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Can you believe it's summer? This year is flying by, and rightfully so with everything that has been going on. Tarrant County is working hard to recover from the COVID-19 shutdown while continuing to tackle the fluid pandemic. It's exciting to see the resiliency and compassion of our community. It's also important to be mindful and ease back into routines by practicing recommended health precautions since we still see substantial positive COVID-19 cases in our County. Tarrant County Public Health has a free online screening tool and appointment system that any resident of Tarrant County can use to test for the COVID-19 virus. Visit covidtesting.tarrantcounty.com if you have symptoms and would like to be tested.

You may have noticed in this Northeast Newsletter that we are not highlighting an individual Tarrant County department. We want to commend ALL of our departments for the tremendous and excellent job they have done while we adjusted to COVID-19. Every department has taken on expanded responsibilities, precautions, and has tirelessly and courageously worked to keep our County responsive during the changing environment. Everyone has had a role in our efforts, from keeping our citizens and employees protected from the virus to helping create new programs addressing immediate needs in our community. As the White House has said, response and recovery to the coronavirus pandemic are managed and locally executed by the state, and federally supported. Tarrant County has played a crucial role in this whole-of-government, all-of-America approach to address COVID-19 in coordination with agencies such as the Texas Division of Emergency Management (TDEM), FEMA, U.S. Department of Health and Human Service, and our cities.

The Tarrant County Small Business Assistance Grant Program has been established by the Tarrant County Commissioners Court to utilize \$30 million in CARES Act funding to provide grants to Tarrant County small businesses who have been financially impacted by the COVID-19 public health emergency, with



\$6 million (20%) of this funding allocated for businesses with 51% Minority, Woman or Veteran ownership. The dollar amount of individual grants will be determined by the information provided, the number of eligible grant applications received and the funding pool available, with no individual grant being more than \$10,000. The program will open for application beginning on June 22 at 10 a.m. and will close on July 1 at 6 p.m. Each small business of 25 or fewer employees that applies may qualify for up to \$10,000 depending on meeting various requirements. We hope this small amount will offer relief to sustain our entrepreneurs as they continue to navigate the effects of the pandemic. View more at smallbusiness.tarrantcounty.com.

Over 30 years ago, Mayor Edward Lopez and his wife Violeta chose to make Richland Hills their home. They raised two beautiful daughters in Richland Hills, Violeta, and Grace. 



COVID-19 SMALL BUSINESS ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

The Tarrant County Small Business Assistance Grant program is designed to provide financial assistance to very small businesses that have been adversely affected by the current COVID-19 public health emergency and most likely have found it difficult to apply and access other federal grants or loans through the SBA or traditional banks and lending institutions. This grant program is aimed at assisting small businesses with the costs of business interruption caused by required closures. The dollar amount of individual grants will be determined by the financial information provided, the number of eligible grant applications received and the funding pool available, with no individual grant being more than \$10,000. An amount of \$30 million in CARES Act funds has been allocated by the Tarrant County Commissioners Court to the Small Business Assistance Grant Program for grant funding purposes.



Question of the Month

Question: Texas Facts, 1841 - Did you know that at one time, the entire World Famous Texas Navy was rented out to another country?

Answer: In 1841, Mirabeau B. Lamar, president of the Republic of Texas, made an alliance with Yucatan, which was then in revolt with Mexico, to rent out the Texas Navy (all three ships) for \$8,000 a month. When Sam Houston was inaugurated president in December 1841, he promptly ordered the fleet back to Texas. Since the Yucatans didn't expect the Mexicans to fight for 8 to 12 months, they suspended the agreement with the understanding that it could be renewed when the Texas Navy was needed again.

Tarrant County Commissioner Gary Fickes finds residents solutions by bringing people together. In 2009, the first Empowering Seniors event came to light as a platform for seniors to have access to essential information about services. Also, with the fast growth taking place in Northeast Tarrant County, he saw another need to fill, and in 2010 started the Northeast Tarrant Transportation Summit. He brought community leaders, business owners, and others together to keep everyone informed about transportation construction projects, and to provide an outlet for ongoing dialogue and proposed solutions for our most pressing transportation problems. Both events have served the community for the past ten years.

What most people don't realize is for the past nine years, a significant portion of the proceeds from these two events have gone to area non-profits as a donation. These funds supplement their funding for the transportation assistance they offer area seniors, disabled residents, and help other non-profits with specialized programs for citizens in Tarrant County. It's impossible to share everything on one page that makes a city great, but we hope to scratch the surface on what makes each city a wonderful place to live, work, and play.

Northeast Tarrant County is home to 16 municipalities in one of the most urbanized regions in the State of Texas. Commissioner Fickes, along with Tarrant County, partners with many entities, including our cities. With these partnerships, our communities continue to thrive via road projects, economic development, public health services, public safety, and emergency management.

Watauga, a community of more than 24,555 residents, is located in the northeast quadrant of Tarrant County in the DFW Metroplex. Watauga is just a short eight miles to downtown Fort Worth, and a quick 11 miles to DFW International Airport. The city's prominent location, and well-traveled roadways have created a healthy business climate for commerce.

Great schools, parks, events, and an award-winning library pave the way for a great lifestyle for residents. Birdville ISD and Keller ISD serve diverse communities and have systems of innovative learning approaches that respond to the unique needs, interests, and talents of all students. The Watauga Public Library was the proud recipient of the 2019 Achievement of Excellence in Libraries Award for the 8th consecutive year, placing them in the top 10% of public libraries in Texas!

Thanks to the Watauga Patrol Division, Watauga continues to focus on prosperity by maintaining a low crime rate. The Division consists of two-day shifts and two-night shifts that provide for public safety by maintaining order, responding to emergencies, protecting people and property, enforcing motor vehicle and criminal laws, and promoting good community relations. They strive to provide the highest quality police services while safeguarding individual liberties and building positive community relationships.

The Watauga Fire Department is a full-service organization that consists of 1 Engine Company, 1 M.I.C.U. ambulance and a cross staffed Quint/M.I.C.U. They employ 27 personnel, including the Fire Chief, Assistant Fire Chief, Fire Marshal, 3 Lieutenants, 3 Driver/Engineers, and 18 Firefighter/Paramedics. Their mission is to safeguard the lives and property and to enhance the quality of life of any person that resides, works, or visits the City of Watauga.

Watauga has so many things to offer its residents, from a central location, affordable housing, and a low tax rate, to a great variety of shops and restaurants. Their small-town atmosphere strikes just the right balance of community pride and involvement for a quality of life that meets the needs of their citizens.

Tarrant County Residents Can Still Fill Out The Census Online

Tarrant County has the highest response rate of large urban counties in Texas. In Tarrant County, 62.1% of households have responded to the 2020 U.S. Census. Overall, Tarrant County's total response rate in the 2010 Census was 66.8%. While our community has made great progress on our Census response, it is essential that we continue to increase our response rate and eclipse our 2010 level.

The U.S. Census Bureau is resuming activities, and offices in Tarrant County are beginning to open. This means the Census Bureau is currently hiring enumerators and other temporary worker positions. To apply and find out more information, please visit 2020census.gov/jobs. If you have not taken the 2020 Census, it's not too late to fill it out online. Go to my2020census.gov and complete your Census. Any information you give the Census Bureau is confidential and will be used for many government activities and programs including allocation of federal funding, economic development, and redistricting. An Historic Moment In Time "The United States Census"


The decennial census has been taken since before the Constitution's ratification in the early 17th century and continues today. In almost all the British colonies that became the United States, they took a count of the number of people. The country's needs and interests became more complex, requiring a need for statistics to help people understand what was happening and to give them a basis for planning. Therefore, the content of the decennial census changed accordingly. In 1810, the first inquiry on manufacturers, quantity, and value of products occurred; in 1840, they counted fisheries; and in 1850, the census included questions on social issues, such as taxation, churches, pauperism, and crime.

As a result of the census's evolution, the constitutionally mandated census has grown to provide valuable information about the U.S. population and its housing. The economic and government censuses and the demographic and economic surveys, combined with census data for statistical information, serve a variety of needs.

The U.S. Census Bureau provides governments, scholars, planners, businesses, and individuals the data they need to build schools, plan highways, open businesses, and distribute the billions of dollars in federal spending that sustains a growing population.

The censuses also spread geographically, to new states and territories added to the Union, as well as to other areas under U.S. sovereignty or jurisdiction. It took close to a full decade to publish the results of the

1880 census, due to the numerous inquiries. In response to this,




Political and technological changes, and the shifting public demand for information, have all shaped the modern census and the mission of the Census Bureau. Although the U.S. Census Bureau carries out hundreds of surveys every year, its most well-known duty is still to conduct the decennial census. Census results have several high-profile applications: they are used to reapportion seats in the House of Representatives, to realign congressional districts, and as a factor in the formulas that distribute hundreds of billions of dollars in federal fund each year. Because of the importance of this population count, procedural changes in the decennial census often reflect larger organizational shifts at the Census Bureau.

Tax Help Available with VITA Tarrant County VITA sites are currently closed to prevent the spread of COVID-19. However, the City of Fort Worth has introduced Taxes to Go! The program provides free VITA tax filing assistance via email through July 15. The IRS has extended the tax filing deadline to July 15 because of COVID-19.

How It Works

- 1. Download the following forms and checklist:
- 2. Form 13614-C
- 3. Form 14446 Checklist

Email the completed forms to VITA@fortworthtexas.gov

- Watch for a confirmation email from VITA; reply to confirm a phone appointment.
- Watch for completed tax return by email; review for accuracy.
- Agree to allow VITA to submit your return electronically; save a copy of your return.

Frequently Asked Questions

Who is eligible?

- Taxpayers who make **less than \$58,000** per year.
- Individuals who are filing their current year 2019 taxes.

Who is NOT eligible?

- Taxpayers who use the Married Filing Separately Status.
- Taxpayers who have rental income.
- Taxpayers who need to amend a tax return that has already been filed.
- Taxpayers who need to file for prior years (2018, 2017, 2016).

What technology will I need? You will need to complete the required forms using a smartphone or computer. You will need access to the internet, as well as a working phone number and email address. You may scan or photograph documents with a smartphone camera to <a href="mailto:emailto:

How long will the process take? Give yourself at least 30 minutes to complete the required forms (13614-C and 14446). Additional time will vary depending on how many documents you need to scan/photograph and email to VITA. A tax preparer and reviewer could take up to an hour with you by phone depending on the complexity of the return.

What will I need for my phone appointment? Have with you all relevant tax forms and receipts for 2019, Social Security numbers for yourself, spouse and any dependents. If you think you'll receive a refund, please also have your bank account information on hand.

Is it safe to email my information to VITA? VITA best practices for security include:

- An encrypted email system to process your return.
- Secure online software called Taxslayer, which provides multiple security measures such as multi-factor authentication and reCaptcha during log-in.

VITA ensures that clients' data is wiped clean within 24 hours of completing the final tax return. Where's my refund? If you haven't received your refund yet, go to the IRS website and use the Where's My Refund tool. You will need to know your social security number, filing status and refund amount.

Where can I get a copy of my tax return transcript or tax account transcript? You can obtain a *free* copy by either <u>ordering your transcript online</u>, calling the IRS Transcript Order Line at 1-800-908-9946, or printing and filling out <u>Form 4506-T</u> before mailing or faxing it to the address listed on the form.

Can I file my taxes for free without using VITA? Yes. MyFreeTaxes.com is a free software from H&R Block that helps identify your potential eligibility for tax credits and deductions, and allows you to file your taxes for free.

Driver Safety

Work zones present a different environment for drivers to navigate. Drivers are likely to encounter uneven pavement, narrow lanes, concrete barriers, slow-moving heavy equipment, and vehicles that make sudden stops. Please keep the following tips in mind when driving through work zones:

- Slow down and always follow posted work zone speed limits. Remember, traffic fines double in work zones when workers are present and can cost up to \$2,000.
- Pay attention as workers and heavy equipment may only be a few feet from passing vehicles.
- Don't tailgate. Give yourself room to stop in a hurry. Rear-end collisions are the most common kind of work zone crashes
- Stay alert, minimize distractions, and put the phone away.
- Watch out for road crews. The only protective gear they wear is a vest, hard hat, and safety boots. Their bodies are no match for your vehicle.
- Allow extra time. Road construction slows things down. Count on it and plan for it.
