community Services, and Family Counseling.

Community Resources
Provided needed resource information to Tarrant Baptist Pastors; secured food, rent, furniture, etc. for needy families; worked with other agencies cooperatively on many cases.

At the request of county officials, we furnish chaplaincy services to the County Juvenile Detention Center. Mr. Lynn Clark, a Home Mission Board Intern, student at Southwestern Seminary has served in the capacity during the year.

Four Seminary students are assigned to the Family Services program for their field work training.

Institutional Services

Regular Jail and Hospital Ministries are conducted under the direction of Rev. Bobby Cox. He serves as Chaplain for the Tarrant County Jail at the request of county authorities.

Jail Ministries

Twenty-eight County Jail inmates made professions of faith during the year. Regular Sunday School services are held each Sunday morning by twenty-six volunteer workers representing nine denominations.

Approximately 2,600 working hours were given by these twenty-six persons in preparation, training, and participation in this worship program.

Average participation of inmates in the worship program for the year was about 38% of the jail population. Approximately 2,800 different inmates participated.

A new program of helping persons serving probated sentences was begun on Feb. 1, 1972.

Names of such persons along with information regarding them is made available to Chaplain Cox for referral to the churches. Of 645 persons placed on probation by Sept. 1, 1972, 497 have been referred to pastors of local churches, 267 of these to pastors of Tarrant Baptist churches.

Hospital Ministries

Baptists from outside Tarrant County coming to local hospitals are ministered to through this program, with information regarding them being sent to their churches.

During the year, an average of twenty-four persons per month were visited. Pastors as well as trained lay people are utilized in this program.

Central Mission

During the 1971 - 1972 church year, Central Baptist Mission continued to seek ways to minister to the people in the downtown area.

In the Mission, a major emphasis is given to the worship and Bible study programs. These programs are an excellent way of training the college age volunteers that make up the staff. At present there are five of these volunteers from the Sagamore Hill Church taking part in the missions activities.

Week-day ministries have been directed largely to children, and have included a weekly fun club conducted by Baptist Student Union members. A total of forty children attended summer camps with Sagamore Hill.

The Central Mission Committee of the Association has worked in active cooperation with the Rescue Mission Committee in organizing the new Inner City Ministries Program.

During the year, the average Sunday School attendance was 50 and there were fifteen baptisms. Present membership, not counting volunteer teachers, is 79 people.

At the time of this report, the mission is without a pastor. William D. Swank, pastor for the past four years, has resigned to accept the directorship of the Inner City Ministries Program. Sagamore Hill and the Central Mission Committee are now seeking a new pastor. Central will remain jointly sponsored by Sagamore and the Association in the future, and will be closely tied to the Inner City Program.

Baptist Good Will Center

The Baptist Good Will Center is operated jointly by the Tarrant Baptist Association and the Tarrant Baptist Association Woman's Missionary Union, with Travis Avenue Baptist Church sponsoring the mission. It seeks to cross economic, racial and religious barriers to reach people for Christ through week-day club programs, benevolent and mission activities.

The greatest asset to the program of the Center has been the increased number of volunteer workers from the churches of the Association serving regularly in every area of the Center's ministry.

Adult clubs and educational programs continued to grow and a typing class was added.

A new freezer was purchased when the old one wore out, and a special gift provided a new refrigerator to match the freezer.

The children's equipment and most of the rooms have been painted by volunteer workers. All of the screen doors have been repaired and hardware cloth added for reinforcement in places of strain.

Derrel Watkins served as Pastor-Director of the Center until August 31, 1972.

On September 13, 1972 the Baptist Good Will Center Board asked Larue Farrar to serve as director of the Center.

EDUCATION

The association's education ministry is designed to provide aid for the churches in developing and maintaining strong educational organizations. This ministry includes offering guidance in the beginning of new work and counsel in the strengthening of existing work. The following reports reflect some of the activities conducted by the volunteer workers in the various organizations. Without their sharing of their time and abilities, it would be impossible to provide such a wide range of activities to help the churches.

Sunday School

Many of our pastors and Sunday School leaders have begun turning their attention toward renewed efforts of outreach through the Sunday School. A number of churches have been setting goals for growth, others are using Vacation Bible School as an outreach tool, while a number have begun bus outreach programs. This could set the pattern for a new surge of evangelistic results.

The highlights of this past year include the following:

Bible Study Week - Approximately 1,000 study course awards were requested for the January Bible Study book, Job, which was promoted this year.

Associational Training Banquet - Dr. Carl Bates, President of the Southern Baptist Convention, spoke for the 21st Annual Training-Outreach Banquet. Trinity Baptist Church received the top training association award and was also recognized for leading the Southern Baptist Convention in earned study course credit. Travis Avenue Baptist Church received an award for showing greatest numerical increase in average Sunday School attendance, while the Oakwood Terrace Baptist Church was recognized for the greatest per cent of increase in attendance.

Adult Sunday School Lesson Previews were held in the spring and were attended by 128 adult workers.

Vacation Bible School Clinics were held in seven locations and enrolled 1,192 persons from 109 churches.

One Night Clinics were held in approximately 12 churches. Most of these provided age group conferences for all Sunday School workers.

Pastor, Sunday School Director, Outreach Director Banquet was held in September with 45 churches represented. The emphasis was upon outreach ideas presented in the form of testimonies from various churches.

Distinguished Achievement Recognition - After being the first association in the Southern Baptist Convention to earn this recognition last year, our association again received this recognition this year.

Conclusion - This has been an excellent year of Sunday School progress and next year holds even brighter promises.

Church Training

Christ trained twelve men for three years and they made a difference in their world. Present-day followers of Christ need to be trained to make a difference in their world. This is the purpose of church training, the program with a difference.

The goal of Tarrant Baptist Church Training leadership is to help each church in the association develop a church training program that will encompass these three aspects of Christian growth: (1) New Church Member Orientation; (2) Church Member Training; (3) Church Leader Training.

The training emphases placed in the association calendar each year are designed to strengthen one or more of these aspects of training.

This past year three activities were provided for the churches of Tarrant Baptist Association by the Church Training organization: (1) March 10-Church Secretaries' Workshop, Broadway Baptist Church, Fort Worth; (2) March 19-Association Youth Bible Drill and Speakers' Tournament, Handley; (3) April 10-11 - Youth Leadership Workshop, Southcliff.

We encourage churches in our association to take advantage of the training opportunities that are being projected for 1972-73.

Music

The Tarrant Association sponsored a total of seven music festivals this year in which 1610 people participated. Churches of Tarrant Association also participated in the church music workshop at Southwestern Seminary.

Twenty-five churches in our Association participated in a music festival this year. Arlington Heights-12 participants; Birdville-54; Broadway-72; Arlington, 1st-154; Benbrook, 1st-53; Euless, 1st-133; Forest Hill, 1st-33; Keller, 1st-45; Saginaw, 1st-114; Haltom Road-72; Hillcrest Park, Arlington-61; James Avenue-17; North Richland Hills-40; Polytechnic-44; Sagamore Hill-85; River Oaks-20; Riverside-15; Southcliff-56; South Fort Worth-6; Southwayside-36; Tate Springs, Arlington-43; Travis Avenue-221; University-199; Wichita Street-25.

Youth Advisory

The 21st Annual Associational Youth Camp was held July 31-August 4, 1972 at the association encampment near Glen Rose, Texas. Gary West of Memorial Baptist Church, Grapevine was Camp Pastor, Merle Basden of the Tarrant Association staff was Camp Director, and Gary Ellis of Southcliff Baptist Church was Co-director.

There were 299 campers registered, representing 10 churches. Sixteen conversions were recorded and scores of rededications were made.

Baptist Student Union

It is the conviction of your committee that this has been one of the best years ever in Baptist Student Unions of Tarrant County. Our Student Unions are operating on the campuses of Texas Christian University, University of Texas at Arlington, Texas Wesleyan College and Tarrant County Junior College, north and south campuses.

Your committee met on the campus of the University of Texas at Arlington where we had opportunity to catch something of the spirit of that Baptist Student Union. We've also had regular reports from the Directors from each of the Baptist Student Unions. We have found a renewed commitment to personal evangelism, Bible study and mission outreach on each of the campuses.

We are fortunate to have Rollin DeLap, Paul Jones, and Roger Matkin leading the work in our Baptist Student Unions. These men bring dedicated, trained and capable leadership to this work. They are men who have a vision of the needs of the campus and the needs of the whole world. They seek to impart to the students a Christian concern about their local communities and a concern for the whole world. Your committee urges that we as Tarrant County Baptists continue to give our regular financial support to the work on these campuses.

We would also urge churches to invite students from the campuses to share testimonies or to lead in worship experiences in our churches. These effective programs cannot continue without the prayerful support of Tarrant Baptist Association.

Audiovisual Aids

All of the new filmstrips relating to the '70 changes have been added to the filmstrip library. The library now includes a total of 183 filmstrips. In addition there are 2 motion pictures.

The committee is continuing the placing of recordings of cassette tapes and during the next year plans to complete this task.

Brotherhood

The annual fish fry at the Tarrant Baptist Encampment in September was well attended and enjoyed by over 674 men and boys. Officers elected for 1972-73: L. H. Libby, President; Jewel Franks, Vice President; Chester Langley, Mission Action Leader. Our speaker for the evening was L. B. George, pastor, Mount Zion Baptist Church.

The association workshop was held at Haltom Road Baptist Church with 105 attending.

Associational officers assisted in organizing a new Brotherhood in three local churches.

RA activities included the RA Banquet in November at Broadway Baptist Church, attended by more than 400 boys. The RA Camp in July registered 286. Association RA Sports include baseball, basketball, and track.

Library

The Association Library Council meets on the fifth Monday in each quarter. All churches interested in church library ministries are encouraged to attend. The following churches have reactivated libraries or are starting new libraries: Twin Oaks, Tate Springs, and Memorial, Grapevine.

The Associational Library Council has assisted the New Rising Star Baptist Church in training its church library staff. Contact has been made and work is under way to assist in the start of a church library ministry in Alvarado (Johnson County), Texas.

The Association Lending Library is available for churches interested in starting a library ministry. It may be scheduled through the association office.

Woman's Missionary Union

Woman's Missionary Union emphasis for the year has been on mission action and family missions. There has been an enthusiastic response to this thrust by the women in the churches, as they have become involved and influenced others in mission activities.

The highlights of the year include:

Annual WMU Meeting - Rev. J. Daniel Luper, missionary to Brazil was speaker; Mrs. Jimmy Stiles, missionary to Colombia, installed officers; Derrel Watkins urged WMU support of Goodwill Center and benediction was given by Miss Irene Jeffers, retired missionary to Taiwan. This meeting was held at University, Arlington.

Weeks of Prayer - Besides the prayer meetings in the churches - Foreign Missions week was observed by a special program at seminary. Home Missions programs was conducted in zones by zone leaders, with speakers who are or have served in special fields of home mission work. State Missions day was observed in general session of workshop. Mrs. W. D. Shores, Zapata, spoke and displayed handcrafts in river ministry. These meetings were well attended.

Mission Study Institute in January was held at Ridglea for teachers of Graded Series books.

Annual WMU Workshop - Led by associational WMU leadership, provided inspiration and training for women in the churches. Many churches took advantage of this major training opportunity for WMU workers, 510 registered. Our officers have visited many churches by invitation, to help organize, train, teach books and manuals, and to offer encouragement and inspiration.

Prayer Retreats were held for Baptist Women and BYW at Glen Rose. BW retreat, in April, attended by 250 where a study in prayer and prayer groups were led by Mrs. Len Sehested and her workers. Single BYW over-night retreat met at Glen Rose in January. Our women have expressed a need for this type of program.

Girls in Action Camp provided five days in July of bible study, mission study, and recreation for 345 campers. Rev. Thomas Norman was missionary pastor with 16 professions of faith and many rededications.

Rescue Mission has been supported through the year by WMU's in the association with donations of clothing and other articles for the store; also provided cakes at Christmas. Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners were served to the transient men.

Goodwill Center - Volunteer workers have provided much needed help at the center. With the apportionments from the local WMU organizations, we gave \$7,200 this year. Acteens have been helpful in the tutoring program. New childrens clothing, cookies, kool-aid and food are ongoing needs being supplied by WMU.

Our association has achieved Distinguished Recognition again this year in Woman's Missionary work.

BAPTIST FLASHES Sketching the Top Events Of Baptists Everywhere

OKLAHOMA CAMPAIGN—Oklahoma United Drys will launch a campaign for county option on the sale of beer in the state with a mass-meeting here Jan. 28. Dr. Duke McCall, president of Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, will be the speaker.

DISTRICT OFFICE—James Roy Clark, pastor of Morgan Ave. Baptist Church, Corpus Christi, has been named missions secretary for District 14 of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

RECREATION TRAINING—A Special Workers' Church Recreation Workshop, directed by the church recreation service of the Baptist Sunday School Board, will be held in Nashville, Tenn., Jan. 29-31. Purpose of workshop is to train workers to assist churches in their recreation needs.

CHALLENGE AT HOME—"As Southern Baptists we face a challenge to have churches here at home with such breadth of world vision, depth of personal evangelistic concern, and genuineness of Christian love for all races that any missionary can say to any national anywhere in this world, 'I am proud to be a representative of those churches,'" stated Elmer West, Jr., secretary for missionary personnel for the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board.

ROADSIDE WITNESS—Mary Frank Kirkpatrick, Southern Baptist Missionary to Nigeria, reports that even running out of gas and being stranded for five hours can have its good points. When such happened recently to a group of missionaries they found an opportunity to tell nine men about Christ. They had come to find out why the white people were there, and left knowing something about Christ's coming into the world.

23 YEARS SERVICE—Miss Mabel Morris retires this month after 23 years of service with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. For the past 14 years she has served as head bookkeeper. She handled a total of \$27,517,025 during the past 17 years.

ILLINOIS LOAN—Southern Baptist churches in Illinois and Indiana have borrowed \$360,000 from the Home Mission Board for church buildings. Money available for such loans comes from the allocation of Cooperative Program receipts to the Home Mission Board.

SALARIES INCREASED—The Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention has voted to give substantial salary increases to many of its direct missionaries.

MAYOR LEADS—Mayor Randall N. Christmas, Miami, Fla., will serve as general chairman of the fund raising campaign for a Baptist hospital in that city.

MISSIONS MONEY—Southern Baptist Convention treasurer Porter Routh announced Cooperative Program receipts totaling \$1,187,137 for November. Since budget needs had already been met the entire amount was divided between the Home and Foreign Mission Boards with the Foreign Mission Board getting 75 per cent.

CITY WANTS COLLEGE—Charleston Baptist Association, S.C., asked the State Convention to consider establishing a Baptist college in their city.

DRAFTSMEN NEEDED—W. A. Harrell, secretary, church architecture department, Baptist Sunday School Board, is seeking the names of draftsmen interested in employment. He states that the drafting room of the church architecture department is in need of more workers in that field.

31 YEARS EDUCATION—If a student attempted to take all the courses offered at Wayland Baptist College today, he would spend 31 years on the campus, says Bob Hilburn, feature writer for the Plainview Daily Herald.

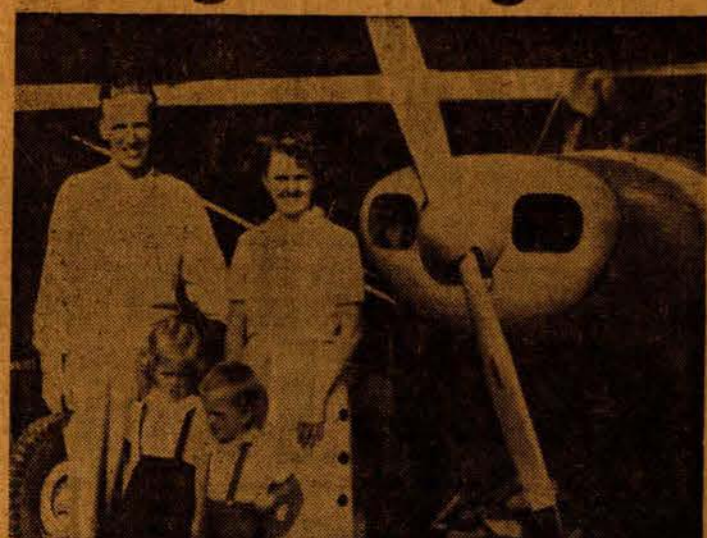

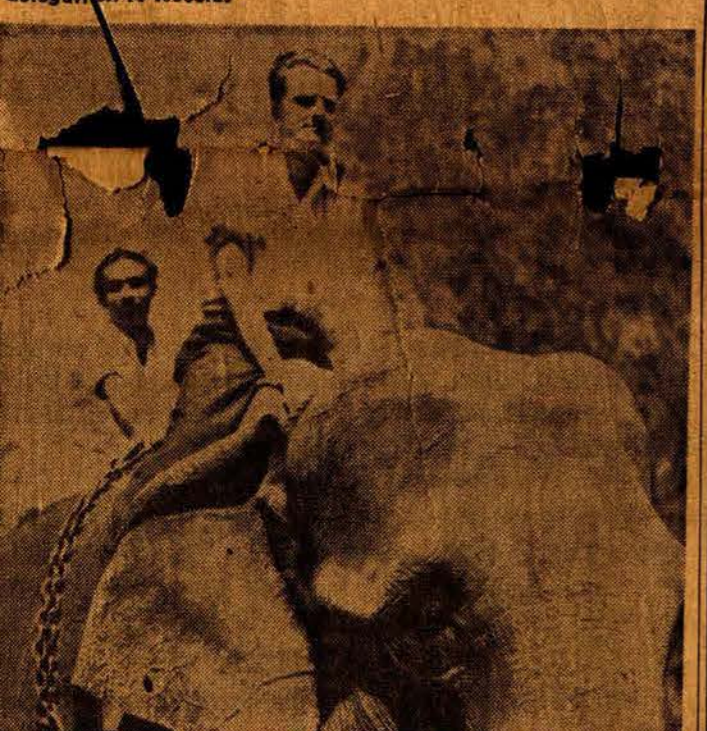

Religion played an important role in 1956. Statistically it was a good year for church advances. There seemed to be increased lay interest in religion. Conflicts and international tension slowed religious advance in some areas, and communism stepped up its atheistic attack. Throughout the year religion made headlines. Here are some of the highlights.

Religion In the U. S.
"In God We Trust" was made the official motto of the United States. Statistics seemed to support it as U. S. church membership was reported at more than 100 million for the first time, along with an all-time high in giving for religious causes. Church construction headed toward a new yearly record with a new six-month record total reported after June. A fall spurt in church construction repeatedly set new monthly records.

Methodists met in their quadrennial General Conference in Minneapolis, and 2,000 Methodists gathered for the World Methodist Conference at Lake Junaluska. The Disciples of Christ voted an official name change for their denomination to International Convention of Christian Churches (Disciples of Christ). Women's status advanced as Methodists approved granting women full clergy rights and a woman was ordained to the ministry in the Presbyterian Church, U. S. A. for the first time.

Merger Trend
A growing trend among some groups to unite continued as

the Evangelical and Reformed Church Synod approved the proposed merger with Congregational Christian Churches, and the Disciples of Christ decided to reopen merger talks with the E and R-Congregational union. The Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. said o.k. to union with the United Presbyterian Church. Student leaders of five Protestant denominations voted to merge their campus organizations.

Evangelism
Billy Graham's Asian tour attracted thousands wherever he spoke, demonstrating the universal attraction of the Gospel. His U. S. crusades included Richmond, Va., Louisville, Ky., and Oklahoma City. Intensive preparation for the 1957 New York campaign was begun.

Australian Methodist evangelist Dr. Alan Walker began his

year-long "Mission to America." Half a million people gathered in Frankfurt-on-Main, Germany, for Evangelical Church Day rallies. In France, 50,000 attended one of the largest Protestant rallies ever held in that country.

Religious Freedom
Predominately Moslem "Islamic Republic of Pakistan" approved a constitution assuring freedom to religious minorities. Several other countries (besides Iron Curtain nations) did not enunciate freedom so clearly.

Egypt expelled two teachers for allegedly teaching Christianity to Moslem students, and in July told of plans to confiscate two mission schools which had not agreed to comply with orders to teach the Koran. The National Bank of Egypt began closing on Friday, the Moslem Sabbath, making Sunday a

work day. The Egyptian government ordered all sermons to be approved and meetings for worship to be held in government-licensed churches.

Spanish authorities closed Evangelical Theological Seminary in Madrid in January, seized some 30,000 copies of Bibles and devotional material of the British and Foreign Bible Society, and broke up a Baptist youth meeting in Alicante.

Leaders of several groups, including the Baptist World Alliance executive committee, voiced concern over repeated reports of "persecution" of Protestants in Columbia.

Sudan announced a policy to take over mission schools.

Missions
A record total of Protestant missionaries serving overseas—23,432—was reported in 1956, the 150th anniversary of the Haystack Prayer Meeting which initiated the American mission movement.

Five American missionaries were slain by Aucas Indians in Ecuador in January, and a December report said more than 2,000 young people had volunteered for mission service as a result.

India marked the 250th anniversary of the first Protestant mission in India. Official reports by two Indian government groups charged missionaries with having political motives. Churchmen denied the allegations, and several leading Indians and Indian groups came to their defense.

The 100th anniversary of Protestant work in Colombia was celebrated. Middle East tensions curtailed British mission work in Egypt.

U.S.—Russia Relations
A delegation of eight U. S. Protestant leaders headed by Dr. Eugene Carson Blake, president of the National Council of

Churches, visited Russia. Eight soviet churchmen returned the visit. Five Russian Baptist leaders came for a 30-day visit.

The first World Council of Churches meeting ever to be held in Eastern Europe was held near Budapest, July 28.

Communism
Russia continued to increase atheistic propaganda, concentrating on young people. A favorite Soviet stratagem was to attempt to replace Christian rites and ceremonies with godless ones.

Poland's revolt reportedly has achieved some measure of religious toleration. Reports filtering from Hungary indicate that churches ousted many Communists from leadership during the revolt, but the future of the churches under the re-inforced Red regime is uncertain.

Churchmen in East Germany have felt Red restrictions tighten. Continuing persecution of Christians was reported from Red China and North Vietnam.

Visitors returning from Russia reported well-attended churches and many faithful Christians, but Communist restrictions are obvious and the number of churches is pitifully small.

ONE IN A MILLION

The United States Post Office Department handles some forty-five billion pieces of mail annually, losing only one in every million. Typically, in one area employing 2,500 postmen, each postman walks out a pair of shoes every three months, collects dog bites at the rate of one every 10,000 miles walking and delivers mail to about 1,500 persons. —The Survey Bulletin.

Ministry Meeting Attracts Students

TOLEDO, O. (RNS) — Four hundred high school students attended a "men for the ministry" conference in St. Mark's Lutheran church here. The meeting was held in connection with a nationwide campaign to enlist students for the ministry of the American Lutheran Church.

Dr. Marcus Rieke, ALC youth director, said that half of the 317 who signed vocational questionnaire cards indicated a preference for the ministry. Most of them were high school sophomores.

Dr. Rieke cited the rapid growth of church membership and opportunities for extending the services of the Church into new areas as the principal reasons for an increased need for Lutheran ministers.

Bishop Estimates 200,000 Christians Slain in China

Religious Freedom 'Joke' Under Reds

PROVIDENCE, R. I. (RNS)—The 25,000 persons estimated killed in the abortive Hungarian revolt are but "a drop in the bucket" compared to the number slain in Red China, an exiled Chinese Anglican bishop said here.

Dr. Quentin K. Y. Yuang, former bishop of the Yun Kwei Diocese of the Holy Catholic Church in China, said he conservatively estimates that the Communists have killed 200,000 Christians alone in China.

Bishop Huang, interviewed before a talk at Grace Episcopal church here, said there are "many more revolts and uprisings in China than in Europe" but the press "doesn't pay much attention to them."

"Almost Daily" Revolts
There are revolts "almost daily," he said, "but not on such a big scale as those in Hungary and Poland." The largest occur in the western and southwestern sections of China, the bishop said.

Bishop Huang charged that the Chinese Church today is a "show window Church controlled by party members." He said nothing could be accomplished by a visit of U. S. Protestant leaders to China to re-establish relations between Christians of the two countries.

He said the U. S. churchmen would go "only where allowed" and Chinese churchmen who are not Communist party members "would have to speak to the visitors through Communist interpreters."

Religious Freedom 'Joke'
"They would have no freedom to talk at all. Freedom of religion in China today is a joke," the bishop said.

Bishop Huang said he had been offered the post of head of "the Church and different religions" in southwest China by the Communists "with authority over life and death." The offer, he said, was made after he had spent 79 days in prison at Kunming.

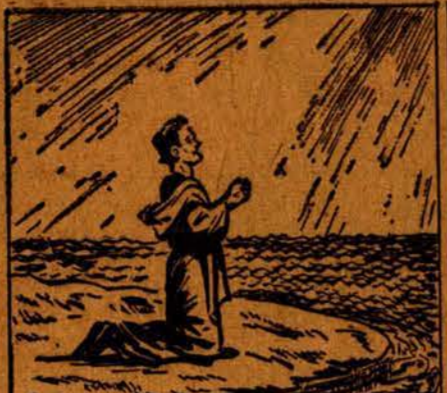

ATHENS (RNS)—A new law approved by the Greek government prohibits Greek-born clergymen of any religion from emigrating to the Middle East or North Africa, except with the special permission of the Ministry of Cults.

Material is being shipped from all over the world to interpret the 56 LWF church bodies with 48 million members in 29 countries to visitors at the assembly.

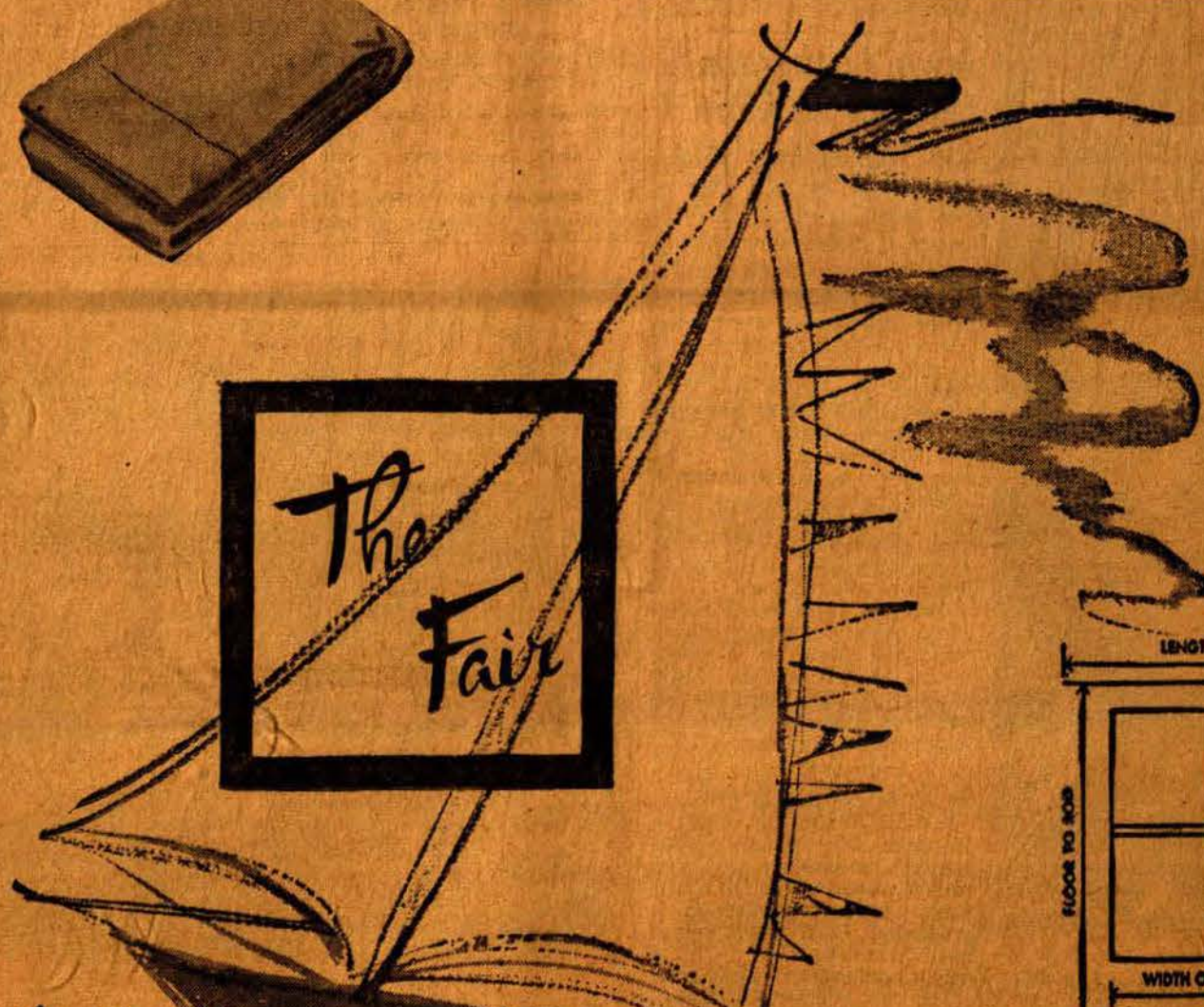
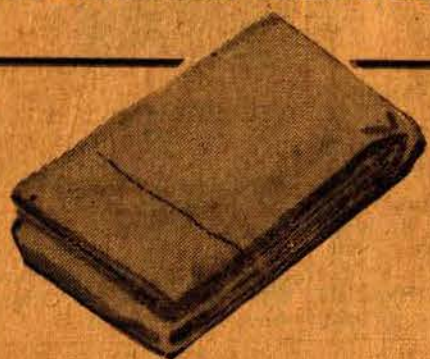

MISSION ASSISTANT—Clovie Brantley has been selected to assist Loyd Corder in direct mission work. He will carry on administrative work in the areas of rescue missions, Good Will Centers, migrant missions and related ministries to underprivileged peoples.

MINISTERS' WIVES—Mrs. Andrew Hall, wife of pastor of First Baptist Church, Fayetteville, Ark., has been elected president of the ministers' wives organization in the Arkansas Baptist State Convention.

BOOKSTORE MANAGER—Kenneth L. Hayes has been elected manager of the Baptist Book Store, Carbondale, Ill., succeeding V. L. McGlocklin who is being transferred to a similar position in Birmingham, Ala.

DISTRICT OFFICE—James Roy Clark, pastor of Morgan Ave. Baptist Church, Corpus Christi, has been named missions secretary for District 14 of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

YMCA PURCHASE—100,000 copies of "Forward March," a booklet prepared for service men, have been purchased by the National Council of the YMCA. Rev. Joseph H. Heartberg, Director of Christian Ministry to Service Personnel of The American Baptist Home Mission Boards, prepared the booklet.

ROADSIDE WITNESS—Mary Frank Kirkpatrick, Southern Baptist Missionary to Nigeria, reports that even running out of gas and being stranded for five hours can have its good points. RECREATION TRAINING—A Special Workers' Church Recreation Workshop, directed by the church recreation service of the Baptist Sunday School Board, will be held in Nashville, Tenn., Jan. 29-31. Purpose of the workshop is to train workers to assist churches in their recreation needs.

DENSON IN VIRGINIA—Dr. W. B. Denson has been elected secretary of the Department of Associational Missions and Evangelism by Virginia Baptists.

POLL USE ADVOCATED—Dr. Harold Ingraham, head of the service division of the Baptist Sunday School Board, says that scientific testing of the attitudes of church members and the general public toward a church project would aid in effective promotion.

BOARD TO BUILD—Construction on a new million dollar activities building for the Sunday School Board is expected to begin next year. The building will be developed for the receiving, assembling, storing and shipping of all periodicals, graded literature, Baptist bulletins and merchandise.

23 YEARS SERVICE—Miss Mabel Morris retires this month after 23 years of service with the Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma. For the past 14 years she has served as head bookkeeper. She handled a total of \$27,517,025 during the past 17 years.

SOCIAL WORK—Wheaton college, Ill., will host the Eighth Annual Christian Social Work conference March 28-30, 1957. Meeting in conjunction with the conference will be the National Association of Christian Social Workers.

CANADIAN FIELD—A resolution was approved by the Home Mission Board allowing the Board to send salaried workers into Canada. There are now 11 Southern Baptist churches in Canada. The resolution is subject to concurrence by the Sunday School Board and Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention.

ARKANSAS EDITOR RETIRES—B. H. Duncan, told by physicians last year that he had leukemia, has announced that he will retire as editor of the Arkansas Baptist.

DRAFTSMEN NEEDED—W. A. Harrell, secretary, church architecture department, Baptist Sunday School Board, is seeking the names of draftsmen interested in employment. He states that the drafting room of the church architecture department is in need of more workers in that field.

CHALLENGE AT HOME—"As Southern Baptists we face a challenge to have churches here at home with such breadth of world vision, depth of personal evangelistic concern, and genuineness of Christian love for all races that any missionary can say to any national anywhere in this world, 'I am proud to be a representative of those churches,' stated Elmer West, Jr., secretary for missionary personnel for the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board.

'ACCUSED' WON—Thirty-one persons have made professions of faith in jail services or in personal interviews conducted by Bill Lutker and the organization known as "Friends of the Accused" during the first two months of that ministry in Oklahoma.

CITY WANTS COLLEGE—Charleston Baptist Association, S.C., asked the State Convention to consider establishing a Baptist college in their city.

CALIFORNIAN TO FLORIDA—Dr. Paul A. Meigs, for five and a half years pastor of Calvary Baptist Church, Berkeley, Calif., will become secretary of evangelism and mission education for the Florida Baptist convention, Jan. 1.

S. S. BOOKLET—"The Reach of the Baptist Sunday School Board's Periodicals," is a new booklet published by the service division of the Board. It covers areas within the United States and sixty-five countries and shows the editors of the Board's seventy-nine different periodicals.

MISSIONS MONEY—Southern Baptist Convention treasurer Porter Routh announced Cooperative Program receipts totaling \$1,187,137 for November. Since budget needs had already been met the entire amount was divided between the Home and Foreign Mission Boards with the Foreign Mission Board getting 75 per cent.

ARIZONA NEWS—The Baptist General Convention of Arizona elected Howard Halsell as administrative assistant to Executive Secretary Charles McKay. The Department of Religious Education was divided by electing Ernie Myers as state Sunday school secretary, and C. E. Archer as state Training Union secretary. Paul W. Davis was re-elected Convention president.

1957 DEADLINE—April 15, 1957, is the deadline for ministers desiring to participate in the Social Security program, provided they were ministers prior to Jan. 1, 1955, reports the Baptist Joint Committee on Public Affairs.

GOOD ADVICE—"Fellow missionary, are you tempted to pack your bags and go home because of mistreatment or lack of understanding? Remember that Jesus had more reason than you to do so, but he stayed," said John A. Parker, Southern Baptist missionary to Chile.

SALARIES INCREASED—The Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention has voted to give substantial salary increases to many of its direct missionaries.

ALCOHOL EDUCATION—Alcohol Education Week, a simultaneous Convention-wide project promoted jointly by the Baptist State Training Union Departments and the Training Union Department, Baptist Sunday School Board, will be observed in March next year.

MAYOR LEADS—Mayor Randall N. Christmas, Miami, Fla., will serve as general chairman of the fund raising campaign for a Baptist hospital in that city.

FOUR CHURCHES—South Dakota, with a 700,000 population, has four Southern Baptist affiliated churches in the state.

CRISES VIEWPOINT—Mrs. Alta Lee Lovegren, Southern Baptist Missionary to Jordan, urges Christians to remember that turbulent affairs in the Near East vitally effect the missionary cause. Prayer is especially needed during these times, she says.

CHICAGO SITES VIEWED—Two possible sites in Chicago are being considered for the location of the national headquarters of the American Baptist Convention. One was near the University of Chicago and the other in the downtown Loop district.

EDUCATION FUND CAMPAIGN—A national survey recommending a proposed \$8½ million campaign for Christian higher education was approved by the National Survey Commission of the American Baptist Convention.

ILLINOIS LOAN—Southern Baptist churches in Illinois and Indiana have borrowed \$360,000 from the Home Mission Board for church buildings. Money available for such loans comes from the allocation of Cooperative Program receipts to the Home Mission Board.

Eisenhower Will Take Oath In Private Sunday Ceremony

WASHINGTON, D. C. (RNS) — President Eisenhower will take his second term oath of office at a private ceremony in the White House at noon on Sunday, Jan. 20. He will thus become the first President of the United States ever to be sworn in on a Sunday.

The President decided to take the oath on a Sunday because of the tense international situation, it was learned here. He will repeat the oath at noon on Monday, Jan. 21, in a public ceremony on the steps of the Capitol. The Monday ceremony will be broadcast and televised throughout the world.

Vice President Richard M. Nixon also will take his second term oath at the private White House ceremony and repeat it at the public ceremony on Monday.

Term Ends Jan. 20
Under the 20th Amendment to the Constitution, adopted in 1933, the term of the President ends at noon on Jan. 20. If a President has failed to qualify, the Vice President-elect shall serve as President until he does.

Thus, President Eisenhower would have to step down as President at noon on Sunday unless he takes the oath for a second term. Presidential advisers recommended against a 24-hour hiatus of executive power. Jan. 20 will be the fourth time in U. S. history that an inauguration day has fallen on Sunday. When Congress voted at its last session to move the public oath-taking ceremony to Monday, Sen. Theodore Francis Green recalled that on the three previous occasions public ceremonies were always held on Monday.

On Saturday night March 3, 1877, President-elect Rutherford B. Hayes took the oath privately at the White House. He repeated the oath publicly the following Monday, March 5.

In 1849, Zachary Taylor refused to take the oath on Sunday and was not sworn in until Monday noon, leaving the United States technically without a President for 24 hours. In 1821, President James Monroe deferred taking his second term oath until Monday.

The President will attend the early 9:30 a. m. service at National Presbyterian church that morning. If he attended the later service he would be in church at the time his term expired.

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Jesus Measures Years by Service

A year is an empty canister, given us to fill with what we will. The receptacle is physically indispensable to the content, but morally it is incidental. The importance of a year depends, not upon its length, but upon its content.

Jesus did not measure life by years, but by service to the Father who sent him, and to the people to whom he was sent. The number of his years is incidental. They were but the essential canister into which he so ably packed a wonderful life. His goal was "to do the will of Him that sent me, and to finish his work." The early martyrs learned from him how to fill empty years. They did not feel that they must have years, but they must have honor and holiness. Better it was to pack a few years with virtue and faithfulness than, having many years to fill them loosely with diluted convictions and weak living.

The person who fills his years to the brim with good experiences will have nothing to grieve about if he runs unexpectedly out of years while still having further work to do. The person to pity is that one who runs out of good living and selfless vision while still having years.

Twelve months ago, the year we are now ending was given to us as an empty canister. Today it is filled with history; it is experience, it is destiny! It is our credential before God and our reputation before men. Some have filled it with waste and spoilage until they now wish vainly to drop it from life. Some have crammed it with love and hope and faith, with joy and service and unselfishness. It is no longer empty; it is filled with treasure.

When God hands a man an empty year and instructs him to fill it, He gives to him an eternal responsibility. Today he has assigned to us that responsibility as we face a new year. This empty canister must be filled, and in due time be sealed and placed in the great store room that holds life's total wealth or poverty. Learning to fill a year means learning to live, for years are filled with life.

A year is not filled as a unit, but moment by moment and day by day. Each tiny corner of the year must be filled by packing into a moment and an hour the fullest possible content. Each week and each month must be filled in turn, for we cannot fill a year from the top down, but from the bottom up. We cannot remove or move a single parcel once it is placed in the container. Let us then press into each moment those experiences which make for successful living.

The most important thing to learn about filling an empty year is that it is better filled by living than by accumulating. He who stands greedily within his container, grasping selfishly for every passing possession or privilege, will find at the end he has filled his canister only with himself. He who stands beside his container of life and draws from its depths every possible thing he can share with his God and with the needy people who pass by will find that his year is continually made more full until it will finally run over with the very things he has shared. Jesus said, "He that findeth his life shall lose it: and he that loseth his life for my sake shall find it."

Church Rebuilt Following Freak Fuel Tank Fire

ITHACA, O. (RNS) — Dedication ceremonies were held here for a church that was donated by the U. S. Air Force after a freak airplane accident destroyed the old edifice.

The rites marked completion of the modernistic Ithaca Evangelical United Brethren building. The former church burned April 13, 1954, when it was struck by a high-octane fuel tank dropped 6,000 feet from an F-51 fighter plane.

Through special Congressional action, the Air Force appropriated \$112,500 for a new church. At that time the judge advocate general's office in Washington reported it was the first peacetime accident in which an aircraft had demolished a church or charitable institution.

On dedication day, the Rev. Lee A. Cate, pastor, estimated the cost of the new church, including furnishings, at \$135,000. He said much of the work was done by volunteer labor and many firms gave special considerations in providing building materials. The church was dedicated debt free.

Christianity Spreading In Russia Despite Restrictions, Says Ohrn

Christianity is spreading rapidly in Russia, Dr. Arnold T. Ohrn, general secretary of the 21 million member Baptist World Alliance, said in an address to the students and faculty of New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary.

Dr. Ohrn, en route to his headquarters in Washington, D.C., stopped in New Orleans after delivering an address at Baylor University, Waco, Texas.

"Christians are prohibited from sending out evangelists and missionaries," he said, "but not a single day passes but that word is received in Russian Baptist headquarters in Moscow of another Baptist church starting somewhere in the country."

He said preachers can only preach in certain officially registered chapels and auditoriums so the Gospel is spread by housewives, engineers, farmers, and workers who have lived in an area where there was a church and then moved to another part of the country.

Dr. Ohrn told of a few Baptist churches which have been started in Siberia by prisoners and former prisoners of the Communist regime.

More than half the Baptist in Europe, which number around

750,000, are behind the Iron Curtain with the 520,000 in Russia representing the largest group, he related.

Government Service Subject of Seminar

WASHINGTON, D. C. (RNS) — The National Association of Evangelicals announced it will sponsor a seminar here Feb. 6-8 for deans and administrators of conservative Protestant colleges to consider ways of encouraging more students to enter government service.

Representatives of 70 colleges and seminaries affiliated with evangelical denominations are expected to attend. Speakers will include government officials.

Dr. Clyde W. Taylor, NAE secretary of public affairs, said "we hope that the educators and counsellors of our Christian schools will catch a new vision of the importance of leadership in government and thus assist in channeling their graduates into government service."

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Understanding Revelation

The book of Revelation was called forth because of the crisis precipitated when the Roman emperor, Domitian, decided to call himself god during his own life. At least in Asia Minor, the Roman officials made a great effort to force all citizens to worship him. Most of the citizens were polytheistic, so the addition of just one more god did not worry them in the least; but Christians could not worship any other god without giving up the true worship of God.

When the Christians refused to worship the emperor, Rome tried to force them to do so, using all kinds of persecution. The book of Revelation was sent to them to strengthen and encourage them to stand fast for their faith no matter what Rome or any other ally of Satan might do to them.

Students of Revelation often wonder why John does not say plainly just what he means. But he could not have done that. He would have been killed for writing such a book, the book would have been destroyed, and the lives of all who possessed such a book would have been greatly endangered.

Revelation is "underground" literature. John had to use a kind of code language, a language that the original readers could understand but that their enemies could not. He made much use of highly figurative language. If we forget or ignore the character of the book, it becomes meaningless, or it may be twisted into all kinds of even fantastic meaning. — Christian Observer.

BERLIN (RNS) — Bishop Otto Dibelius of Berlin, head of the Evangelical Church in Germany, led a delegation of churchmen who met with Soviet Premier Otto Grotewohl to discuss the situation of the Church in East Germany.

The delegation reportedly asked that government-imposed impediments to Church life in that area be removed.

Lumber Camps Get Scriptures In 30 Tongues

TORONTO, Ont. (RNS) — Three thousand Bibles and New Testaments, printed in more than 30 languages, were presented by the Upper Canada Bible Society here to the Shantymen's Association of Canada for distribution in the lumber camps of northern Ontario.

The Shantymen's Association is a non-denominational group formed in 1908 to combat drinking and gambling among the lumberjacks. It has a paid staff of 15 and another 15 part time workers.

For the first time, the Shantymen asked for and received Bibles in Spanish and Portuguese, languages not usually in demand in the chilly regions of northern Ontario.

Oklahomans Plan Homes for Aged

PERRY, Okla. (RNS) — Two denominational groups in Oklahoma have announced plans for retirement homes at Perry and Hugo, and later at Oklahoma City.

The Oklahoma-Arkansas Synod of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. approved a location in Perry for a one-story brick building to cost around \$175,000 to provide residence homes for aged people. Presbyterian Homes, Inc., composed of ministers and laymen in the two states, will finance the project by gifts and endowments on the site provided by Perry residents.

The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma has started "Golden Age" home at Hugo on a 65-acre site donated by a family there. The project, to cost around \$150,000 when completed, is the first of two such homes being planned in the state. A site has been provided for the second home at Oklahoma City adjacent to a projected new Baptist Memorial Hospital.

Leaders of both groups said the establishment of these homes is in response to needs which are mounting every day with an increased population of aged people who need special care in their later years.

Churches to Help in War Against Traffic Accidents

CHICAGO (RNS) — The National Safety Council here announced it had received a grant of \$75,000 to help churches and synagogues conduct a "religious crusade for safety."

\$2 Million Given Hungarian Relief

NEW YORK (RNS) — American Protestants have already contributed about \$2,000,000 in emergency relief for victims of the Hungarian fight for freedom. Dr. R. Norris Wilson, executive director of Church World Service, reported here. The agency is the overseas relief arm of the National Council of Churches.

Dr. Wilson, who also is a member of the President's newly-appointed Committee for Hungarian Refugee Relief, said most of the aid given thus far has been food, clothing and medical supplies. The major portion of the funds, he said, have been used to aid the Hungarian refugees pouring into Austria.

"The need for continuing assistance," he said, "cannot be stressed too strongly, particularly as regards those fleeing from Hungary."

Official Urges Opinion Poll Use

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (RNS) — A Southern Baptist official, in an address here, advocated the use by churches of public opinion polls to determine reaction to their programs.

Dr. Harold Ingraham, head of the service division of the Baptist Sunday School Board, said scientific testing of the attitudes of church members and the general public toward a church project would aid in effective promotion.

He spoke at the semi-annual meeting of the 100-member promotion committee of the Southern Baptist Convention.

On New Year's day we usually take a frantic glance over our shoulder at the past and a worried look into the future and return to the present to endeavor to work out our salvation in fear and trembling. This is the result of our stubborn will to explain everything in terms of the material.

Some years ago a college paper offered a prize for the best definition of life. Some of the more sobering and tragic definitions were these:

"Life is a bad joke that isn't even funny."

"Life is a disease for which the only cure is death."

"Life is a jail sentence which we get for the crime of being born."

"Life is an everlasting struggle to keep money coming in and teeth and hair from coming out."

They are tragic for they present the disturbing fact that so many face life with no better conception of its meaning.

If you want to test how foolish it is to define life in materialistic terms, try to explain to one you love that life is simply the recurrent satisfaction and dissatisfaction of a protein molecule. Or, try to explain to a Toscanini that his favorite violinist is just a biped, sawing with a horse's tail across the intestines of a dead cat.

One who is in Love knows that there is more to life than that, and to the musician, music is something beyond its several material parts. Those who believe otherwise, lose their life and never find it again.

Churchmen Discuss East Berlin Needs

BERLIN (RNS) — Bishop Otto Dibelius of Berlin, head of the Evangelical Church in Germany, led a delegation of churchmen who met with Soviet Zone Premier Otto Grotewohl to discuss the situation of the Church in East Germany.

The delegation reportedly asked that government-imposed impediments to Church life in that area be removed.

Lumber Camps Get Scriptures In 30 Tongues

TORONTO, Ont. (RNS) — Three thousand Bibles and New Testaments, printed in more than 30 languages, were presented by the Upper Canada Bible Society here to the Shantymen's Association of Canada for distribution in the lumber camps of northern Ontario.

The Shantymen's Association is a non-denominational group formed in 1908 to combat drinking and gambling among the lumberjacks. It has a paid staff of 15 and another 15 part time workers.

For the first time, the Shantymen asked for and received Bibles in Spanish and Portuguese, languages not usually in demand in the chilly regions of northern Ontario.

Oklahomans Plan Homes for Aged

PERRY, Okla. (RNS) — Two denominational groups in Oklahoma have announced plans for retirement homes at Perry and Hugo, and later at Oklahoma City.

The Oklahoma-Arkansas Synod of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. approved a location in Perry for a one-story brick building to cost around \$175,000 to provide residence homes for aged people.

The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma has started "Golden Age" home at Hugo on a 65-acre site donated by a family there. The project, to cost around \$150,000 when completed, is the first of two such homes being planned in the state.

A site has been provided for the second home at Oklahoma City adjacent to a projected new Baptist Memorial Hospital.

Leaders of both groups said the establishment of these homes is in response to needs which are mounting every day with an increased population of aged people who need special care in their later years.

Churches to Help in War Against Traffic Accidents

CHICAGO (RNS) — The National Safety Council here announced it had received a grant of \$75,000 to help churches and synagogues conduct a "religious crusade for safety."

\$2 Million Given Hungarian Relief

NEW YORK (RNS)—American Protestants have already contributed about \$2,000,000 in emergency relief for victims of the Hungarian fight for freedom. Dr. R. Norris Wilson, executive director of Church World Service, reported here. The agency is the overseas relief arm of the National Council of Churches.

Dr. Wilson, who also is a member of the President's newly-appointed Committee for Hungarian Refugee Relief, said most of the aid given thus far has been food, clothing and medical supplies. The major portion of the funds, he said, have been used to aid the Hungarian refugees pouring into Austria.

"The need for continuing assistance," he said, "cannot be stressed too strongly, particularly as regards those fleeing from Hungary."

Official Urges Opinion Poll Use

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (RNS) — A Southern Baptist official, in an address here, advocated the use by churches of public opinion polls to determine reaction to their programs.

Dr. Harold Ingraham, head of the service division of the Baptist Sunday School Board, said scientific testing of the attitudes of church members and the general public toward a church project would aid in effective promotion.

He spoke at the semi-annual meeting of the 100-member promotion committee of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Mr. Prescott, a retired financier, is board chairman of the Greenwich Safety Council. He originated a recent experimental religious Crusade for Safety in Greenwich that was supported by clergymen, public officials and civic leaders there.

The Greenwich crusade was so successful, the National Safety Council said, that Mr. and Mrs. Prescott wished to see it extended on a nationwide basis and made their gift for this purpose.

The \$75,000 fund will be used by the council over a three-year period "to assist churches of every denomination in their increasing efforts to influence members to practice safety as a moral obligation and as practical religion."

Ned. H. Dearborn, council president, said "we believe the active support and leadership of church people in the war on accidents may well turn the tide of battle and halt the mounting toll of death and destruction from traffic accidents."

"The National Safety Council is grateful," he added, "that this grant will permit it to help make 'Thou Shalt Not Kill' the commandment of the highway."

Evangelistic Convocation To Meet In Fort Worth

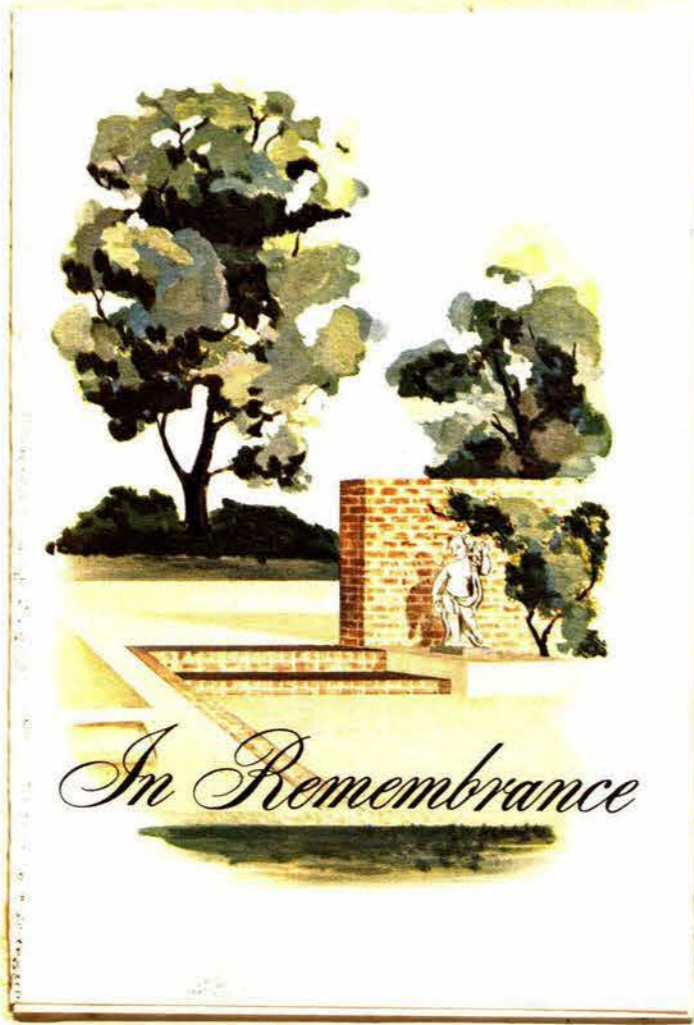

This Week's Church

Growth, Outreach Story of Church

Arlington Heights Baptist Church could sum up its past in one word: growth. And its present thrust also can be summarized as briefly — outreach.

The statistics charting its 61-year history of development are impressive. When the church was organized in September of 1912 — at W. 7th and Curry, as Trinity Baptist Church — it had 40 members. The present membership is 530.

Sunday School attendance at that first church was about 35; today it is around 120. The first year's church budget was approximately \$1,200; this year it is \$57,462. The first church property was valued at \$300; valuation of the present Arlington Heights Baptist property is \$450,000.

A YEAR AFTER organization of the young church was accepted into the Tarrant County Baptist Association. It became Soldier's Memorial Baptist Church in 1919, a name change to honor the memory of America's World War I troops. In 1926 that was changed to Baptist Temple Church, and then in 1935 it became the present designation: Arlington Heights Baptist.

Meantime, the church location had changed twice, the second move putting it at its present site where, as the pastor, the Rev. Paul H. Leber, declares, it "has a great opportunity to minister as it lets its light shine on one of Fort Worth's main arteries, Camp Bowie Boulevard."

Arlington Heights seats 400 in its main auditorium, and an education building has the same capacity. There is a large fellowship hall and excellent kitchen facilities.

THE CHURCH has a Wheeler Memorial Chapel, seating about 100, on the building's second floor. A five-suite nursery is maintained for all church services.

Besides Rev. Mr. Leber, the pastor, the Arlington Heights staff includes: Jim Smith, minister of music and youth; Bill Maupin, assistant to the pastor in outreach; Carol Holden, secretary; Larry Ballinger, custodian; and Dr. T. E. Durham, pastor emeritus.

Rev. Mr. Leber is moderator, and Dr. Durham, twice pastor and whose total service in the church's pulpit was over 30 years, is assistant moderator.

Deacons are R. H. Morris, R. DeGonia, G. Jones, L. R. Ballinger, B. Greene, T. Jones, L. Biser, P. McKinney, J. D. Ballard, E. L. Wing-

field, E. Milburn and R. C. Hartzell.

Trustees are J. D. Ballard and Glen Jones. Other church officials include:

KATHY GREENE and **MARY COLE**, church clerk and assistant; **J. D. BALLARD**, treasurer, and **PAUL MAYO**, assistant; **LEE ROY BALLINGER**, Sunday School director; **PETE MCKINNEY**, training union director.

Marion Biser heads the W.M.U. and Kathy Greene the B.Y.W. Department directors are J. D. Ballard, Marion Biser and Bill Maupin, adult department; Jim Smith, youth; Cynthia Ratcliff and Mary Cole, children; Louise Ballinger, preschool. There are 20 Sunday School teachers.

On the church council, besides the pastor, are Pete McKinney, Lee Roy Ballinger, Marion Biser, Bill Maupin, Jim Smith, Wince Woodard and R. H. Morris.

Rev. Mr. Leber, who became pastor of Arlington Heights Baptist in May of 1972, is a native of Philadelphia. He received B. A. degrees from Columbia Bible College and the University of South Carolina, and in 1950 a bachelor of divinity degree from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary here. Currently he is enrolled in the local seminary's graduate school, studying in the field of pastoral ministry.

HE HAD SERVED five other churches before accepting the call here. He has held a number of high positions in Mississippi and Texas Baptist circles, and currently is a director for the General Ministerial Association of Fort Worth.

His wife is the former Sybil Deweese of Philadelphia, Miss., and is a former education worker at the First Baptist Church of San Antonio.

The couple have two children, Gay Leber, 11, married and living in South Carolina, and Paul Jr., a student at Arlington Heights High School.

Of Arlington Heights Baptist's present active program and its forward-looking philosophy, the pastor says:

"The friendly Arlington Heights Baptist Church looks to the future. Emphasis is being placed on reaching out into the community, for those around our church. Accenting that emphasis, the church recently called Bill Maupin as a new staff worker, to be associate pastor in charge of outreach."

GOALS HAVE been set in the Sunday School program aimed at an overall increase in attendance.

Arlington Heights Baptist earnestly believes in ministering. At present it has four ministry areas in rest homes and nursing homes, and in the Baptist Rescue Mission. It is ministering to senior citizens with a Bible study and fellowship period, a program given every Wednesday morning.

Too, the church has been liberal in supporting missions, both local and worldwide. Fifteen per cent of the budget goes to missions, and in addition there are special offerings for state, home and foreign mission programs. Recently, Arlington Heights Baptist voted to send the pastor under the Home Mission Board, to Alaska for a two-

week revival crusade.

A young adult department in our Sunday School seeks to enlist other young adults. The minister of music and youth is working both with the choir program and in the area of young people.

"We are proud of the

achievements of the past and particularly of the great growth during the pastorate of our pastor emeritus, Dr. Durham.

"Yet we are sure that opportunities as great lie before us today. Arlington Heights Baptist looks to the future."



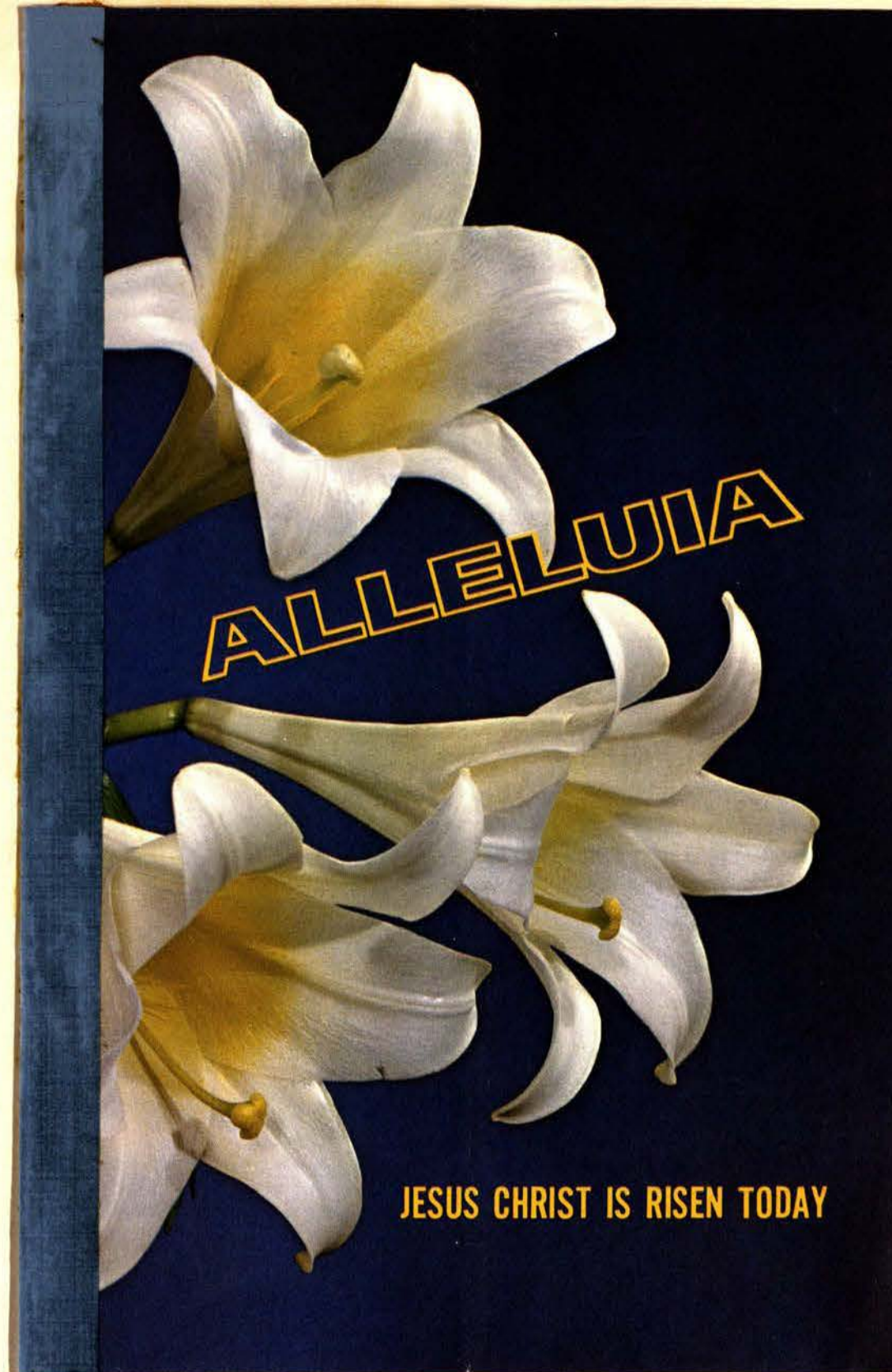
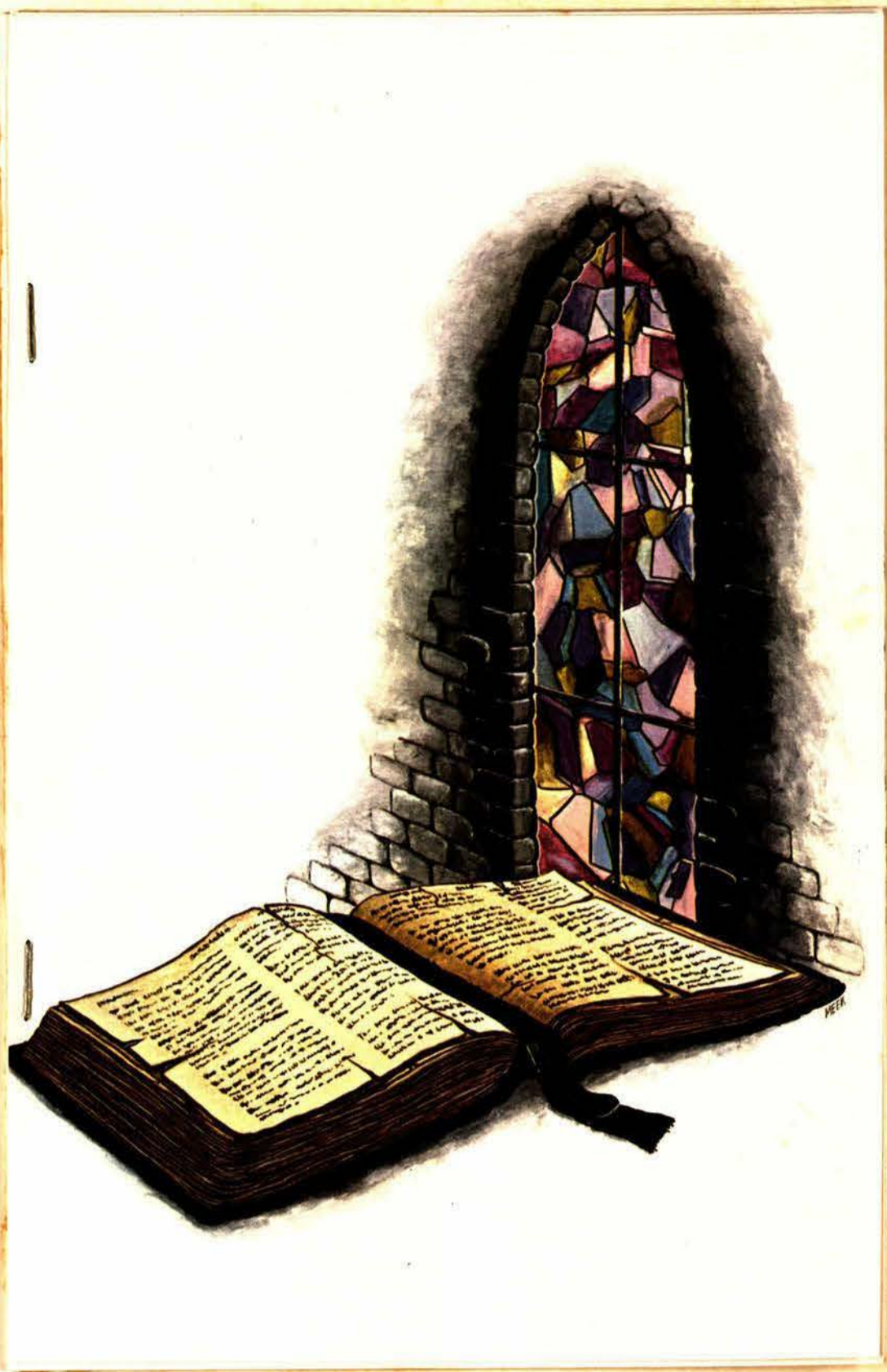

Dear Sirs,

We have some exciting plans to share with you. Will you take a moment to consider them and then let us hear from you concerning your reactions?

The Texas Collection of Baylor University is one of the largest libraries of materials relating to Texas and its history in the world. Because we are a part of your Baptist University we have been very keenly aware of our responsibility to the Baptists of Texas to provide a depository for materials relating to Baptist history. A complete picture of the Baptist work in Texas can never be obtained without a record of the individual churches; and although the State minutes, Area and Associational minutes give a partial statistical history, the heart of the matter has been neglected.

Now we are ready to give the individual churches an opportunity to share with us in this great project. We would like to be designated as the depository for your church's records on a continuing basis. This would include minutes of the church, financial records, membership rolls, minutes of the deacon body, brochures, pamphlets, special programs, sermons, correspondence, etc. If your church is the typical church most of these records are kept stuffed into some out-of-the-way closet or, even, in some member's home.

We would like to create a collection of materials under your church name, where all the papers of the church would be kept in dust free/acid free boxes, in controlled heat, and a fire-proof building. Old, torn, folded manuscripts would be cleaned and mended, and all would be preserved so that researchers a hundred or more years from now would have the opportunity to use them. Since most older records are infrequently referred to, we would be able to give retrieval service as the need arises. But the important thing to consider would be the fact that the records were preserved!

Please let us hear from you concerning your reaction to this service. Bring it before your deacons and the church for their consideration. We will be happy to answer your questions concerning the program and will work carefully with you in setting up a collection that would please your people.

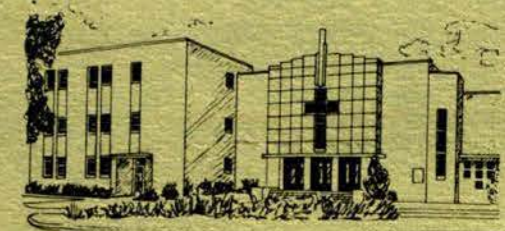

HISTORY OF JIM SMITH, MINISTER OF MUSIC AND YOUTH, 1973

Jim Smith (James R. Smith) was born on June 23rd, 1941, in Nashville, Tennessee. He lived in and around Nashville for 5 years then moved with his family to Shelbyville, Tennessee, some 50 miles south of Nashville. The family consisted of his mother and father and two sisters, one older and one younger. In 1952, the family moved to Clearwater, Florida, where Jim stayed until 1961. After a brief interlude following high school he enlisted in the United States Air Force. He was stationed at Castle Air Force Base in Merced, California, for his entire 4-year, 9-month enlistment. While in the Air Force he worked in Base Fuels Supply as an aircraft refueler. In June, 1966, he was discharged from the Air Force. On August 13th, 1966, he was married to the former Cheryl Brock. Jim and Cheryl moved to Fresno, California, some 60 miles from Merced, where they both enrolled in college. Cheryl graduated in 1969 with a degree in Social Welfare and Jim graduated in 1971 with a degree in Music. Jim did graduate work for one semester following graduation then worked for several months in a secular field. Stephanie Lynn Smith was born to Jim and Cheryl on October 19, 1971. In December, 1971, Jim, Cheryl, and Stephanie moved to Fort Worth, Texas where Jim enrolled in Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. He began working toward the Master of Church Music degree and as of August, 1973, was still enrolled with an expected graduation date of June, 1974.

Jim first felt compelled to enter the music ministry in 1965 when he had an opportunity to organize a junior choir in the First Baptist Church of Atwater, California. When he moved to Fresno, he was called as the Music Director of Bethel Baptist Church in which capacity he served until 1969. He was called to Harvard Terrace Baptist Church in 1969 as Music Director and served there until 1971. In August, 1972, Jim was called as Minister of Music and Youth for Arlington Heights Baptist Church in Fort Worth, Texas. As of August, 1973, he was still serving in that capacity.

His plans for the future included hopes for a full-time position of Minister of Music in a church wherever God leads.

Ten Weeks of Sunday School Growth -- "BRING THEM IN"

PURPOSE: An all-out effort of the entire Sunday School to bring in the lost and those not engaged in a Bible teaching ministry anywhere.

THEME SONG: "Bring Them In", #429 To be sung in the worship services before the testimonies.

TIME OF THE PROGRAM: April 1st through June 3rd, 1973

SPECIAL TIME OF RECOGNITION TO BEGIN:

- April 1st -- (1) attendance goal set by departments and entire Sunday School. Announced this date. They are previously set.
- (2) special recognition of beginning in the Morning Worship hour. Have all Sunday School workers at the front of the auditorium for special prayer for reaching the lost and those needing Bible study.
- (3) Suggested attendance goal is 10% increase over Jan-Feb. average attendance. This will be the goal for Easter Sunday.

Continual Emphasis -- Each week prior to the beginning program, have teachers give testimonies about what they will do or seek to do. Department Directors and Sunday School officers can participate in this, or those contacted by the Sunday School Director.

- RECORD BREAKING DAYS: (1) Easter Sunday -- high attendance day.
- (2) June 3rd -- high attendance day -- record breaking day before VBS -- "The Last Round-Up". This goal set by 10% increase above previous goal for Easter Sunday.
- Departments set goals which are then added together for an overall Sunday School goal. Ideas are made to see about ways taken to reach these goals. Classes set goals which add up to department goals.
- Get a commitment weeks in advance for those who will bring 5, 10, etc. Class members can do this in connection with their class goals. Pledge to bring so many.
- Have something special going on these days to help attract visitors. WHAT? Each department can have a special attraction for the record breaking days.

A CHURCH WIDE ATTENDANCE PROMOTION FOR TEN WEEKS:

1. A recognition will be given to the class which brings the most visitors during the 10 weeks. From Youth Division down, it will be done by departments.
2. The recognition will be a mission field trip, a Bible or some other gift in keeping with the Sunday School program. This is to be decided.
3. Other -- the winning department will be given a covered-dish supper by the other departments who lost. The winning department would be determined by percentage increase over what the department had averaged the

3 months before the push began (Jan-Feb-Mar).

PROMOTION IS CHURCH WIDE:

- Have attendance posters put up where all could see as to the weekly attendance and the Sunday School progress made.
- A weekly attendance in each department and each class should be posted and noted in the Teacher-Officer meeting.
- Special emphasis can be noted for those who are making a special effort of reaching. Call attention from the pulpit of these classes that are making special effort to bring them in.

NOTE:

I. RECOGNITION

1. Recognition for those classes which bring the most visitors to Sunday School for the 10 weeks period.
2. Recognition given winning department by the other departments. The winning department will be determined by the percentage increase over what that department had averaged the 2 months before the push began.
3. Special recognition given each week to the classes with visitors. This done from pulpit Sunday morning.

II. GOALS

1. Goals are set especially for 2 days.
2. Easter Sunday, April 22nd. This goal for each department and class is 10% of average attendance over January and February, 1973.
3. "Last Round-Up" -- June 3rd. This goal set for each class and department, but it will be 10% added to the average attendance of 2 months of Jan. and Feb.

THE ALASKA TRIP

The pastor will leave Friday, March 15th at 3:20 p.m. from DFW Airport, and arrive in Anchorage, Alaska at 7:10 p.m. The return trip begins at 11:30 p.m. Friday, March 29th and arrive at DFW Airport at 12:10 a.m. on Saturday, March 30th.

There will be 2 weeks of revival there, the first one being at First Church Butte, just outside of Palmer. The pastor works and pastors the church with full time service. The highest attendance for Sunday School in the church is 24, with the average of 12 each Sunday.

Elmer is 50 miles east of Anchorage. There are about 2000 people in this area who need Christ. The Butte church is the only church of any denomination in six miles in one direction and about 30 miles in the other direction, and there are only two directions in that area. The need then is great and Arlington Heights Baptist Church is encouraged to pray for that area and all others who will be in the crusade. Many other pastors from the states will be there at the same time, along with some song leaders. (con't on back)

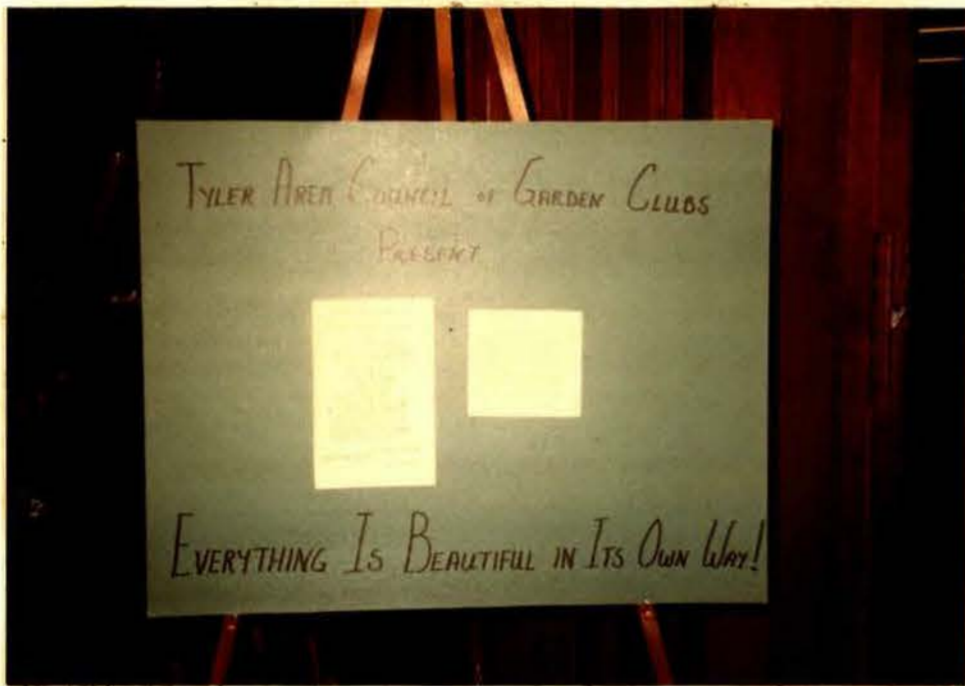

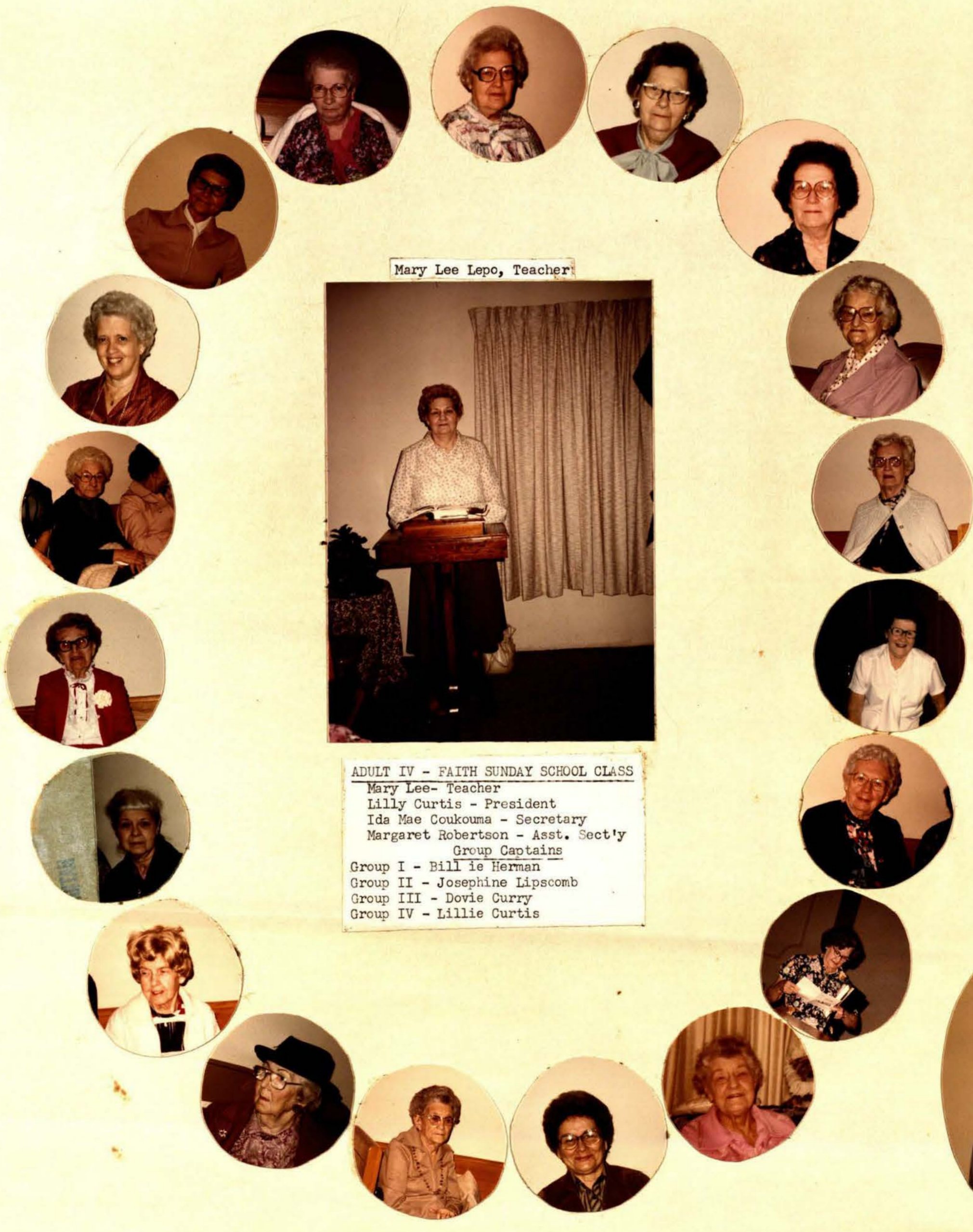

* HISTORY *

1912 On September 23th the Mother Church of the Arlington Heights Baptist Church was founded and organized. It was named "Trinity Park Missionary Baptist Church," with sixty-seven charter members. First services were held under a tent at the corner of West Seventh and Curry Streets.

1913 On September 25-26, at the 27th Annual Session of Tarrant Baptist Association held at Broadway Baptist Church, a petitionary letter from Trinity Park Church was read by the clerk, and messengers Lon Garrett (Pastor), Joe Franks, John Graves, May Burchet and Hightower were welcomed and seated by the moderator on behalf of the association.

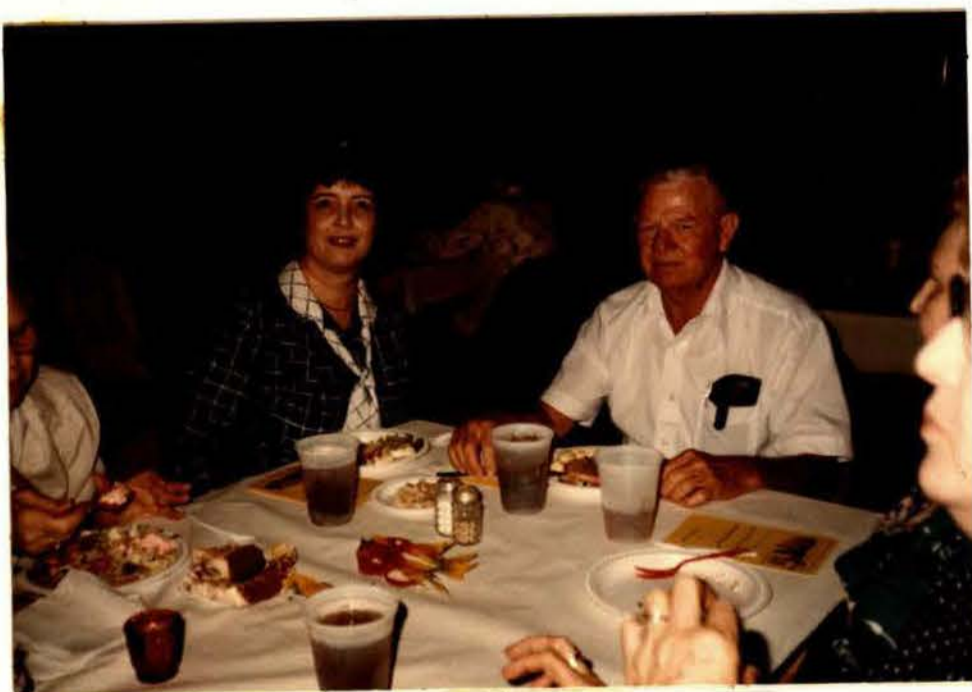
1919 The name of the church was changed to "Soldiers Memorial Church" in honor of the many soldiers of Camp Bowie in its fellowship. During this period the church purchased property and a building on Mattison Street near Montgomery.

1926 The church purchased its present property and changed its name to "Baptist Temple".

1935 The name "Baptist Temple" was confusing to many so the church adopted the name "Arlington Heights Baptist Church" by which it is presently called.
