TEEN DATING VIOLENCE

<u>Teen Dating Violence (TDV)</u>: unhealthy actions or threats that occur in a teenage dating relationship with a current or previous partner. TDV is a type of **intimate partner violence (IPV)** [see Data Brief] and can occur in several ways:

Digital- using technology to track, bully, or control a partner.

Financial- controlling or abusing a partner's money or job.


<u>Physical</u>- using physical force to harm a partner on purpose.

<u>Psychological</u>- verbal and non-verbal communication that harms a partner's mental and emotional health.

Sexual- forcing sex and related acts (kissing, sexting, touching, etc.) without a partner's consent.

<u>Stalking</u>- undesired contact or attention causing a partner to experience fear, anxiety, and feeling unsafe. These forms of TDV can occur in-person and electronically. TDV happens in heterosexual and same-sex relationships and among all gender identities. TDV is considered an adverse childhood experience (ACE).

Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS) Dating Violence Questions

Among high school students who dated or went out with someone during the 12 months before the survey:


- Being physically hurt on purpose (hit, slammed into something, or injured with an object or weapon) by someone they were dating or going out with, one or more times during the 12 months before the survey.
- Being forced to do sexual things (kissing, touching, or being physically forced to have sexual intercourse) they did not want to do by someone they were dating or going out with, one or more times during the 12 months before the survey.

In 2021, a significantly higher percentage of Texas students reported physical dating violence (12.8%) compared to Fort Worth Independent School District (FWISD) (5.8%) and U.S. (8.5%) students. The percentage of Texas students who reported physical dating violence was significantly higher in 2021 (12.8%) compared to 2019 (8.3%) and 2017 (7.1%).

In 2019, a significantly higher percentage of U.S. students reported sexual dating violence (8.2%) compared to Texas students (5.4%). The percentage of U.S. students who reported sexual dating violence was significantly higher in 2021 (9.7%) compared to 2017 (6.9%).
