Mayor Pat McGrail



Mayor Pat McGrail has seen and shaped a lot of change in Keller since making it his home in 1989, but his community pride is still rooted in the things that attracted him to the city in the first place: wonderful people and exceptional quality of life.

"What I love most about Keller is its small-town feel and charm," he says.
"Even though we continue to grow — we're getting close to 45,000 residents — we've been able to maintain that neighborly feel that people love, and that's really important to me."

McGrail was elected to his fourth term as mayor in May 2017, but his service to the community stretches back long before that. He got his start serving on boards — the Keller Development Corporation, which approves funding for parks capital projects, the Old Town Keller Committee and the Zoning Board of Adjustment. Leading up to his first mayoral election in 2007, he also served five terms on the Keller City Council, spending four years as mayor pro-tem, and lent his time to the 2006 Keller ISD Bond Committee.

He also remains active in the Greater Keller Chamber of Commerce, Keller Rotary Club, Keller Lions Club, Tarrant County Mayor's Council and Tarrant Regional Transportation Council, and serves on the Baylor Scott & White Medical Center — Grapevine Board of Directors.

In his private life McGrail has been retired since 2005 from a 38-year career with American Airlines, where he finished his tenure with an 18-year stretch as Regional Director for operations in 28 states and Canada. And following the 2009 passing of Geri, his wife and the mother of his children, he found love again upon being introduced to the secretary of his

church. He and wife Pauline remain active members of Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton Catholic Church, and share three grown children each and five grandchildren.

Tarrant County Veteran Services



The Tarrant County Veteran Services Office is an advocate agency established to assist veterans and/or their survivors to obtain entitled benefits from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) and the State of Texas. The office is a part of -- and is funded by -- Tarrant County and *not* a part of the U. S. Department of Veterans Affairs, more commonly known as the "VA".

Tarrant County Veteran Services' motto is "Leave No Veteran Behind". The office works extremely hard to ensure that high levels of customer service are provided to veterans and their family members. Tarrant County is the 4th largest county by veteran population in the state. Veterans have traveled from outside county lines because of the reputation the department has built. All veterans are seen through walk-in services and by appointments.

A comfortable atmosphere helps earn the trust and respect of the clients on every visit. The office has an open door policy with the veterans served and ensures clients that they will be guided through entire benefits process. Often, a veteran is looking for someone to listen to them and not rush them out of the door. Tarrant County Veteran Services offers the necessary time for each visit.

These past two years have been busy ones for Veteran Services. From October 2017 to March 2018, the office has assisted 1865 total veterans, surviving spouses and eligible dependents. The previous year, during this same period (October-March), it assisted 1282 clients, which shows that this year it has already assisted 583 more veterans than the previous year. This includes benefit representation, VA advocacy and complete case management between a

staff of five service sfficers and one administrative assistant. Last year, the office assisted a total of 2862 clients and to date, they have already serviced 1865 veterans putting Tarrant County on track to break 3000 veterans served. So far during this fiscal year, Veteran Services has also assisted 997 first-time clients. The office works for Tarrant County Veterans and their survivors, free of charge!

Answer: There are 277 volcanos in the United States. Scientists consider 169 of the 277 volcanos active

- An active volcano is a volcano that has had at least one eruption during the past 10,000 years. An active volcano might be erupting or dormant.
- A dormant volcano is an active volcano that is not erupting, but supposed to erupt again.
- An extinct volcano has not had an eruption for at least 10,000 years and is not expected to erupt again in a comparable time scale of the future.

The Town of Trophy Club and Trophy Club Police Department ioined forces and facilities with the November 18, 2017 grand opening of the new 24,000 square foot Administration Facility. The joint facility allows Town Hall (approximately 9,500 square feet) and Police Administration (approximately 11,200 square feet) to share building functions while reducing overall square footage needs. In addition to the public spaces and lobby. Town Hall and Police Administration also share Mechanical, Electrical, Server/ IT rooms, and an all-employee break room (approximately 3,300 square feet in total).

Included in the building are a large conference room, Town Council Chambers, and multi-use community

room which are designed for the residents and various civic groups to use. The Community Room will function as a training room, voting center, and Emergency Operations Center in times of crisis.

In an effort to decrease the Town's carbon footprint, the staff has taken extra measures to make this facility as eco-friendly as possible. This has been accomplished through a variety of techniques including adjustments both



inside and outside of the building. The building façade includes regionally-sourced brick veneer highlighted with cast stone and metal accents. Included in the facility are high-efficiency windows and insulation which reduce heating and cooling costs. In addition, both interior and exterior lighting fixtures are energy efficient, 100% LED lighting. A clerestory window separating Council Chambers from the lobby allows natural light into the room from the rotunda. And lastly, environmentally sustainable DIRTT modular wall partitions assure adaptability to any future changes in town functions, personnel, or office configuration.

TARRANT FOOD BANK

The Tarrant Area Food Bank (TAFB), based in Fort Worth, holds the belief that all people deserve regular, nutritious meals. TAFB works to empower communities

to eliminate hunger by providing food, education and resources through innovation and collaboration.

Tarrant Area Food Bank was founded in 1982 by a group of Fort Worth residents concerned about hunger in their community. Three months after opening in October 1982, the organization had distributed donated food to 50 charities in Fort Worth, thanks to commercial donors and a holiday food drive by the Fort Worth community.

Today, Tarrant Area Food Bank works with a network of 270 hunger relief organizations to provide food in 13 North Texas counties: Tarrant, Bosque, Cooke, Denton, Erath, Hamilton, Hill, Hood, Johnson, Palo Pinto, Parker, Somervell and Wise.

In TAFB's service area, one in six people and one in four children face hunger. Each week, TAFB provides access to more than 500,000 nutritious meals. In 2017, Tarrant Area Food Bank provided access to 26 million nutritious meals.

In addition to providing food for hungry North Texans, TAFB provides education and resources to the community through several programs. From free culinary training in TAFB's Community Kitchen to free gardening workshops in the TAFB Learning Garden, Tarrant Area Food Bank is focused on helping the community thrive.





There are three main ways you can support Tarrant Area Food Bank's work. One way to help is to make a monetary donation. Every dollar donated helps provide five meals. Another way to help is to donate food. Some of the most requested items are canned meats, canned fruits and vegetables, rice and peanut butter. Finally, you can sign up to volunteer. An Historical Moment in Time

"It's all in how you say it!"

Haslet, Texas, located 15 miles north of Fort Worth, has a unique story about the origin of their name.

When the railroad came through in 1886, the story goes Santa Fe requested permission to build on the ranchland owned by Charles L. Maloney, one of the first settlers.

Maloney told the railroad agent to "let the wheels of progress roll across someone else's property" and he considered the matter closed. However, Maloney's wife convinced her husband that being able to ride the train to Fort Worth from their property would be a delight.

Maloney saddled his horse and rode to the railroad headquarters to give his permission. The message sent by telegraph to the company's head office read, "Mr. Maloney HAS LET the railroad through."

Records show that the railroad contractor was from Haslet, Michigan, and he could have been the one who selected the name. But many local residents prefer the telegraph tale.

(Pictured left) A *Star-Telegram* photo (Jan. 14, 1929) shows ranch hands placing snubs on the horns of one obstinate cow, and the title reads, "It Takes Real Cowboys for This!" In the captions it says "All of the employees of the Staley Ranch took a hand Saturday in preparing 12 buffaloes for shipment to San Saba." The small herd, part of the famous Goodnight collection and owned by J.I. Staley, a Wichita Falls oilman, was sold to J.E. Barnes, a San Saba cattleman for \$1,050." Staying Safe in the Heat

When the temperature climbs above 90°F, senior citizens need to be proactive and take precautions. Check the outside temperature on summer days. If it's above 90°, please keep in mind the following tips:

- STAY OUT OF THE SUN!
- AIR-CONDITIONING is your friend. Spend as much time as possible in air-conditioned spaces. If you don't have an air-conditioner, go somewhere that is air-conditioned. Read a book at the library, walk around in indoor malls, watch that new movie at the theater, or meet your friends at the senior center.
- STAY HYDRATED. Drink plenty of cool water.
- DRESS APPROPRIATELY. Whenever you can, try wearing loose, light-colored clothes. Top it off with a lightweight, broad-brimmed hat.
- DID SOMEONE SAY SUNBURN? Use broad spectrum sunscreen with sun protection factor (SPF) of 15 or higher.

DFW Connector Project • On May 1, the DFW Connector Project celebrated the substantial completion of the SH 121/360 interchange project! Completed seven months ahead of schedule, this was the first Texas Clear Lanes project to break ground – an initiative aimed at reducing gridlock in some of the state's most congested areas. Special thanks to Commissioner Fickes for attending our event

and supporting our project since the beginning. • Later this summer, the DFW Connector Project will continue with the I-635/SH 121 interchange project. This project will increase capacity and connectivity between I-635, SH 121, SH 26 and FM 2499 north of DFW Airport. Additionally, crews will rebuild and widen the Bass Pro Drive bridge. Construction will last (Ribbon cutting May 1, 2018) through 2022.

•The NTE 35W construction project is 96% complete with approximately four miles of new TEXpress Lanes open from I-820 to Northside Dr. The contractor is working diligently on laying the final layer of asphalt between Northside Dr. and I-30 while work is still progressing on the future TEXpress ramps at SH 121 and I-30. The remaining TEXpress Lanes from Northside Dr. to I-30 are on schedule to open later this

• SH 26 phase 2 construction activity is continuing in the center area between the north and southbound travel lanes between Centerpark Drive and John McCain Road. Current construction activity consists of concrete pavement placement beginning near Centerpark Drive and on the Little Bear Creek Bridge on the west side of SH 26. Oak Pointe Drive has been re-aligned with Tinker Road to improve safety and operations

at the intersection. Lane closures throughout the project limits are possible from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. (weather permitting) and SH 26 could be reduced to one lane at times. • The \$38.2 million project in Colleyville from John McCain Road to Brown Trail will improve mobility and safety, and consists of the widening of SH 26 from four lanes with a continuous left turn lane to six lanes with raised curb medians with left turn bays, continuous sidewalks and improved signals.  Roadway reconstruction from Brookforest Drive/ Kingswood Drive to Randol Mill Avenue on the north end of the FM 1938 project continues with the rebuilding of drainage in that area. Construction of a screen wall for the Myers Meadow subdivision located on the east side of FM 1938 near Johnson Road will begin soon. The current speed limit of 30 mph throughout the project limits will remain in effect until

the project has been completed due to safety. • The 1.6 mile project widened the existing two-lane roadway to a four-lane roadway with curbed medians including dual left turn bays at the intersection of FM 1938 and FM 1709 which has improved traffic flow through the intersection. The project is estimated to be completed in 2018.
