The new budget year for Tarrant County will begin on October 1st. I am excited that the Tarrant County Commissioners Court was able to adopt a county general budget tax rate of \$0.234 which is lower than last year's rate of \$0.244. The Tarrant County Hospital District (JPS) adopted tax rate is \$0.224429 which is the same tax rate as the previous year. Tarrant County's combined tax rate is the lowest in the state of the five major urban counties. Check out more from Commissioners Court by visiting www.tarrantcounty.com.

JPS HOSPITAL BOND INITIATIVE



On Tuesday, August 14, Tarrant County Commissioners unanimously approved an order to call an election to authorize the issuance of \$800 million in bonds to acquire, construct, improve, equip or enlarge facilities of the Tarrant County Hospital District, operating as the JPS Health Network.

The no tax rate increase bond will appear on the November 6th ballot.

Proposed improvements include a new mental and behavioral health hospital, a new main hospital tower, needed upgrades to the JPS Level One Trauma center (which is the only Level One Trauma center in Tarrant County), a new cancer center, four new regional health centers, and a new ambulatory surgical center. Also planned are needed upgrades in the JPS Hospital system for training our local nurses, doctors and healthcare providers.

New countywide patient care clinics which interact with the health care needs of our families and local school districts are proposed and will model the new JPS Northeast Medical Home scheduled to open on October 11th in Euless.

The Commissioners Court is required by law to call any bond election authorizing this issuance of tax-supported bonds by the Hospital District. It is currently anticipated that the bonds authorized by the election will be issued in several series over the next several years.

"This is a process more than two years in the making, and since the bond's first inception, costs have only gone up. As a result, now is a time to call the bond," says Commissioner Gary Fickes.

The Tarrant County Hospital District serves all residents of Tarrant County.

Check Out The New Digs at DFW International Airport!

If you've driven around DFW Airport, you've probably noticed there's no shortage of digging going on.

"There is active construction on five of DFW's ten planned development districts right now, so we are really moving forward," says John Terrell, vice president of Commercial Development. "What most people see from Airport Freeway is Passport Park, but we have many more construction sites active at the moment."

One active site is Southgate Plaza, already home to DFW Airport Headquarters and a Hyatt Place Hotel. Located in Euless at International Parkway and Rental Car Drive, the Southgate Plaza development also includes Code3



Emergency and a Starbucks café. Later this year, a new U.S. Post Office will open, followed by a new Hyatt House Hotel in 2020.

Around the Airport, you can find other sites under construction. The International Logistics Center, along South Airfield Drive west of International Parkway, is a three-building complex designed to meet the ever-growing demand for warehouse



and logistics space largely driven by e-commerce. The 40-acre business park includes three buildings totaling more than 640,000 square feet of space.

"That's an ideal project for Airport development," says Terrell. "It fits in perfectly with the Land Use Plan



developed over the past decade."

Across Airfield Drive, work is underway on what will be the DFW Southwest Campus, including the new Department of Public Safety headquarters.

The aforementioned Passport Park, one of the largest development districts planned at DFW, is emerging on the far south end of the Airport, and will eventually cover 600 acres of land including a large 300-acre warehouse district.

All these projects serve the DFW Airport mission of creating economic impact for the Dallas Fort Worth region while driving new revenue streams that allow DFW Airport to become even more cost competitive. And we all dig that.

Question: Which presidents are celebrated on Mount Rushmore?

Answer: George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, Abraham Lincoln, and Theodore Roosevelt. This grand presidential tourist attraction in the Black Hills of South Dakota was the brainchild of historian Jonah LeRoy "Doane" Robinson. Sculptor Gutzon Borglum chose to carve the heads of Washington, Jefferson, Lincoln, and Roosevelt because he wanted to draw visitors from across the nation. It took from October 1927 to October 1941 to turn the mountain into a monumental work of art.

An Historical Moment in Time

Camp Bowie

Named for Alamo defender James Bowie (1795-1836), who said he would rather die in these ditches (defending the Alamo) than give it up to the enemy, Camp Bowie was a World War I training camp founded some hundred years ago in the area now known as Arlington Heights in west Fort Worth. Serving as headquarters for the 36th Division of the United States Army from 1917-1919, it was established to train the Texas and Oklahoma National Guard after the U.S. entered the World War. The first troops to arrive slept in

deep Johnson grass that covered the then undeveloped suburb. By Nov. 1917, the 36th had 25,000 men at Camp Bowie and on July 8, 1918, they were shipped to France, to form a reserve for the French Armies. Soon, they entered into the thick of battle at a pivotal time in the war. After nightfall, on October 6th, the 36th occupied a segment of the fighting front. Two days later, the unit from Camp Bowie captured St. Etienne-A-Arnes, then fought in the Meuse-Argonne operation that shattered the German Army and assured

victory to the Allies; a pivotal victory towards bringing Armistice on November 11, 1918. The 36th, also known as the Panther Division due to Fort Worth being the Panther City, stayed to help stabilize the region and did not have all its men on U.S. soil again until June 11, 1919. After demobilization, Camp Bowie reverted to civilian use. When the Texas National Guard entered World War II, its new camp at Brownwood was also named Bowie. To give an idea of the size of the camp, it extended from White Settlement Road in the north to Granbury Road in the south; from University Drive on the east to Lake Como on the west.

• On August 13th, NorthGate, TxDOT and the City of Grapevine broke ground on the new I-635/SH 121 interchange project. The \$370 million project is the next big piece of the DFW Connector and will reconstruct and increase connectivity between I-635, SH 121, SH 26 and FM 2499. At 3 miles long, the project will also widen

• The North Tarrant Express 35W project is substantially complete. There is some ongoing work to complete the direct connectors at Belknap St./Weatherford St. and I-30 to the I-35W TEXpress Lanes. This work, which is part of the additional scope added after the project began, is expected to be complete by the end of the year.

• SH 26 construction is progressing with work starting from near Pleasant Run to John McCain Road which includes drainage installation on the east side of SH 26. Activity south of Centerpark Drive consists of work on the Little Bear Creek Bridge and drainage installation to be followed by pavement construction of the new

southbound travel lanes. Mill Valley Road at SH 26 has been reconstructed and is now open. • The \$38.2 million project in Colleyville from John McCain Road to Brown Trail will improve mobility and safety, and consists of the widening of SH 26 from four lanes with a continuous left turn lane to six lanes with raised curb medians with left turn bays, continuous sidewalks and improved signals. The project is estimated for completion in 2019.

• Roadway reconstruction on the north end of the FM 1938 project continues with the rebuilding of drainage in that area to be followed by pavement construction. Construction of a screen wall for the Myers Meadow subdivision located on the east side of FM 1938 near Johnson Road has begun with crews drilling shafts for columns. The current speed limit of 30 mph throughout

the project limits will remain in effect until the project has been completed due to safety. • The 1.6-mile project widens the existing two-lane roadway to a four-lane roadway with curbed medians including dual left turn bays at the intersection of FM 1938 and FM 1709 which has improved traffic flow through the intersection. The project is estimated for substantial completion by the end of 2018.
