## Human Trafficking


**Human Trafficking:** the exploitation of individuals using force, fraud, or coercion (assault/violence, manipulation, false promises, debt, isolation, threats, confiscating identification documents, etc.) to make them provide **labor/services** or engage in **commercial sex** (any sex act in exchange for anything of value). When a minor (<18 years) is made to engage in commercial sex it is considered human trafficking regardless of the use of force, fraud, or coercion.

Human trafficking <u>does not require</u> the movement of individuals across state or international borders. Human trafficking can include recruitment, harboring, transportation, provision, obtaining, patronizing, or soliciting someone for labor/services and/or commercial sex.

<u>Venues for labor trafficking</u>: domestic work, landscaping, factory, farming/agriculture, construction, door-to-door sales, health/beauty, food service, hotel/hospitality, illicit activity, entertainment, commercial cleaning, begging/peddling, etc. <u>Venues for sex trafficking</u>: fake massage/spa businesses, online ads, pornography, street-based, escort services, bars/clubs, truck stops, hotels/motels, residential brothels, etc.


Traffickers can be anyone (family members, intimate partners, friends, peers, strangers, business owners, employers, gangs, etc.) and any gender, age, and race/ethnicity. It's critical to sufficiently prosecute traffickers and buyers in order to reduce the supply and demand of human trafficking, and not penalize victims/survivors. Criminal records make it extremely difficult for survivors to acquire employment, housing, child care, etc.

Figure 1. Texas human trafficking cases and victims reported to the National Human Trafficking Hotline (NHTH), 2017-2021 (n=4,816 cases; n=11,021 victims)



The NHTH uses the word **case** to represent distinct situations of trafficking reported to the hotline (via phone call, text, e-mail, online report, or webchat), but it is not an indication of law enforcement involvement in the situation. A case can involve one or more potential **victims** of trafficking. Data are subject to change and the NHTH cannot verify accuracy. These data are not a comprehensive representation of human trafficking within an area.

Figure 3. Age, gender, and citizenship status among Texas cases reported to the NHTH, 2017-2021



Individuals reporting to the NHTH may not provide demographic information and these data are non-cumulative. NHTH reports demographic data at the case level, and does not disclose exact data when responses occur less than three times. Data are subject to change.

Figure 2. Types of human trafficking among Texas cases reported to the NHTH, 2017-2021 (n= 4,816)





Figure 4. Top 5 reported locations of sex and labor trafficking among Texas cases reported to the NHTH, 2017-2021

Figure 6. JPS Health Network patients identified as possible human trafficking victims by year and gender, 2020-2022




Figure 5. JPS Health Network patients identified as possible human trafficking victims by age group and gender, 2020-2022





Figure 7. JPS Health Network patients identified as possible human trafficking victims by year and age group, 2020-2022
