


*Figure 4. Proportion of Tarrant County female IPV deaths by child outcome, 2016-2020* 





## **Intimate Partner Violence (IPV)**


Unhealthy actions or threats between current or previous spouses or dating partners. IPV includes several forms of violence: digital, financial, mental/emotional, physical, sexual, and stalking. IPV varies in severity and how often it occurs. IPV happens in heterosexual and same-sex relationships, and among all gender identities. Many agencies and reports focus on heterosexual female victims of IPV due to current data limitations. However, the Texas Council on Family Violence started to include male victims and LGBTQ+ victims in their annual fatality reports in 2018. IPV is sometimes called **Domestic Violence** 

or a subgroup of **Family Violence**. Family Violence is between family or household members and can include children.
